

# TOWN WARRANT

Penobscot, ss..

Levant, Maine, Feb. 20, 1939.

To W. C. Goodwin, a Constable in the Town of Levant, in said County, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Levant, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the town house in said town, on Monday, the thirteenth day of March, A. D. 1939, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the town report as printed.

Art. 4. To elect three selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor.

Art. 5. To elect a member of the superintending school committee to serve for three years.

Art. 6. To elect a road commissioner or commissioners.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to be expended for the repair of roads and bridges, to be used for summer work.  $\mathbf{2}$ 

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for snow removal for the year 1939-40.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of schools.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for patrol maintenance for the year 1939-40.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for school appliances.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for repair of schoolhouses.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for high school tuition.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of poor.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for contingent expenses.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for memorial purposes, care of cemeteries, and for interest on the local school fund.

Art. 17. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for State aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges), under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the town for State aid highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments. Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for cutting and burning bushes, to be done before August 1st.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise, if any, to buy two snowplows to be used on trucks, or act anything relative thereto.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to buy a road machine and raise money therefor, or act anything relative thereto.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to put the selectmen on a salary, and say how much, or act anything relative thereto.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to allow discount on taxes paid in full, on or before July 1, and charge interest after December 1, and say what rate, or act anything relative thereto.

Art. 24. To see if the town, owing to the existing condition of Preston Waugh, who is ill and very nearly blind, will vote to exempt him from all taxes for the coming year.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise

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for the control of white pine blister rust within the confines of the town. The State will add 50% to the appropriation or it will be supplemented with W. P. A. labor, if available.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions, under the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82 of the Revised Statutes of 1930, said sum to be expended under the State Publicity Bureau.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money to continue repairing the town house, and how much, or act anything relative thereto.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$100.00 for school bus insurance.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$549.00 for maintenance of third class road.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$61.00 for public health work in Levant, said sum to be expended by the Bureau of Health, State Department of Health and Welfare, in coöperation with local authorities.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to sell the town house stable, or act anything relative thereto.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$200.00 to be expended on 50-50 road, or act anything relative thereto.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$1,000.00, to apply on outstanding notes, or act anything relative thereto.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to give the selectmen

authority to give quitclaim deed, or rent or lease such property as the town may become possessed of through tax liens, or such other procedures as are usual in acquiring tax titles to property.

Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to instruct the treasurer to deduct 50% of all orders to any person owing the town a tax, or act anything relative thereto.

Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to instruct the collector to place a tax lien on all real estate on which the tax is still unpaid, or bring suit.

Art. 37. To elect a tax collector.

Art. 38. To elect a treasurer and fix compensation.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to authorize the treasurer, with the consent of the selectmen, to hire money necessary to meet bills during municipal year in anticipation of, and to be paid out of the current year's taxes, and to execute and deliver the negotiable promissory note, or notes, of the town therefor.

Art. 40. To elect constables and all other necessary town officers.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to elect a budget committee for the ensuing year.

Art. 42. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State aid roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 2, Chapter 132, Public Laws of 1935.

The selectmen give notice they will be in session at the town house at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, of the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Fail not to make due service of this warrant and return your doings thereon at the time and place of said meeting.

#### TEACHERS

At the end of the school year in June, Miss Lillian Leighton resigned from the Village Grammar School and Miss Lillian Wyman from the West Levant Primary School. The fall term opened with the following teachers: Arthur Doe, Village Grammar; Miss Vivian Grant, Village Primary; Miss Flora Elliott, West Levant Grammar; Miss Glennice Peavey, West Levant Primary; Mrs. Madeline Carter, South Levant Grammar grades; and Miss Dorrice Trickey, Primary grades. Miss Grant, Miss Elliott, Miss Peavey and Miss Trickey are graduates of the Farmington Normal School, and Mr. Doe has a degree in elementary education from Gorham Normal. Mrs. Carter is a teacher of considerable experience and during the fall term took a special course under the teacher-exchange plan at Castine Normal. At the end of the fall term, Mr. Doe resigned to accept a position in the Frankfort Grammar School. The vacancy thus created is being filled by Stanley Gay, a graduate of Gorham Normal. The teachers in this town are exceptionally well-trained and as a result excellent work is being done.

At South Levant there is an enrollment of forty-three pupils. As this is too large a number for one teacher to handle satisfactorily, in the summer the school board voted to hire another teacher to take care of the lower grades. As there was no separate room for these grades, both pupils and teachers have been working under difficulties with recitations of two groups being carried on in the same room at the same time. If two teachers are to be retained there for the coming year, and they should be, some provision should be made for more adequate housing facilities. At a comparatively small cost, approximately \$200.00, the present building could be remodelled to take care of the situation.

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 $\Lambda$  different grading system is being inaugurated this year. Instead of nine grades, there are now eight grades and a subprimary. This neither shortens nor lenghens the time the child is to spend in the elementary school. The reason for making this change is obvious from the educational standpoint: courses of study and textbooks are written with eight grades in view. Moreover, the eight-grade system is almost universal, and with our present set-up, the child who finds it necessary to transfer from one town to another will find it less difficult to adjust himself to his new environment. Some repetition of work was, of course, necessary in order to make the adjustment, but on the whole, this has not proved a waste of time. Although the method is not easily explained or understood, there have been few inquiries or complaints. Parents have shown an excellent spirit of cooperation in this as well as in all my other policies which may have seemed strange to them at first. In some instances, the attendance has not been altogether satisfactory. Children are allowed to stay out of school for no apparent legitimate reason. The attention of the parent who is lax in this respect is called to the following excerpt from the School Laws: "Every child between the 7th and 15th anniversaries of his birth and every child between the 15th and 17th anniversaries who cannot read at sight and write legibly simple sentences in the English language and every child between the 15th and 16th anniversaries who has not completed the grades of the elementary school shall attend some public day school during the time such school is in

session, and an absence therefrom of  $\frac{1}{2}$  day or more shall be deemed a violation of this requirement. All persons having children under their control shall cause them to attend school, and for every neglect of such a duty shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$25.00, or by an imprisonment for not more than 30 days."

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The repairs appropriation has been overdrawn \$51.00, although only the necessary repairs were made. As not a cent has been wasted, we make no apology for the deficit. The greater part of the money raised for this purpose was spent on the building at West Levant; the roof was shingled and the interior redecorated. At the Village the foundation was repaired. Out of this appropriation, too, the bills for cleaning were paid and a bill left over from 1938. All stoves are in poor condition and should have some new parts, for the sake of safety, if for no other reason. Your repairs appropriation for next year should be large enough to take care of the following: overexpenditure, 1938-39, \$51.00; interior decorating at the Village, estimated \$150.00; remodelling at South Levant, estimated \$200.00; cleaning and minor repairs, \$50.00.

Your attention is called to the overexpenditure for high school tuition, about \$500.00. This tuition, of course, must be paid. It is recommended that you raise enough money at the annual town meeting to take care of the overexpenditure and the tuition for the coming year. In Grade VIII there are ten pupils. If they all enter high school in the fall, there will be a greater number of tuition pupils than at present, and as a result, the cost will be greatly increased. Another quotation from the School Laws may not be out of place here: "provided further, that such free tuition privilege shall continue only so long as said youth shall maintain a satisfactory standard of deportment and scholarship."

The common schools account shows an overexpenditure of \$173.00. There are two explanations for this: first, there was a misunderstanding on my part in regard to the amount of the State equalization fund that was received by the town early in the year, prior to the time I took office. I understood there was \$525.00; as a matter of fact there was only \$515.00, and of this,

\$172.00 had been used the previous year. In the second place, the teachers and drivers have been paid for thirty-five weeks where previously they had been paid for thirty-four when the municipal year closed. The plans, however, are for a school year of thirty-four weeks. This overexpenditure need cause no alarm for I have no intention of lengthening the school year until sufficient funds are available for the purpose. For common schools, the appropriation should be about the same as it was a year ago. You should remember that there are now six teachers to pay instead of five.

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The amount paid out for textbooks and supplies is no small item. At present the schools have a fair equipment of instructional material and next year the cost can be cut one-half. There is a pressing need for up-to-date spellers, health books and histories. There are still unpaid supply bills amounting to around \$100.00, dating back to 1933. It will be impossible to pay these bills unless your appropriation is sufficiently large. It is recommended that you increase your appropriation \$100.00 in order that these bills may be cleaned up.

For insurance on conveyances about \$100.00 will be needed.

#### CONCLUSION

To work in the Levant schools during the past year has been a real pleasure. The members of the superintending school committee have been deeply interested in the schools and have given freely of their time. They have shown me every courtesy and consideration and at this time I want to assure them of my sincere appreciation. I also want to thank the other municipal officers, the teachers, parents and children for helping to make this year of service worth while and pleasant.
