To L. P. Hinds, a constable in the town of Kingfield, county of Franklin, state of Maine,

Greeting:

In the name of the state of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Kingfield, qual-

ified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Webster Hall in said town on Monday, the second day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside in said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear reports of town officers and take action thereon.

Art. 4. To choose all other town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for elementary and secondary schools, including teachers' wages and board, fuel, janitor service, conveyance, tuition, and board of pupils, text books, reference books and school supplies for desk and laboratory use.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair on schoolhouses for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the salary of Superintendent of Schools.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the services of Health Officer.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay insurance premiums.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town charges for the ensuing year.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of roads and bridges for the ensuing year.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the collection of taxes for the ensuing year.


To see what sum of money the town will vote to Art. 14. raise for the discount and abatement of taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 15. To see what the town will vote in regard to the collection of taxes, when made payable, what discount to be allowed and interest charged.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay hydrant rental, street lights, and interest on town debts.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 18, of Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.



Art. 18. To see what action the town will take in regard to appropriating -and raising money for State Aid Highway con struction as provided in Section 18, of Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 19. To see whether the town will vote to raise money and what sum, for the maintenance of State Aid Highways during the ensuing year, under the provisions of Sections 8, 17, 26, 27, and 28 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the use of the fire department for the ensuing year.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the care of silent sentinels.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the care of cemeteries.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for aid of dependent mothers

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for sidewalks for the ensuing year.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of sewers for the ensuing year.

Art. 26. To elect or appoint a budget committee.

Art. 27. To see if the town will raise \$200 or more to provide for the services of a public health nurse, or take any action thereon.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town debts.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise \$217.00 for maintenance of 3rd class road in accordance with the provisions of Sections 43 to 47 inclusive of Chapter 28, R. S. 1930.

Art. 31. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 154 of the Public Laws of 1917, for the construction of a State Highway, extending from Lexington—New Portland town line to Jerusalem Plt. line.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to raise \$50.00 for Memorial Day Exercises.

Art. 33 To see if the town will raise the sum of \$150.00 to fight White Pine Blister Rust.

Art. 34. To see what action the town will take in regard to plowing roads suitable for the use of automobiles during the winter months.

Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of snow fence for the ensuing year.

Art. 36. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for High School Library.

Art. 37. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.







SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Town of Kingfield:

I hereby submit my first annual report of the condition and status of the schools for the fiscal year ending February 15, 1931.

May I call attention first to the financial report. Tuition bills have been as hard to collect as other bills this year, and our resources were therefore between two and three hundred dollars less than usual. Unpaid bills from the previous year, added to lower resources, are responsible for the small overdraft.

The interior of the Stanley High School building has been greatly improved this year by repainting and tinting the corridors and some of the rooms. It is now in quite good condition. The exterior, however, is badly in need of painting. If allowed to stand for another year, the cost of painting will be somewhat greater.

The installation of metal weather strips on the north and west windows of the building has made a great difference in the temperature of the rooms on windy days, and has accomplished a considerable saving in fuel consumption.

It was found necessary to make some alterations in the chimney of the building late last fall, but as these were only temporary it will be necessary either to rebuild or to repair it after school closes.

Probably the most important question in connection with the school situation at present is the matter of promotion and retardation. It is of grave concern to both teacher and parent that approximately one third of the students who enter High School are obliged to take five years for the completion of their course, or else drop out before reaching their objective. The High School is wrongly blamed for its failure to hold and equip these students; the fault is found elsewhere. The first motive and purpose of the



school is the building of character and the fullest possible development of the individual, but at the same time, certain high scholastic standards are essential.

It is not unreasonable to assume that all but a very few of those who enter High School should be able to do the required work. The courses are certainly not too difficult. The normal child, which includes the large majority of Kingfield students, provided his or her mental capacities have been sufficiently developed, can meet the requirements. This development is closely correlated with physical development. It is unreasonable to expect a twelve or thirteen year old pupil to do the work of a fourteen or fifteen year old. Intelligence tests have been given to determine mental ability. Achievement tests have been given for the purpose of classifying students with regard to their achievement. As a result of these tests we have learned that, almost without exception, the students who are doing the unsatisfactory work, provided they are of normal intellegence, are the ones who entered High School one or two years too early. High School is not the place to retard these pupils. They have then reached a time when discouragement provides too great a temptation to leave school. This condition, however, is not confined to the secondary grades alone. It is almost as noticeable, perhaps fully as difficult to deal with, in the lower grades. A large percentage of students are doing work of very low order, when they have the ability to do satisfactory, and in some cases exceptionally fine work. Every student should be attaining his highest point of efficiency if he is to receive the maximum benefit from the course

We cannot place the responsibility for this inconsistency entirely upon the teacher. Undoubtedly promotion has been granted to some unqualified pupils, but it would seem that the greater share of the responsibility should rest upon the parent who has insisted that the child be promoted if he has managed to secure a "passing" mark, thus regarding promotion as the highest objective of education. And it would be safe to say that the majority of



these questionable promotion cases may be accounted for on the basis of age.

Would it not be far more satisfactory to parent and teacher, and most important of all, more beneficial to the student, if he or she were to enter school at the right age, keep in the right a ge group through all his school years, doing work of which he is capable of thorough mastery; attaining his maximum of efficiency every year, and eventually graduating from High School with perhaps no failures to mar his record?


The situation cannot be corrected at once. It will take several years, but the result will be worth striving for. We trust that the parents of Kingfield will cooperate and support the general plan of holding back those pupils who are not able to keep up with grades beyond their age and ability, and who are now merely marking time. We hope that they will realize that promotion is a means and not an objective. Inasmuch as the Maine State Law provides schooling for the five year old child, and the majority of Kingfield children enter at this early age, and if promoted each year enter High School at thirteen, it would seem advisable to provide a sub-primary to care for these students. Such a plan would readily adjust the age difficulty, assure a higher standard of efficiency from grade one to grade twelve, and cut down the unnecessary cost of retardation. This plan need not require an extra teacher, so there will be very little added expense.

In closing, may I commend to your attention the reports of the Principal and the County Nurse. I would also take this opportunity to extend to the Committee Members, to each and every one of the efficient corps of Teachers, and to all who have cooperated to make this school year successful, my appreciation of their loyal support.

Last year in my report I stated that our outdoor athletic teams were much more successful than our basketball teams. Although we have had the use of the new Webster Hall only about one month, our teams have shown a marked improvement. It is interesting to note that many of the younger girls and boys are making use of this building. The prospects for future basketball teams in Kingfield look bright.

You will notice in the registration statistics that a rather large number of pupils find it necessary to repeat grades. We high-school teachers feel that this is largely due to a lack of preparation, for in practically every case we have found by adminis-



tering standard achievement tests that those who are having difficulty are from one to three grades in advance of where they should be. In several instances pupils with normal or above normal mental ability are having trouble in maintaining a high standard of work because of their entering high school too young. We feel that it is a grave mistake to allow girls and boys to enter secondary school when they are twelve or barely thirteen unless they are very superior.

In closing, let me again urge you to visit your school at any time.

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

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

REPORT OF COUNTY PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

To the Citizens of the Town of Kingfield:

I hereby submit my second report as the Public Health Nurse for the fiscal year Feb. 1, 1930 to Feb. 1, 1931.

The tuberculin testing of students, adults and pre-school children by Miss Davis of the Public Health Association has been a most valuable piece of work and the one active case found early, means a good chance for recovery. 133 school children, 2 adults and 6 pre-school children received the test. Several home calls were made with Miss Davis on the children who were not in school the day the Tuberculin test was read. The follow-up of Contact cases means the prevention of new cases developing, and each case reported to the Board of Health is referred to the County Nurse that she may visit to give instructions in sanitary measures.

The Health Parade in the Spring was a very successful one, 2 Freeman schools, Carrabasset, and Salem joining with Kingfield. The cooperation of teachers, mothers and friends was most appreciated and we hope to have another parade next year. A Child Welfare Conference was held in May with an attendance of 5 children.

A child was taken to the Children's Hospital for treatment, and one to Wilton for chest examination by Dr. Adams. Several home calls were made on children who had pneumonia during the winter.

In the Spring, the nurse assisted Dr. Dunlap in the examination of School children and also helped the teachers in awarding the SEVEN POINT Pins and Certificates.

In November and December, Routine Health Examinations were given each student. 198 were examined. 74 had corrections made of physical defects. 159 notices sent to parents advising of defects. A Health Chart was made for each room. 31 had defec-



tive vision, 28 defective hearing, 44 apparently abnormal throat conditions, 111 referred to the dentest, 7 poor posture, 11 were 10% or more underweight, 6 were 20% or more overweight. In the elementary school 41 had SEVEN POINT PINS.

The nurse and the North Franklin County Public Health Committee again extend thanks and appreciation to the teachers and others who have cooperated with them in the Health work and also to those who assisted with the Sale of Christmas Seals. This work is supported by Town appropriation and the money from the Sale of Seals is used for the work of the Tuberculosis Campaign.


