To the Citizens of the Town of Sullivan:

I present herewith a report of the condition of our schools and a statement of the several accounts for the past year.

The whole number of scholars in town is three hundred and forty-two. The total enrollment has been two hundred and twenty-six, with an average attendance of one hundred and sixty. We have had twenty-seven weeks of school, divided into three terms, one of ten, one of nine, and one of eight weeks.

The work of the teachers and the progress of the pupils has been generally satisfactory and the standard of the schools has been well kept up. The shortening of the school year one week interfered with the work somewhat, as the course of study has been arranged for a school year of twenty-eight weeks. A small increase in the appropriation for next year will be necessary in order to continue the schools the usual number of weeks. This town has been raising liberal amounts for school purposes for some years and the wisdom of this policy can be easily seen by comparing our schools with those of the towns that follow the old custom of raising "What the law requires" and no more.

I would suggest that \$1200 be raised for common schools for the ensuing year.

The following teachers have been employed during the past year :

At West Sullivan Mr. Andy P. Havey taught the spring term of the grammar school, Mr. Isaac Goddard the fall and winter terms; Miss Florence Pease taught the intermediate and Miss Josie Urann the primary school for the year.

At Sullivan Miss Agnes Patten taught the spring and fall terms. Miss Bernice Smith began the winter term but resigned on account of illness. Mr. Kenneth Bragdon finished the term.

At the Centre Miss Margaret Dunbar taught the spring term, Mr. Clarence Havey the fall term, and Miss Bessie Gordon the winter term.

Mr. J. B. Clark taught the spring term at East Sullivan, Miss Alice W. Gilman the fall and winter terms.

Miss Bernice Smith taught the spring term at the Ash District, Miss Adah Farnsworth the fall and winter terms.

Miss Bessie Gordon taught the spring and fall terms at Tunk, Mr. Geo. A. Patten the winter term.

HIGH SCHOOL.

The school has been under the instruction of Mr. C. H. Smith for the year. The entire enrollment has been twenty-six with an average attendance of twenty. The course of study has been considerably changed and several studies added.

REPAIRS.

At West Sullivan the schoolhouse has been painted inside and a fence has been built around the lot.

This building needs to be painted on the outside.

At Sullivan the schoolhouse needs painting on the outside.

At the Centre the schoolhouse has been raised and placed on a stone and cement foundation. The outbuildings should be repaired.

At East Sullivan the schoolhouse needs painting and the chimney should be attended to.

At the Ash district the wood room has been taken out, a window put in, and the schoolroom papered.

The chimney was found to be defective and was built over.

At Tunk a new stove is needed.

As suggested at the last town meeting the funds, known as the District No. 1 Balance, were used to build the fence at West Sullivan. These funds consisted of the balance that was due District No. 1 from the town and amount due from G. D. Blake on the District No. 1, commitment of 1895, which has been paid in order not to open a new account. These funds have been placed in the resources of the Repairs Account and the expenditures for the fence in the expenditures of the Repairs account.

I would suggest that \$300 be raised for repairs for the ensuing year.

TEXT BOOKS.

The text books are in a fair condition but the supply needs to be renewed each year as the old books wear out. Extra demands are made on this account by the high school just at present as it is necessary to buy new books as new studies are introduced.

I would recommend that \$200 be raised for this account for the ensuing year.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Sullivan

Art. 9—To see how much money the town will raise for State road.

Art. 10—To see how much money the town will raise for repairs of roads and bridges.

Art. 11—To see how much money the town will raise for repairs of sidewalks.

Art. 12.—To see how much money the town will raise for Memorial services.

Art. 13—To see what action the town will take relative to collection of taxes.

Art. 14—To choose a collector of taxes.

Art. 15—To choose a member or members of superintending school committee.

Art. 16—To choose three or more fence viewers.

Art 17—To choose all other necessary town officers.

Art. 18—To see how much money the town will raise for support of poor.

Art. 19—To see how much money the town will raise for support of common schools.

Art. 20 —To see if the town will vote to change the location of "High school" to that part of the town where the largest number of scholars eligible to attend will be accommodated.

Art. 21—To see how much money the town will raise for free high school.

Art. 22—To see how much money the town will raise for free text books.

Art. 23—To see how much money the town will raise for repairs of school houses.

Art 24—To see how much money the town will raise for incidental expenses.

Art. 25—To see if the town will allow W. R. Martin to work his tax on road leading from Carlton Ash house to said Martin's house to be expended under direction of road commissioner.
