## Superintendent's Report.

---

To the S. S. Committee and Citizens of the Town of Lincolnville, I now submit my report as Supt. of Schools.

Taken as a whole our schools have done good work the past year. With three exceptions, our teachers had had previous experience. Some of our schools are so small, that it is hard for both teacher and pupils to maintain an interest in the studies. Yet the teachers have made extra efforts and the results have been better than I expected. With few exceptions, thorough work has been done. If the parents could be induced to visit the schools more and see for themselves what is being done, we should get better work from both teachers and pupils, and fewer complaints in regard to our schools.

During the year we have exchanged our geographies and introduced Maxwell's Introductory Grammar; with the latter only part of the schools have been supplied. The new books seem to be satisfactory. More grammars will be needed in the spring to supply the other schools. These books are not paid for as our exchange could not be completed the past year. In closing, I wish to extend my thanks to the members of the School Committee for the assistance given me in the discharge of my duties.
