

Levant, Maine, Feb. 21, 1948

To Jasper Goodwin, a Constable of the Town of Levant, insaid County. GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Levant, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Grange Hall in said town, on Monday, the eighth day of March, A. D. 1948, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1. To elect a moderator to preside at said meeting.
 - Article 2. To elect a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the town report as printed.
- Article 4. To elect three selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor, and fix compensation.
- Article 5. To elect a member of the Superintending School Committee, to serve for three years.
- Article 6. To elect a road commissioner or commissioners.
- Article 7. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for roads and bridges for summer work.
- Article 8. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for snow and ice removal.



- Article 9. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for support of common schools.
- Article 10. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for repair of schoolhouses.
- Article 11. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for school superintendency.
- Article 12. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for high school tuition.
- Article 13. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for patrol maintenance.
- Article 14. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for support of poor.
- Article 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for contingent expenses.
- Article 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for memorial purposes, care of cemeteries and interest on local school fund.
- Article 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for cutting and burning bushes.
- Article 18. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for maintenance of third class road.
- Article 19. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$50.00 for public health nursing in the Town of Levant, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local services.
 - Article 20. To see if the town will vote to grant and

raise the sum of \$1000.00 to apply on outstanding notes, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$300.00 for interest, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money to buy gravel to go with the state's unimproved road fund, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$1500.00 to cover the overdraft, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money, and say how much, to retouch and bring the honor roll up to date, and cover with plastic, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise money, and say how much, to purchase fence for the South Levant cemetery, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 26. to see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for state aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 25 and 29, Chapter 20, R. S. 1944 as amended.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$280.00 for aid to dependent children.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to give the selectmen authority to give quit claim deed, or rent or lease such property as the town may become possessed of through tax liens, or such other procedures as are usual in acquiring tax titles to property.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to insure the school buildings and snow plow equipment or act anything relative thereto.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to compel the tax collectors to settle all back taxes by February 15, 1949, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to compel the tax collector for 1948 to settle all taxes in one year from date of commitment, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 32. To elect a tax collector and fix compensation.

Article 33. To elect a treasurer and fix compensation.

Article 34. To see if the town will vote to authorize the treasurer, with the consent of the selectmen, to hire money necessary to meet bills during the current municipal year, in anticipation of and to be paid out of the current year's taxes, and to execute and deliver the negotiable promissory note or notes of the town therefor.

Article. 35. To see if the town will vote to authorize the treasurer to deduct 50% of all vouchers of any person oweing the town a tax, or act anything relative thereto.

Article 36. To see if the town will vote to itemize the town report.

Article 37. To elect constables and all other necessary town officers.

Articles 38 To see if the town will vote to sell the tractor house, or act anything relative thereto.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Grange Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon, the day of said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

Fail not to make due notice of this warrant, and return your doings thereon, at the time and place of said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee and Citizens of Levant:

The following school report for the year ended March 1, 1948 is presented with the hope that you may better understand the conditions which exist in your schools together with the problems which must be faced in the coming year.

ENROLLMENT

The total enrollment for the present school year is 162, slightly less than last year's record registration of 170. The largest number of pupils this year is at West Levant, where the rooms are quite crowded. The following statistics regarding the enrollment will show how pupils are distributed by schools and grades:

Of this number, 104 are conveyed to the schools by bus.

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

At the present time we have 31 students attending various high schools. There are 10 at Bangor High, 11 at Hermon High, 2 at Bangor High, 2 at Carmel High, 4 at Higgins, 1 at Corinna, and 1 at East Corinth.

The cost of tuition, as you will see by the financial report, was slightly over \$4,000.00 for the past year. It will doubtless be higher next year as the increased tuition rates did not go into effect until last September and consequently only part of this increase is reflected in this year's cost. However, regardless of the expense, we should encourage all graduates of the eighth grade to enter high school and graduate if possible. Every American boy and girl should have the privilege of a high school education.

TEACHERS

We were fortunate in being able to retain four of our local teachers again this year. Without them it would be very difficult to keep our schools in operation. During the summer I searched in vain for two teachers to fill the vacancies. However, it was not until the week before school was scheduled to open that we were able to secure teachers. Mr. Wayne Garland, a graduate of Gorham Normal School, was hired to teach the village grammar school. Mrs. Beryl Goff, a graduate of Farmington Normal School and with summer school work at Boston University, was engaged for the West Levant grammar school. Mrs. Goff resigned at the end of twelve weeks and Miss Marraine McConnell was hired to complete the year. Miss McConnell comes to us with two years of college training. Miss Kathleen Hewes of Hampden is our music teacher. She received her training at the Northern Conservatory of Music. She teaches one day a week in Levant.

REPAIRS

During the past year part of the roof at West Levant school was shingled. The porch and steps at the village were rebuilt and minor repairs made on all buildings. At West Levant electric lights were installed. This expense, however, is being paid by the school and the citizens of that part of the town. None of the repairs appropriation was used for this purpose.

In order to make the necessary repairs in the coming year we will need at least \$500. A new stove at a cost of \$50.00 to \$60.00 will be needed for the primary room at the Village. Many of our seats are broken and beyond repair, which will make it necessary to secure some replacements. The primary room at the Village is very cold and difficult to heat. If the room could be divided I believe it could be made much more comfortable for the little ones.

Other repairs such as redecorating the inside of the school rooms and painting the outside of the school houses are much needed but will have to be postponed until another year.

I hope that sometime in the not too distant future the state and federal government may provide funds for new school building construction. When that time comes I trust that the citizens of Levant will unite in building a consolidated school which will provide much better educational opportunities for all the children of the town.

CONCLUSIONS

I wish to express by appreciation to the teachers and school committee for their wholehearted support in carrying out the school program. I am also grateful to the citizens and parents whose interest and support make it possible for the schools to be kept in operation in these difficult times. To the school children whose cheery smiles and pleasant greetings meet me on every hand I renew my pledge to provide the best possible training for the years ahead.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR LEVANT

January 1 to December 31, 1947

BUREAU OF HEALTH NURSING SERVICE

A Public Health program is only as good as the interest shown by the citizens of the town in which the program is being carried out. In recent years much better effort has been made in your community but many people who really should benefit by it are still not reached. Health is an asset that we obtain by normal healthful living. Individual taxpayers of your community, whether directly or indirectly, bear the cost of this service and should be interested in a sound health program for this town.

During the past year your Public Health Nurse has given more time to the prenatal, infant and preschool periods of the child's life because we realize the children of today will be citizens in a few years.

As in previous years home visits for health supervision have been made to infants and preschool children in order to help mothers with the planning of a daily schedule and to help with correction of defects and establishment of good health habits.

Conferences have been held with the superintendent and teachers regarding health problems arising in school and to cooperate with them in promoting modern health education. Guidance in making the school environment safer has been given.

Whenever necessary children have been referred to the Pediatric and Crippled Children's Clinics sponsored by the State Bureau of Health. These referrals are made through the family physician.

There were three Child Health Conferences held for preschool children in the summer. These were sponsored by a group of Levant women and the State Bureau of Health. Each child was given a complete physical examination and the immunizations requested by the parents. The results were as follows:

Physical examinations - 45
Smallpox vaccinations - 3
Diphtheria toxoid - 10
Whooping Cough vaccine - 5

Necessary follow up visits have been made to patients with venereal disease and tuberculosis and their contacts in order to keep them under treatment and to prevent the spread of either disease.

From February until June your town had emergency health service. During this time your Public Health Nurse was away securing further education to improve her service to the town.

The help of those who have assisted with the Health Service has been greatly appreciated.
