



School Report

Members of the School Committee

To the members of the Superintending School Committee of the town of Hope.

Gentlemen:

I have the honor to submit to you the annual report of the condition and progress of the schools in your town.

I would also respectfully invite inspection by you and other citizens of the town, of the financial statements for the year just ended, which will be found at the end of this report; also of my books and accounts which are open to the inspection of any who may desire to see them.

The work of the schools in town has gone on much as usual during the past year. There have been changes of teachers and superintendents which have, no doubt, had their effect, but on the whole the results

are gratifying. The teachers have worked hard and put in long hours, and in most cases the pupils have

cooperated and bent to their tasks with a will. But the school year is so short that our pupils are placed at a disadvantage when they compete in secondary schools with classmates who have enjoyed regularly 36 or 37 weeks per year. At a cost of a hundred dollars two weeks can be added to the school year, and the children are such good workers that they will use every minute to good advantage.

The school at Head of the Lake has been much improved by the repairs made in December.

An entertainment by the Hope Corner school was generously patronized. Teacher and pupils worked hard for its success and secured a generous sum for school improvements.

The schoolhouse at South Hope is in bad condi-

tion and no temporary patching will correct it. The soft wood floor is worn through and its dust laden cracks furnish a fine breeding place for germs, the windows should be rearranged and more added, a jacketed stove should be substituted for the present affair which cannot keep the building comfortable on a cold day, the ceiling needs renewing, and sanitary closets must be installed. All this costs money and taxes are already high, but the health of our children comes first. An unsanitary abode is a menace to health and the South Hope schoolhouse is unsanitary from every point of view.

Many of the books in the school are so worn that numerous leaves are missing, and in a number of the classes there are not enough books for all pupils. A slightly larger appropriation for text books will make it possible to remedy this defect.

The thanks of all parents are due to the teachers who spent their noon hours in the schoolrooms. Teachers who thus sacrifice their hour of recreation for the sake of the moral welfare of their charges, are the ones who will send real men and women into the battle of life.

The amount recommended for secondary tuition seems large, but there is already an overdraft of \$114, four students are at Union High and one in Camden High; their tuition bills in June will be \$116. This gives us a total of \$230. Other pupils expect to enter high school in the fall, so that even this total may be increased.

The members of the committee have extended to me their heartiest support for which I wish to express my sincere thanks. To the citizens I extend my thanks for their friendly interest and cooperation. Respectfully submitted

REPORT ON TEACHERS

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Town Warrant

STATE OF MAINE

Knox, ss.—To J. D. Pease, a constable in the town of Hope, in said county.

Greeting: —

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Hope, qualified by law, to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House, in said town, on Monday, the 10th day of March, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles to wit:

Article 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2 To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3 To hear and act on the reports of Town Officers.

Article 4 To choose Selectmen, and Assessors. Article 5 To see if the town will vote to elect a board of overseers of the poor for three year term, one term to expire each year.

Article 6 To choose one member of the school committee.

Article 7 To choose a sexton.

Article 8 To see what method the town will take to repair roads for the ensuing year.

Article 9 To see if the town will vote to have one two or three road commissioners.

Article 10 To see what method the town will take to collect taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 11 To choose a collector of taxes.

Article 12 To choose a treasurer.

Article 13 To choose one or more constables.

Article 14 To choose all other necessary town officers.

Article 15 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools.

Aritcle 16 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the tuition of scholars at secondary schools.

Article 17 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of text books.

Article 18 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of school buildings.

Article 19 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of poor.

Article 20 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of roads and bridges.

Article 21 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cutting bushes.

Article 22 To see what sum the town will vote to raise for breaking roads in Winter.

Article 23 To see what sum per hour the town will vote to pay for labor on the highways.

Article 24 To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise in accordance with the provisions of (Chap. 154, 1917) the public laws of nineteen hundred and seventeen for the construction of a State highway extending from Camden through Hope to Appleton.

Article 25 To see if the town will vote yes or no on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid, as provided in Section 19, of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Article 26 To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$533 for the improvement of the section of state aid road, as outlined in the report of the State highway commissioners, in addition to the amount regurlarly raised for care of ways, highways, and bridges; the amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Article 27 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for town expenses.

Article 28 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town officers.

Article 29 To see if the town will vote to create a special Municipal Board of Mother's Aid, to consist of three members, at least one of whom shall be a woman and at least one of whom shall be one of the board of overseers of the poor, to serve for three year terms, the term of one to expire each year.

Article 30 To act on any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town House, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, on the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
