

Report of Superintendent of Schools.

I herewith submit my report as Superintendent of Schools for the year ending March 1, 1903.

There were in town, April 1, 1902, 152-persons between the ages of 4 and 21 years.

No. 1.

Spring and Fall terms taught by Alice Ripley of Hope. No. 4.

Spring and Fall terms, taught by Josephine Knight of Searsmont. Winter term, taught by Alice Hobbs of Hope. No. 5.

Spring and Fall terms, taught by Julia Bills of Hope. Winter term, taught by Mary C. Barrett of Hope.

• No. 6.

Spring and Fall terms taught by Mary C. Barrett of Hope. Winter term taught by Jethro D. Pease of Hope.

No. 7

Spring, Fall and Winter terms, taught by Eva L. Taylor of South Hope.

Some necessary repairs have been made upon the school buildings and still others are needed. More blackboard surface and some simple devices for ventilation, are among the essential improvements. Pupils should not sit in a draft, neither should they breathe foul air which endangers health and induces stupidity. The Milne arithmetics being badly worn have been exchanged for Wentworth's. Additions to books already in stock, supplementary reading, and two maps have been purchased. More maps and globes

would make teaching more effective. The teachers employed with the exception of one term have been those of many years experience. They have been earnest and faithful in their work, though seriously handicapped by short terms and irregular attendance. A more general cooperation of parents and teachers would improve present conditions, as nothing else ran. Pupils should be made to feel that when school is in ression, it is their business to attend promptly and regularly, to be diligent, trustworthy and cheerfully obedient, ideal pupils, hastening the advent of the ideal school. We are at the threshold of a new and progressive century, rich in educational progress. The demand for trained minds was never greater. Children who are to compete for positions of usefulness should eagerly seize upon the opportunities offered by our brief school year, for to them will come the responsibilities of the future. "The safety of this nation is not in the hands of its rulers but in the lives of its common people."
