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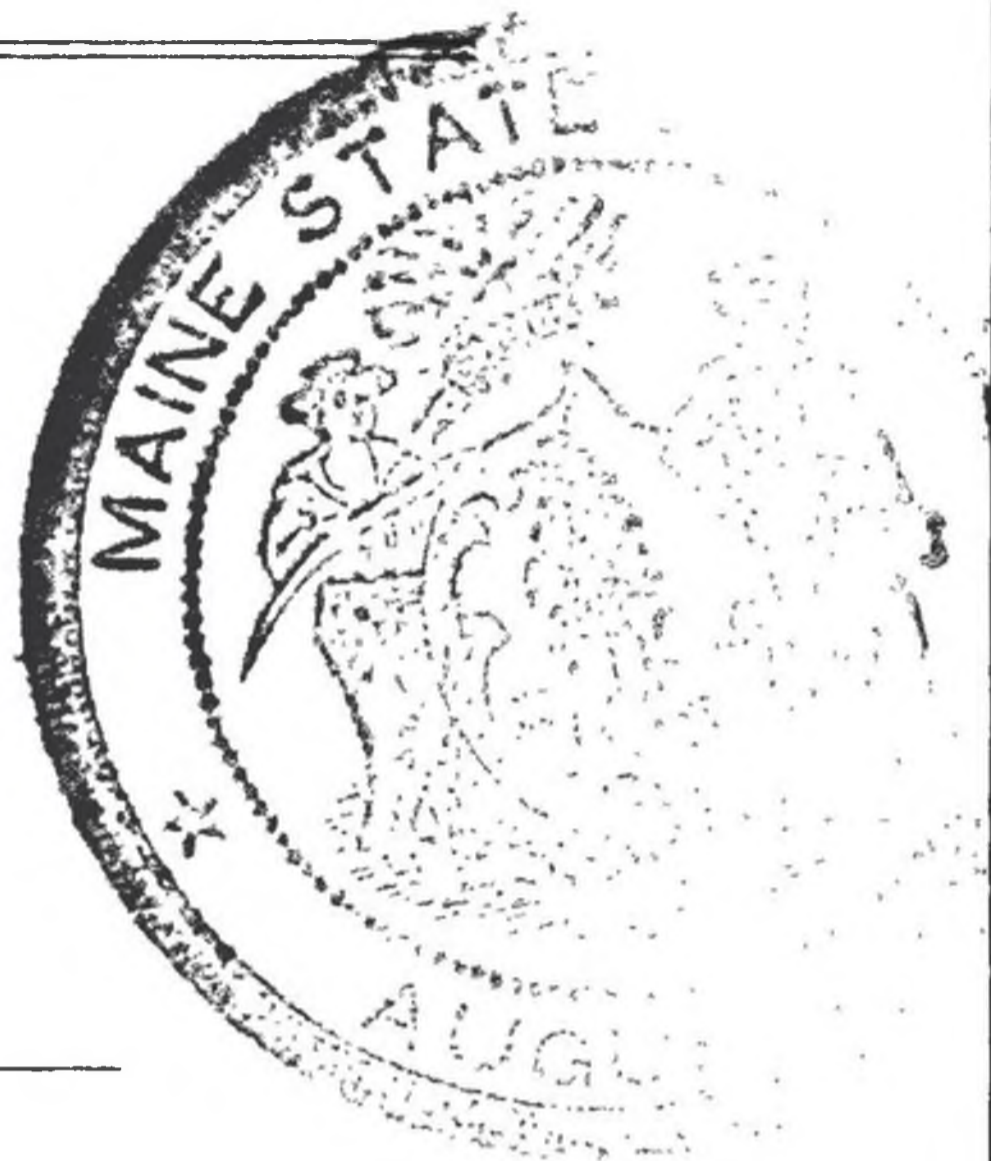

### SCHOOL REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Fort Fairfield:—

I hereby submit to you my second report of the schools of Fort Fairfield.

#### High School

Mr. Paine has written a very full report of the high school so there is little left for me to say except that I am in sympathy with the recommendations made by him.

Our school is not perfect; nevertheless it is possible to see good healthy growth and improvement. The enrollment has increased from 40 to 172 in the past five years. The fact that the number of students today equals four times the attendance five years ago is good evidence that the appropria-

tions made for high school during this period have in a very large measure been put to good use.

One of the greatest needs of the school for the past two years at least, was a submaster. I am glad to report that that need has been met, and that we have a man for that position who is certainly a strong spoke in our educational wheel. The salary we have been paying Mr. Foss is inadequate and we can not retain his services the coming year unless a larger appropriation for high school is made.

Following is the report submitted to me by Mr. Paine:

Miss Catherine P. Fawcett, Commercial Branches

Miss Verna B. Cochrane, Assist. in Commercial Branches

All of the above named teachers are college graduates except those engaged in teaching the commercial work; the commercial teachers are business college graduates. All the other larger Northern Maine high schools have considered it necessary to hire a submaster, but this year's high school appropriation did not warrant our school committee's hiring a suitable sub-master, thus I opened the fall term with all lady assistants, which necessitated my conducting all my recitations in the assembly room and my laboratory work would have been much neglected had not a product of circumstances brought about the resignation of one of my assistants, and had not Mr. Foss kindly consented to help out for the remainder of the year.

Mr. Foss has proved himself a very valuable man, an excellent disciplinarian, a born teacher, a man of experience in handling the delicate situations constantly arising in a large school, a congenial co-operator; a man who, because his services were needed, in his native town, consented to teach the rest of year for a small salary, and is working with the same enthusiasm and interest that he would were he receiving double his present pay. I strongly recommend that Mr. Foss be retained for another year, and that he receive a more adequate equivalent for services rendered. He can ill afford to remain with us at his present salary, and a sister school of Northern Maine has already, to my knowledge, sought to obtain him for another year.

I wish here to make mention of Miss Fawcett's value as a commercial teacher in our school. A hard worker herself, she accomplishes wonderful results and the business men of our town are realizing that the thorough four years' training

that her pupils receive gives a more substantial business education than a few months spent in a business college. The demand for our commercial graduates right here in our town is greater than the supply. I always know that her work is being done rightly. Persons who keep school are plenty, but good teachers are scarce. Money is thrown away which is paid to an incompetent teacher. Miss Fawcett has made our commercial course what it is and this fact should be appreciated.

I would further recommend that one of our most reliable graduates from the commercial course be urged to take a post graduate course in some business school and then be permitted to return as Miss Fawcett's assistant. Knowing her students thoroughly as we do, we should be taking no chances on their success.

Two years ago we had a registration of 99 pupils, a year ago, 140, this year, 172. Our rooms are crowded to the utmost, and recitations have to be held in the office, and in the laboratory among the disagreeable fumes of the chemicals. Hence, I recommend that next year, when our new grade building is opened, one of the rooms down stairs be reserved for the use of the high school.

I further recommend that our high school course be revised next summer. Five years ago our school course was brought up to date and systematized. Now the colleges and the State Department are growing more liberal in their demands on the secondary schools. Ideas of education are fast changing and I believe that in the next five years we shall see a great difference. A course of study ought not to be changed to fit every educational fad that is advanced by educators. I believe in letting others try out the new ideas and observing their success or failure; there are always enough to clutch at a new idea as a drowning man grasps at a straw. However, some of the practical studies now introduced in the high schools of our State are beyond the experimental stage and proper to introduce into our school curriculum. Instead of Ancient History, algebra, geometry,



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etc., a few of these practical subjects should be offered to the students who are not intending to go to college, and our boys and girls would be thereby benefited.

A physics and a chemistry laboratory should never be together in one room. Ours is, and the acid fumes so tarnish and damage the physical apparatus, that I have considered it a waste of money to order those instruments which other up-to-date schools have. I have managed to get along with a meagre supply, which hardly passes the State inspector's examination. If it is not possible to have a physical laboratory apart from the small room in the basement that we use for chemistry, I urge that at least some suitable cases be built in which to keep our physical apparatus, when it is not in use.

Graduates from our school are now admitted to almost all of the N. E. Colleges without examination. Seven of our graduates are attending college; all are doing creditable work and next fall we shall send more students to college than ever before. How long we maintain our present standing among the high schools of the State depends upon the character of our school work in each department.

The sacrifice which the parents are making to send their boys and girls to high school, our large attendance through storm and mud, are encouraging symptoms to us as teachers, but the problem we are confronting is how to get some of our students to do a little or more home work. Any person attending high school can profitably employ one hour, at least, in study at home each night. Many of our students do more than that, some do none; if each one of us as a teacher would not accept work half done, it would help; if each parent would see that his boy or girl does a little home work it would help. In a public school where the supervision of the teachers must to a large extent cease when school is dismissed, co-operation between parents and teachers will bring the best results in this matter of home work. Neither can alone remedy this evil.

I realize that the tax problem is a big one in our town.

It is true that our high school costs money but not so much as it looks on the face of it. The town of Fort Fairfield is paying 11 cents per day per scholar for each scholar's instruction in the high school this present year. Just one cent more than the cost of a cigar or a plug of spear-head tobacco. Though the appropriation required is a little larger, our high school is giving more value for money expended now that it has its present enrollment, than it did five years ago, when we had only forty scholars in the high school. I believe that a poor high school is the most expensive high school.

In closing, I wish to thank the citizens, school committee, and superintendent for their support and aid rendered to my assistants, my students, and myself during this past year.

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### **The Grades of Fort Fairfield Village**

In my report of last year I stated that action should be taken to provide more room for the lower grades. I recommended the purchase of a lot in the upper part of the village and the erection of a four-room building. In my report of this year I am very glad to state that a liberal appropriation was made at the last annual meeting and with this sum an excellent lot has been purchased and a fine building erected.

Conditions in the Fessenden building have been practically the same as last year—too many pupils for the accommodations. Many parents kept children at home this year because we had no room for them in Grade I. Next year the first four grades will be divided and the children who live in the upper part of the village will go to the new building.

We are employing nine teachers in the grades. Six of these served last year. The new teachers are Annie R. Buck in the fourth grade; Elizabeth Donato in the fifth grade; Winnifred Mehann in the sixth grade. Misses Mehann and Puck are graduates of the Castine Normal School. Mrs. Donato is a graduate of the Gorham Normal School. All had

much experience in teaching before coming to Fort Fairfield. The work of the sixth grade has been interrupted by change of teachers. Miss Myra Turner was obliged, on account of ill health to resign in the early part of the fall term. Mrs. Winnifred Goodhue substituted until November. Since then Miss Mehann has taught that grade and will have charge of it the rest of the year.

Following is a list of teachers in the grades, their salaries and the number of pupils registered in each grade:

Misses McKenney, Stanchfield and Smith are receiving \$15.00 per week for the winter term. These teachers signed contracts to teach this year for \$13.00 per week provided the grades might be divided at the beginning of the winter term. We expected that this division might be made at that time as the contract for the new building called for its completion December 1, 1913. However the work was delayed and we could not reduce the number of pupils in the Fessenden school at the close of the fall term. The teachers mentioned above asked for \$15.00 per week for the winter term or until the new building might be ready, and this salary was granted. These teachers are very efficient and we did not deem it expedient to accept their resignations and hire strange teachers for their grades as they are very difficult positions to fill in a satisfactory manner. If we open the new schoolhouse in the spring the salary of each of these teachers will be reduced to \$13.00 per week.

### Rural Schools

We are maintaining 23 rural schools this year. At the close of the fall term it was necessary to secure a new teacher for the Murphy school as Mr. Edward McDonald was obliged, on account of a bad throat trouble, to resign. Miss Margaret Shea of Caribou was engaged for the rest of the year. The position in the Strickland district was vacated by Miss Stella Dinsmore near the middle of the winter term, because her father's sickness necessitated her services at home. Edward McDonald was engaged for this precinct. It is very fortunate that we are not obliged to change more teachers during the year. The work of the rural schools has been interrupted and handicapped more or less in the past by frequent changing of teachers.

The highest salary paid is \$13.00 per week and the lowest \$7.50. The average is \$10.33.

The average attendance in the fall term was better than in the fall of 1912 but this winter it is not as good as it was a year ago. Fewer pupils were kept from school to work in the potato fields last fall. This accounts chiefly for the increase in the average attendance for that term. The decrease this winter is due to the cold and stormy weather. Last winter was very mild and for this reason the average attendance was higher than it had been for many years.

It is difficult to secure good teachers for many rural schools for two reasons—undesirable boarding places and poor janitors. Parents will sometimes say to me: "We must have a first-class teacher next year. Our school is unprofitable. The scholars are not interested. They are learning nothing but mischief. You might just as well close this school unless you can send us an excellent teacher."

Now, teachers are like people in other professions. Some are excellent; some are good; some are fair; some are poor; and some are very poor. If I were to ask you where the excellent teachers will desire to go, you would say where the best salaries are paid. This rule will not hold good.

Take two groups of children, twenty-five in each group.

The schoolhouse in which one group is schooled is of the old-fashioned type. No one in the district will serve as janitor. The teacher's boarding place is so far from the schoolhouse that she must walk from one to two miles through the mud for about eighteen weeks of the thirty-six, and for the greater part of the rest of the year over rough frozen ground or through deep snow.

In the morning after her arrival at the school she has to build the fire, bring the wood for the day, eat a cold lunch at noon, sweep and dust the room after school, and walk back to a boarding place at night where accommodations are far from comfortable.

The salary is fourteen dollars per week.

The schoolhouse where the other group of children is schooled, is modern. One can enter the wood house or toilet rooms without going out of doors. A responsible boy is willing to serve as janitor. He has a clean schoolroom and a good fire, if the weather requires it, when the teacher arrives. He has a watchful eye over the care of the school property at all times.

The teacher's boarding place is an attractive home maintained by people cordial to the teacher and friendly to the school. It is located a few minutes' walk from the schoolhouse so that the teacher can have a good warm dinner at noon.

The salary is ten dollars per week.

Ask for applicants for the two schools and you will receive ten applications for the ten dollar position to one for the fourteen dollar position.

As a rule the people who have the most comfortable places for teachers will not board them. Last year one district under my supervision lost an excellent teacher because she had to board almost two miles from the school. In that same district there are three very comfortable homes within two hundred yards of the schoolhouse and in not one of the three could I engage accommodations for a teacher just because the people didn't "want to bother." I had another case where

a teacher resigned a position that paid twelve dollars per week and accepted one in another town that paid only nine dollars per week for the simple reason that the school building and boarding place in my district were much inferior to the accommodations in the other town.

Now, in order to have a good rural school someone in the precinct must be public spirited enough to do something for the good of the school. The school committee and superintendent can not do it all.

### **Schools With An Average Attendance Below Eight**

A school that does not maintain an average attendance of eight pupils for the year is discontinued by law and can not be continued unless the town so votes. The schools in the Barnes and Russell districts have not averaged the required number the past year so I have had inserted in the town warrant an article to give the citizens of the town an opportunity to act upon this matter,

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### **Consolidation and Transportation**

There is no disputing the stubborn fact that the one-teacher school must exist for years to come in Fort Fairfield. To make this school more efficient is a problem which is without a key to its solution. The strongest teacher can not hope to teach eight grades in such a school so as to give instruction which will be of great service. The one-room school with one teacher, eight grades and from twenty to thirty-five pupils makes proper grading very difficult and in many cases impossible. The course of study may be followed to some extent but proper grading is seldom done.

In many sections of Maine rural school problems have been solved by consolidation of schools and transportation of scholars. There is no doubt that the greatest objection to consolidation is the question of transportation. Very few people would object to the better school and larger school provided it could be placed near enough to the home to avoid transportation.

My observation and experience convince me that consolidation is a good thing provided we can have first class wagons, horses, drivers and GOOD ROADS. Good roads are absolutely essential before consolidation should be put into operation to any considerable extent. The conveyance should be especially built for the service and should be strong and durable. It should have comfortable seats and a cover to protect the children in stormy weather. It would be more satisfactory for the town to own the wagons and sleds and hire the drivers and teams. A good roading team should be required so that

the pupils may not be too long on the road in severe weather.

Some people are satisfied with the system in Fort Fairfield and some are dissatisfied. From the Foss district comes a request for the re-establishment of a school in that precinct, while many parents in the Barnes and Ridge districts have expressed a strong desire to have their schools closed and their children transported to the village.

The past year pupils have been transported to the following schools: Fort Fairfield Village, Maplegrove, McIntosh, and Strickland schools.

### Text Books

A generous appropriation for text books was made last year. This was asked for, because there were many outstanding bills. This year it is not necessary to raise so much. The sum of \$1,200 will pay for all books needed for the ensuing year.

Special effort has been made by many pupils to take better care of their books. The scholars with very few exceptions have provided themselves with book bags so that the text books are not exposed to the snow or rain in stormy weather. The life of a school book is shortened more by the outdoor treatment it receives than by use in the schoolroom.

### Apparatus and Appliance Account

There were many outstanding bills against this account when the books were closed February 20, 1913. Consequently



a larger appropriation than usual was recommended. The sum of \$1,500 was raised and with it all bills both old and new have been paid. It will not be necessary to appropriate more than \$1100 for this purpose at the next annual meeting.

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### Repairs

No extensive repairs have been made in any one district the past year. The Strickland schoolhouse was painted on the outside, and the walls of the schoolroom and entry repaired and kalsomined. The walls of the Barnes schoolroom have been repaired and papered. Only minor repairs were made in the other districts. Some much needed repairs have been made in the boys' basement of the Fessenden building.

A small appropriation was made for repairs last year. Nearly half of the sum raised has been used to pay for the pupils' desks and other furniture required for the new school building. At the next annual meeting a larger amount should be raised. Steps should be taken to improve the toilet arrangements in many districts, and it is also time to introduce a more up-to-date means of heating the rural schools than the common box stove. The Smith or the Waterbury system of heating and ventilating a schoolroom is very satisfactory. The Smith system has been used in Presque Isle and some other Aroostook towns for the past two years, and the school officials and teachers make very favorable reports for the work done by the same.

The Smith system of heating and ventilating a schoolroom supplies to each pupil an abundance of pure fresh air, and thoroughly warms and distributes this air to all parts of the room without draughts. It removes from the room an equal volume of the most undesirable air, that is, the coldest and foulest air near the floor. Many doctor's bills are saved each year because it does away with poisonous air and cold draughts which cause headaches, colds, coughs and consumption. The teacher and pupils can do more and better work because it makes the room comfortable and more healthful.

The saving in the expense of fuel will amount to enough in a few years to pay the difference in cost between one of these systems and a box stove. The cost of such a plant as is needed for one of our rural schools is about \$125.

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### School Flags

Only three school buildings are provided with flags and staffs. I am told that at one time all of the schoolhouses displayed our national banner, but that the flags were not replaced as fast as they were worn out and a new staff was not provided when an old one became unfit for use. It seems that this matter has been so neglected that it is now necessary for us to have a special appropriation in order to comply with the law requiring flags for school buildings. The law is as follows:

Chap. 182, P. L. 1907.—It shall be the duty of superintendents of schools to report to the municipal officers of cities, towns and plantations all schools within their jurisdiction without flags, and it shall be the duty of said municipal officers to furnish flags to all such schools, to be paid for by said municipalities. These flags are to be used in all schools, for the education of the youth of our state, to teach them the cost, the object and principles of our government, the great sacrifices of our forefathers, the important part taken by the Union army in eighteen hundred sixty-one to eighteen hundred sixty-five, and to teach them to love, honor and respect the flag of our country that cost so much and is so dear to every true American citizen.

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## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE PUBLIC LIBRARY

Our new library, which was under construction at the time of the last annual town-meeting, was completed and opened for public use in September, 1913. Since the opening of the library, a much greater number of our people than formerly have made use of it. The expense of completing the building was \$600 in excess of the amount received from Mr. Carnegie, and it will be necessary to raise that amount this year in addition to the regular library appropriation. Our new library building contains two excellent reading-rooms, one for children and one for adults. Both of these rooms have been used to some considerable extent since the new building was opened, but their use has not been so general as it should be. Our library will not fill the place that it ought to fill in our community until it is more generally used by the people.

Several gifts of value have been made to the library during the past year. The present appropriation for general library purposes leaves but a small amount each year that can be used for the purchase of books. We believe that the appropriation by the town should be supplemented by gifts of books or money from those who are interested in the welfare of the town. A small contribution from each person interested would be a great benefit and would enable the library more nearly to fill the place it should fill as an educational influence in the community. Our library is in great need of additional reference works and contributions on this line would be especially valuable.

The trustees acknowledge the following gifts; a picture and books from the late Mrs. Mary S. Lombard; a picture each from Mrs. Florence E. W. Bliss, Mr. Louis Bernstein, Mr. C. W. Perry; a fire set from Mr. Sterling Fessenden and Mr. A. W. Spaulding; cash from Mr. R. F. Thurlough and books from Mr. J. S. Estes and Mrs. R. F. Thurlough. We also acknowledge our obligations to Mr. R. B. Porter for his influence in obtaining for the library a tablet cast from the metal from the battleship Maine.

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**ABSTRACT OF WARRANT FOR MARCH MEETING  
MARCH 23, 1914**

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Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing.

Art. 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for town expenses for the year ensuing.

Art. 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for the support of paupers for the year ensuing.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to be expended in cash on the highways and sidewalks for the year ensuing.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for interest on the town debt for the year ensuing.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for the salary of superintendent of schools for the year ensuing.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for the support of the Free High School for the year ensuing.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for the support of common schools for the year ensuing.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to purchase books, apparatus and appliances for the year ensuing.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for insurance and repairs on schoolhouses for the year ensuing, and improvements on school properties.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to be expended toward the support of the Fort Fairfield free public library for the year ensuing.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote 'yes' or 'no' upon the adoption of the provisions of the Public Laws of Maine, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the

town to State aid for highways for the year 1914.

Art. 14. To see if the town will raise, for the permanent improvement of the main highways within the town, as directed by the Public Laws of Maine, the sum of \$1,333 00.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to be expended in lighting the Aroostook river bridge and the streets of Fort Fairfield village for the year ensuing.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to be applied towards defraying the expenses of observing Memorial Day.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to pay hydrant rental for fire protection for the year ensuing.

Art. 18. To see whether the town will vote to fix the time for the payment of taxes, and to fix the rate of interest to be added upon taxes remaining unpaid after such time of payment.

Art. 19. To see whether the town will authorize the Selectmen to make temporary loans, if necessary, during the year ensuing, to anticipate taxes and protect town orders duly issued.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote and raise the sum of \$1,000 to redeem Bridge Bond, falling due February 1, 1915. Also to see if the town will vote and raise the sum of \$2000 to redeem New Schoolhouse bonds falling due within the year.

Art. 21. To see if the town will accept a town way laid out by the Selectmen, on petition of H. W. Trafton and others, beginning on Elm street and ending on Presque Isle street and known as Columbia street.

Art. 22. To see if the town will accept a town way laid out by the Selectmen, on petition of H. W. Trafton and others, beginning on Columbia street and running thence northerly to Presque Isle street and known as Milk street.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to discontinue so much of the highway known as the Grant road or True

road leading from the Presque Isle road easterly to the cross road leading from Forest Avenue to Maplegrove as is embraced in the bridge crossing Johnston Brook.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to repair the old bridge over Johnston Brook on the Grant road so called.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to build a new bridge over Johnston Brook on the Grant road so called.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay to H. V. Goodhue for the use for several years past of his land adjacent to the town barn lot.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to empower the selectmen to contract for an electric light on Lincoln street.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to purchase a steam roller or traction engine.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise respectively for road repairs on the following roads:

1st. For the Townsend swamp on Forest Avenue.

2d. For culvert over Taylor Brook on Higgins Hill road.

3d. For swamps on the Strickland road.

4th. For repairs on road, on Center Limestone road between the potato houses of Fred Philbrick and Joseph Emery.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to accept town ordinances herewith submitted establishing a fire district in the village being the same, substantially, as accepted at annual March meeting, March 18, 1912, and thereafterwards rescinded at a special town meeting April 22, 1912.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote and determine the number of road commissioners, not exceeding three, to be appointed for the ensuing year, and what sum of money the town will vote and raise to pay road commissioners' services for the year.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to build a furnace on the town barn lot to consume inflammable and combustible waste.

Art. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote

and raise for the purpose of purchasing necessary land and constructing thereon a Municipal building.
