

To the Members of the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Sullivan:

I have the pleasure of submitting my third annual report of the condition of our schools and of the work done the past year. During the present school year the per cent of repeaters in the grades was 4.3. This was 1 per cent. higher than the previous year, being due probably to irregular attendance caused by epidemics of whooping cough and measles. However, this is a very satisfactory test of the efficiency of our teaching force. The pupils passing from the eighth grade into the high school seem to have as great a grasp of the subject matter as the ninth grade had under that system. The State granted us \$225 from the equalization fund, thereby making it possible for the town to attain a school year of thirty-six weeks. This is the minimum school year recommended by the State department, and should be maintained in the future.

While the uncertain conditions brought on by the war in a way affect our general prosperity, we must not lose sight of the fact that we must educate our boys and girls to be citizens of to-morrow, and we should do noth-

ing to lessen the efficiency of our schools in a material way.

Higher salaries will undoubtedly be necessary, as even now there is a shortage of teachers throughout the State, and this shortage will increase before the next school year.

Nearly all our teachers attended the State convention in Bangor and the county convention in Ellsworth. These meetings have been a source of inspiration to all who attended them. A list of the Sullivan teachers is given, together with their training, experience and present salaries.

HIGH SCHOOL.

This year finds us with an entirely new corps of teachers in the high school. However, owing to the complete records kept in the different departments, the new teachers were able to take up the work and carry it on in a satisfactory manner.

Although the high school account shows an over-draft of \$362.27, there is enough outstanding tuition due to balance this overdraft. It would also seem necessary to increase the present appropriation, as salaries will necessarily be higher another year. Since the new furnace has been installed in the basement the building has been very comfortable, even during the coldest weather.

TEXT-BOOKS.

All school paper and supplies are still increasing in price, and larger appropriations seem necessary to meet this increase. The teachers have been urged to be careful in giving out paper and supplies, but the expense is heavy, nevertheless. During the past year we have completed the introduction of the new language books, and also introduced a new arithmetic into the grades. The Palmer Method in writing has been also introduced into all our schools. During the coming year we hope to profit greatly from this method.

REPAIRS.

During the past year, in accordance with the recommendation of the State department, the Tunk Pond schoolhouse has been thoroughly repaired and renovated. A wood shed and modern outbuilding were also erected.

It is for the town to decide whether it cares to continue the repair program and remodel another building during the coming year.

In closing, I wish to thank the committee and

teachers for their splendid support and cooperation. Our heartiest thanks are also due the citizens of the town, who have made this work possible by their unstinted support.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC.

As this is my first experience in school work, I wish to say that I am doing my uttermost to meet with the approval of the public of Sullivan and vicinity.

The opera "Martha", mentioned by Miss Jones in her report for last year's work, was very successfully given at the Maine State convention in Bangor. Owing to the early date of the convention, very little work could be done, but Sullivan high school was creditably represented by Miss Hope Perkins, alto, Miss Marjorie Springer, soprano; Wilton Hanna, tenor, and Hugh Pettee, bass.

During the year a Victor has been placed in the Sullivan high school. This is of the most advanced educational type. The payments are to be made by the students, five cents weekly being the amount requested by them; also by concerts which were to be given monthly. The first two given were a marked success, but owing to the unfavorable weather and numerous school activities just at this time of year, it has been necessary to abandon them for the present.

Forty-two dollars and ten cents have been paid on the \$90 due. The contract says that the payment should be completed November 10, 1918, or one year from the date of placing the machine in Sullivan high school. I hope that through the co-operation of the parents and promptness of the pupils the above stated amount may be paid before the close of the school year, June 7, 1918. This will enable my successor to buy new records and go on unhampered with the work of music and music appreciation. This machine can also be used along with English, and will be able to prove its educational value.

Because of the great advance in the price of music of all kinds, I hope to keep down expenses by producing a musical patriotic pageant during the spring term.

The work in the graded schools has followed in the footsteps of my successful predecessor. I have placed the Progressive series in the schools that are not already supplied. All the schools throughout my district are now using these books excepting Sullivan Harbor. A sufficient number of books Number 11 have been ordered for this school, and I hope will be in use there very soon.

Very few lessons have been missed in any of the schools outside of Sorrento and Sullivan Harbor. These schools unfortunately have been without a teacher for several successive weeks. But both schools are doing good work.

Two-part work is being successfully caried on in all the schools. Naturally some schools are in advance of the others because of more pupils and less monotones. I feel that all the boys and girls feel their responsibility, and they are all doing their best.

In closing, I wish to thank all the teachers for their splendid work and courteous treatment. Whatever success the graded exhibition proves to be will be due to their co-operation.

STATE OF MAINE.

To Oakman Bunker, a Constable of the town of Sullivan in said County:

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Sullivan qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet at Temperance hall, in said Sullivan, on Monday, the eleventh day of March, A. D. 1918, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to vote on the following articles, to wit:

ARTICLE 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

- 2 To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3 To hear and act on the report of the town officers for the past year.
- 4 To choose selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor.
- 5 To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 6 To choose a collector of taxes for the ensuing year.
- 7 To determine the number of road commissioners.
- 8 To see what action the town will take relative to the collection of taxes.
- 9 To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money to entitle the town to State aid, as provided in section 20 of chapter 110 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- 10 To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533 for improvement of the sections of the State aid road as outlined in the report of the State highway commissioner, in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges. The above amount being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 19 of chapter 130 of the public laws of 1913.
- 11 To choose a trustee for York Hill cemetery.
 - To see if the town will vote to increase the per diem rate of the road commissioner; if so, how much.
 - To see if the town will vote to increase the per diem rate of the selectmen, overseers of poor and assessors; if so, how much.
 - To see if the town will choose three or more trustees of the George Gordon cemetery and determine the length of the term that each shall serve.
 - To see if the town will vote to expend for the improvement of the George Gordon cemetery all money received from the sale of lots since 1917 and all money and proceeds received hereafter from the sale of lots in said cemetery.

To see if the town will choose one or more fire wards, fix the compensation and raise a sum of money for same.

To see how much money the town will raise for the repair of roads and bridges.

To see how much money the town will raise for common schools.

To see how much money the town will raise for free text books.

To see how much money the town will raise for the support of poor.

To see how much money the town will raise for free high school.

To see how much money the town will raise for the repair of school buildings.

To choose a member of the superintending school committee.

To see how much money the town will raise for the repair of sidewalks.

To see how much money the town will raise for teachers' meetings.

To see how much money the town will raise for incidental expenses.

To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to hire \$5,000, if necessary, in anticipation of taxes.

The warrant will remain open for inserting articles until March 1.

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
