

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TOWN WARRANT

Penobscot, ss: Levant, Maine, Feb. 24, 1947

To Ervin Goodwin, a Constable of the Town of Levant, in said County, GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Levant, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Grange Hall in said town, on Monday, the tenth day of March, A.D. 1947 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To elect a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To elect a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the town report as printed.

Article 4. To elect three selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor, and fix compensation.

Article 5. To elect a member of the Superintending School Committee, to serve for three years.

Article 6. To elect a road commissioner or commissioners.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for roads and bridges for summer work.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for snow and ise removal.

Article 9. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for support of common schools.

Article 10. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the repair of school houses.

Article 11. To see what sum of money the town will grant - and raise for school superintendency.

Article 12. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for high school tuition.

Article 13. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for patrol maintenance.

Article 14. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of poor.

Article 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for contingent expenses.

Article 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for memorial purposes, care of cemeteries and interest on local school fund.

Article 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for cutting and burning bushes.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$477.00 for maintenance of third class roads.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$50.00 for public health nursing in Levant, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local services.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$1,800.00 to apply on outstanding notes, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise

the sum of \$300.00 for interest, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money and say how much, to put a hydraulic dump body on the Auto-Car or act anything relative thereto.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money and say how much, to buy fire fighting equipment, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money and say how much, to repair the town garage, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money and say how much, to repair the Tay road, so-called, or act anything relative thereto.

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Article 26. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money to buy gravel to go with the State's unimproved road fund, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$2,000.00 to cover the overdraft, or act anything anything relative thereto.

Article 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for state aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 25 and 29, Chapter 20, R. S. 1944 as amended. Article 29. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$192.00 for aid to dependent children.

Article 30. To see the town will vote to give the selectmen authority to give quit claim deed, or rent or lease, such property as the town may become possessed of through tax liens, or such other procedures as are usual in acquiring tax titles to property.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to insure the school buildings and snow plow equipment, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 32. To elect a tax collector and fix compensation.

Article 33. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all unpaid taxes after December 1, and set the rate, or act anything relative thereto.

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Article 34. To elect a treasurer and fix compensation.

Article 35. To see if the town will vote to authorize the treasurer with the consent of the selectmen, to hire money necessary to meet bills during the current municipal year, in anticipation of and to be paid out of the current year's taxes, and to execute and deliver the negotiable promissory note, or notes, of the town therefor.

Article 36. To see if the town will vote to authorize the treasurer to deduct 50% from all vouchers of any person owing the town a tax, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 37. To elect constables and all other necessary town officers.

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The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Grange Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon of the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Fail not to make due service of this warrant and return your doings thereon, at the time and place of said meeting.





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# **REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

To the School Committee and Citizens of Levant:

It is again my privilege and duty to <present for your consideration a report of your schools for the past year and a summary of needs for the coming year.

#### ENROLLMENT

The enrollment for the present school year is 170. This is an increase of 40 pupils or nearly a third more than last year. This enlarged enrollment has made for a considerable increase in the cost of operation of your schools.

The following statistics regarding the enrollment may be of interest:

### HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

It is pleasing to note that a large number of our graduates from the eighth grade are attending high school. However, as the number increases, the cost to the town increases correspondingly. The present state law allows the town providing high school education to charge the average per capita cost for tuition not to exceed \$125. per year. Most of the high schools, which Levant students are attending, do charge this maximum of \$125., although in many cases the per capita cost is considerably above this figure. For example, in Hermon last year the cost of maintaining the high school was \$138.31 per pupil; in Bangor it was \$165.55. There is a bill before the present Legislature which would allow towns to increase this maximum charge from \$125. to \$150. If this bill becomes a law the cost of tuitions for the town of Levant will be considerably increased. Even at the present rate with the number we now have in high school we will need an appropriation of at least \$4,000.00 for high school tuitions.

At the present time we have 35 students attending the, following high schools: 11 at Bangor High, 6 at Fifth Street Junior High, 11 at Hermon High, 3 at Higgins Classical Institute, 1 at Maine Central Institute, 1 at Brewer High, and 2 at East Corinth Academy.

With seven of our pupils graduating from high school next spring and sixteen completing the eighth grade we might expect that next year we would have nearly forty high school students. This will mean still further increases for tuition next year. Even so, we could not maintain our own high school with any less expense than what we have to pay for tuitions.

#### TEACHERS

The secret of a good school is the teacher. No matter how fine a school building we may have or how superior the equipment may be, unless we have a good teacher, we are sure to have a poor school. On the other hand, if we have a good teacher in a modern school building with good equipment, we are sure of having an excellent school.

The people of Levant are extremely fortunate in having a large number of excellent local teachers who have helped to maintain the schools at a comparatively high level of efficiency in spite of trying conditions the past few years. The salaries, however, are not adequate to take care of the very great increase in the cost of living and as a result very substantial increases are due our teachers. The School Committee has provided in the budget for increases which will allow us to pay the minimum salary as prescribed by the MacKinnon Bill which is currently being considered by the Legislature. Whether this bill becomes a law or not we must give our teachers increased salaries if we are to keep our present efficient staff.

We were extremely unfortunate in losing Mrs. Barton from the Village Grammar School last fall. However, I believe, that we now have in Mrs. Briggs an excellent teacher who will accomplish much with the children during the remainder of the year.

#### REPAIRS

During the past year we have bought two new stoves, one for the grammar room at South Levant, and the other for the Village grammar room.

At South Levant one side of the school house roof was shingled, a new outside door was placed in the corridor leading to the shed so as to provide a second exit in the case of fire, and the flag pole was placed in operation again.

At West Levant a new flag pole was erected outside the building and new shades were purchased for the grammar room.

At the Village part of a new sill had to be placed under the building, new stringers under the floor in places, and some new clapboards. Repairs were also made to the fire escape. Due to the increased enrollment it was necessary to purchase a number of additional seats. We were fortunate in being able to secure some substantial seats from Bangor at a reasonable price.

Next year the West Levant school house will have to be shingled and the porch at the Village repaired. Sometime in the near future the school houses at the Village and South Levant should be painted. All school rooms need to be redecorated in order to provide a clean and cheerful atmosphere for the children.

#### CONSOLIDATION

Sometime in the not too distant future I hope that the town of Levant may be able to construct a consolidated school to which all children may be brought. In such a school we would need only five teachers where we now have six. Each teacher would have only two grades where each one now has four or five grades. Teachers would be able to accomplish much more with fewer grades and your children would be much better prepared for high school than is possible under the present system. The cost of transportation ought not to be any more than at present. Fuel and janitor service would not be any more, possibly less.

This matter should be given thoughtful consideration by the citizens as a way of improving the school system. If federal or state funds become available again to help in school building construction the town of Levant should try to profit by the opportunities thus provided.



# **REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE--1946**

Public Health means Community Health. Therefore in order to have a good public health program in your town it is necessary that the citizens know how the public health program functions. Everyone benefits either directly or indirectly by this program.

Recognizing that whatever is done to assure physical and mental health during maternity, infancy, childrhood and youth will affect the health of the adult population, we have, as in the past, placed most emphasis on the work with the pregnant mother, the infant and pre-school child.

Health supervision visits were made to infants to urge the mothers to keep their babies under medical supervision, to have them vaccinated against smallpox and immunized against diphtheria. Stress was placed on the importance of having whooping cough vaccine given to the infant as soon as the family physician feels it advisable. While we know whooping cough vaccine isn't a true immunization, statistics reveal it has lessened the severity of the disease a. great deal. Whenever indicated mothers were assisted in planning daily schedules for their infants. The prevention of communicable diseases which takes such a heavy toll during infancy was emphasized. Health supervision visits were made to pre-school children in order to help with correction of defects and establishment of good health habits. It is very important that defects in this age group be corrected before they enter school. It is our aim to send a healthy child to school. Three Child Health Conferences were held in your town this summer sponsored by a committee of interested mothers and the State Bureau of Health. Each child was given a complete physical examination and the immunizations requested by the parents. It is discouraging to know that

39

more parents do not take advantage of such a grand opportunity when offered them. Notices were sent to all parents having pre-school children and only a few responded.

Conferences were held with the teachers to discuss health problems arising in the schools and to co-operate with them in promoting progressive health education. Home visits were made to parents of school children in order to explain need of dental, vision and hearing corrections and to guard against communicable diseases.

This year 99 school children were given the hearing test by use of the audiometer.

Children in your town have profited by the Pediatric and Crippled Children's clinics sponsored by the State Bureau of Health. Children are referred to these clinics by their family physician through the public health nurse for help in diagnosis and treatment.

Necessary follow up visits were made to patients with venereal disease and tuberculosis and their contacts in order to advise them to return for check-up and treatments and to prevent their spread.

As has been stated in previous reports a Health Committee or Council would be an asset to your community in

helping plan a health program and in solving many health problems.

# AUDITOR'S REPORT

March 1, 1947

Board of Selectmen Levant, Maine

Gentleman:

In accordance with the terms of our engagement, we have made an examination of the balance sheet of the Town of Levant, Maine, as of February 15, 1947. Our audit has embraced the verification of the assets and liabilities of the municipality and an analytical review, by test, of the departmental expense and income records, transactions and supporting evidence, to the extent necessary, in view of the system of internal control; however, we did not make a detailed audit of departmental expense and income transactions. We investigated the accounting system now in force in the municipality and found it being well maintained and on a basis consistent with sound methods of municipal accounting.

#### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Cash in the general fund has been reconciled with certificate furnished by The Merrill Trust Company of Bangor, Maine. Cash on hand, at the close of the year, in the amount of \$488.26, was certified by the treasurer as being town funds. All cash was reconciled to the date of our examination.

We have proved the assessment of 1946 taxes and compared the amounts, in detail, with the list committed to the Collector. The total assessment was in agreement with the collector's warrant. Valuation records appear to reflect careful inventory with boundry descriptions accompanying each real estate assessment. We have examined all tax liens for 1945 and reconciled all transactions to ledger balances. A reserve for possible loss covering all tax receivables is considered to be adequate.

We have 'examined all transactions in tax acquired property; all tax liens maturing have been transferred to this account.

Notes outstanding have been reduced \$1,800.00. The balance is for temporary loan, in the amount of \$2,000.00, due October 1, 1944, remained unpaid at the close of the year; the balance of \$800.00 is for equipment purchase, but not due for payment until February 17, 1948.

We have confirmed with the depository banks all investments of trust funds.

#### Comments

We have examined, in detail, all transactions in the departmental accounts for the months of February and October 1946 and found checks issued in payment of pay-

rolls and other vouchers to be substantiated. We further test checked items of income and expense for the other ten months; traced all items of cash recorded as received and paid to the general ledger.

We have added excise receipts numbers 65 to 222 inclusive for 1946 and numbers 1 to 75 inclusive for 1947 and found the total to be in agreement with receipts issued by the treasurer. Collections have been credited directly to net deficit.

Departmental balances carried forward, other than for education, are \$50.00 in the highway accounts, retained pending possible transfer to other joint construction accounts, during the coming year, and for over-payment to the sexton of .02c in excess of amount withdrawn from Trust Fund time deposits; the municipal officers con-

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sider this procedure more advisable than a change in the accounting of trust fund balances.

Municipal accounting procedures have been well maintained during the year and the records well kept.

# Certificate

Subject to the foregoing qualifications and based upon our examination, we hereby certify that, in our opinion, the accompanyiny balance sheet and statement of departmental income and expenses fairly present the financial condition of the Town of Levant, as at February 15, 1947, and the results of operation for the year ended that date.


