

To Jethro D. Pease, a constable of the town of Hope in said county,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Hope, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday, the 13th day of March at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1 To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
  Art. 2 To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
  Art. 3 To hear and act on the reports of the town officers.
  Art. 4 To choose Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor.
- Art. 5 To choose one member of the school committee.
  Art. 6 To choose a Sexton.
  Art. 7 To see what method the town will take to repair
  the roads for the ensuing year.

Art. 8 To see if the town will vote to have one, two, or three Road Commissioners.

Art. 9 To see what method the town will take to collect the taxes for the ensuing year.

- Art. 10 To choose a Collector of Taxes.

- Art. 12 To choose one, or more constables.

Art. 13 To choose all other necessary Town Officers.Art. 14 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the schools.

Art. 15 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor.

Art. 16 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of roads and bridges.

Art. 17 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of school buildings.

Art. 18 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for town expenses.

Art. 19 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay for breaking roads in winter.

Art. 20 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cutting bushes.

Art. 21 To see what sum of money, per hour, the town will vote to pay for labor on the highways.

Art. 22 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the tuition of scholars at secondary schools.

Art. 23 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay Town Officers.

Art. 24 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to purchase text books.

Art. 25 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) to aid in the erection of the Knox Memorial Building and how the same shall be raised.

Art. 26 To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum, for maintenance of state aid highways, during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of section 9 and 18 of chapter 130 of Public Laws of 1913.
Art. 27 To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid, as provided in section 20 of chapter

130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 28 To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533 for the improvement of the section of state aid road as outlined in the report of the state highway commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges: the above amount being the maximum which the

town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 19 of chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 29 To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money and what amount for work on Morey Grave-yard, cutting bushes, replacing fallen headstones and any other needed work and to see if the town will authorize the selectmen to expend the money.

Art. 30 To see if the town will vote to raise \$50 to pay for screening either the Hobbs or Fish Ponds and to see who shall have charge of its expenditure.

Art. 31 To act on any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
