NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS IMPORTANT

ALL TAXPAYERS SHOULD READ THE FOLLOWING REQUIREMENTS AND COMPLY WITH THEM

Section 70, Chapter 13, Revised Statutes of Maine, 1930

"Before making an assessment, the Assessors shall give seasonable notice in writing to the Inhabitants, by posting notifications in some public place in Town, or shall notify them, in such other ways as the Town at its Annaul Meeting directs, to make and bring in to them true and perfect lists of their polls and all their estates, real and personal, not by law exempt from taxation, of which they were possessed on the first day of April of the same year. If any resident owner after such notice, does not bring in such lists, he is thereby barred of his right to make application to the Assessors or the County Commissioners for any abatement of his taxes, unless he offers such lists with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to offer it at the time appointed."

At our last annual town meeting held March 1, 1937, the following was voted under Article 40:

"That the town authorize its assessors to consider the lists of delinquent taxes for the years 1926, 1928, 1931, 1932, 1933, 1934, and abate to the respective collectors such items as in their judgment should be abated; that of the remaining items

unabated the collector of the town place with a competent attorney for collection, the town to pay a reasonable and minimum commission or charge for attorney's services. The amount collected to be accepted by the town as a full settlement with the several collectors."



REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Cranberry Isles:

I herewith submit for your consideration my first annual report of the schools, for the year ending January, 1938.

The financial statement which follows requires but little explanation. The major portion of school appropriations, used for teachers' and janitors' wages, is not subject to much fluctuation from year to year. The text-book and supply account, of course, may vary somewhat, but we note that the expenditure this year has been consistent with that of other years. Tuition charges, an item which cannot be controlled by the paying town, show variations, also, from year to year.

The repairs account shows an overdraft of approximately twenty-five dollars. The same account last year carried an overdraft of slightly over one hundred dollars. These expenditures were unavoidable, and should be provided for in the appropriations for the new year. The recommendations of the Superintending School Committee include an increased repair budget, intended to take care of the overdraft, and permit also the purchase and installation of some new windows for the Islesford school. These windows are in bad condition, and replacement is truly advisable. The G. C. I. school, thoroughly renovated during the past summer, is in fine condition, and, after the replacement of windows at the Islesford school, the town will have excellent buildings, facilities of which the citizens may well be proud.

The following tabulation will show, at a glance, the distribution of the school dollar in this town, a normal one as compared with that of other towns:

You will note that the budget calls for a reduced appropriation for common schools. This is made possible by the balance carried in the account at present, and the reduction will help to offset the necessary increase for repairs.

We believe that the schools of this town have done and are doing a good grade of work. Your teachers are working conscientiously and thoughtfully, and they have proved willing and eager to cooperate in accepting suggestions of different methods. With their cooperation, it has been possible to make some changes which are in line with modern school practice, and which will prove their value in each succeeding year.

We feel, very definitely, that the primary grades are a most important unit. The tendency, not only in this town but in many others during past years, has been to expect too much of children entering school at five years of age. Experience has proved the truth of this statement in school systems throughout the State and throughout the country; and most towns have been adopting plans for the control of this problem. We believe that less crowding in the first two years of school will bring a resultant higher level of achievement in these grades, and that, as a result, a higher level will be maintained throughout the elementary grades and the high school years as well.

Physical and mental development should proceed together at a normal rate. Attempt to force the mental process unduly, and to set grade objectives too high for the average pupil, and the natural result can only be an unsatisfactory achievement which will prove an increasingly acute problem in each succeeding grade. The proof of this statement may be easily found in some of the grades of these schools. When boys and girls of good average mental ability fail to attain the standards set for a grade, there is a definite reason for such failure, and the reason is not altogether that of poor teaching, nor is it entirely due to lack of study on the part of the pupil. In many cases it is only too evident that lower grade foundations, and especially reading skill, been completed, due to the necessary crowding of the beginning grades.

We are attempting to lay special emphasis, then, upon these lower grades. A new system of reading has been introduced in the primary, a system which is thoroughly modern, and yet one which has been widely used throughout this State, and with excellent success. The experience of other school systems has clearly proved that, with an extra sub-primary grade, which will permit the beginner to develop and learn at a normal rate of speed, we can make better readers, and better fit these boys and girls for the work of the succeeding grades.

We do sincerely urge the necessity of a grade adjustment and the elimination of the ninth grade, to be replaced by a sub-primary grade. This plan would still provide a nine-grade system, requiring the same number of years to be spent in elementary schools. It would lay stress equally upon achievements of all grades, and would, we feel confident, result in greatly increased values to all pupils. This is not a retardation, but rather a readjustment program. It is not a new theory nor an an untried experiment. It is, very definitely, a move toward standardization, and it is entirely in line with what other towns within the State and elsewhere have found advisable. If it has given satisfactory results elsewhere, it will do the same for the boys and girls of these schools.

We respectfully urge that parents and citizens who are interested in the welfare of the schools give serious consideration to this recommendation. We welcome the interest of any citizen in any problem relative to the school, and we stand ready to discuss all such problems at any time, or to provide information on school matters.

In closing this report, I take this opportunity to thank the teachers for their cooperation during the past year, and to the members of the School Committee I would express my appreciation of their friendly counsel and loyal support.

To Alonzo J. Bryant, a Constable of the Town of Cranberry Isles, in said county, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Cranberry Isles, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet at Neighborhood House, Little Cranberry Isles, in said town, on Monday, the seventh day of March, A. D. 1938, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1 To choose by ballot a moderator to preside at said meeting.

- 2 To choose by ballot a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3 To hear and act on report of town officers.
- 4 To choose by ballot three selectmen, who shall be assessors and overseers of poor.
- 5 To choose by ballot a treasurer, and vote his compensation.
- 6 To choose by ballot a collector of taxes, and vote his compensation.
- 7 To choose by ballot a collector of automobile excise tax, and vote his compensation.
- 8 To choose by ballot one member of superintending school committee for three years.
- 9 To choose constables for the ensuing year.
- 10 To choose by ballot, road commissioners for the ensuing year, and vote their pay.
- 11 To choose by ballot surveyors of lumber and measurers of wood and bark for the ensuing year.
- 12 To see if the town will vote to hold the next annual meeting at town hall, Great Cranberry Island.

13 To see if the town will vote and raise a sum of money for schools, under this joint budget, to be accounted for separately.

- 14 To see what sum of money shall be raised for necessary town charges.
- 15 To see what sum of money shall be raised for support of the poor.

- 17 To see what sum the town will appropriate for State-aid road construction (in addition to amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of section 19, chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of section 3, chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.
- 18 To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State-aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State-aid roads, in excess of the requirements of section 2, chapter 132, P. L. 1935.
- 19 To see what sum of money shall be raised for highways on the different islands.
- 20 To see what sum of money shall be raised for snow removal on the different islands.
- 21 To see what sum of money shall be raised for insurance on school buildings.
- 22 To see if the town will vote and authorize the school committee to employ a school physician, and raise a sum of money for same.

- 23 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs and maintenance of public wharf and float.
- 24 To see if the town will vote to appoint a caretaker of public wharf and act thereon.
- 25 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to renew wharf permit of Eber L. Spurling for a term of one year, at \$25.00, and act thereon.
- To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$75.00 for superintendent of schools' office rent.
- 27 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for superintendent of schools' salary.
- 28 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for maintenance of State-aid highway, according to the provisions of sections 9, 18, 36 and 37, chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of Maine, and specify amount of each island.
- 29 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for street lights.
- 30 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on notes.
- 31 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay on principal of note.
- 32 To see if the town will vote to adopt daylight saving time.
- 33 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for extermination of mosquitoes, and to whom paid.
- 34 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to make temporary loan, or loans, not exceeding in the aggregate the sum of \$4,000, in anticipation of, and to be paid out of, the current taxes for the municipal year of 1938.
- 35 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to issue the town's negotiable notes or bonds in a sum not exceeding \$5,500 for the purpose of refunding, renewing or paying certain indebtedness of the town due now or to become due during the year 1938, to wit: First National Bank, \$500, balance of note due April 14, 1938; Arthur M. Spurling, note for \$2,000,

due July 1, 1938; Leslie M. Rice, note for \$2,000, due July 1, 1938; Bar Harbor Banking and Trust Co., note for \$1,000, due October 1, 1938.

- 36 To see if the town will vote to change location of light on public wharf.
- 37 To see if the town will vote to elect a fire warden, according to section 6 of chapter 35 of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- 38 To see if the town will vote to accept the report of State auditor.
- 39 To see if the town will vote to purchase suitable material for laying dust on its roads, and act thereon.
- 40 To vote pay of town officers, labor and trucks.
- 41 To see if the town will vote to buy snow plow for Little Cranberry Island, and raise a sum of money for same.
- 42 To choose a town auditor for the ensuing year.
- 43 To see if the town will vote to discontinue any part of the town road on Sutton Island.
- 44 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
- 45 To vote pay of moderator for his services.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town, and hearing and deciding on applications of those claiming the right to have their names upon said list, at Neighborhood House, Little Cranberry Island, in said town, at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
