#### ENGINE HOUSES,

The houses are all in good repair. There has been expended on the Hook & Ladder House about one hundred dollars in sheathing and painting, which was very much needed.

#### RESERVOIRS.

There are within the limits of the Department twenty-one reservoirs: some of them are worthless. I would recommend building three new reservoirs, of a capacity of one hundred and fifty hhds. each; two of them on the Plains, one near junction of Water and Grove streets, the other near junction of Water and Gold streets, and a new one in place of the old one at foot of Union street. I would also recommend making a new covering to the one near the junction of Main and Temple streets, and the painting of No. 3 engine, and No. 1 hose carriage.

With these, in addition to the hydrants connected with the Lockwood Mills, our facilities for the prompt extinguishment of fire are as good as can be expected of a hand fire department.

July 13, house and barns of Asa R. Clifford, loss \$2000, insurance \$1200, sparks from chimney.

Aug. 15, blacksmith shop occupied by J. J. McFadden, and owned by Water Power Co., cause unknown, loss trifling, insured.

Oct. 26, alarm from West Waterville, No. 3, responded to the call.

Jan. 2, 1880, dwelling house on the Plains, owned by Mrs. Gurney, loss \$500, no insurance, cause unknown.

Jan. 19, False alarm.

Jan. 24, stable owned by C. E. Grey, on Ticonic street, loss \$100, no insurance, cause unknown.

Feb. 20, 1880, dwelling of Rev. Dr. Shaw, loss trifling, fully insured, cause burning out of chimney.

Congratulating our citizens on the immunity from serious loss by conflagration for the past year, and extending my earnest thanks to all the officers and members of the department and the citizens in general, for the prompt and generous response to all calls, I can but hope that the same good feeling will prevail in the future as in the past.

## SCHOOL REPORT.

## TOWN OF WATERVILLE, MARCH, 1880.

The close of another municipal year devolves upon the Superintending School Committee the duty of presenting their Annual Report. They are called to give an account of what they have done in the fulfilment of their trust, and of the condition of the schools under their care. In relation to their own duty of Superintendence, so far as this needs to be made a separate topic, it may suffice to say, that by frequent visits, on the part of one or more of their number, to the different schools, and by careful examinations of them at the close of each term, they have kept themselves informed of the progress of the pupils, and advanced them from one grade to another, as their attainments were found to justify. They have also, as occasion made needful, listened to the complaints of parents and others, and given counsel to teachers as to the best way of dealing with troublesome pupils. But the cases have been hapily few, in which such services have been required.

In all the village schools, the graded system has been in operation now for many years; and the past year has called for no change in the system. With the same classification and nearly the same teachers, the committee, as may be supposed, have to report no considerable variation in the condition of these schools from year to year. Yet there has been, in their judgment, while a slow, yet a perceptibly steady improvement in their efficiency and usefulness, ever since the present graded system was established; and the year now ending has witnessed its share of this

improvement. There has been a good degree of regularity in the attendance of the children; and, as a general remark, the teachers have brought to their work a becoming sense of responsibility, and a governing desire to awaken the interest and secure the proficiency of their pupils.

In the outlying rural districts also, where from the nature of the case graded schools could not be had, the results gained have been quite satisfactory. The schools here have been faithfully taught, and, so far as known, have met the expectation, and won the favor of the people directly interested in them.

### TEACHERS' MEETINGS.

In the hope of exciting a deeper interest in the teachers, of awakening and keeping alive in them a healthful spirit of inquiry in relation to their work, and stimulating them to better effort for the improvement of the schools, the committee, more than a year since, recommended to them to form themselves into a Teachers' Association. With the aid of the committee, such an association was formed and organized, with the Principal of the High School as president, and all the teachers in the village enrolled as members. Provision was made for stated meetings, and for the consideration, at each meeting, of some subject of practical interest connected with the work of the schools. It was arranged that the committee, or at least some one of them, should be present, as often as possible, at the meetings, and take such part as might seem desirable in the free and familiar conversations and discussions. During the past year, the association has met three times each term, or twelve times in the year; and, as its records will show, has had in consideration many questions of vital concern to the schools. The teachers have had the advantage of comparing their different views and methods, and of profiting from the experience and suggestions of one another. The committee too have found desirable opportunities of presenting some not needless cautions and hints. Good has evidently come from the meetings thus far; and if, as the committee hope, they shall be continued, still greater benefit may justly be expected from them. But in order to secure this benefit, they should be faithfully attended. The one respect in which teachers are most liable to fail, is in the interest demanded in their work. This interest ought to amount to an absorbing passion. The moment teaching becomes a routine, or is sought mainly for a livelihood, or for other reason than interest in the work, it loses its proper motive and dignity, and much of its usefulness and success. Readiness to attend such meetings as those here in view may well be regarded both as a sign of interest actually felt, and a means of continuing and strengthening it.

#### DISCIPLINE AND PUNISHMENT.

During the year, the committee have given much attention to the subject of discipline in the schools. In the teachers' meetings just spoken of, the matter has been very fully discussed; and the views of the committee respecting it may fitly find expression in this report. Order in the schools is a necessary condition of their efficiency. It is also a thing of great value in itself, and an important part of the training of the young to habits of self-restraint and of quiet submission to the regulations of society. Lessons of prompt and cheerful obedience, learned in the schools, are naturally carried into the conduct of life, and help lay the foundations of good citizenship. It is hence essential to the success of the schools, and a matter of wide-reaching concern, that they should be wisely governed; and this wise government may sometimes call for the infliction of something in the way of punishment. The committee do not think that they could, with safety to the schools, deprive the teachers altogether of this right to punish. But while they do not take from them the right, to be used with judgment, they are clearly of the opinion, that the best governed schools are almost always those in which there is the least resort to punishment; and that an ideally perfect school, if it could be reached, would be one in which there would be no corporal punishment. It is character in the teacher that most effectually governs, — firmness tempered with kindness, and especially skill in awakening the interest and the faculties of the pupils. No teacher, in whom these qualities of the mind and heart are seriously lacking, no one whose chief reliance for maintaining order is the use of the rod, ought to be allowed in the school-room.

#### SCHOOL ACCOMMODATION.

The committee have to call the attention of their fellow-citizens to the immediate and imparative need of additional school accommodation. From the beginning of the present school year, there has been a large increase of the number of pupils in all the primary schools. In three of these schools—that in the north brick building, kept by Miss Maxwell, that in Oak Street, kept by Miss Haynes, and that on the Plains, kept by Miss Fifield the increase in the number of pupils has been so great, that it was impossible to give them all seats in one room, and beyond the power of a single teacher to hear their lessons. In the fall term, a partial remedy for the evil was found, by putting the smaller children into the entries, and employing for them additional teachers. A still better, though not wholly satisfactory provision was made at the opening of the second or winter term, by hiring of father Halde the Catholic school-building, and establishing there two new schools. This is however regarded as merely a temporary arrangement. Three new school-rooms will be indispensible, as soon as they can be got in readiness. This will hardly be denied by any one, who takes account of the facts, that in the school on the Plains there are already registered 155 names, in the Oak Street primary 115, and in the north brick primary 95.

#### SALARIES OF TEACHERS

At the beginning of the school year, the committee, in deference to what they understood to be the wishes of the tax-payers, made a reduction of ten per cent. in the salaries of all the village teachers below the High School, and a still greater reduction in the salary of the assistant teacher in the High School. The step was taken by reason of the seriously felt pressure of the times. But that pressure is already somewhat lightened, while the cost of living for the teachers is becoming higher. In this state of things, the committee submit to the town, whether they may not fitly bring back the salaries to their former amounts. They do not think that the teachers were ever paid more than the just value of their services, nor do they believe that they can get teachers with the needful qualifications at cheaper rates.

#### OTHER MATTERS.

With respect to instruction in music and penmanship, the committee have nothing to add to what is contained in their last report, beyond the remark, that they would regret the withdrawal from the schools of the measure of attention now given to these branches. Nor have they any change of opinion to express as to the wisdom of providing free text-books for the schools. In their judgment, the course pursued in this respect has justified itself by its results. To the discussions now going on in certain quarters respecting new methods of instruction, they have given some thought; but at present they see no occasion for recommending any considerable change in the methods of teaching.

# WARRANT.

## STATE OF MAINE.

To E. H. PIPER, one of the Constables of the Town of Waterville, GREETING: County of Kennebec,

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Waterville, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet at Town Hall, in said Town, on Monday, the 15th day of March, A. D. 1880, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles, to wit:—

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator to govern said meeting.

- ART. 2. To choose a Town Clerk, Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, and one or more Superintending School Committee.
- ART. 3. To see what method the Town will adopt to collect taxes for the ensuing year.
- ART. 4. To choose a Treasurer, Collector, Agent Auditor of accounts, and all other necessary Town Officers.
  - ART. 5. To raise a sum of money for the support of schools.
  - ART. 6. To raise a sum of money for the support of poor.
- ART. 7. To see if the Town will vote any instructions in relation to the management of the poor, or of the Town Farm.
- ART. 8. To see what method the Town will take to repair the roads, bridges and sidewalks, and raise a sum of money to pay for said repairs the ensuing year.
- ART. 9. To raise a sum of money to pay the current expenses of the Town the ensuing year.
- ART. 10. To see if the Town will raise a sum of money to pay its interest-bearing debt, or any portion thereof, or take any action in regard to the same.
- ART. 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a suitable number of persons to be measurers of Wood and Bark, and Surveyors of Logs and Lumber the ensuing year.
- ART. 12. To see if the Town will raise a sum of money to pay a Night Watch, or act anything thereon.
- ART. 13 To see what action the Town will take in regard to Lighting the Streets, and raise a sum of money for the same.
- ART. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for the support of a Free High School.

- ART. 15. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the management of the Town Hall.
- ART. 16. To see if the Town will take any action in regard to Sewerage, and to raise money for the same.
- ART. 17. To see if the Town will vote to furnish Text-books for the Scholars of the Public Schools.
- ART. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the Fire Department.
- ART. 19. To see if the Town will vote to refund to Joseph Mitchell and Joseph Mitchell Jr., money paid on School-house tax, in Union District No. 2, of West Waterville.
  - ART. 20. To see if the Town will vote to tax dogs the ensuing year.
  - Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Reform Club to use the Town Hall for meetings, free, when not otherwise engaged.
  - ART. 22. To see if the Town will take any action in reference to a Revision of the "By-Laws of the Town of Waterville."
  - ART. 23. To see if the Town will vote to have a Supervisor of Schools instead of a S. S. Committee as heretofore.
  - ART. 24. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a lot for School Purposes on the Plains in said town, to erect a School Building on the same, and raise a sum for the purchase of the lot and the erection of the building.
  - ART. 25. To see if the Town will vote to provide an additional room for the accommodation of the Oak St. Primary School, and raise a sum of money for the same.
  - ART. 26. To see if the Town will vote to sell a strip of land three feet wide from the south side of the white school house lot on the east side of Pleasant Street, to Wesley J. Maynard, and empower the Selectmen to convey the same by deed.
  - ART. 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and place in the hands of W. S. Heath Post G. A. R., the sum of \$25,00 to be used in decorating the graves of deceased Soldiers and Sailors, next Decoration Day.
  - ART. 28. To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to have the sale of Liquor at the Agency confined to the residents of Waterville.
  - ART. 29. To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to run out the lines of Main Street, and set permanent monuments to mark the same, to be paid from the Highway approriation.
  - ART. 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money to improve the Park.
  - ART. 31. To see if the Town will take any action in relation to the method of calling future Town Meetings.

ART. 32. To see if the Town will vote to lease of Ticonic Bank the office now occupied by the Selectmen, for a term of five years, at one hundred dollars per year.

ART. 33. To see if the Town will vote to rebuild the Cedar Bridge over the Messalonskee stream, and raise a sum of money for the same.

ARS. 34. Tho see if the Town will vote to discontinue so much of Front St., described as follows: Beginning on the easterly line of Front St., three rods northerly of where the same intersects the norterly line of the Maine Central Railroad, as located; thence north 15 3-4 degs. east, to the fence next southerly of Memorial Hall; thence north, 56 1-2 degs. west, about eleven (11) rods and seven (7) links to College Street; said way being three rods wide and lying west and south of the above described courses and distances, and being the northerly end of the way accepted by the town March 8th, 1841.

ART. 35. To see if the Town will vote to accept a Private Way, laid out by the Selectmen, and described as follows:—Beginning at a bolt driven in the ground in the north line of Silver Street, and in J. H. Plaisted's west line; thence northerly, on said Plaisted's west line about ninety-two (92) feet to a bolt driven in the ground; thence on a line parallel, (or nearly so) to the fronts of the stores on Main Street, about 448 ft., to a bolt driven in the ground one (1) ft. north of, and eight (8) feet from the east end of the store house now occupied by J. F. Percival; thence about fifty-two (52) ft. to a bolt driven in the ground one ft. east of the southeast corner of F. Walker's shop; thence on a line parallel to the east side of said shop, about forty-five (45) to Temple Street. The above described line is to be the west line of the Way, and the east line is to be twenty-four (24) feet easterly therefrom, excepting where the Way passes in the rear of the following lots on Main St., viz.: lots owned by C. M. Barrel, C. G. Carleton, Merchants' Bank, John Ware, J. M. Crooker, Louise Ingalls, Mrs. Joanna B. Gilman, Waterville Savings Bank. Arthur alden, Mrs. Caffrey, P. S. Heald, L. E. Thayer, and Ticonic Bank, where the way is to embrace all land lying between the above described lots, and the above described west line of way, all according to a plan in the hands of the Selectmen, which is hereby made a part of this description.

ART. 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept a Town Way laid out by the Selectmen, and described as follows:—Beginning at a point in the easterly line of College Street, where the same intersects the northerly line of land of Maine Central Railroad Company; thence southeasterly, on said northerly line of said Company's railway land, to the easterly line of Front Street, said road to be 3 rods wide, and lying northerly of said railway land.

ART. 37. To see if the Town will vote to accept a Town Way laid out by the Selectmen, and described as follows:—Beginning at the westerly end of Gilman Street, at an iron rod in the northerly line of said street; thence north 63 degs., 36 min. west, to a bolt driven in the ground, 103 rods; thence north, 63 degs. west, 65 rods to an iron bolt in the easterly line of the West Waterville road (so called), said road to lie south of the above described line, and to be three rods wide.

ART. 38. To see if the Town will vote to accept a Town Way laid out by the Selectmen, and described as follows:—Beginning at the southwesterly corner of Mrs. Drinkwater's homestead lot, on the northerly side of Centre Street; thence northerly, on the westerly line of said Drinkwater's lot, 109 ft. to land of R. B. Dunn; thence, on land of R. B. Dunn; parallel to Mrs. Florence McFadden's land, 165 ft. to land of Mrs. Fannie A. Butterfield; thence, on land of said Butterfield, 36 ft. 6 in.; said way to be two rods wide and lying westerly of the above described line.

ART. 39. To see if the Town will vote to abate the tax assessed against Asa R. Clifford, in 1879.

ART. 40 To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for Police Services.

ART. 41. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for deficiencies in Overdrawing Accounts for year ending Feb. 20, 1880.
