## TOWN WARRANT

State of Maine,

County of Franklin, ss.

To L. P. Hinds, a constable in the town of Kingfield, county of Franklin, state of Maine,

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Kingfield, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Webster Hall in said town, on Monday, the fourth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside in said meeting.
  - Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear reports of town officers and take action thereon.
- Art. 4. To choose all other town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for elementary and secondary schools, including teachers' wages and board, fuel, janitor service, conveyance, tuition, and board of pupils, text books, reference books and school supplies for desk and laboratory use.
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair on schoolhouses for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to

raise for the salary of Superintendent of Schools.

- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for graveling the West Kingfield road.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town charges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of roads and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote Yes or No in regard to adopting Daylight Saving Time for the same period as is customary throughout the State.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the collection of taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the discount and abatement of taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 15. To see what the town will vote in regard to the collection of taxes, when made payable, what discount to be allowed and interest charged.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay hydrant rental, street lights, and interest on town debts.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 20, of Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

- Art. 18. To see what action the town will take in regard to appropriating and raising money for State Aid Highway construction as provided in Section 19, of Chapter 28, or Section 22-28, of Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.
- Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$169.00 for Third Class Maintenance in accordance with the provisions of Section 46, Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of State Aid Highways during the ensuing year under the provisions of Sections 8-17-26-27 and 28, of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the use of the fire department for the ensuing year.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the care of cemeteries.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for aid of dependent mothers.
- Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fifty dollars for books for Webster Free Library.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of sewers for the ensuing year.
  - Art. 26. To elect or appoint a budget committee.
- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the services of the County Nurse.
- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town debts.

- Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to purchase a snow-plow.
- Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will raise to purchase a snow plow.
- Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for tarring the Village streets.
- Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the service of the Cooperative Health Union health officer.
- Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared by the municipal officers.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to procure temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 35. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters at Webster Hall at 8.30 A. M., on the day of said meeting.

#### COUNTY NURSE REPORT

To the citizens of the Town of Kingfield I hereby submit my seventh report as the Public Health Nurse for the fiscal year, February 1, 1934 to February 1, 1935.

Each spring the students are re-weighed and usually those 10% underweight in the fall have gained several pounds (so that if they have no other defects) they receive their 7 Point pins.

Thirty-one students had their hearing tested with the audiometer, almost all from the 3rd and 4th grades.

Several visits were made to interested individuals and a short talk at the Parent-Teachers meeting in regard to the summer roundup of pre-school children. Where this is done the mother can be advised before school opens of needed corrections, and the child be ready to enter school with teeth, throat, etc., in good condition.

Some very important Social Service work was done; often the nurse can help where the patient hesitates to consult friends.

Home Nursing was demonstrated at the July meeting of the Farm Bureau, practical teaching of those who may have the care of the family should prove of great benefit to nurse as well as patient.

All students had their annual Routine Health Examination in the fall and during the year 75 received 7 Point pins and certificates.

## SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

# Report of Superintendent of Schools

#### TOWN OF KINGFIELD

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Kingfield, Ladies and Gentlemen:

It is a pleasure to present to you my second annual report of the schools for the fiscal year ending February 15, 1935.

We have had, during this year, enrolled in our high school, 63 students and in our elementary schools 148 pupils, making a total enrollment of 211. The total cost of operating our school, other than the amount spent for repairs has been \$8,146.10.

INSTRUCTION: We have been able to retain the same teaching force as that of last year and at the time of their reelection small increases in salary were given to several teachers in the system. During the summer vacation one of the high school teachers was offered a new position and it was the opinion of the superintendent that rather than to let her go that an attempt should be made to make an offer equal to that made to her by the other town. This was done at that time. Making the following salary schedule effective:

It is my recommendation that in most instances the salaries for the coming year should not be decreased but should be maintained at their present level with the exception of one elementary salary that should be brought to the same level as the others.

The instruction given in our school during this year has, on the whole, been satisfactory, although we realize that at present a great deal must be accomplished in securing better preparation for our boys and girls who are entering high school. Two years ago a primary grade was added to the system with the result that we now have nine years of elementary school work and the results obtained from this addition will be apparent in a few years to come. We have also more definitely outlined the work. Six teachers' meetings have been held during the year and these have been faithfully attended by the Kingfield teachers. At these meetings an attempt is made to take up in a practical way the discussion, and if possible, solution of some of our own local problems.

One evening session of school was held on the evening of Oct. 18, and at this session we had an excellent attendance of interested parents and friends. In view of the interest shown the evening session, it will be continued as an annual event.

REPAIRS: In this department it was pointed out last year, that the toilets and sewer connected with the primary building were in a very unsatisfactory condition. During the year these have been repaired at an estimated expense of approximately \$500.00. A condition existed that was in immediate need of correction and while the sewer was being repaired it was felt advisable to have the whole thing remedied. In anticipating these repairs it was felt that we would have the assistance of the FERA, but this was not forth-coming as Kingfield's allocation was used for roads and we had none available for the schools.

It was also pointed out last year that the exterior and interior of the high school building should be painted. We have been able to accomplish the painting of the interior with many repairs and alterations, making a much more attractive, and from an instructional standpoint, a much more workable interior.

RECOMMENDATIONS: In view of the recommendation that I have already made in regard to keeping our salary scale at its present level, it will be necessary for us to have an appropriation equal to that of last year. This appropriation was \$6,000.00.

The matter of repairs should be settled by the voters at their annual town meeting. As has already been pointed out, the exterior of the high school building is in need of paint. The present paint is peeling away from the surface and in many places exposing the building to the wear of the elements. To my mind it will not be good economy to delay its painting for a longer period of time.

If this is to be done, an appropriation of \$300 for this one purpose will be necessary. The interior of the primary building is in need of paint and rearrangement. This could be done at an estimate cost of \$150. Then of course, the unforseen, but unavoidable overdraft in our repair account of this year should undoubtedly be taken care of.

HIGH SCHOOL: The work carried on in Stanley High School has been of a satisfactory nature. A higher standard is being expected and in most instances is being obtained. The teaching force has worked faithfully, and that work has been productive of good result. Following is a brief report submitted by Principal Rhuland:

#### REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF KINGFIELD HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. T. A. DeCosta, Superintendent of Schools, and the citizens of Kingfield:

The Kingfield High School opened for the current year on September 4, 1934, with a total registration of 64 pupils. The enrollment was distributed as follows: 19 Freshmen; 24 Sophomores; 10 Juniors; and 8 Seniors. From the total enrollment, 6 have left school, leaving a working registration of 58 pupils. Kingfield High has joined with Strong and Phillips High Schools in a project of one-act plays, this year. One set of plays has already been presented and another set will soon be given to the three towns by the three schools. A contest of One-Act Plays will be held at Farmington in April, and the winning school will compete at the State Contest at Bowdoin College, in May.

I am pleased to report that the New England College Certificate Board has renewed the certificate privilege of Kingfield High School. This time the renewal is extended to the year 1938. This entitles all graduates maintaining certificate grades to admission without examination to all New England Colleges which are members of this board, and reflects much credit upon the quality of work being done by our graduates in the various colleges.

In addition to the above honor, Kingfield High School is again classified by the State Department as a Class A High School, fulfilling all requirements as to curriculum and faculty.

I wish to express to you, as Superintendent, and to the members of the School Committee, my sincere appreciation for the cooperation and assistance which I have always received.
