

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS R. L. Sinclair.

Sullivan, Maine, Feb. 1, 1916.

To the Members of the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Town of Sullivan:

I have the pleasure of submitting my second annual report of the condition of our schools and of the work done during the past year. We have striven to bring the schools not only to a higher standard of efficiency, but also to find the weak points in the system. In a well regulated school system there should be definite progress from year to year and from grade to grade. That is, there should be a continuous line of upward growth from the first grade to the high school. One of the greatest weaknesses of the Sullivan system has been the breaking of this line. There have been too many places either above or below the normal line of progress. It has been our problem for the year to find these places by observation and conferences with teachers and then to make a conscious effort to remedy the condition. One of the best measures of the success of teaching is the number of pupils who are repeating the work of any grade. Of course this assumes that the work of the grade is not too difficult for that age; in other words, that the course of study is adapted to the child's ability. During the present school year the per cent. of repeaters is 4.2. This is low and can be made lower by individual promotion of pupils when they are capable of doing the work; by semi-annual promotion and attention to individual differences in pupils. When we consider that two years ago 8.7 per cent. of the pupils were repeating the work and in previous years a high per cent. we may rest assured that progress is being made.

Teachers and Teachers' Improvement

A complete list of the Sullivan teachers is given, together with their training, experience and present salary. On the whole it is a strong list.

Most of them have had some professional training and several are normal graduates. While this is not the only test of a teacher's worth to a community, yet we must admit that other things being equal, the trained teacher has the advantage, especially if she has also had some experience.

We have been pleased with the manner in which the teachers have responded to opportunities to secure professional advancement. During the fall term two district meetings were held, one at West Sullivan and one at Sorrento. Both these meetings were very helpful to all who attended. Several teachers attended the State Convention in Portland and all but one attended the County Convention at Ellsworth.

Most of our teachers are getting a professional attitude toward their work and are not willing to rest upon low standards of work in any subject, but express a sincere desire to improve their teaching in the light of modern methods and tests.

High School

We have been so fortunate as to retain the services of Principal Havey and Miss Jones, while Miss Ross was elected to teach the subjects taught by Miss Perkins last year. I am sure that no high school in the state has a better corps of instructors and the pupils are making excellent progress under this instruction. The entering class this year is the largest in the history of the school. This year I have merged High School Account No. 1 and No.2, as I wish the citizens of the town to see just the facts of the High School Account. As you may see, there is a large overdraft brought about partially by the heavy cost of fuel during the present years, and partially by the overdraft from Account No. 2 in previous years. In order to continue a Class A high school it would seem necessary to raise more money, as there seems no way in which one can cut down in expense. However, by rearranging the heating apparatus in the basement of the building it would seem that a saving could be made in fuel and increased comfort given to the pupils at the same time.

The establishment of a Commercial Course would also add to the efficiency of the school to the community, as graduates of Commercial Courses find ready employment, thus securing a means of livelihood to our boys and girls without the expense of further training.

Text Books

During the past year we have paid from two to four times as much as formerly for paper and supplies for the school. That is, it takes \$3.00 now to buy what \$1.00 would buy for two years ago. The text book publishers have also announced an increase in prices of 25 per cent. The large entering class in the high school necessitated the expenditure of so

large a part of the text book account that it was impossible to make a change in arithmetics as had been planned. The condition of these books are so bad that it is necessary to have a new supply of the same kind or exchange for a better book, as the latter method is the more economical I trust that we can do so during the coming year.

Repairs

During the past year new floors have been laid in the North Sullivan school building and the minor repairs have been made throughout the town. The state is now entering into a campaign for "Better School Buildings" and I am publishing a copy of a report on the condition of one room school building that I recently filed with the state educational department.

The state department recommends that we remodel one building each year and we received from the state equalization fund the sum of \$165.00 for that purpose.

As the state has shown itself so willing to aid us in this work it seems to me that it is a good business proposition to take hold of this matter and adopt a program to remodel and modernize one school building each year.

In closing, I wish to thank the school board, teachers and citizens of the town for their splendid support and co-operation. I wish to assure you of my best service for the coming year.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

Since the last issue of the Sullivan town report, the work in music n the schools of Sullivan has been carried steadily forward. The several schools have been visited by your supervisor as follows:

West Sullivan, 27 visits; Sullivan Harbor, 27 visits; Sullivan Centre, 30 visits; Ashe District, 28 visits; Bridgham Hill, 28 visits.

Owing to holidays, attendance on convention, and sometimes because of illness on the part of the grade teacher, the several schools have not received the same number of visits. At the close of the last school year, many of the books were practically worn out and the whole series out of date. At the opening of the fall term, where new books had to be purchased, the text book was changed, introducing in place of the old "Normal Course" the new "Progressive Series," the series now in use in the best schools in the state. The change has been beneficial and it is hoped that the amount raised for text books for the coming year will be sufficient to cover the expense of introducing this series into all the schools in town.

Last May an exhibition of the grade work was given at K. of P. hall and a similar exhibition is in process of preparation for the coming year.

Much of what has been accomplished in the grades has been due to the faithful work and co-operation of the grade teachers. Without their efficient help little, if anything, could have been accomplished.

In the high school, work has been carried on under difficulties, owing to lack of suitable music. Regular lessons have been attempted using any music available. Last February an operetta, Polished Pebbles, was given by the pupils of the high school. A similar composition, The Isles of Chance, is under preparation and will be given early in March.

During the fall term a "Girls' Glee Club" and a "Boys' Quartet" were organized.

Next October the high school pupils from this section of the state are to produce the opera "Martha" at the Maine State Convention in Bangor.

The pupils of Sullivan high school have been invited to have a part in this grand festival chorus. Shall Sullivan boys and girls have a chance to accept this invitation and share in the honors and privileges offered, or, for lack of sufficient money with which to purchase the needed music, must they remain at home, lose the training and see others, no better qualified, take their places?

To the citizens of Sullivan and the school officials I wish to express my gratitude for their hearty support and encouragement in whatever has been undertaken along musical lines.

TO OAKMAN BUNKER, CONSTABLE FOR THE TOWN OF SULLIVAN, IN SAID COUNTY:—

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Sullivan, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Knights of Pythias hall, West Sullivan, on the twelfth day of March, A. D., 1917, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2—To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3—To hear the report of town officers and act thereon.

Article 4—To choose three or more selectmen.

Article 5—To choose three or more assessors.

Article 6—To choose three or more overseers of the poor.

Article 7—To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 8—To determine the number of road commissioners.

Article 9—To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid as provided in section 20 of chapter 110 of Public Laws of 1913.

Article 10—To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533 for improvement of the sections of the State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commissioner, in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges. The above amount being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 19 of chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

- Article 11—To choose one or more fire wards, fix their compensation and raise a sum of money for the same.
- Article 12—To raise a sum of money for salary of superintendent of schools for the present year.
- Article 13—To see how much money the town will raise for the repair of roads and bridges.
- Article 14—To see how much money the town will raise for free text books.
 - Article 15—To choose a trustee for York Hill cemetery.
- Article 16—To see how much money the town will raise for the repair of sidewalks.
- Article 17—To see what action the town will take relative to the collection of taxes.
- Article 18—To see if the town will vote to charge six per cent. interest on all taxes remaining unpaid on September first, said interest to commence on that date.
 - Article 19—To choose a collector of taxes.
- Article 20—To choose a member of the superintending school committee.
 - Article 21—To choose all other necessary town officers.
- Article 22—To see what action the town will take relative to the purchase of some fire apparatus.
- Article 23—To see if the town will vote to pay Mrs. Maggie Milne \$150.00 because of an injury received by falling from the sidewalk.
- Article —To see how much money the town will raise for teachers' meetings.
- Article —To see how much money the town will raise for the support of the poor.
- Article —To see how much money the town will raise for Memorial services.

Article —To see how much money the town will raise for the support of common schools.

Article —To see how much money the town will raise for high school.

Article —To see how much money the town will raise for repair of school buildings.

Article —To see how much money the town will raise for incidental expenses.

Article —To see how much money the town will raise for high school apparatus.

Article —To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to hire sufficient money to pay town bills.

The warrant will remain open for inserting articles until March 1.
