

Superintendent's Report

TO THE S. S. COMMITTEE AND CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF LINCOLNVILLE:—

GREETINGS:-

I hereby submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Thirty weeks of school have been maintained.

Thru the efforts of teachers and pupils the following improvements have been made: A fine teacher's desk purchased for the Youngtown school; slate blackboards placed in the Center school by money previously earned, and new curtains ordered for the Miller school.

The idea of the school lunch has been successfully worked out in two of our schools.

We are pleased to have the parents visit our schools; one of the schools had twenty-three visitors during the winter term.

A State examination was given during the year and the following pupils passed and entered Camden High School: Roland Gould, John McCobb and Mildred Lermond. Flora Young and Clarence Mahoney who completed the course in 1918, also entered. Cranston Dean entered East Maine Conference Seminary. Five more pupils will complete the course in June.

Proper seats and desks are needed for the Hill and Wiley schools. I recommend that seats and desks not in use in the Beach and Mlller schools be transferred to the Hill and Wiley schools.

The Wiley school has fallen slightly below the required average attendance. I recommend that the town vote to leave both the Wiley and Rackliff schools to the discretion of the S. S. Committee.

The flag in the Youngtown school is badly worn and should be replaced.

Land for a playground is much needed for the Youngtown school.

The windows of the Center school are in a bad condition. I recommend when a change is made that the proper lighting be considered.

The Beach schoolhouse was re-shingled. The Hill schoolhouse has had needed repairs.

We shall need to appropriate more money for the schools.

I wish to thank the selectmen for their support and the members of the S. S. Committee for their advice and aid, and also the citizens of the town who have shown such a fine spirit of co-operation.
