Report of Supt. of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Hope:

I herewith submit my second annual report of conditions and progress in the schools of Hope.

Schools have been in session practically without interruption since opening the second Monday in September except for a vacation of two weeks at Christmas.

Attendance has been good considering the severity of the winter and condition of roads.

Only one change of teachers has been made since opening in September.

I am glad to report that good discipline exists in all of the schools and that all have made fairly good progress; also that the standing of the pupils in their studies in South Hope and Head of the Lake schools will compare favorably with village schools of one or two grades.

Pupils are interested, orderly, studious and attentive to their work.

I an glad, also, to commend the work of the teachers. In all four of the schools they are rendering faithful, conscientious and intelligent service in the most important and responsible work in which we can engage, that of educating the future citizenship of the town to be home and nation builders of tomorrow.

The following words of Abraham Lincoln apply in this connection: "Upon the subject of education I can only say that I view it as the most important subject which we, as a people, can be engaged in."

Since our schools occupy so large a place in community affairs it is right and fitting that we should try

to estimate as fairly as possible the results which we are receiving from the expenditure necessary to maintain them.

I will indicate two ways by which we may make a close estimate; first, the attainments of the children in their studies, their habits, manners and morals; and second, by the character and influence of the teachers.

Judging from these two standpoints I feel warranted in saying that the town is getting good value for the expenditure.

The services of the helping teacher have been retained this year with the usual good results. Mrs. Ethel T. Staples has served in that capacity. She has made it a point to give the greater part of her time to the inexperienced and untrained teachers. I wish to call the attention of citizens to the value of this course for increasing the efficiency of the teacher. The helper takes up the work in detail for the benefit of the new teacher, makes out a program of studies, teaches classes, explains methods of teaching, how to give noon lunches, physical exercises, etc. The value of this to the teacher without experience or training is at once apparent.

The salary of the helping teacher is paid by the state. The only cost to the town is for transportation.

It has been necessary to purchase more textbooks and supplies than last year and many more are needed for next year. I recommend raising the same amount as last year, \$150.

At North Hope the out-buildings have been remodeled and rebuilt in conformity with the state law. Enough money should be raised this spring to make similar improvements at Hope Corner or Head of the Lake, leaving the other to be finished a year later on or before September, 1, 1924.

The schoolhouse at the Head of the Lake was papered, the ceiling whitened and the floor painted.

In view of the unexpended balance in the school account, \$479.46, I would suggest that it might be advisable to increase the length of the school year from 32 weeks to 34 weeks. The monthly pay-roll at present amounts to \$240 for four schools at \$15 each per week.

In conclusion I wish to thank the members of the School Committee and Citizens of the town for their interest and cooperation.

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Hope, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town, on Monday, the 12th day of March, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act on the reports of the town officers.
- Art. 4. To choose Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor.
- Art. 5. To choose one or more members of the School Committee.
 - Art. 6. To choose a Sexton.
- Art. 7. To see what method the town will take to repair the roads for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to have one, two or three Road Commissioners.
 - Art. 9. To choose Road Commissioners.
- Art. 10. To see what method the town will take to collect the taxes for the ensuing year.

- Art. 11. To choose a Collector of Taxes.
- Art. 12. To choose a Treasurer.
- Art. 13. To choose one or more Constables.
- Art. 14. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of schools.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for tuition of scholars at secondary schools.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to purchase text books.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of school buildings.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of the roads and bridges.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cutting bushes.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for breaking roads in winter.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money per hour the town will vote to pay for labor on the highways.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town expenses.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay the town officers.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote yes or no on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid, as provided in Section 19, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$533, for improvement of section of State aid road, as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commissioners, in addition to the amount regu-

larly raised for care of ways, highways and bridges, the amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the Treasurer of the town to borrow on the faith and credit of the town, from time to time, such sums of money as may be necessary for the payment of town charges and to give the notes of the town for such sums, to be paid during the municipal and current year, such notes to be countersigned and recorded by the Selectmen.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of the bridge near C. E. Wellman's.

Art. 30. To act on any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town House, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
