Fort Fairfield Public Library

Report of Trustees

One year ago the trustees of the Library reported that the circulation of books and use of the reading-rooms had been larger than ever before. The same report may be made this year. From the point of view of increased circulation and patronage of the reading-rooms, the year just past has been the banner year for the Fort Fairfield Public Library. The report of the Librarian, which is presented herewith, will give many interesting details of this growth.

Various items have been added to the equipment of the library during the past year. A new table, with six chairs, has been placed in the general reading-room. A large filing cabinet, with a capacity of 15,000 cards, has been purchased for the new card-catalogue system which is being installed. This catalogue, when completed, will afford a most accurate and convenient record of the books in the library. A telephone has been installed, and a few minor changes have been made in the lighting system.

The real equipment of a library, however, is its books. In this respect, the Fort Fairfield Public Library is in poor condition. The cost of the new supplies which were necessary in order that the work of the library might be carried on to the best advantage, added to the cost of maintenance, has left very little for the purchase of new books. The townspeople have been very generous in their gifts, but the burden of supplying books can not well be left to chance donations. Three times the amount available this year would be little enough to spend for books. The Librarian has made an at-

tempt this winter to supply books to those living in the country through the country schools. While no accurate figures are available as yet, it is certain that the number of books called for in this way will be limited only by the number which can be supplied. There is no reason why people living outside the village should not have as full use of the library and its resources as possible. To do this, there must be books and more books. Books cost money, and, with the amount available in the past, it has been impossible to buy nearly as many as were needed. The usefulness of the library can be increased greatly by the purchase of more books.

In making an estimate of the amount of money which should be raised for the Library this year, the trustees are confronted with the fact that running expenses increase somewhat from year to year. The more the Library is used, the more it costs to heat and light it, and the more it is necessary to spend for equipment. The Librarian is not overpaid, certainly, for the work which she is now doing; her salary should be increased a little from year to year until it reaches a proper figure for the amount of work she is doing. Many books are needed. The trustees recommend the sum of \$3,000.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

To the Board of Trustees of the Public Library the annual report for the year 1920 is herewith submitted:—

CONDITION OF THE LIBRARY

The books are in process of being catalogued by the card-index system, and until this is completed it will be impossible to state the exact number of volumes the library contains, but with additions that have been made this year it is approximately 5,000.

CIRCULATION

The library was closed during the influenza epidemic from February 6 to March 1, 1920. Otherwise it has been open every afternoon and evening except Sundays and regular holidays.

Thirteen thousand eight hundred ninety five books were issued to borrowers during the year—the largest circulation in the history of the library; and these figures are not a complete record, as they do not include the number of books circulated through the rural schools, of which no full report has yet been received. At the present time the library has collections of books in six of the rural schools.

There is no way of estimating the reading-room attendance, or the number of people using the library for reference work, but we do know that it is considerably many more than it was last year.

GIFTS

In no previous year has the library been so well remembered by its friends. It is unfortunate that lack of space does not permit publication here of a complete list of the gifts and their donors. Special mention, however, should be made of the following:—

Twenty volumes of juvenile books: People's Natural History, in five large volumes: History of the United States, in six volumes: and a case of mounted birds, from Hon. and Mrs. H. W. Trafton.

A very fine lamp for the delivery desk was presented by Mrs. Nicholas Fessenden through the interest and generosity of Rev. T. W. Fessenden. From the Hekayto Camp Fire Girls \$18.10 was received for juvenile literature; from the Philomathian Club, \$25.00 for children's books. During children's book week, in November, the village schools, under the direction of Principal G. H. Foss, raised \$104.37 for children's books. From the proceeds of a food sale conducted by the Hook and Needle Club \$53.00 were added to this fund. Special gifts for this time were "The Burgess Animal Book," from Mrs. G. E. Bartlett: subscription to John Martin Magazine, Mrs. E. E. Hacker: subscription to Boys' Life, Mrs. J. B. Williams.

GENERAL REMARKS

The library has made decided progress along lines of real usefulness, the principal features of which are general reference work: co-operation with the schools by providing special reading lists and reference material: and extension of the library privileges to the pupils of the rural schools to whom the library is not easily accessible. This is an entirely new activity this year, and bids fair to be one of the most successful branches of library service, providing the resources of the library are maintained sufficiently to meet the demands for books for this purpose, which at the present time they are not. In this work the traveling library idea is utilized on a small scale, and is carried on through co-operation with the teachers, who have taken it up with much interest and enthusiasm and without whose assistance the work could not have been accomplished.

The library has many needs, but the most pressing and outstanding one is for juvenile books, the demands for which, apparently, are unlimited and away beyond the library's supply.

Citizens of Fort Fairfield:

The Federal census of 1920 gives the population of Fort Fairfield as 4,551. The school census of the same year shows that of this number 1,736 are under twenty-one years of age and that over 1,200 boys and girls (more than one-fourth the entire population) are pupils in the public schools. The school

department is therefore in direct daily contact with more than a fourth of the town's population at a period when habits of life and thought are being formed. At the same time its influence penetrates into nearly every home in the community determining to some degree the atmosphere of that home. To say that the work of the school department is important states the case but mildly: to say that it is the most important public work in which the town is engaged is stating the truth. Accepting this, it is the duty of every citizen, more especially every taxpayer, to know from first hand information, (not hearsay) what the schools are attempting to do and with what degree of success they are doing it. Furthermore it is the duty of the taxpayer to assist the schools in every possible way. Ample financial support is a requisite of a good school system, so too is ample moral support. They should always go together. With them the work of the school officials and teachers will go on from year to year with increasing efficiency: without them the work of the department must fail.

The success or failure of your schools is to a considerable degree in your hands.

Communities differ just as individuals differ. In some localities the people realize that they have a responsibility toward the local school and seem perfectly willing to assume it. In other localities the people appear to feel that the responsibility rests entirely upon someone else and consequently do very little to make their school what it should be. This manifests itself when the question of providing a boarding place for the teacher arises. In some districts the interested parties take up the matter among themselves finally arranging for a suitable boarding place. In other localities the people avoid all responsibility and even refuse to board the teacher. In such instances the school cannot be opened with the other schools in town thus depriving the children of their right to a full school year. For such conditions the

school officials can not be held responsible. It is a responsibility that rests directly on the people in the district and should be assumed by them.

Finance

The entire amount of money available for all school parposes for the fiscal year ending February 20, 1921 was \$82,-550.99 and was received from the following sources:

Balance from last year\$2,383.65
Appropriated by the town
Received from the state
Received from other sources 747.60

The entire amount of money spent for all school purposes during the fiscal year was \$74,728.13. The undrawn balance on hand February 21, 1921 in the common school and high school accounts is \$9,612.08. A detailed statement of receipts and expenditures will be found in the report of the town treasurer. It is impossible to estimate with absolute accuracy the amount that will be needed for another year. Emergencies may arise that will call for more money that is available. On the other hand certain appropriations may be over-estimated. We have gone over the whole situation so far as it is possible to do so in advance and are asking for only such amounts as in our judgment will be actually needed to carry on the work without detriment to the schools. These several amounts are as follows:

High School	\$12,000.00

The total amount asked for is \$51,000, the same being \$15,-000 less than was asked for and appropriated last year. We are asking for \$5,000 less for common schools because we believe that a town appropriation of \$30,000 together with the

unexpended balance of \$4,843.19 in the common school accurate and such money as will come from the state will be sufficient to meet the actual necessary running expenses. This estimate does not contemplate any general increase of salaries.

We are not asking for any appropriation for rebuilding rulal schools, not because we think it isn't desirable, but because
we believe the money situation here this year is such that we
ought not to spend only enough to pay actual necessary running expenses. You will recall that it has been the policy
of the town to appropriate annually for the past few years
\$6,000 to be used in improving rural schools. Each year two
such schools have been rebuilt to conform to modern requirements. There is more of this work to be done and the school
committee will be glad indeed to do if the town so wishes, but
they do not feel justified in urging it all this time. The town
warrant contains the usual article covering this matter that
the voters may express their own opinions. It is the feeling
of the school board that the work should be resumed in 1922
if the financial situation permits.

School Buildings

The following table has been prepared to show the condition of the schoolhouses in the town. It will be seen at a glance that the greater number of them are in excellent condition. Fort Fairfield has earned and established a reputation for having good rural school buildings: in fact they are above the general average of such buildings in the state.

The above table clearly shows that the Barnes, Chambers, Grass, Haley, Longfellow, McIntosh and Russell schools are the ones that are most in need of improvement. There are seven of them and should the town see fit to continue its policy towards rebuilding it will only a matter of three years before all the rural buildings will be in excellent condition and up to modern standard requirements. In addition to the regular schoolhouses a school is kept in the building belonging to Lynn Kipp and another in St. Paul's parish house. Neither of these rooms are suited to school purposes but seem to be the only rooms obtainable to relieve the over-crowding in the village. The truth of the matter is the village schools as a whole are badly over-crowded and the town will soon be compelled to provide additional room. Some have the impression that if the children who are con-

PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING

By courtesy of the local chapter of the Red Cross Miss Anna F. Goss the Public Red Cross Nurse has inspected all the schools in this town at least once during the past year and in some instances more than once. She has filed a report of her work from which the following quotation is made:—

"I wish to call the attention of the school committee to the fact that the number of cases of defective eyesight in the old fashioned school room where there are cross lights and otherwise improper lighting is noticeably larger than where the school rooms are correctly lighted. Following is the result of the school inspection of 1921:—

Every one of these children, handicapped however slightly by some physical defect, is failing to attain the physical and intellectual development of which he is capable.

It is of course, desirable that all these children suffering from any physical defect whatever should have medical attention.

We must help children to resist disease and in order to do so they must be taught the first step in education which is health.

What we do need in Fort Fairfield to correct the physical defects of the children and to prepare them to be healthy, happy and useful citizens.

- 1. A school physican who will give each child a thorough physical examination twice yearly.
 - 2. Teachers trained to teach health habits.
- 3. Parents to co-operate with the doctor, nurse and teacher in the forming of health habits and building up of health for their own children.
 - 4. A teacher of physical culture.
- 5. A scale in every school and every child's weight record sent home on the monthly report.
 - 6. Hot luncheon available for every school child."

A law enacted by the Legislature of 1919 compels that instruction in personal hygiene, community sanitation and physical education be given in all public schools in accordance with a course prepared by the State Superintendent. We are complying with the law to the extent that such instruction is given in all elementary schools in addition to exercises in physical culture. In the high school physical instruction is given the girls by Miss Chamberlain. The senior and junior girls take one hour, from three to four Tuesday afternoons, for instruction in calisthenics, marching, and other exercises calculated to aid bodily development. The sophomores and

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freshmen take similar instruction from three to four on Thursdays. This work has been very popular with the students and good results are already apparent. As soon as the weather permits the same plan will be carried out on the campus. Because of lack of room in the high school building the work is now carried on at Libby's rink.

One other line of work of great importance conducted by Miss Chamberlain is the regular Red Cross course of first aid. Along with this, one period each week is devoted to instruction by Miss Goss in home nursing. At the conclusion of the course the eighteen senior girls who are taking it will be given an examination. The successful ones will be granted a Red Cross diploma, which in time of war, would qualify them for service in the war zone or wherever the Red Cross saw fit to use them.

HIGH SCHOOL

The average attendance at the High School for the past year was 207. There are ten teachers employed. Of this number, seven are new to the school since the last report was made. Ordinarily so great a change in the faculty would be an injury to the school. This change however has not produced any such results. We were fortunate in being able to strengthen several of the departments so the work of the school in general has shown improvement. The value of any school to the community it serves lies in the influence it has on its students and through them on the homes represented. Something of the influence of the High School may be told upon reading the following statement of the number of alumninow engaged in further effort to secure an education. Fifty seven graduates are now pursuing courses in other institutions.

COMMON SCHOOLS

There are 1025 pupils registered in the common schools and thirty five teachers employed. The teaching force as a whole has been materially strengthened during the year. Twenty teachers are graduates of normal schools; six have had normal training-but are not graduates; the remaining nine are teachers of successful experience rendering valuable service. It is the aim of the school department to employ only graduates of normal schools or teachers having proved their ability by long and successful experience. We are gradually nearing the goal. Each year teachers who have had only a part time normal course have been urged to continue their training and to secure a normal school diploma. Several have taken the suggestion and have been given positions.

To build up and maintain an efficient teaching force in a rural community remote from centers of population is not so easily done as some may think. It is more than a question of money. Living costs and conditions, type of school building, sentiment of the community toward the school, and other factors enter in to make the problem really difficult at times. This town is really more fortunate than many towns have been in being able to get so large a percentage of trained teachers. Having secured good teachers we should keep them. There isn't any sentiment about it; it is simply good business judgment or better still, common sense. To let a good teacher go because he or she may get two or three dollars more a week is usually a sure way to injure our schools.

There are still a few schools in town in which stronger teachers are needed. These will be provided as scon as conditions permit. The time will never come when the teachers will give entire satisfaction to everybody. But the time when the town will have an all-round, good-working force of interested teachers loyal to their trust is not far distant.

The common schools are following the course of study as prescribed by the State Superintendent. Greater uniformity of work is apparent this year than has been secured for a long time. The course as outlined has to be adopted to local conditions to some degree but in general it is quite closely followed. It is not our plan to do a lot of showy work or to plan for many public performances. Rather do we strive to conform ourselves to systematic work along lines that are calculated to lay a reasonably good foundation for an ordinary public school education.

Time and again our teachers have been cautioned not to lose sight of the boys and the girls. The first duty of every teacher is to know the pupil, to teach him by example and by precept to live up to the best there is in him and then to train him along the academic lines. We believe this to be the only way of accomplishing work that shall endure. The average child has a good memory. Taking advantage of this it is easy enough to stuff a pupil with a lot of facts. But this is not education. Education consists of a knowledge of certain fundamentals acquired through observation and experience and the ability to use that knowledge when occasion requires. Such is the nature of the work we are trying to do.

Public School and Public Library

It is certainly fitting that the work done by the librarian at the public library be recognized in this report. Mrs. Estes established what she chose to call the "Story Hour.". During this hour she gathered children from the first three grades, read and discussed stories with them, and suggested story

books for their own reading. This work was intended to get children accustomed to using the library, to establish the library habit. It succeeded admirably.

The number of children using the library is increasing. It is particularly gratifying to know that the boys from the seventh and eight grades and from the freshmen class in high school are among the steady patrons. Their demand is not alone for fiction: they are using the books of reference. Part of their interest and activity is directed by the teachers; part of it purely voluntary.

The library is doing some extension work in the rural schools. Collections of books have been made up and sent out to the Findlen, Stevensville, Longfellow, Maple Grove, Grass and Monson schools. This line of work is particularly helpful because it reaches many children whose opportunity to use the library is rather limited. More such work could be done if the library had sufficient books to meet the needs. The trustees are asking for more money this year in order that they may extend the scope of the work and be better equipped for carrying on this extension work. Their requests should be granted. The importance of interesting children in the right kind of reading cannot be too strongly urged. Sad indeed is the plight of him who does not read or who reads trashy stuff. There is a wealth of good reading to be had and it seems a duty to place that reading within the reach of those who are really eager to read it.

In General

Regard if you please the school department as a concern doing a business of nearly \$100,000 a year. It has twenty-six school buildings valued at \$125,000, furniture and equipment valued at \$25,000, employs 48 persons, and deals directly or indirectly with every tax-payer in town.

The business management of such an enterprise would be quite a task if the work were carried on in a limited area as most commercial enterprises are. But it is spread out over an area of seventy-two square miles.

Add to the business end of it the work involved in maintaining the professional standards and it is easy to see that the supervision of such a system is no small matter. It must be remembered that there are two towns in the union and that practically a third of the time is required by the other town.

There are a thousand and one details involved in caring for the schools that the public never know consequently the average person fails to realize the amount of work required to keep the department going.

No claim to perfection is made. We recognize that there are weak spots. We are removing them as rapidly as time and conditions permit. We do believe however that the school system as a whole is growing better year by year and that the kind of work that is being done is constructive work that will produce good results. The real value of the schools cannot be determined now. It will be seen some years hence in the type of citizen it produces.
