Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Kingfield,

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

In accordance with the usual custom this report of the condition of the schools during the past year is submitted to you. This report must necessarily be very much the same as those of former years but it seems that it may be of interest to review briefly the school happenings of the year and to explain in some detail the receipt and expenditure of funds.

INSTRUCTION. We have in no way changed the course of study in the schools during the past year. What changes were adopted last year have proved to be satisfactory and, we believe, productive of better results. We have at present in the process of printing an Objective Outline of the high school work. This will be of value to the teachers and its composition has been made possible through the coöperation of the teachers in all of the high schools of this union. This was started last year but has taken some time to complete but should be in the hands of the teachers by the spring term of this school year. No intelligence or objective tests have been given during the year but it is planned to do this during the spring term. These are the only real tangible means that we have of measuring the results of our school work in comparison to the results of other school systems of the same size.

We have had many changes in our teaching staff during the past year. In the high school the Latin and French classes that were formerly under the instruction of Mrs. Bernice Pinkham are being carried on by Miss Josephine Bodurtha, a graduate of Colby College. Dana Emery resigned to accept a position in Massachusetts and this place has been filled by Charles Wright, a graduate of Farmington Normal. Glenda Knapp and Ruth Strickland, both graduates of Farmington Normal, were engaged to take the positions formerly held by Miss Eine Vainio and Mrs. Bertha Gilmore. A different division in the grades has been made, combining the sixth, seventh, and eighth grades under the instruction of Mr. Wright. While this brings about

a large teacher load it is felt that by providing workbooks in English and Arithmetic and by the combining and alternating of subjects that the results secured have been satisfactory. Mr. Wright has also assisted with the coaching in the high school.

The instruction in the schools, both elementary and secondary, has been of a high order and with the same degree of efficiency and coöperation it is certain that our schools will show satisfactory results at the end of this year's work.

ENROLLMENT. Beginning last fall term we had an enrollment of 79 pupils in the grades at the Little School and 83 in the Stanley Building. In High School we had an enrollment of 75 students. It can readily be seen from the foregoing that we have a more even distribution of pupils between the two buildings than we had last year. The total enrollment in town is 137 boys and 97 girls, making 234 pupils attending our schools.

FUNDS. This year we had a decided reduction in the amount that we received for tuition but our equalization fund from the state was greater so that our total receipts were of about the same amount. We expended less for Common School Teachers and a little more for High School Teachers. Less was expended for fuel. We spent more for janitors but this can be accounted for by the fact that we have transferred the Webster Hall Account to our school account. The increase in the amount for conveyance was brought about by the fact that some bills for transportation were not in at the closing of last year's books. The increase in the amount spent for supplies is in part accounted for by the fact that we have paid from this fund \$98 for water rent that was formerly taken from another account and the lights for Webster Hall have been an addition.

RECOMMENDATION. It is estimated that next year we will need approximately the following amounts:

It would seem that an appropriation for this fund should be \$6,000 and if this amount is raised it seems that it would be possible for us to take care of next year's expenses and possibly to reduce our present overdraft. This amount should be raised under the following headings:

In our Repair Account an appropriation should be made to take care of the present overdraft and to provide some money for the repair or replacement of seats. If \$200 were available in the account it would cover the needs if no unexpected expenditure should be necessary.

HIGH SCHOOL. Following is a report submitted by Mr. Abbott, principal of Kingfield High School:

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent and School Committee of Kingfield:

The following is a summary of the condition and activities of the High School:

At the opening of school on September 12 the enrollment was 72; since then 3 other pupils have entered and 6 have either left school or transferred, so that out of a total of 75 who have been registered, 69 students are now in regular attendance. The chart below shows the present distribution:

This fall the State Department of Education sent us the renewal of our Class A Certificate, and from the New England College Entrance Certification Board we received a certificate granting to us continued approval as a school qualified to extend full certification privileges to those of our graduates who meet our requirements. Reports from schools attended by graduates of this high school continue to show creditable achievement, thereby further evidencing the maintenance of satisfactory standards by your schools.

Extra-curricular activities occupy an important place in the school set-up and in these the pupils have done well in competition with other schools. In Public Speaking two students competed at the University of Maine contests, and one in the preliminary Spear Contest in Lewiston; in the county contest we received a cup for first place for girls and in the boys' competition our speaker was awarded second place. Last spring the boys won the baseball championship of the North Franklin League and during the same time, while not winning any title, the girls did receive a lot of enjoyment from playing soft-ball against the other schools. In basketball this year the girls have won 7 and lost 6 games. The boys have won 13 out of 17 games, got third place at the Farmington tournament and are in the lead for the North Franklin league championship.

In addition to these activities, dramatics have received their share of support with spelling also having its turn. At the spelling contest Kingfield won in the fourth, fifth, sixth, and Junior-Senior groups.

With the firm support of all, the carnival was again successfully completed this year and this, together with our other events, has enabled us to build up a substantial balance in the athletic fund. We have further bettered our equipment by adding both boys' and girls' jackets to our basketball outfits; the equipment is now adequate, all bills are paid and if no extraordinary expenses come out, we should finish the year with a good balance. If so, we hope to be able to build movable

two-seat bleachers to go around the gym floor. By using bleachers we can nearly double our seating capacity without coming out on the floor any farther than at present to cut down the playing surface. If any of you citizens have any lumber for which you have no use, we would very much appreciate having it to use for this purpose.

Last fall new books were provided for enough classes so that now, with only one or two exceptions, the texts are up-to-date and in good condition.

The attitude of the pupils, townspeople, school officials and other teachers has been excellent and for your continued support I take this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation.

We are all interested in the boys and girls and have a common desire to improve our schools.

GREETING:
