Whatever may be said of our care of the roads for the past year is of little consequence. The redeeming feature is that we have kept within the appropriation.

We have not resurfaced with dirt any roads, for we are well aware that the day of dirt roads is gone. Roads surfaced with dirt cannot stand up under heavy cars and trucks. We have used gravel as much as we could and that should be the policy in the future.

We question whether the use of log drags or graders is of much use in filling ruts, since as soon as the roads have been smoothed, along will come some heavy car and make new ruts. A better policy would be to fill all ruts with good gravel or crushed rock.

About every culvert and bridge was in such condition as to need extensive repairs.

Main street has been put in better condition than it has been for years.

Our suggestions would be: That the town should own a team or truck; that there should be a regular road crew to be kept on the roads the entire season; and of course a competent road commissioner to have entire charge of all the roads in town.

For the village streets and sidewalks, on account of the difficulty and expense in getting good gravel, we believe it to be more profitable to use crushed rock.

# Report of Superintendent of Schools

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To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Bucksport:

I have the honor to submit to you my fourth annual report of the condition and progress of the public schools of Bucksport for the municipal year ending January 31, 1922. This report includes the report of Mr. H. R. Emery, Optometrist.

The changes in the teaching force in the Grammar School in the Spring and Winter terms make it impossible to submit a Music Report.

## REPAIRS

Before the Spring term opened the Cobb building was papered and painted, the ceiling painted and seats replaced.

A new fence was built on the north side of the West Side School, the old flag pole taken down, and the pole placed on the top of the school building.

The porch on the front of the Millvale building had new sills. A new floor was laid and the floor painted two coats. Two lengths of sill under the building were reset to last until permanent repairs can be made. The out building had new rock bearings and sills, a new floor and the toilets painted. The fence between the shed and school building taken down, repaired, and reset.

## REPAIRS RECOMMENDED FOR 1922

Most of the buildings will need minor repairs.

The walls and ceilings of the East and West Side rooms need painting.

The Duck Cove and Buck's Mills buildings need new paper and the ceilings whitened.

The interior of the Millvale building needs to be done over.

Many of the school houses need to be painted. One building should be painted each year.

The underpinning on the north side and west end of the Millvale building will have to be reset. The frost has thrown this out until the underpinning is inside the sill. A trench should be dug outside the foundation and filled with rocks for the frost to work on, the wall reset and pointed with cement. The approximate cost will be between \$200 and \$300.

Last year the cost of insurance was \$227.41, lighting \$20, water \$25, cleaning \$95. Making a total of \$367.41. This left only \$332.59 for repairs.

## RED CROSS NURSE

During the months of March, April and May the three Hancock County towns in this Union will have the services of Miss Hoyt, Hancock County Red Cross Nurse. I feel sure that the parents, teachers, and pupils will give her their loyal support. The Modern Health Crusade has been started in the village schools.

## HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS

This year there are 47 pupils in the High School. 41 at East Maine Conference Seminary, 4 at Bangor High School, and 2 at Winterport High School. 26 pupils will be ready for High School next Fall. 14 from Spofford Grammar School, and 12 from the Rural Schools. There are 10 pupils in the Senior Class at the Seminary. The majority of the pupils are doing creditable work.

Section 85 School Laws of Maine provides that free tuition of pupils in High School, shall continue so long as the pupils maintain a satisfactory standard of deportment and scholarship. At present, the choice of High School Course is largely left to the student. The School Committee believe that no pupil should be allowed to choose his High School course without the assistance of the more mature mind and judgment of parent and teacher. This arrangement would give ample opportunity for parent, teacher and pupil to meet in conference and wisely decide upon the proper course for the child. The town is under no legal obligation to pay the tuition of pupils unless they take a satisfactory course and do creditable work. No pupil is lawfully entitled to more than four years of High School tuition from the Town and State.

## SPOFFORD GRAMMAR SCHOOL

Last Fall the entering class in the Grammar School was so large that it seemed advisable to form an A and B division. Under Miss McCaslin's instruction the A division accomplished in 14 weeks the same amount of work that the class last year accomplished in 34 weeks. At the beginning of the Winter term this division was promoted to the Eighth grade and are doing excellent work.

For several years there has seemed to be a disturbing element in the Grammar school. The atmosphere and school spirit have been bad. While the pupil is under the authority of the school the teacher stands in the place of the parent, hence there is every reason why the home and school should work in harmony and close co-operation.

I want to bring again to the attention of the parents the necessity for visiting the schools, and especially the Grammar school. A parent who does not visit the school is in touch with it only from the viewpoint of the child.

Visits from parents have always proved to be productive of better work on the part of both teachers and pupils. At the present time the school is running smoothly.

It is the desire of the Superintending School Committee to raise the standard of the Grammar school.

The plan is to bridge the gap between the Ninth grade and the first year in High School. We do not intend to slide back in an easy groove, but to be alert to needed changes which will make for a bigger and better school.

### CONSOLIDATED SCHOOLS

At the close of the State year, which ends June 30, 1922, there will be three rural schools in Bucksport which will fall below the average of eight required by law. There are always many cases of absence owing to illness and bad weather. There have been days when only three or four pupils were present in these schools. A school of this type belongs to the pioneer era when a man cut his grain with a sickle and threshed it with a flail, and stands out as a solitary landmark of former days.

At the last Legislature a law was passed which provides for an apportionment from the State for conveyance for consolidated schools. "There may be apportioned the same amount as for the maintenance of a teaching position, provided, however, that the amount so apportioned shall not exceed one half the cost of conveyance." It is most desirable that some plan of consolidation be worked out in these cases.

### REPORT OF H. R. EMERY, OPTOMETRIST

Pupils examined in the Grammar school 37. 11 of these pupils needed immediate attention, and 5 at a later period.

Pupils examined at the West Intermediate school 28. 3 needed immediate attention, and 1 at a later period.

Pupils examined at the East Intermediate school 30. 3 needed immediate attention, and 4 at a later period.

It is very essential that these children have attention.

# Warrant

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## STATE OF MAINE

Hancock County, ss.

To Augustus W. Mooney, a constable of the Town of Bucksport,  
in said County,

### GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Bucksport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Alamo Theatre in said town, on Monday, the sixth day of March, 1922, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To see if the town will vote to accept the report of Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor and Auditor.
4. To choose three Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, and Auditor.
5. To choose a Treasurer of the town and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year, excepting Collector of Taxes.
6. To choose a Collector of Taxes.
7. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more Road Commissioners, not exceeding three; or authorize the Selectmen to appoint and fix the term of office not to exceed three years; or authorize the Selectmen to act as Road Commissioners.
8. To choose one or more Road Commissioners if the town so votes in the preceding article.
9. To fix the compensation of each of our several town officers, to wit: Town Clerk, First, Second and Third Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Auditor, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Superintendent of Schools, School Committee, Attendance Officer, Fire Wardens and Road Commissioner and to raise money for the same.



10. To determine the manner of collecting the taxes, and the rate of discount allowed, or interest to be charged.

11. To determine what sums of money the town will raise, by taxes or otherwise, for the following purposes:

Common Schools.

School House Repairs, supplies and insurance.

Purchase of Text Books.

Support of Poor off the Farm.

Support of Town Farm.

Payment of Notes and Interest.

Payment of Coupons on Town Bonds.

Payment of Principal on Town Bonds as required by section 136, chapter 51, Revised Statutes.

Fire Department.

Repairing Sewers.

Discounts, Abatements and Contingent Expenses.

12. To see how much money the town will raise and appropriate to repair highways, bridges and sidewalks.

(a) Summer work to include amount paid State for patrol.

(b) Winter work.

13. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the purpose of removing bushes from the highways as required by law.

14. To see what action the town will take regarding the compensation of men and teams and the hours of labor for the same or act anything relating thereto.

15. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for building permanent sidewalks.

16. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to make a contract with the Central Maine Power Co. for street lights, and to raise money for the same.

17. To see what action if any the town will take in regard to securing additional fire apparatus.

18. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the services of one or more fire companies for the municipal year of 1922.

19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be used for Memorial Day exercises, 1922.

20. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars (\$75) to aid in keeping the reading room in the Buck Memorial Library open to the public or act anything relating thereto.

21. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for carrying out the law regarding Mothers' Aid and Dependent Children.

22. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the playground given to the town by the late Parker Spofford.

23. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in section 19 of chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

24. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600), for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 18, chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

25. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the protection of Health, said sum to include salary of Health Officer.

26. To see if the town will authorize the school committee to pay the tuition of such of the town students as are fitted to attend an approved secondary school and raise money for the same.

27. To see what action if any the town will take on the report of Committee appointed by the town at its annual meeting, March 3, 1919, to investigate the "Dean Will."

28. To see what action the town will take for the permanent care of the Luman Warren Memorial Fund and conform to the agreement made by the inhabitants.

29. To see if the town will vote to establish a free high school.

30. To see if the town will vote to erect and furnish a building for a high school; the funds for which to be appropriated from the legacy left the town by Emma H. Dean for a memorial to Luman Warren.

31. To see if the town will vote to sell the Town Farm and stock.

32. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the Rock Crusher and if not to raise money for the same.

33. To see what action if any the town will take regarding claim of Willard F. Eldridge for damage caused by water.

34. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of William H. Williams as per vote of the town March 3, 1919.

35. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the school house in District No. 2, so called, known as the "Boyles School House," if a satisfactory price can be obtained.

36. To see if the town will authorize the Municipal Officers to elect a Building Inspector.

37. To see what action the voters of the town will take in regards to Albert B. Dunham paying tax on the barn located on the George Hardy farm. (By request of Guy H. Russell and 21 others.)

38. To see what action the town will take in regard to locating the boundaries of the Village streets and having the same marked with durable monuments.

39. To see what action the town will take in regard to the sale of fireworks and firecrackers and other explosives preceding the Fourth of July and make any regulations relating thereto.

40. To see if the town will authorize the Treasurer to sell and convey the town's interest in any real estate that has been forfeited to the town for the non-payment of taxes.

41. To see if the town will authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen to make a temporary loan.

42. To see if the town will elect an estimating committee who shall report at the next annual meeting of the town its recommendation on each article on the warrant of said meeting

43. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen will be in session at their office, Main Street on Thursday (March 2), Friday (March 3), and Saturday (March 4) for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
