#### REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

Bethel has always appropriated funds for Public Health Nursing Service. The Public Health Nursing Program has been active in all parts of the town. A Child Health Conference has been conducted by the local Health Officer in all three of the villages. Immunizations for diphtheria, small-pox, and whooping cough have been offered at Child Health Conferences and have been well accepted. At these conferences 48 children received smallpox vaccinations, 35 immunizations to protect from diphtheria were completed and parents of 19 took advantage of this opportunity to have protection from whooping cough for their infants and young children.

Three hundred and thirty-three pupils were examined by the local school physician.

Many visits to families, because of health problems, have been made during the year.

The school officials and teachers have worked very closely with the Public Health Nurse. As a result many corrections of the visual and dental defects have been completed. Some defective tonsils which had not been corrected were discovered during the medical examinations.

Some of the time of your Public Health Nurse has been spent on follow-up visits to tuberculosis patients endeavoring to help promote recovery and prevent infection of others in the household. The Selective Service Board has requested investigations of some selected cases before their induction into the armed forces.

Your Public Health Nurse has appreciated the cooperation of local town officials, local organizations and the Health Committee, all of which have added to the effectiveness of the health service in your community.

#### COMMENTS

Re: Audit of the town of Bethel December 31, 1943 to December 31, 1944

The 1944 tax commitment was found to be in agreement with the Assessors' records.

The balance due from the Collector is represented by a list of unpaid taxes taken from the records.

The excise tax collections were checked to the copies of the receipts.

As far as could be ascertained, all receipts were recorded and the cash deposited in the bank.

Expenditures were made by check from properly authorized warrants, supported by invoices and payrolls on file.

The cash balance was reconciled with the bank.

Payments were recorded as received on tax liens and deeds were found to have been applied against the proper items.

The records of the Town Clerk were examined and appeared to be in proper order.

Our test check of paid invoices and payrolls indicated they were proper charges and correctly recorded.

The trust fund investments were examined and all income withdrawn appeared to have been properly expended. The balance was left on deposit. The interest on the School Fund has not been turned over to the schools for several years.

Verifications to the extent deemed necessary were made of the asset accounts.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Bethel:

The war is over but new problems are being added to those of the duration in the successful operation of the schools of our country. It is predicted by those intimately acquainted with the situation that the teacher shortage in the elementary schools will be a critical problem for some years yet despite the remark so frequently heard that "plenty of teachers will be available next year." The fact remains that not enough students are enrolled in our State Teachers' Colleges and Normal Schools to fill the normal number of vacancies of pre-war days. The enrollment of girls in teacher training institutions already shows a slight increase but these young women will not be ready for teaching until they complete their courses of three or four years. Many patriotic women who have been helping out in this emergency are already feeling a "let down" in their responsibilities and wish to give up their school duties. Unfortunately there are no teachers to replace these and others who for one reason or another will leave the school room.

Every city, town and hamlet will have its problems to meet. People are leaving the strictly rural communities. This tends to disrupt the well-organized rural school and results in the overcrowding of schools in the cities, towns and villages, The Bethel union is an example of this condition. In some of the sparsely settled areas there are hardly enough children to maintain an interesting school while the more thickly settled areas will soon be crowded. If your superintendent is correct in her vision of the future, it is not too early to begin to give the housing problem for Bethel schools serious consideration.

Bethel has again been fortunate in having its schools in session without loss of time for lack of teachers. Our town was fortunte is having only two changes in its teaching force. Mr. Charles Chapman of Farmington is Principal of the Grammar School. Mr. Chapman is proving successful in

arousing an interest in sports among the boys. Miss Ruth Bradeen of Old Orchard succeeds Mrs Mary Billings at the West Bethel Primary. The teachers of previous years continue their loyal and efficient services. Bethel is truly blessed in having so many good local teachers.

The East and West Bethel schools have maintained only one room this year. At present it seems necessary to reopen the upper room at East Bethel next September. The condition at West Bethel is such that at present it seems probable that the village schools can care for a sufficient number from this school so that only the primary room need be maintained.

The conveyance arrangements have been in general the same as last year and appear to have been satisfactory.

Mr. Harry Sawin, our faithful janitor in the village schools, is as usual contributing to the comfort and happiness of the pupils. Our citizens are not unmindful of his versatile ability in caring for the buildings.

We would again express our appreciation to Gould Academy for its splendid cooperation shown in a variety of ways. All the seventh and eighth grade pupils of the town are privileged to continue to have instruction in music and physical education at the Academy. The use of the Gould gymnasium for the grammar school basketball practice is gratefully appreciated as is its use for entertainments and other gatherings for the grammar school pupils. The various contacts which the public schools have with the Academy paves the way for easier adjustments and better work when they enter Gould. It is the opinion of the superintending school committee and superintendent that the town is a small but tangible way should again express its appreciation to the Academy and to its teachers under whom our pupils are privileged to work. This service, freely given, should be recognized.

The attendance record for the year 1945 was excellent. With very few exceptions absences have been excusable.

The school lunch program was carried on successfully during the winter months in all the schools. The cooperation of parents and citizens in this project is worthy of note. In the village schools more than one hundred pupils were served a hot dish at noon under the sponsorship of the Parent Teacher Association. The number served in the outlying

schools includes as many when compared with the enrollment.

The health program carried on in 1945 proved helpful to a number of pupils in having defects corrected. The resignation of Mrs Ruth Hopkins as our public health nurse is a distinct loss to the health interests of our different communities.

The school budget requires more than the usual consideration because of changes in State funds. The balance which appears on the common school account seems large until one understands the conditions which have resulted in this larger balance. This account was increased under the legislation of 1945 whereby the Town of Bethel received an allocation of approximately \$2100 designed for increase in teachers' wages for the school year 1945-46. It is therefore true that with the closing of the books on December 31, 1945, considerably less than half of this money has been used. The same thing is true of Bethel's allocation of \$2173 from the equalization fund to be used during the school year. In general, with the closing of the books in December the balances are not so large when so much of the resources for the school year are unexpended. By the time when new appropriations will be available this balance will be reduced over \$4000.

Unfortunately for the town the school money available from the State funds for the next school year will be considerably less. This is in large measure due to the fact that because of the increase in the average school tax rate Bethel is not eligible to share in the equalization fund. In order to share in this fund a town's school tax rate must be above the average of the State and Bethel's rate this year was slightly below the average, thus eliminating Bethel's sharing in this fund, as it has for the past five years.

Because of the above facts, it is evident that the common school budget should be increased, not only to insure the successful maintenance of our schools the coming year but to place the town in a position where it will hope to be eligible for an allotment from the equalization fund. It is with these thoughts in mind that your superintending school committee has given much thought in making their recommendations for the appropriation.

The repair work of the past year included the refinish-

ing of the interior of the South Bethel building and of the primary room at West Bethel. Some additional work was done to improve the playground at the Bethel Grammar school. The work done on this playground during the past two years has resulted in a decided improvement. The posts have been purchased for fencing the East Bethel lot but it has seemed impossible to get the work done.

The repairs for the coming year should include extensive repairs in the plumbing at the grammar school, some improvement on the toilet facilities at West Bethel and the improvement of the water system at East Bethel.

The increased recommendation for the repair account is to provide for the installation of oil heaters in the outlying schools. In these modern days of heating it should not be necessary to subject the teachers and pupils in our rural schools to the discomforts of the winter mornings of a generation ago. It is believed that after the heaters are installed the expense for fuel will be little different from that of the present while the value received will be much greater.

Once more I wish to say thank you to all those who directly or indirectly have given me loyal support and encouragement in my work of directing our schools.

# WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

To Carl L. Brown, a Citizen of the town of Bethel in the County of Oxford.

GREETINGS—In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Bethel, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at Odeon Hall, in said Town of Bethel, on Monday, the fourth of March, A. D. 1946, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

The Polls will be open for balloting on elective officers upon order of the Moderator and will be closed at five o'clock in the afternoon.

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting
- Art. 2. To hear and act on the report of Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Collector, Suintendent of Schools, Road Commisioner, Clerk and other town officers.
- Art. 3. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the various town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4. To establish the price to be paid for collecting taxes for the ensuing year.
  - Art. 5. To choose all other necessary Town Officers.
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of Common Schools, for the year, 1946.
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Secondary Schools.
- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Textbooks.

- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for School Supplies.
- Art. 10 To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs on school houses.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for insurance on school houses.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for services of a School Physician.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for salary of School Superintendent.
- Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to reopen the school in the upper grade room at East Bethel on recommendation of the superintending school committee.
- Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen and Superintending School Committee to sell the Middle Intervale School building.
- Art. 16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$100.00 for public health nursing in Bethel. Said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs of Roads and Bridges.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Winter Maintenance of Roads.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Bituminous Surfacing of Roads and Streets.
- Art. 20. To see what sum the Town will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chap. 20, R. S. 1944, as amended.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for joint expense for maintenance on State and State Aid Highways as provided by law.

- Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$925. for the Maintenance of the Third Class Roads as required by law in Section 52, Chapter 20, Revised Statutes 1944.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of sewers.
- Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to have the Moderator appoint a committee of two to work with the Selectmen in investigating the necessary requirements and estimate the cost of constructing a sewer at West Bethel, the committee to report at a later Town meeting..
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of poor.
- Art. 26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Officers' bills.
- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to take care of abatements as made by the Assessors.
- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for building a new sidewalk after raising the grade thereof, extending from the northerly end of the more recently constructed concrete sidewalk on the westerly side of Main Street in said Bethel to a point opposite the building now occupied by the First National Store.
- Art. 29. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction of sidewalks and install suitable surface drains if necessary.
- Art. 30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day observance.
- Art. 31. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay for Treasurer's Bond.
- Art. 32. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay for Collector's Bond.
- Art. 33. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for expense of fire pumper and fires.

- Art. 34. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended for care of old cemeteries.
- Art. 35. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for miscellaneous expenses.
- Art. 36. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to procure from the Bethel Library Association the free use of books during the coming year for all inhabitants of the Town under such restrictions and regulations as shall insure the safety and good use of the books.
- Art. 37. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to care for the interest on notes and temporary loans.
- Art. 38. To see if the Town will vote to purchase Public Liability and Property Damage Insurance on any or all of the motor driven vehicles owned by the Town of Bethel and raise money for same.
- Art. 39. To see if the Town will vote to remove the snow from business and other congested sections, both from streets and sidewalks.
- Art. 40. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for tractor, plow and loader equipment to remove snow as voted in Article 39 or provide other suitable means.
- Art. 41. To see if the Town will authorize its Treasurer to obtain money by loan to pay the debts of the Town and to take up outstanding notes against the Town or to renew the same with new notes, and to execute and deliver the notes of the Town therefor signed by its Treasurer and countersigned by the municipal officers of the Town.
- Art. 42. To see if the Town, for the purpose of procuring a temporary loan to, and for the use of the Town of Bethel, to pay indebtedness of said Town due and to become due during the present municipal year, the same to be paid out of money raised by taxation during the present municipal year, will authorize and direct its Treasurer to borrow from time to time a sum or sums of money, not exceeding \$50,000.00, and to execute and deliver the note or notes of the Town

therefor signed by its Treasurer and countersigned by the municipal officers of the Town.

- Art. 43. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to sell and convey real estate owned by the town under tax deeds or under tax liens to such persons for such prices and upon such terms as said Selectmen and Treasurer in their judgment and discretion may determine for the best interests of the Town and to execute in behalf of the inhabitants of said Town such deeds or other instruments of conveyance as may be required to complete such sales and conveyances.
- Art. 44. To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), more or less, to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to discontinue that part of Summer Street, so known, in Bethel Village, which extends from its point of intersection with Elm Street to the point of its intersection with Church Street.
- Art. 46. To see if the Town will authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee of 12 to be known as the Budget Committee.
- Art. 47. To choose any committee, hear any report of any and act thereon.
- Art. 48. To choose by ballot the following Town officers for the ensuing year, to wit: Town Clerk, Three Selectmen, Three Assessors, Three Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, one member of the School Committee for three years, Tax Collector, and Road Commissioner.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session in the Selectmen's Office on Monday, March 4th, 1946 for the purpose of correcting the list of voters from 9 o'clock in the forenoon until time for the polls to close.
