EXPLANATION OF HIGHWAY MONEY EXPENDITURES

After paying for breaking winter roads and doing the necessary amount of turnpiking, dragging, cutting bushes and rockpicking on our 128 miles of highways the following improvements were made, to wit:—

CULVERTS

Five hundred dollars' worth of metal culverts was bought and used.

LUMBER

One thousand dollars' worth of lumber was bought and used in replanking and rebuilding culverts, bridges and crosswalks.

CEMENT AND IRON

Two thousand dollars' worth of cement and iron bars were bought and used in constructing sidewalks, concrete street and concrete culverts, as follows: Sidewalks, frontage Hopkins Bros. Building, Farmers' Exchange, Frontier Trust Co., and W. F. Churchill's. Concrete street, section on our Main street one hundred and forty feet long by twenty-four feet wide. Concrete culverts, three large culverts, one near Elmer Amsden's, one near Claude Webster's and one near Guy Maines.'

All of the above concrete work was inspected by a representative of the Portland Cement Association and passed as equal to the best concrete work done in the State of Maine

GRAVEL

One thousand dollars' worth of gravel bought and used, the said gravel being bought from the following parties: Alice Fisher \$200.00, Melvin Grass \$50.00, William LeVasseur \$50.00,

Elmer Amsden \$75.00, Ola Cogswell \$400.00, Guy Maines \$100.-00 and J. C. McLaughlan \$125.00.

We think that if the gravel taken from the seven pits above named was measured it would show that over 20,000 yards of gravel were hauled for the highways and sidewalks during the past year.

OUR RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 1923

Raise enough money to make some permanent improvements each year. Few realize the seriousness of our highway problem with over one hundred miles of soft dirt roads. Should we raise double the amount previously raised we would then be far behind other towns in New England and New Brunswick.

Raise enough money so that all the roads can be kept from deteriorating.

Annual Report of Superintendent of Schools

March, 1922—March, 1923

It is gratifying to know that in a time when public burdens have lain very heavy upon the people there has been everywhere a determined purpose to maintain education unimpaired, in order that the coming generation may be equipped, regardless of sacrifices in the present, for the increasing responsibilities which it must bear Only through a properly motivated and generously inspired process of education can this be accomplished.—President Harding.

CITIZENS OF FORT FAIRFIELD:—

Present local conditions demand strict economy in the expenditure of the public funds. What is true economy in financial affairs? It is the spending of money to advantage: getting the largest possible return and incurring the least possible waste. In such times as these, when many are having real difficulties in meeting their obligations, the necessity of reducing operating expenses to a minimum becomes a real one. With this in mind the school committee has made a very careful analysis of its budget for another year, reducing it to the lowest figure, that, in their opinion, will permit a continuance of the work of the schools without actually crippling them. To cripple the schools would not be economy: it would be parsimony. That you may form some idea of the size of this de-

partment and the work required of it the following miscellaneous statistics are given:—

To carry on the work that is suggested by the above items, to which must be added the cost of books, supplies of all kinds, payment of janitors, payment of insurance on village property and numerous smaller items, the following amounts of money will be needed:—

Last year the town appropriated for the above items \$60,800.00. This year's request is therefore \$6,800.00 less than the amount given the previous year. It is the judgment of the school officials that the rural building program and the construction of sanitary toilets be discontinued for this coming year, therefore no appropriation is asked for either of these two items.

NEW HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

The last annual town-meeting by a practically unanimous vote authorized the erection of a new High School building not to exceed a cost of \$125,000. Hon. C. A. Powers, Horace G. Richards and Fred E. Peterson were chosen to serve with the school committee and the superintendent of schools as a building committee. Plans prepared by Herbert W. Rhodes of Portland were finally accepted and bids were invited. The bids varied greatly, there being a difference of over \$40,000.00 between the highest and lowest. The contract was awarded to the F. A. Rumery Company of Portland for \$117,000.00, their bid being the lowest. The building committee has been particularly careful to safeguard the interest of the town in every way. The plans were submitted to a prominent contractor, carefully examined and approved by him. Advice was sought from men who were in a position to give it regarding construction, heating and ventilating. This action seemed desirable because the building in question is of a type new to Maine but more common in the western states in buildings costing from a million dollars upward. To further protect the town the contractor was required to give a bond for \$59,000.00 for the faithful execution of his contract and a full-time expert building inspector was employed to watch over the work.

Ground was broken Thursday, July 20, 1922, since which time the work has gone forward with dispatch. Under the immediate supervision of Mr. Frank Murphy, a trusted and experienced foreman, the building has progressed until today it stands ready for plastering. The first concrete was poured August 15, the first brick was laid September 13, and the first steel column was erected September 26. The building is of brick and steel, rising two stories above the basement. It is as nearly fireproof as it is possible to make a building, even to steel window sash and frames. The floors are of concrete, over which will be laid maple in the class rooms. Basement floors,

corridors, assembly hall and stairs will be of granolithic finish. All partitions are of gypsum block, non-bearing, and sound-proof. The heating system has been in operation for a month or more and has given entire satisfaction so far. The roof is a Barrett twenty-year-guaranteed roof of the central-drainage type.

The interior arrangement seems admirably adapted to the requirements of a school of four hundred pupils. The gymnasium, in the basement, measures 76 by 44 feet. Directly over it is the assembly hall, seating (with the balcony) upwards of five hundred people. It is especially well provided with exits and can easily be emptied in one minute. Classrooms, recitation rooms, laboratories, library, all are commodious, convenient and well lighted. The fact of the matter is the town has a building of the first-class in type of construction, quality of material and workmanship; one of which it may be justly proud; one that could not be built today for less than \$160,000; one that has the approval of State authorities, contractors, engineers and others who are competent to judge of such construction. The building committee has been unanimous in every decision to date, having in mind the single purpose of getting one hundred cents' value for every dollar expended. You who have not visited the building should do so at once. You will learn a lot and find much to commend.

HIGH SCHOOL

The High School continues to grow in numbers, showing conclusively that the public at large has an abiding confidence in the work being done. One has but to familiarize himself with what the school is doing to be convinced that the only policy of the school is to fit its boys and girls to serve better and to work better. To accomplish this there must be something more than mere academic instruction, and this something more can only be supplied by those who have a genuine inter-

est in boys and girls and their future welfare. Any school that limits its work to the purely academic branches falls down on its job. It is particularly true of the Fort Fairfield High School that it is not so falling down.

The present faculty is highly efficient, constituting an actual force for the betterment of the coming generation. In no part of our school system is it more apparent that the expenditure is a real investment that will pay competent dividends in years to come. The spirit of the school is fine, the atmosphere one of industry, and the co-operation between faculty and student really remarkable. Any attempt to tear down the standard of this school should be fought as vigorously as is humanly possible.

VILLAGE SCHOOLS

The work of these schools has gone along pleasantly without serious interruption. Few changes in teachers have been made and no decided change in policy. Several grades are obliged to run on a half-time schedule, but with the occupancy of the new building that arrangement will be a thing of the past. "The proof of the pudding is in the eating." The test of a school system is in the results it obtains. Each year sees an increased number of eighth-grade pupils entering High School better equipped than the classes preceding them. This is encouraging, showing, as it does, evidence of steady progress.

RURAL SCHOOLS

It has been the consistent policy of the school officers to lay special stress on the country schools. To provide the rural community with modern sanitary schoolhouses, trained teachers and adequate equipment has been our constant aim. In large measure we have succeeded. With one or two exceptions every rural teacher has had normal training; with three exceptions all the rural school buildings are of the approved

modern type; in every instance the equipment in the rural school is identical with that of the village. Much of this has been brought about within the past six years. To be sure, there are weak spots in the system, just as in every other department of public administration. Turn the searchlight on any public department, courts included, and defects will be revealed. But true it is that our schools are on the right track, moving in the right direction. So long as they show signs of progress there is reason to feel encouraged. When the roads become settled take your car and ride out to any one of the rural schools, watch the work, spend the noon hour there if possible, then make an honest comparison between conditions as you see them and conditions when you went to a rural school, and it is safe to say in most cases the comparison will favor the school today.

HEALTH WORK IN SCHOOLS

One very important branch of school administration is the work done by Mrs. Anna Fisher, the Red Cross Nurse. If you who read this could only see the great improvement resulting from her work, you would vote with both hands for its continuance. What she has done, supplemented by the work of the teachers and the co-operation of the pupils and their parents, is plainly manifest in greatly improved physical conditions. The improvement noted is not a matter of guesswork; it is a matter of record. Each pupil's height and weight is recorded periodically and compared with the normal increase to be expected in a healthy child of the given age. Some parents would do well to view these records. Mrs. Fisher's report is printed herewith, just as submitted. Read it, please. It furnishes "food for thought."

AMERICAN RED CROSS

Fort Fairfield, Maine

Aroostook County

The school year of 1922 and 1923 bids fair to be the healthiest year for the school children since the school examinations have begun in 1920. The teachers' reports show fewer absentees from sickness than for several years. A Health Program is being carried out in every school by the teacher, and children are learning the simple rules of health and in most cases trying hard to carry them out. In January, 1922, the dental clinic was started, and fifteen clinics were held on Friday afternoons of January, February, March and April. The clinic was financed entirely by the efforts of the school children and the Junior Red Cross. A second-hand dental chair was purchased and other equipment necessary to carry on the work. The local dentists worked on every third Friday afternoon at the rate of ten dollars for the full afternoon. As many as eighteen children received treatment in an afternoon when the work consisted mostly of extractions. Prophylaxis treatment was given by the nurse on other days. Two hundred and twenty children received treatment at the dental clinic by the dentists. A prize of a ten-dollar gold piece was offered the rural school and another to the village grade having the largest number of children with perfect teeth at the end of the spring term. The Lincoln School won the rural prize and the eighth-grade Fessenden the prize for the grades. A very large number of children received treatment by their own family dentists during the year. In February, 1923, Dr. Lombard, County Health Officer, examined the pupils of the High School. The examination shows the following result:—

Parents have received notices of defects in every case and been advised to have them see a physician for further examination and treatment. A personal visit has been made the parents in many cases. To improve the health of the children it is very necessary that the parents co-operate with the school nurse in carrying out the requests and that they observe the direction given the children in regard to right living. Plenty of fresh air night and day, long hours of sleep,

regular habits and a plain wholesome diet, with plenty of fruit, vegetables and milk, go very far toward improving the health and endurance of our school children.

EQUIPMENT OF NEW HIGH SCHOOL

It was plainly stated at the last annual town-meeting that the cost of furnishing and equipping the new High School building would amount to \$25,000.00. This amount was an estimate, but there seems to be no need for revising that estimate now. It would, of course, be desirable to furnish complete equipment this year, but to do so is well nigh impossible. The town should, however, make an appropriation sufficiently large to permit the purchase of what is actually needed to open the building this fall and use it. The amount already suggested in the first part of the report includes the cost of fuel and janitor services for the new building. Aside from these two items the school will need some furniture, blackboards, electric lights, program bells, lockers for clothing and ventilating machinery (a portion of the ventilating system was included in the general contract). Furnishing the assembly hall and gymnasium, together with some other items, can be deferred till the town is better able to provide them.

If the town will appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 the new building can be opened and run for a year, the grades that are now running on a half-time schedule can be put on a full-time basis and ample accommodations provided for all. The amount paid for rent and maintenance of the two outside schoolrooms will more than pay the interest on the \$10,000. We realize that this request comes at an unfortunate time, but it would seem only fair to everybody concerned that provision should be made that all children should have equal opportunities.

CONCLUSION

In presenting this report the writer has tried to state the case regarding the schools frankly and openly. If the reader will carefully peruse the report from the balance sheet through the schedule of teachers and salaries that follows this paragraph, he will be enabled to make a fair estimate of the work in hand. There would seem to be no reason why any taxpayer should not know the true situation. It is every taxpayer's duty to know the facts set forth herein, that he may make up his mind intelligently and without prejudice just what his attitude should be toward the financial requirements for another year. The problem is yours, not ours. The school board and the superintendent pledge themselves to a continuance of their present policy, namely, without fear or favor to give you as good a system of public schools as it is possible for them to give with the money you are willing to provide.

TRUSTEE'S REPORT

As many a worthy committee has done before, the trustees of Fort Fairfield Public Library can make their report for the year just past in two words—they can “report progress.” The report of the librarian, which is presented herewith, shows a circulation for the past year larger than ever before. There has been a normal, healthy growth in the patronage of the library, particularly among the young people of the town. Much of the interest shown by these young people, an interest which is growing all the time, is due to the untiring efforts of the librarian. She has accomplished a great deal, with the limited means at her disposal.

No changes have been made during the past year to the library building or equipment, except for some minor repairs. Metal weather strips have been put on some of the windows, and one or two small changes have been made in the plumbing system. The building and its furnishings are in excellent condition.

With the larger appropriation of 1922, it has been possible to buy more books than usual during the past year. There are not yet nearly enough books for an adequate working equipment. Books have a habit of wearing out, and must be replaced. New ones ought to be added from time to time, especially for the children. All funds of the library, other than those needed for the actual running expenses, are used for books. The voters should bear this in mind when the library appropriation is under discussion. A library without books is like a motor without gas. A reasonable amount for this pur-

pose is essential to the use of the institution. The trustees do not ask as large an appropriation as that of last year, in view of the unusual conditions, but they do recommend an appropriation large enough to cover the running expenses, with a fair amount to be expended for books.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

To the board of trustees and the citizens of Fort Fairfield the following report of the Public Library for the year 1922 is respectfully submitted:—

The circulation for the year was 15,148 volumes, which is the largest in the history of the library.

The amount of reference work and the reading-room attendance have far exceeded those of any previous year, which is an indication that more and more the townspeople, especially the young people, are making real use of the library's resources. And it is along these lines of work rather than in building up a big circulation of light reading that a library's true service to the community should be given and estimated.

As far as possible, books have been lent to the rural schools, but it has been impossible to fill many of the applications that have come from that source on account of the shortage of children's books. It is a deplorable fact that, while many other public libraries are offering inducements to attract children to read their books, this library is daily turning them away without books. The greatest need of the library is good up-to-date reference books and juvenile literature.

Three hundred and seven books have been added to the library by purchase and 38 by gift. The books purchased include a number of important reference and non-fiction books, among them a "New International Encyclopaedia."

On Memorial Day the Citizens' Band generously advertised its first out-door concert for the benefit of the library, and this, in connection with a food sale at the booth, netted \$104.36. From an entertainment given July 3, by the young people \$42.00 was cleared. This fund was used for a magazine file and cabinet and children's literature. The Hook and Needle Club has made its usual contribution of \$30, and at the time of writing the Philomathian Club is making plans for a library benefit in the near future, for their annual contribution.

WARRANT

To Lee H. Parker,

Constable of the Town of Fort Fairfield:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Fort Fairfield, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Libby's Rink in said Fort Fairfield, on Monday, the 19th day of March, 1923, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:—

Art. 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Art. 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for General Government, as follows: Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Clerk, Treasurer, Tax Collector's Commission, School Committee and Department Expense.

- Art. 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Protection of Persons and Property, as follows: Police Department, Fire Department Salaries, Fire and Building Inspector, Insurance for Fire Department, Apparatus and Appliances for Fire Department and Care of Fire Alarm
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Health and Sanitation, as follows: Red Cross Nurse, Milk Inspector, Health Officer, Tuberculosis Prevention, Vital Statistics and Board of Health.
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Highways and Bridges, as follows: Maintenance of Highways and Bridges, Three-Town-District Highway, Road Commissioner, Patrolling State Aid Highway and Breaking Winter Roads.
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for Charity and Mothers' Aid, as follows: Paupers and Mothers' Aid.
- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Education, as follows: Supt. of Schools, Truant Officer, Common Schools, Text Books, Repairs, Apparatus and Appliances, Free

High School, Equipment for New High School Building and to Rebuild Lincoln Schoolhouse.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended toward the support of the Fort Fairfield Free Public Library.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended in lighting the Aroostook River Bridge and the Streets of Fort Fairfield for the year ensuing.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be applied toward defraying the expenses of observing Memorial Day.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay hydrant rental for fire protection for the year ensuing.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 to redeem schoolhouse bonds falling due within the year; also to see if the town will vote to raise \$1,000.00 to redeem Municipal Building bonds falling due within the year.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for maintaining and insuring the Municipal Building.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for interest on the town debt for the year ensuing.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to charge interest at the rate of six per cent per annum on all taxes remaining unpaid after November 1st, 1923, and twelve per cent per annum on all taxes remaining unpaid after January 1st, 1924.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for sprinkling village streets for the year ensuing.

Art. 18. To see whether the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate notes during the ensuing year, to anticipate taxes and protect town orders duly issued, said notes not to exceed in the aggregate \$150,000.00 and to be paid during the year which they were made, out of money raised during such current year by taxes.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to ratify the doings of the Selectmen, whereby they abated the taxes published in the town report for the year last past.

- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to elect a Budget Committee to recommend to the next annual town-meeting the necessary appropriations for the next ensuing year.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to take care of the abatements for the year 1922.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to rent a hall to be used as a drill hall or armory by the local company of Field Artillery of the National Guard of the State of Maine.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to elect a Road Commissioner or to instruct the Selectmen to appoint a Road Commissioner in accordance with Section 16 of Chapter 92 of the Public Laws of 1919.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended resurfacing Lower Main Street with gravel from the residence of W. F. Churchill to the residence of Albert Hoyt.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended in building a concrete culvert also to grade hill on Currier Road near the residence of Albion Spinney.

-
- Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended graveling the Marshall Road from near the residence of Frank Trafion to the Starch Factory of Fred Philbrick.
- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended straightening and graveling the Murphy Road from the residence of Abner Ames to Mrs. Nellie Flannery's.
- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended graveling the Strickland Road from the residence of Chester Giberson to the Fred Osborne Starch Factory.
- Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended blowing the ledge, grading and graveling the Dorsey Hill on the Dorsey Road.
- Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to be expended graveling Forest Avenue from the residence of Ambrose Parker to the residence of Leo MacLauchlan.
- Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended graveling the West Limestone Road from the Limestone Town Line to the residence of Coleman Ireland; also to gravel swamp on Base Line Road.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended graveling the Center Limestone Road from the residence of Charles Spearin to the residence of Fred Philbrick; also to gravel said road near the B. & A. Railroad Crossing.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to do any concrete work this coming year on sidewalks, street or culverts and if so how much money will the town vote to raise for same.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to accept the following town ways for the use of the town, as laid out and surveyed by P. L. Hardison in October, 1903, according to his plan of Sunnyside, said plan being recorded in the Aroostook Registry of Deeds, on petition of Wallace W. Rollins, Michael Dionne et als., to wit:

A town way commencing at Fisher Street and running in a general southerly direction to Art Street, so-called, said town way being known as Brookview Ave.

A town way commencing at Brookview Avenue, so-called, and running in a general westerly direction to Center Street, so-called, said town way being known as Art Street.

A town way commencing at Fisher Street and running in a general southerly direction to Art Street, so-called, said town way being known as Center Street.

- Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred dollars to cover Compensation Insurance Premium of highway crew.
- Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to abate the taxes on the property owned by the Fort Fairfield Hotel Company for the years 1921 and 1922.
- Art. 37. To see whether the town will vote to abate that portion of the taxes assessed against Robert Giggey for the years 1921 and 1922 upon that part of his homestead farm which was sold prior to the assessment of said tax.
- Art. 38. To see whether the town for the purpose of continuing the concrete work on Main Street, said concrete road to be twenty-four feet wide, will vote to issue its bonds to the aggregate principal amount of ten thousand dollars, said bonds to be dated June 1st, 1923, and payable June 1st, 1923, and to bear interest payable semi-annually at such rate, not exceeding four and one-half per cent per annum as the Selectmen and Treasurer may determine; also to see whether the town

will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to determine the form and all other particulars relating to said bonds and to issue and negotiate the same.

The Selectmen will be in session at their office in the Hopkins Building Thursday, Friday and Saturday preceding March 19, 1923, from 10:00 o'clock A. M. to 5.00 o'clock P. M. for the purpose of correcting the check list.
