WARRANT

To Geo. A. Simmons, a constable in the town of Kingfield, in the county of Franklin, State of Maine,

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Kingfield, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at French's Hall in said town, on the fifth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk and all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Free High school for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for heating and janitor work for Free High school for the ensuing year.
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for text books for schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs on school houses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for supplies for schools for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor for the ensuing year.

- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray town charges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town debts.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs of roads and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for collection of taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the abatement of taxes for the ensuing year,
- Art. 15. To see what the town will vote in regard to the collection of taxes, when made payable, what discount to be allowed and interest charged.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay hydrant rental, street lights and interest on town debts.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid, as provided in section 20 of chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 18. To see what action the town will take in regard to appropriating and raising money for state aid highway construction as provided in chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 19. To see whether the town will vote to raise money, and what sum, for the maintenance of state aid highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of sections 9 and 18 of chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the use of the fire department for the ensuing year.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the use of the Webster Free Library for the ensuing year.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for teaching music in schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Wing Spool & Bobbin Co. to place any additional street lights, and if so where the same shall be located.
- Art 24. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to file application and soundings with the State Highway Commission for a concrete bridge to replace the Norton bridge.
- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to raise money to pay the amount due on the pianos in the schools.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will accept and build a town way as laid out by the Municipal officers on the 27th day of January, 1917, on petition of M. D. P. Thompson, beginning at a point on Maple Street near the north end of the concrete bridge, thence running westerly across land of S. J. Williamson to land of M. D. P. Thompson, known as the Island Lot, and damages awarded of one hundred and twenty-five dollars; also to see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay damage and build said road.
- Art. 27. To see what action the town will take in regard to sections 8 and 17, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916, and of Chapter 272 of the Public Laws of 1915, which provide for the proper maintenance at the joint expense of the towns and the State, of State Highways and State Aid highways, together with a certain mileage of unimproved roads under the patrol system.

Art. 28, To see what action the town will take in regard to watering tubs, and what sum of money they will raise for the same.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at French's Hall at eight o'clock A. M., on on the day of said meeting.

- Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to authorize its superintending school committee to join with either or any of the following towns, Salem, Freeman, Strong, New Portland, or such other town or towns as it may deem expedient, for the purpose of employing a superintendent of schools in accordance with the provisions of Sections 55 to 62 inclusive, of Chapter 16, of the Revised Statutes.
- Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of Superintendent of schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.



Annual Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Municipal Officers and Citizens of Kingfield:

Again it becomes necessary to make to you my report.

High School

At the opening of the fall term we registered an attendance of eighty-three. During the first few weeks three were dropped from our list. Since that time the attendance has steadily held to eighty.

After the first week of the fall term by a vote of the superintending school committee, another teacher was employed. This time the additional teacher was for the important branch—English. If any branch of the curriculum has been slighted it has been this branch. Miss Muriel Payson of Wheaton College was employed for the position. Good work has been done in this department and the future will reveal how well Miss Payson is laying the foundation for English work.

During the summer vacation Miss Beulah Irwin resigned from the Music and History department. Her place was filled by Miss Mabel Sargent. Miss Sargent has increased the efficiency of the Music department. The fundamentals have been taught and the basis laid for excellent work now and in the future.

Miss Ella Maxcy has had charge of the foreign languages. By the addition of an extra teacher, it has not been necessary for the classes to be doubled as in the past, thus giving time for each individual scholar in classes.

Needs of the High School

The school needs more room if you wish to provide for future growth. This year it was necessary to use the book room for a recitation room. This has resulted in a chaotic condition of books, etc.

The ideal way would be to remove all grade scholars from the present building. The mixing of High School scholars with those of the Common Schools has never been satisfactory and never will be. If this method is not adopted some arrangement should be made for more room.

Additions should be made to the school library. I herewith present to you a letter sent me by the Agent for Secondary Education, Josiah Taylor, expressing his views of our needs.

State of Maine State Superintendent of Public Schools Augusta

To the Superintendent of Schools,

Kingfield, Me.

My dear Sir:

An examination of the library material reported as belonging to the high school together with my personal observations in the school makes it clear to me that there is a very serious deficiency in the material provided for this purpose. By referring to the pamphlet issued by this office entitled "High School Libraries" you will find what are regarded as the minimum essentials for a high school library. I am writ-

ing at this time to urge that you incorporate in your annual report a recommendation, endorsed by your committee, that an appropriation be made for this purpose. This appropriation should be sufficient to purchase material that will bring the school library up to the extent of that suggested in the pamphlet mentioned.

The library is rapidly coming to be recognized to be as important to successful work in the high school as any other factor in its equipment. In the case of your school in particular, I believe you need not hesitate to urge vigorously that the lack of suitable reading to supplement textbooks and provide for an acquaintance with the best in literature be met by adequate appropriation by the town.

Common Schools

Th common schools have had the same teachers with the exception of Miss Winnifred Gould taking the place of Miss Nellie Greenleaf in the 2nd and 3rd grades. Later Miss Gould was changed to the 4th grade upon the resignation of Mrs. Mabel Butts. Miss Dorris Viles was elected to take the place of Miss Gould in the 2nd and 3rd grades.

During the summer vacation modern seats were added to the 1st grade room. These seats, I assure you have been appreciated both by the scholars and their teacher, Mrs. Small.

Needs

Modern seats should be installed in the 2nd and 3rd grade room. School rooms throughout the building would then be equipped with modern seats.

I would also advise a piazza for the front of the lower grade building. Steel rods were placed on the roof of this building to prevent accidents caused by snow slides, but a sure preventative against such an accident would be a piazza.
