To the Citizens of the Town of Sullivan:

In accordance with the instructions of the School Board, I hereby submit a brief report of the financial standing and condition of our schools for the year ending March 1, 1904.

The whole number of pupils in town is three hundred and forty-seven. The entire enrollment in the schools for the past year has been two hundred and forty-six, the average attendance two hundred and nineteen. The length of the school year has been twenty-eight weeks, divided into three terms, one of ten and two of nine weeks each.

At West Sullivan the grammar school has been successively under the management of Mr. John W. Higgins, Mr. Everett Ober and Mr. Andy P. Havey.

Miss Pease went back to the intermediate school for the year. Miss Bunker had the primary. Because of the crowded condition of this school, Miss Gussie Robertson was employed as assistant for several weeks during the spring term.

The spring term at Sullivan was taught by Miss Evans. Miss Patten taught the fall and winter terms.

Miss Smith was at the Centre for the year.

At East Sullivan the spring term was taught by Miss Patten. Miss Farnsworth began the fall term, but at her request was released. Miss Evans finished the term and also taught the winter term.

Miss Clara Chilcott was at the Ash district for the spring term, Mr. George Patten for the fall and winter terms.

The teachers at Tunk were Miss Dunbar, spring; Miss Simpson, fall; and Miss Urann, winter terms.

Our teachers have been uniformly successful the past year, but to do the very best work we must have the co-operation of the parents. Many parents do not seem to realize what a vast deal they could help their children in their school work by just a little of the right kind of encouragement. One of the evils of the present day and one which could be in a great part corrected by the parent or guardian, is a dislike on the part of many children for regular attendance or determined effort in overcoming difficulties. There seems to be an ever increasing feeling that school is not a serious occupation, and that it may be put aside for almost anything that occurs. It may be a ball game or the county fair, but it is the excuse for a day's or perhaps for a week's absence.

HIGH SCHOOL.

In the high school we have not deviated to any great extent from the general plan adopted last year. The course of studies has been modified somewhat but not essentially changed. Nearly all the pupils are coming into line and by another year all ought to be taking the regular work. A crying need of our

school is a permanent schoolroom. Each time we are compelled to change, our text books, library and apparatus suffer, and until we have this there will be little to encourage us to add to the library and collections.

REPAIRS.

A wood shed has been erected at West Sullivan. The school house is very much in need of paint both inside and out.

At Sullivan the seats have been turned, the school room painted and the windows opened at the back of the room. The outside of the building, however, needs painting.

The school house at the Centre has been painted. The building needs to be raised and the wood shed to be enlarged.

At the Ash district the wood room ought to be taken out and a window placed in the back. This room also needs other repairs, such as papering, etc.

The school room at Tunk has been put in thorough repair. The East Sullivan school house should be painted.

THE TUNK SCHOOL.

In explanation of the article in the warrant relating to the Tunk school, I will quote from the school laws. "Schools having an average of less than eight can be continued only by a vote of the town at the regular annual meeting, after a written recommendation by the S. S. committee."

The board recommends that the school be continued.

Copy of Warrant.

STATE OF MAINE,

HANCOCK, SS.

To Oakman Bunker, a constable of the Town of Sullivan, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Sullivan qualified by law to vote in town affairs to meet at the town house in said Sullivan on the fourteenth day of March A. D., 1904, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
 - Art. 2—To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
 - >> Art. 3—To hear report of selectmen.
 - Art. 4—To choose three or more selectmen.
 - Art. 5—To choose three or more assessors.
 - Art. 6—To choose overseer or overseers of poor.
- Art. 7—To choose a town treasurer.
 - Art. 8 -To choose a road commissioner or commissioners.
 - Art. 9—To see how much money the town will raise for State roads.
 - Art. 10—To see how much money the town will raise for repairs of Roads and Bridges.
 - Art. 11—To see how much money the town will raise for repairs of sidewalks.
 - Art. 12—To see how much money the town will raise for Memorial services.

Art. 13—To see what action the town will take relative to collection of taxes.

Art. 14- To choose a collector of taxes.

Art. 15—To choose a member or members of superintending school committee.

Art. 16—To choose three or more fence viewers.

Art, 17—To choose all other necessary town officers.

Art. 18—To see how much money the town will raise for support of poor.

Art. 19—To see how much money the town will raise for support of common schools.

Art. 20—To see if the town will vote to change the location and terms of high school as they now are to one term per year in North Sullivan, Sullivan and East Sullivan.

Art. 21—To see how much money the town will raise for free high sehool.

Art. 22—To see how much money the town will raise for free text books.

Art. 23—To see how much money the town will raise for repairs of school houses.

Art. 24—To see how much money the town will raise for incidental expenses.

Art. 25—To see what action the town will take in regard to road laid out by the selectmen over Mrs. C. A. Stimson property.

Art. 26—To see if the town will raise a sum of money to pay the expenses of E. E. Bragdon to Augusta in 1903 in behalf of the town in regard to the islands being set off from Sullivan.

Art. 27—To see if the town will vote to raise money for the erection of a soldiers' monument.

Art. 28—To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to lay out road commencing at county road near Flanders stream and following old road so far as practicable to a point opposite north end of barn owned by Fred D. Crane.

Art. 29—To see if the town will allow Wm. R. Martin to work his tax on road leading from Carlton Ash house to said Martin's house to be expended under direction of road commissioner.

Art. 30—To see if the town will vote to have our annual town meeting the first Monday in March.

Art. 31—To see what action the town will take in regard to continuing the Tunk school.

Art. 32—To see if the town will vote to build a stone bridge over Morancy stream on the county road said bridge known as Smith bridge and raise a sum of money to build said bridge.

Art. 33—To see if the town will vote to have eight hours constitute a days labor and that the wages shall be two dollars per day minimum, double team and teamster four dollars minimum, and single team and teamsters three dollars minimum.

Art. 34—To see what action the town will take in regard to the taxes due from G. D. Blake on the 1895 school district No. 1 commitment.

Art. 35—To see what action the town will take in regard to the tax deeds now held by town.

Art. 36—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to fence in the school property at North Sullivan.

Art. 37—So see if the town will vote to improve the bridge near Granite Hotel and place an iron or stone watering basin there for public use and to raise a sum of money for the same.

Art. 38—To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to lay out a road in that part of the town known as North Sullivan, commencing at the junction of the Porcupine Quarry road (so called) and county road and following said Porcupine Quarry road to land owned by Hooper, Havey & Co.
