Town Warrant

State of Maine, County of Franklin, ss.

To L. P. Hinds, a constable in the town of Kingfield, county of Franklin, State of Maine,

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Kingfield, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at French's Hall in said town on Monday, the fifth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside in said meeting.

- Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear reports of town officers and take action thereon.
- Art. 4. To choose all other town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the Corner at Chester Durrell's through to the Freeman road, that leads from Kingfield to Salem, Maine.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road from the Corner at Chester Durrell's into the Gilbert's Mill, so called.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to discontinue renting public hydrants from the Kingfield Water Company after July 1, 1928.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the public watering tub.

- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to buy a Motor Pumping Engine for fire service, and to raise money for the purchase of said engine.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for elementary and secondary schools, including teachers' wages and board, fuel, janitor service, conveyance, tuition, and board of pupils, text books, reference books and school supplies for desk and laboratory use.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs on schoolhouses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the salary of Superintendent of Schools:
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for services of Health Officer.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay insurance premiums.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town charges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of roads and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the collection of taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the discount and abatement of taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 20. To see what the town will vote in regard to the collection of taxes, when made payable, what discount to be allowed and interest charged.

- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay hydrant rental, and interest on town debts.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in section 18, of Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 23. To see what action the town will take in regard to appropriating and raising money for State Aid Highway construction as provided in Section 18, of Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 24. To see whether the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of State Aid Highways during the ensuing year, under the provisions of Sections 8, 17, 26, 27, and 28 of chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the use of the fire department for the ensuing year.
- Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the upkeep of silent sentinels.
- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the care of cemeteries.
- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for aid of dependent mothers.
- Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for sidewalks for the ensuing year.
- Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of sewers for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 31. To elect or appoint a budget committee.
- Art. 32. To see if the town will raise \$200 or more to provide for the services of a public health nurse, or take any action thereon.

- Art. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town debts.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to employ a night watchman and how much money they will raise to pay said watchman.
- Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.
- Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to unite with the Webster Library Association in the erecting of a building or the purchasing of a building already erected in the Village of Kingfield which shall satisfy the conditions of the two bequests made in the will of John C. Webster, deceased, one bequest to the town of Kingfield of \$10,000 and the other bequest to the Webster Library Association of Kingfield of \$10,000, said sums with the earned increment thereon to be merged in one common fund and to be handled by a Board of Trustees of seven members, three of said members to be elected by the town of Kingfield at its annual meeting, one for three years, one for two years and one for one year, and one member to be elected at each annual town meeting thereafter, and three members of said Board of Trustees to be elected by the Webster Library Association at its next annual meeting or a special meeting called therefor, one for three years, one for two years and one for one year, and one member to be elected on said Board at each annual meeting of the Webster Library Association thereafter, said Board of six to elect the seventh member of the Board, said Board of seven members to have full charge of the expenditures of both funds, and the disbursement of all proceeds and the building or purchasing of a building and the care and upkeep of the property when acquired.

- Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to buy 1000 feet of snow fence and raise \$200 for same.
- Art. 38. To see what action the town will take in regard to a sewer on Salem Street west of Percy Wilber's.
- Art. 39. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at French's Hall at 8:30 A. M., on the day of said meeting.



Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Kingfield:

Two outstanding features mark the year just past; the elimination of the deficit that has been a burden to the school department for the last few years, and the creation of the position of athletic director in our system. While these two features are outstanding, I think that you will agree that there has also been marked improvement in the instruction offered by our teachers.

Kingfield was fortunate in having but two transfers in the teaching force this year: Miss Claire Crosby of Milo (Colby, A. B.) with two years of teaching experience filled the vacancy caused by Mrs. L. A. Bradbury's resignation, and Mr. Everett Page of Greenville (Farmington State Normal School) was elected Athletic Director and teacher of the seventh and eighth grades. The fact that Miss Cornforth attended the summer session of Boston University during the vacation is worthy of recognition; also that Principal Kassay attended the convention of the National Education Association in Seattle, Washington as a delegate. As a town, we should appreciate the fact that our teachers are interested enough in their profession to spend their vacations in professional advancement. It is also worthy of note that our High School is on the Roll of Honor of the National Education Association for having its entire faculty enrolled as members of the national organization of the profession. As far as I can find a record, this year marks the first time that the entire teaching force attended the convention of the Maine Teachers' Association, and Principal Kassay served on the nominating committee. These facts show that we have a corps of teachers interested in their work and professional advancement and it cannot help reacting favorably upon our school system.

During the summer, additional windows were put into the first and second grade room bringing the building up to standard requirements.

School opened this fall with an enrollment of 220; four more than last year. Hot noon lunches have been discontinued this winter because of lack of interest in them.

The tennis courts built on the Stanley School grounds have proved very popular. Training for wise use of leisure time is one of the aims of education, and supervised and directed play carries out that branch of our work.

I wish to call attention to Chap. 16, Sec. 52 of the Revised Statutes of Maine: "Superintendents of Schools shall see that the flag is displayed from the public school buildings on appropriate occasions. They shall report annually to the towns the amount necessary to furnish the public schools with suitable flags and flagstaffs and towns shall annually appropriate a sufficient amount to defray the necessary cost of the display of the flag. The appropriation for this purpose shall be separate from and additional to all other appropriations for schools."

It is impossible in a report of this sort to enter into a full discussion of the junior high school idea, but I recommend the organization to you as soon as the way is clear. The junior high school fills a peculiar place in the modern school system, and in Kingfield, conditions are ideal for working out the plan.

In closing, I wish to leave with you a standard by which to measure the progress of our educational system. Motion is wholly relative and in order to know whether or not we are making progress, we must have a definite aim or result in mind. It is not enough that our schools operate and that scholars attend, but like the factory, we must check up occasionally and see if the results obtained give a fair return for our investment. As your superintendent of schools, I am operating your schools for the ultimate purpose of preparing

the pupils to meet life in all of its phases. To accomplish this end, I have adopted the seven aims of education as offered by the National Education Association:

- 1. Training for sound health.
- 2. Training for worthy home membership.
- 3. Training in the mastery of the tools, techniques, and spirit of learning.
- 4. Training for faithful citizenship.
- 5. Training for vocational effectiveness.
- 6. Training for the wise use of leisure time.
- 7. Training in ethical character.

How do your schools measure by this standard? Are the results in keeping with the investment? Are your schools moving nearer to this goal each year or away from it? These are questions that every citizen will do well to consider, but especially those who have children in school.

I call attention to Principal Kassay's report of conditions at the high school.

I wish to express appreciation to the teachers for their loyalty and co-operation. It means a great deal to a superintendent to have the support of his teaching force. I also appreciate the co-operation of the school committee, parents, and citizens.

Report of the Principal

STANLEY HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools, School Committee and the Citizens of the Town of Kingfield:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report.

This year the high school registered fifty-eight students, twenty-three boys and thirty-five girls. In the past four years the number of boys enrolled in the high school has more than doubled.

We have under the able direction of Mr. Everett Page a fine interest in athletics. We are under a great handicap in carrying out an efficient program of physical education. We have our daily physical calisthenics between rows of desks. We need a high school gymnasium where the required physical exercises could be given, and this gymnasium should be connected with the school. It would be an asset to our town if it could afford to build such an addition to the Stanley School.

Most of the citizens already know that a very good basket-ball squad has been organized among the high school boys by Mr. Page; and for the short experience in basket-ball practice and technique, the squad has done admirably. The same can be said to a large extent for the base-ball work of the students of the school.

A girls' club has been organized under the direction of Miss Crosby and Miss Nutter. This club of high school girls meets every two weeks for a social time.

A drama entitled "The Guest Retainer" is now being coached by Miss Crosby. The proceeds from the presentation of the drama will be used to equip the school attic for social and other functions.

Two groups have been started on the Bates Interscholastic Debates. We are hoping to have as much success this

year as we did along this line last year. Both of the high school teams won from the schools they debated; the teams had the privilege of going to Lewiston as guests of Bates College where our teams debated the Fairfield and Deering High School teams. The Deering High School debaters last year were the champions of the League. In one of the debates, Miss Alene Cross was chosen the best debater.

The question for debate this year by the League is the Cancellation of the Allied War debts. The two groups are made up as follows:

The following have been chosen to be awarded the "Honor K" of the school for scholarship and service to the school: Hermione Hutchins, Onni Vainio, and Mary Rowe.

With two exceptions, we have the same staff of teachers in the Stanley School as last year; Miss Claire Crosby taking the place of Mrs. L. A. Bradbury and Mr. Everett Page the place of Miss Nellie Davis.

The high school on the whole is making gratifying progress. I may also say without hesitation that the professional attitude of the teaching force toward higher standards of instruction is apparent. Harmony and co-operation have been responsible for an improvement in the quality of teaching, with a corresponding improvement in the work of the pupils and in the school morale.

Finally may I make an appeal to the parents to visit the school rooms of their children. In this way you can see what your child is doing and what the school is doing for your child. These contacts you make with your child's teacher and the talking over of school problems will eliminate many sad misunderstandings.

I wish to thank all the citizens and members of the school board who have helped with their support and cooperation.
