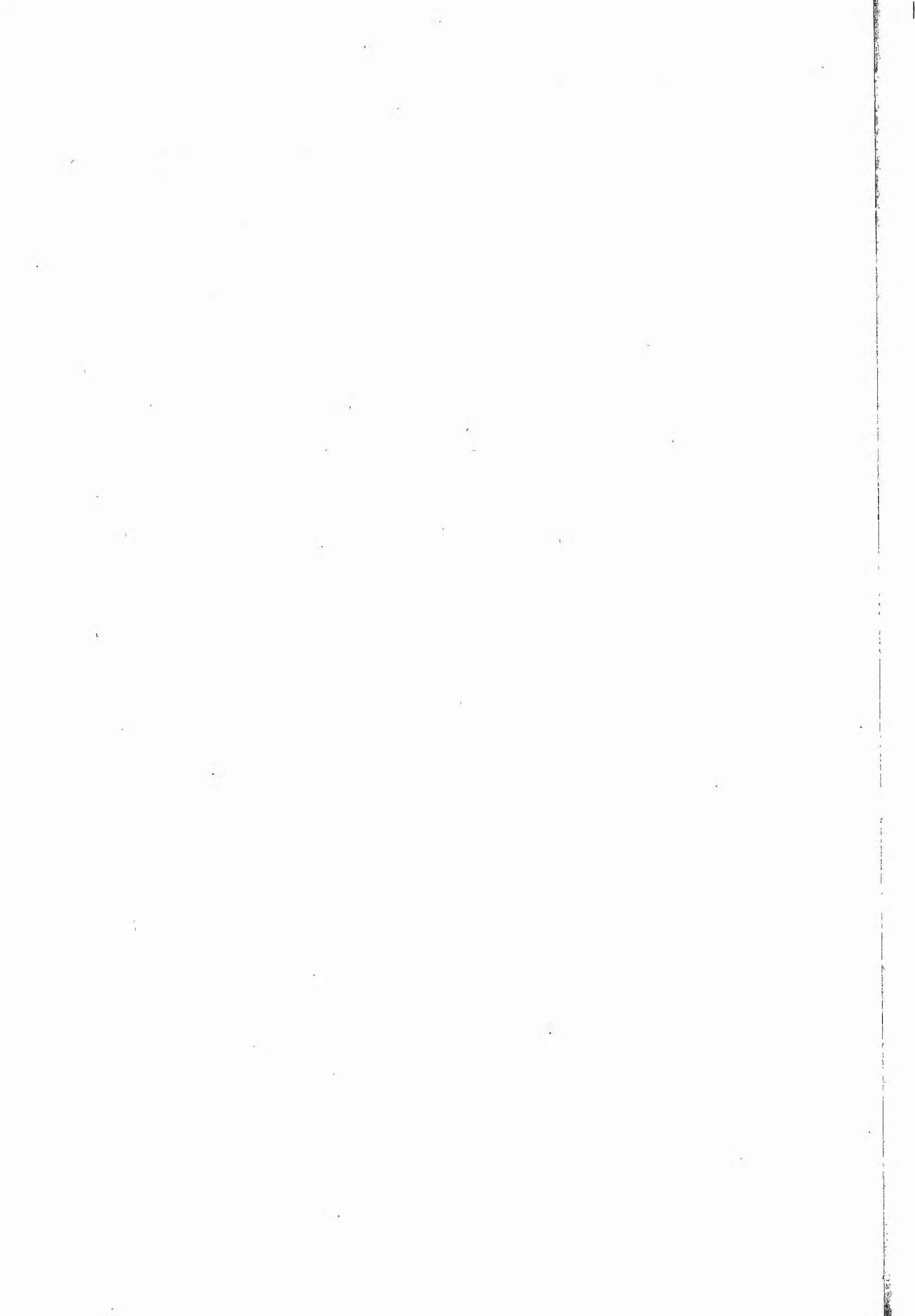

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*To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of  
the Town of Sullivan:*

On account of the loss of time caused by closing the schools because of the epidemic of influenza, the work of the schools has been somewhat handicapped since the beginning of the present school year. However, the teachers are carrying on their work in a satisfactory manner, and are giving careful attention to the required essentials of our course of study. While our school year may be shortened somewhat, there should be no material loss to the pupils.

The per cent of repeaters in the grades for the present year is 3.9. This is a very low percentage, and speaks well for the efficiency of our teaching force.

Because of the teacher shortage, higher board and general living expense, it has been necessary to increase the salaries of our teachers, but even now they are not clearing as much per week as they were before the high cost of living affected us. Salaries have not risen in proportion to the additional expense.

During the past school year there has been a total enrollment of 174 pupils in the grades, with an average

daily attendance of 133 pupils. Thirteen boys and seven girls completed the grade work and entered the high school in September.

#### HIGH SCHOOL.

While many high schools in the State have an entire faculty composed of women, we are fortunate to have two men, George House and Arthur Jellison, with Miss Beulah Thompson, in charge of our school. The work is being carried on in a very capable manner, and the pupils are taking much interest in all school activities.

The overdraft in the high school account is due to salary increase of teachers and heavy increase in the cost of fuel. There is a large supply of coal on hand, and there are several outstanding tuition bills, which will decrease the overdraft nearly one-half. But even then a larger appropriation is necessary for the coming year.

#### TEXT-BOOKS.

During the past year we have completed the introduction of new arithmetics and introduced new geographies into three of the schools. The Palmer method of writing has been taught with good success. The larger classes in the high school have drawn heavily on our text-book account. The same appropriation as last year should cover our expenditures in text-books and supplies.

#### REPAIRS.

More than half the money expended in this account has been expended on repairs at the high school building. This includes the cost of the new furnace installed last year.

During the coming year a new shed should be erected at the Center school, as the old shed is in a bad

condition and is not large enough to store the wood used by that school. Also there will be the usual minor expenditures.

CONCLUSION.

In closing I wish to acknowledge the hearty co-operation I have received from the teachers, who have striven diligently to make the school year a success. While many are entitled to special mention for the quality of their work, space will not permit me to refer to them individually.

I wish to express my gratitude to the S. S. Committee for their loyal support and assistance.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank all who have aided the schools in any way during the past year.

## REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC.

As supervisor of music in the town of Sullivan, I am making every effort to carry on the work that my predecessors have so ably begun.

The victrola which was purchased by Miss Allen, last year, was finally paid for November 9, and as soon as possible new records will be added to the collection that we now have.

In spite of the broken school year, on account of the influenza epidemic, I am very well pleased with the work which both teachers and pupils are doing under these conditions. I hope for some exhibitions to be presented by the children, that the parents and other townspeople may realize what they are accomplishing.

I am carrying on the progressive method that Miss Allen introduced last year. This method is very efficient in teaching the children tone-values and sight reading. Two-part music is carried on very successfully. I think the boys and girls thoroughly enjoy it, and are doing their very best.

As is the custom, I plan to have an operetta for the high school in the spring. I am very much pleased with the music in the high school, and would like to say that I believe it to be a great credit to the town.

Thanks to the mild winter and adequate supply of teachers, scarcely a lesson has been missed in Sullivan, East Sullivan or Sorrento.

Much credit is due to the teachers, who have given me their hearty co-operation and assistance, to whom I am grateful.

## WARRANT.

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STATE OF MAINE.

*To Oakman Bunker, a Constable for the Town of Sullivan in said County:*

GREETING.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Sullivan qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the K. of P. hall at West Sullivan, on Monday, the tenth day of March A. D. 1919, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to vote on the following articles, to wit:

- 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2 To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3 To hear and act on the report of the town officers for the past year.
- 4 To choose three or more selectmen.
- 5 To choose three or more assessors.
- 6 To choose three or more overseers of the poor.
- 7 To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 8 To choose a collector of taxes for the ensuing year.
- 9 To determine the number of road commissioners.
- 10 To see what action the town will take relative to the collection of taxes.
- 11 To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriation and money to entitle the town to State-aid as provided in section 20 of chapter 110 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- 12 To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533 for the improvement of the section of the State-aid road as outlined in the report of the State highway commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of sec. 19 of chap. 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- 13 To choose a trustee for York Hill cemetery.
- 14 To choose a trustee for George Gordon cemetery.

15 To see if the town will vote to increase the per diem rate of the road commissioner; if so, how much.

16 To see if the town will vote to increase the per diem rate of the selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor; if so, how much.

To choose one or more fire wards, fix their compensation and raise a sum of money for the same.

To choose all other necessary town officers.

To see how much money the town will raise for the repair of roads and bridges.

To see how much money the town will raise for common schools.

To see how much money the town will raise for free text books.

To see how much money the town will raise for support of poor.

To see how much money the town will raise for free high school.

To see how much money the town will raise for repair of school buildings.

To choose a member of the superintending school committee.

To see how much money the town will raise for the repair of sidewalks.

To see how much money the town will raise for incidental expenses.

To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to hire not more than \$5,000, if necessary, in anticipation of taxes.

To see if the town will vote to abate the taxes on the Sullivan steamboat wharf property for five years.
