## SCHOOL REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Fort Fairfield:—

I hereby submit to you my first report of the schools of Fort Fairfield.

### High School

As Mr. Paine in accordance with my request has written a report of the high school I shall not make any report in detail. However, I do wish to say a few words that will give the public my estimation of the principal and the school. Although I have devoted comparatively little time to superintending this department nevertheless I have become familiar enough with it to know that we have a very valuable man in charge and that so long as it is possible to retain his services we should make special effort to do so.

Comparing the school of the present with that of the past I think it is safe to say that Fort Fairfield High was never in as good condition as it is today. The attendance is larger, more interest is manifested and better advantages are offered to the student than ever before.

I most heartily endorse what Mr. Paine says regarding the need of a sub-master.

To the Superintendent of Schools and Citizens:—

I herewith submit the following report of the High School for the year 1912-1913.

This is the number in attendance at the present time and does not include five students who for various reasons have left the High School during the present school year. Last June

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diplomas were granted to fifteen students, seven graduating from the College Preparatory course, five from the English course and three from the Commercial course. Of this number five are teaching in our district schools, one is obtaining a musical education, one is attending Wheaton Seminary, while the rest are engaged as bookkeepers, clerks, stenographers, and in other useful employments. Two boys of the class of 1912 are intending to enter University of Maine next fall.

Graduates of our school are, at the present time, doing excellent college work at the University of Maine, University of New Brunswick, Colby and Bates.

The three Maine colleges above named now accept our graduates as members of their freshmen classes without a condition and without an examination and the first of next April we have assurance that our high school will be placed on the list of secondary schools approved by the New England Entrance Certificate Board, thus admitting our graduates to most of the New England Colleges without examinations, when those graduates are certificated by the principal. Simmons College for young ladies has also, by a vote of its faculty, recently opened its doors to our young lady graduates. A high standing with the above named colleges and certification board can not be long maintained unless our graduates are found fitted to do satisfactory college work.

I believe that we need experienced teachers in the school, teachers who are sure of accomplishing results. We also need to have the students well fitted to do high school work when they enter the high school. Some of the present Freshman class will not receive their promotion this year, simply because, as they knew, as their teachers knew, and as their parents knew before they entered the high school, they had not the foundation on which to build this year's work. It is not using the student right to advance him into the high school before he is fitted, he holds others back, he gets discouraged and if allowed to go on, lowers our standard of scholarship.

Our school has been inspected this year by the State Inspector, Mr. Taylor, also by Prof. Mitchell of Bowdoin and

Prof. Jones from the University of Maine. They all agreed that, considering our equipment, numbers and work done, there was no reason that we should not be placed on the approved list.

My assistants this year are: Mrs. Paine, who has the entire charge of the English work, Miss Allen of Mount Holyoke College, teacher of French and History, and Miss Chandler, a Bates graduate, teacher of Latin and part of the Mathematics. Miss Catherine Fawcett has charge of our Commercial work, assisted by Miss Hopkins, who devotes part of her time teaching penmanship in the lower grades.

I consider our Commercial course very practical and a valuable asset to our high school, especially for the girls who are inclined toward business and not toward school teaching. It is not, however, in my estimation especially adapted to the young man who contemplates business for his vocation. I would recommend that next year a special business course be devised for the boy, eliminating stenography altogether,—his stenographer will attend to that—and giving him two years' typewriting instead of three, in place of these subjects I would substitute Chemistry, Physics, and "Business Methods and Banking," a practical book recently published. These three practical subjects he ought to have and he isn't getting them at the present time. This change would necessitate only one extra class, and with our present force of teachers this arrangement could easily be made.

I would further recommend that next year a sub-master be hired for our high school, not a man who will work at woman's wages,—in that case I prefer the woman's help,—but a sub-master at a living wage, even though hiring him would necessitate cutting down our teaching force. No woman ought to be asked to discipline our main room, where next year more than 150 students will sit in seats huddled so close together we can scarcely get between them. If she can do it, it is too severe a strain on her nerves, if she can't do it, it is "pandemonium."

This year we have been handicapped in having no sub-



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master to take charge of the main room when I have been obliged to be down in the laboratory. We also need a man to be out with the boys, directing their sports at recess, at noon time, after school, and to go on their athletic trips with them, while I have charge of the school work in the building.

In closing I wish to take this opportunity to thank the citizens of the town, who, through lean and fat years alike, have dug down into their pockets to support our work in the high school and helped to give our young people an opportunity for an education.

You have nobly supported all our school interests, supported the teachers in their efforts to keep the school in good discipline and have encouraged us in our endeavors to be thorough and practical in our work. You have sent your boys and girls to school when it meant dollars to you to keep them at home, and self sacrifice on your part to send them, and those are some of the things which have been a source of encouragement to me during the four years that I have been among you.

### **The Grades of Fort Fairfield Village**

A great bar to progress in the grades is caused by pupils who have been promoted before they were qualified. This condition is due very largely to the congestion in Grade I. Since the discontinuance of the schools in the Hacker building it has been necessary to send pupils from Grade I to Grade II and from Grade II to Grade III before they were qualified in order to make room for the beginners who make their appearance in Grade I each year. Since the opening of the schools in September 93 different pupils have been registered in Grade I. One teacher has been obliged to use the hall for a school room as it is impossible to accommodate so many children in any one room of the Fessenden building. Because of the crowded conditions here I find that promotions without proper qualifications have been practised to quite an

extent throughout the grades. I do not mean to imply by this that all scholars promoted during the past two years were unqualified as I find many pupils in each grade doing excellent work. However there are just enough deficient pupils in each room to lower the standard of the work, as too large a proportion of the teacher's time must be devoted to them.

Action should be taken in the annual meeting this year to provide more room for the lower grades. I would recommend the purchase of a lot in the upper part of the village and the erection of a four room building. Some provision must be made before the opening of the schools next September. Othwise we shall be forced to ask many parents, who plan to send children to school next fall for the first time, to keep them at home.

### Rural Schools

There are 23 rural schools in session this year. At the close of the fall term it was necessary to secure new teachers for the Blaisdell, Goodrich, Haley and Murphy districts because those who served during the fall resigned. The highest salary paid is \$12 per week and the lowest \$7.50. The average is \$9.80. High salaries will as a rule secure good teachers. The trained and experienced teacher who is an acknowledged success will not hire for low wages.

The rural schools are supposed to be graded but it is difficult to get first class results with a graded system as long as

the attendance is not better than it has been in many districts.

### Truancy

The progress of the schools is handicapped to a large extent by truancy. Very little attention is paid to the truancy law. The potato—the root of all good and of all evil in this section—is responsible for this condition. Many pupils remain at home to work because public sentiment demands the privilege of keeping boys and sometimes girls in the potato fields whenever their labor is considered necessary. I am informed that this is a custom that has grown up with the industry. Some parents think that a child's education is complete when he

has learned to play some part in the spud drama. They readily cite cases where men without book education are accumulating fortunes through devotion to this branch of agriculture. The report that Mr. A. or Mr. B. cleared thirty thousand dollars last year is an incentive for any boy to want to leave school and engage in the business that has made Aroostook famous. However, parents should not permit him to do so before he has acquired at least a common school education. Although this practice of keeping the pupil out of school may be a temporary advantage to the farmer, it is a positive disadvantage to the boy who finds when he enters school late in the year that he is unable to do the work as it should be done, and the inevitable result is poor work, discouragement on the part of the scholar, and a continual drag for the teacher; consequently much of the profit and all of the pleasure of study are lost, and that which was designed to bring enjoyment and happiness becomes a source of uneasiness and displeasure.

For the benefit of those who are not familiar with the compulsory education law the following extracts taken from Chapter 15 of the Revised Statutes of the State of Maine are inserted:

Sec. 49. Every child between the seventh and fifteenth anniversary of his birth shall attend some public day school during the time such school is in session, and an absence therefrom of one-half day or more shall be deemed a violation of this requirement; provided that necessary absence may be excused by the superintending school committee or superintendent of school or teachers acting by direction of either; provided also that such attendance shall not be required if the child obtained equivalent instruction for a like period of time, in an approved private school or in any other manner approved by the superintending school committee; provided, further, that children shall not be credited with attendance at a private school until a certificate showing their names, residences and attendance at such school signed by the person or persons having such school in charge, shall be filed with the school officials of the town in which said children reside; and pro-

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vided, further, that the superintending school committee may exclude from the public schools any child whose physical or mental condition makes it inexpedient for him to attend. All persons having children under their control shall cause them to attend school as provided in this section, and for every neglect of such duty shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars or shall be imprisoned not exceeding thirty days.

Sec. 52. If a child, without sufficient excuse, shall be absent from school at six or more consecutive sessions during any term he shall be deemed an habitual truant, and the superintending school committee shall notify him and any person under whose control he may be that unless he conforms to section forty-nine, the provisions of the two following sections shall be enforced against them; and if thereafter such child continues irregular in attendance, the truant officers or any of them shall, when so directed by the school committee or superintendent in writing, enforce said provisions by complaint.

Sec. 53. Any person having control of a child, who is an habitual truant, as defined in the foregoing section, and being in any way responsible for said truancy, and any person who induces a child to absent himself from school, or harbors or conceals such child when absent, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars or shall be imprisoned not exceeding thirty days.

Sec. 54. On complaint of the truant officer, an habitual truant, if a boy, may be committed to the State School for Boys, or if a girl, to the State Industrial School for Girls, or to any truant school that may hereafter be established.

### **Equipment**

We do not expect a carpenter to do good work without good tools, and so we have no right to expect a teacher to do good work in our schools, which we may call educational workshops, if they lack the necessary tools.

Since cleanliness in the scale of virtues is given a place even in advance of wisdom, it is not improper that the way to cleanliness be provided for those pupils whose homes have for-

gotten its importance, or who may have fallen from grace between home and school. A wash-basin, soap and towels go far toward adding to the mental as well as to the physical brightness of the school, and would serve as a means of keeping the text books clean. Each school should be provided with a good metallic tank for drinking water, instead of the ordinary waterpail, which is nothing more than a receptacle for disease germs.

All the schools are greatly in need of maps, and several are not provided with a large dictionary. In order for pupils to do their work well, these things are absolutely necessary. It is possible for any school to have them.

It is true, of course, that many supplies might properly be purchased by the town, and it certainly is true that they may just as properly be obtained through the efforts of the school, and what is provided in the latter way will be most highly appreciated. It has been demonstrated that a dictionary bought by the pupils outlasts three bought by the town, and the difference is not in the quality of the binding or of the paper; it is in the quality of the interest in the book.

Not all the things we want for our school will come at once. But by getting a few articles each year, and having them properly cared for, we will, in a comparatively short time have every school room well equipped for the work to be done.

There are outstanding bills against the apparatus and appliance account to the amount of \$429.95.

### **Text Books**

Too many people act as though they thought public property did not deserve the same care and protection that private property does, and especially is this the case with our school books. The consequence of the prevalence of such a spirit has cost the town many dollars for text books. The books in many schools show that they have been poorly cared for, recklessly destroyed in some cases, and no one, so far as I can learn, has had to pay the damages but the town. This is not right. It should not be so. The teachers should do their best to have the

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books properly used and suitably cared for. Parents should teach their children to be as careful of the property of others and of town property, as of their own.

Scholars should take pride in having neat books and a good school. To allow a pupil willfully destroying property to go unpunished is to allow him to do an injury to himself. It is to allow him to cultivate a habit directly opposed to what the school ought to teach. The books in many schools are in poor condition and should be replaced by new ones the coming year.

There are several outstanding bills against this account. The amount is \$688.89. The appropriation for 1912 was exhausted before my election and unpaid bills were on hand. I have purchased a few books but only when it was absolutely necessary. I hope to be favored with an appropriation large enough to pay all bills on file at present and to purchase the books needed for next year.

### **Repairs**

The schoolhouses with few exceptions are in good condition. However there are so many buildings in the town that a large sum is needed each year to keep them in good order. The interior of many of the schoolhouses is better than the exterior. It would be economy to paint several buildings during the summer of 1913.

Two new furnaces have been installed in the basement of the Maplegrove schoolhouse. I am told that many complaints because of cold were received from that precinct before this winter. Although this has been a mild winter nevertheless I think we have had cold mornings enough to test the plant and to prove that it will supply all the hot air needed for that building at least.

Every rural school should be provided with toilet arrangements such as we have at the Grange Hall school. It would be a good plan to build a few of these modern closets each year. Easton made a special appropriation in 1912 to provide such closets for her schools.

### Janitors

A janitor is employed for each district. The service in many precincts is unsatisfactory because there are not many pupils who care to do this work. When the boy who is hired to serve in this capacity knows that there isn't another person in the district who wants his job he is quite apt to be very independent and when the teacher expresses any dissatisfaction with his work his reply is, "Get somebody else if you don't like my work." Consequently the teacher has to lend a hand or tolerate a dirty schoolroom a good part of the time.

Mr. L. M. Hoyt, who has had charge of the Village schools for over eight years, is still serving as janitor. His work is very satisfactory. He keeps a watchful eye over the care of the buildings, and allows no accumulation of waste of any description in the basements. In addition to his regular duties as janitor he does many jobs that would cost the town a large sum of money each year if it were necessary to send for a carpenter or plumber every time repairs had to be made.

In closing, I wish to express my gratitude to the people of the town, and especially to the committee and other town officers for many favors and courteous treatment. I also wish to mention my appreciation of the earnest efforts and co-operation of the teachers and pupils.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE PUBLIC LIBRARY

Soon after the last annual town meeting your Trustees made a contract with Mr. R. J. Noyes of Augusta, for the building of the New Public Library. Work was commenced on the building as soon as the question of the location of the lot had been determined by the Town, but owing to the very unfavorable weather conditions the progress of the work was very much retarded. However, the new Library Building is now practically completed, and we expect that it will be ready for occupancy in April. The building will be completed within the Carnegie grant of \$10,000.00, but it will be necessary for the Town to raise a small amount of money for the purpose of furnishing the new building. We think that the sum of \$500.00 will be sufficient for that purpose at present, and we recommend that the Town appropriate the sum of \$500.00 in addition to the usual appropriation.

The Library has been well patronized during the past year and we believe that, with the completion of the new building, it will prove to be of still greater benefit to all of our people.

During the past year the library has received gifts of valuable books from Mrs. A. C. Paul, Mr. George W. Eastman and Mr. J. F. Meyer.

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing.
- Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the Town Report as printed for the municipal year 1912.
- Art. 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for town expenses for the year ensuing.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for the support of paupers for the year ensuing.
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to be expended in cash on the highways and sidewalks for the year ensuing.
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for interest on the town debt for the year ensuing.
- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for the salary of superintendent of schools for the year ensuing.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for the support of the Free High School for the year ensuing.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for the support of common schools for the year ensuing.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to purchase books, apparatus and appliances for the year ensuing.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for insurance and repairs on schoolhouses for the year ensuing, and improvements on school properties.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to be expended toward the support of the Fort Fair-

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field free public library for the year ensuing.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote 'yes' or 'no' upon the adoption of the provisions of the Public Laws of Maine, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1913.

Art. 15. To see if the town will raise, for the permanent improvement of the main highways within the town, as directed by the Public Laws of Maine, the sum of \$1,000.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to be expended in lighting the Aroostook river bridge and the streets of Fort Fairfield village for the year ensuing.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to be applied towards defraying the expenses of observing Memorial Day.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to pay hydrant rental for fire protection for the year ensuing.

Art. 19. To see whether the town will vote and raise the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) to pay and take up town of Fort Fairfield refunding bond No. 14, one of a series of bonds executed August 1st, 1895, which bond becomes due on August 1st, 1913.

Art. 20. To see whether the town will vote to fix the time for the payment of taxes, and to fix the rate of interest to be added upon taxes remaining unpaid after such time of payment.

Art. 21. To see whether the town will authorize the Selectmen to make temporary loans, if necessary, during the year ensuing, to anticipate taxes and protect town orders duly issued.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote and raise the sum of \$2,000 to redeem Bridge Bonds 7 and 8, falling due February 1, 1914.

Art. 23. To see if the town will elect one or more Road Commissioners, and what sum of money the town will vote and raise to pay said Commissioners.

Art. 24. To see if the town will accept a town way laid

out by the Selectmen August 26, 1912, upon petition of B. L. Haines and others, connecting Forest Avenue with the Dorsey Road.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize and permit W. H. Doran to bury and maintain in the ground underlying Water street, so called, a gasoline tank, and to lay and maintain a pipe from said tank along the gutter of Main street to a point in front of the store occupied by him.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to purchase a traction engine and road roller.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to instruct its superintending school committee to maintain schools in the Russell and Turner districts, as recommended by the superintending school committee.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to be expended in purchasing a lot in the village, building a schoolhouse thereon, and furnishing the same.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to authorize and empower its board of selectmen to obtain by loan, either bonded or otherwise, upon the credit of the town, for the purpose of purchasing a lot in the village and building a schoolhouse thereon, and furnishing the same.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for the purpose of installing a Fire Alarm system in the village.

Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to make repairs on the bridge near the Bolier Farm on the town highway leading from Stevensville westerly to the Caribou town line, and to make repairs on said highway.

Art. 32. To see what sums of money the town will vote and raise to be expended for the following purposes, respectively:—

A. To build a new bridge, or to repair the present bridge, over Lovely Brook on the main road leading to Caribou from Fort Fairfield village, south of the river, near Hockenull's mill.

B. To build a new bridge, or to repair the present

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bridge, over Pattee Brook on the Dorsey road near Henry A. Johnston's Dwelling.

C. To replank the Bridge on the Grant road so-called.

D. To replank the Bridge over the Aroostook river in Fort Fairfield village.
