

TOWN WARRANT

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Penobscott, ss. Levant, Maine, Feb. 27, 1945.

To M. P. Roberts, a Constable in the Town of Levant, in said Counyt. GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Levant, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Grange Hall in said town, on Monday, the twelfth day of March, A. D. 1945, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To elect a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To elect a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the town report as printed.

Article 4. To elect three selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor, and fix compensation.

Article 5. To elect a member of the superintending school committee to serve for three years.

Article 6. To elect a road commissioner or commissioners.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for roads and bridges for summer work.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for snow and ice removal.

Article 9. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for support of common schools.

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Article 10. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for repair of school houses.

Article 11. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for school appliances.

Article 12. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for high school tuition.

Article 13. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for patrol maintenance.

Article 14. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for support of poor.

Article 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for contingent expenses.

Article 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for memorial purposes, care of cemeteries and interest on local school fund.

Article 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for cutting and burning bushes.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$477.00 for maintenance of third class road.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$50.00 for public health nursing in Levant, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local services. Article 20. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$1,800.00 to apply on outstanding notes, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 21. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$300.00 for interest.

Article 22. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise to purchase snow fence.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to discontinue permanently the roads closed for the winter by the County Commissioners, or act anything relatively thereto.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money to purchase a dump body to the snow plow truck, or act anything relative thereto. act anything relative thereto.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to work the Auto-Car truck in the summer, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to recind the vote taken at the special town meeting to repair the International truck, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to sell the International truck, as is, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money and say how much, to build a house for the Auto-Car truck, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to buy another snow plow, and raise money for the same, or act anything relative thereto. Article 30. To see if the town will vote to contract the plowing, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 31. To see if the town will grant and raise money to cover the overdraft.

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to give quit claim deed, or rent or lease such property as the town may become possessed of through tax liens, or such other procedures as are usual in acquiring tax titles to property.

Article 33. To elect a tax collector and fix compensation.

Article 34. To elect a treasurer and fix compensation.

Article 35. To see if the town will vote to authorize the treasurer, with the consent of the selectmen, to hire money necessary to meet bills during the municipal year in anticipation of, and to be paid out of the current year's taxes, and to execute and deliver the negotiable promissory note, or notes, of the town therefor.

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Article 36. To elect constables and all other necessary town officers.

Article 37. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money, and say how much, to tar the third class road, beginning at the Kenduskeag town line to Wing's corner, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 38. To see if the town will vote to buy additional land for the Waugh Cemetery and the South Levant Cemetery, and raise money for the same, or act anything relative thereto. Article 39. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to insure the school buildings and plowing equipment, or act anything relative thereto.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Grange Hall at 9 o'clock in the forenoon of the day of said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Fail not to make due service of this warrant and return your doings thereon, at the time and place of said meeting.

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

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee and Citizens of Levant:


I am pleased to submit herewith a report of the schools of Levant for the past year together with the report of the public health nurse, Miss Georgina Patterson.

ENROLLMENT

The enrollment for the present school year inculdes 67 boys and 65 girls or a total of 132 students. The enrollment by grades is as follows:

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HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

According to tuition bills which have been presented we have ten students attending Bangor High, five at Hermon High, four at Fifth Street Junior High, one at John Bapst, two at Carmel High, two at Brewer High and two at Higgins Classical Institute. The tuition charge at all of these schools is well over \$100.00 per year and in most cases \$125.00 per year. In order to meet the increased cost of high schools tuitions we are asking for an increase of \$200.00 per year making the necessary appropriation for high school tuition this year \$2,200.00.

TEACHERS

The citizens of Levant are most fortunate in having excellent local teachers who are willing to neglect their home duties in order that they may help carry on the schools during this period when the shortage of teachers is so critical. Only two changes were necessary in the teaching staff this year. It was our good fortune to be able to secure two normal graduates with successful experience to to fill these vacancies. Mrs. Gertrude Mayhew was engaged for the Village Grammar and Miss Anna Myers for the West Levat Grammar. Miss Adel Eveleth of Bangor was engaged as supervisor of music for Hampden, Hermon, and Levant. Miss Eveleth teaches in Hampden two days each week, in Hermon two days, and in Levant one day.

It seems to be necessary and right for the teachers to be given a small increase in salary for the coming year. In the budget which has been prepared plans have been made to increase the salaries of all teachers to \$25.00 per week.

Even at that figure we will find it very difficult to secure any one except local teachers for our schools. If we cannot retain our local teachers we will, without a doubt, have to pay considerably higher salaries if all schools are to be kept open.

REPAIRS

During the past year only minor repairs have been made. For the most part these have consisted of repair and varnishing of seats and painting the inside of several school rooms. The building at South Levant needs quite extensive repairs such as outside painting, shingling of the roof, and repairs to the foundation. The village school needs painting on the outside. The school building at West Levant seems to be in good condition and no major repairs there are contemplated. The \$200.00 we are asking for repairs will not take care of all the needs I have listed above but probably will be scfficient to take care of all we will be able to get done this year due to the shortage of labor.

APPROPRIATION FOR COMMON SCHOOLS

We find it necessary to ask for a considerable increase in the appropriation for common schools this year. One reson as I have stated above is to provide a small increase in teachers' salaries. The second reason is that no increase was made last year in the appropriation but the cost of conveyance and janitor service has increased appreciably. Consequently we had only enough money to pay the operating cost of schools for 34 weeks instead of the usual 36. This of course means an extra burden on next year's appropriation. The cost of operating schools like any other business, is necessarily much greater in war time and it is apt to continue to increase each year until we get back to normal times again.

CONSOLIDATION

The consolidation of rural schools seems to offer a plan for providing better educational opportunities for the children of rural communities. If Levant had a centrally located consolidated school the cost of maintenance and operation would be considerably less than the present cost of running our schools. Four or five teachers would be sufficient to take care of all the children. Each teacher would have not more than two gradés which would make for more effective teaching and instruction. The cost of transportation, fuel, and janitor service would not be any more than at present. The cost of upkeep would be considerably less. Of course consolidation at the present time is out of the question, but it is a method of improving our schools. After the war is over we may expect that the state and federal government will give liberal financial assistance to those communities which are ready for the program. Let's think and talk this matter over for I know that the people of Levant are interested in any matter which effects the welfare of their children.

WAR SAVING STAMPS

All schools are cooperating in the war effort by selling War Saving Stamps and Bonds. The report of sales from Sept. 1st to Feb. 16th is as follows:

REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

January 1 to December 31, 1944

The effectiveness of a community health service depends to a large extent on the interest in and the understanding of the Public Health Program by all citizens of the community. It is essential that they appreciate the value of that service. From a personal standpoint they should be interested in the program because the health of every citizen in the community affects the health of other citizens and because the cost of service is directly or indirectly borne by the individual taxpayers of the community.

Visits were made to the expectant mother for the purpose of helping her secure necessary equipment for confinement, a diet suitable for growth and development of the baby and to help carry out doctor's orders. Medical attention has been urged early in pregnancy, as care at this time is most beneficial.

Visits were made after the baby was born to emphasize the importance to the mother of proper rest, diet and a return visit to the doctor.

Several visits were made to infants in your community to help the mothers set up daily routine for feeding and care of the baby. Importance of a visit to the doctor has been stressed. Mothers were helped in introducing new foods into the baby's diet to promote growth. Special emphasis was given to the prevention of communicable diseases.

Importance of the preschool examination was stressed to mothers of children entering school in the fall. This is valuable in order that defects may be discovered and corrected before the child begins his school life.

During the month of March fourteen school children were vaccinated against smallpox. The hearing test with the audiometer was given in all the schools this fall. Follow-up visits have been made to those children to explain need of dental and vision corrections and to advise on control of communicable diseases.

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Necessary visits to contacts of persons with tuberculosis have been made.
