

# Town Warrant

#### STATE OF MAINE.

To David O. Trafton, Constable of the town of Newport, in the county of Penobscot,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Newport, aforesaid, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, so-called, in said town, on Monday, the seventeenth day of March, A. D. 1902, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles Viz:

- Art. 1-To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2-To choose a Town Clerk for the year ensuing.
- Art. 3-To hear all reports made at said meeting.
- Art. 4-To choose three or more Selectmen.
- Art. 5-To choose three or more Overseers of the Poor.
- Art. 6-To choose three or more Assessors.
- Art. 7-To choose a Town Agent.
- Art. 8-To choose a Town Treasurer.
- Art. 9-To choose a Collector of Taxes.
- Art. 10—To choose one or more Road Commissioners not exceeding three, and to determine their per diem compensation, as well as laborers and horses on the highway.
- Art. 11-To choose a member or members of Superintending School Committee.
- Art. 12-To choose a Superintendent of Schools.

- Art. 13-To choose Sextons for the various cemeteries in town.
- Art. 14-To choose three or more persons to enforce town ordinances
- Art. 15—To choose all other town officers required by law to be chosen at the annual town meeting.
- Art. 16—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, and if so, how much, for the purchase of books and documents for the use and benefit of the Free Public Library, and for the payment of the running expenses thereof
- Art. 17—To see how much money the town will raise to pay town charges.
- Art. 18-To see how much money the town will raise for the support of Poor.
- Art. 19—To see how much money the town will raise to make and repair highways and bridges, ways and sidewalks, in said town, and determine how the same shall be expended.
- Art. 20 -To see how much money the town will raise for the support of common schools.
- Art. 21-To see how much money the town will raise for the support of Free High Schools.
- Art. 22—To see how much money the town will raise to purchase school books
- Art. 23—To see how much money the town will raise for school supplies and apparatus.
- Art. 24-To see how much money the town will raise for school house repairs.
- Art. 25—To see if the town will raise a sum of money, and if so, how much, for the purchase of a modern snow plow to break out sidewalks and keep them open in the winter.
- Art. 26-To see if the town will raise a sum of money, and if so, how much for the purchase of a roller for the sidewalks of said town.
- Art 27—To see if the town will vote to make a contract with the Smith-Sturtevant Light and Power Company for the lighting of the village by electric lights, and if so, for

what term it will make said contract, how much money it will appropriate for said purpose and how many lights and of what kind it will contract for, and whom it will authorize to sign such contract.

- Art. 28—To see if the town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to take the necessary legal steps for the establishment of a state road, so-called, in said town.
- Ant. 29—To see if the town will raise a sum of money, and if so how much, for the purpose of constructing a public drain or common sewer to connect with the northerly termination of the present Shaw Street sewer, and thence to extend westerly along Middle Street, so-called, to a point nearly opposite the dwelling house of Byron Porter.
- Art 30—To see how much money the town will raise to aid the G A R in decorating soldier's graves in the town of New port on the 37th day of May, A D 1902
- Art [3]—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to repair and paint the cemetery fence, near Rowe's corner so-called, money to be expended under the direction of an agent, to be appointed by the chair.
- Art 32—To see how much money the town will raise for the purpose of draining, marking the lots and avenues, and drafting of Plans of Riverside Cemetery.
- Art. 33—To see if the town will vote to raise and pay to Benjamin Grant, the sum of Twenty-five dollars, to remove the stone, earth, and bushes on the east side of the road, on the Martin Hill, so-called, to a level with the road bed and back eastward far enough to take in all of the stone and bushes, grading the same to the road bed.
- Art 34—To see if the town will raise a sum of money, and if so, how much, to build a Concrete—Sidewalk from the Sebasticook Hotel, around corner by H. F. Titton's Barber Shop, to a point between the store and residence of Geo. M. Barrows on Main St.
- Art. 35—To see if the town will vote to sell the S. B. Thayer lot, which was bid in for taxes by the inhabitants of said

- town, and if so, when, on what terms, and by whom
- Art. 36—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of twenty-five dollars for the purpose of rebuilding the snow fence at the Martin Hill Railroad Crossing.
- Art. 37—To see how much money the town will raise for the support of the Fire Department
- Art. 38—To see if the town will raise a sum of money, and if so, how much, for the purchase of fence wire to take the place of rail fencing running along our several roads and highways, and as a gift to all owners of such fencing who will remove the same and construct on or near the site of the same a legally built wire fence
- Art 39—To see if the town will raise a sum of money, and if so, how much, to purchase a town clock to be placed in the new church of the Methodist Episcopal Church Society
- Art. 40—To see if the town will vote to abate the taxes assessed as and for the year 1901, upon the following described property to wit, the Planing and Wood Working Mill owned by Wm. W. Pearson and James McFadden, which was destroyed by fire, May 17th, 1901; the farm buildings of Forest A. Wilson, destroyed by fire; and also the taxes assessed against J. E. Hescock for the years 1898& 1899; the taxes assessed against Harry White for the year 1899, the taxes assessed against Mary Ethel White for the year 1899.
- Art 41—To see if the town will vote to abate a portion of the taxes on the Judkins and Gilman Grist Mill property and stock therein, year 1901, and if so, what proportion, the said property destroyed by fire, May 17th, 1901.
- Art. 42 -To see if the town wili vote to raise a sum of money, and if so how much, for the purpose of building an Annex to the Village School Building, constructing the same into suitable rooms for the use of the different school grades therein, as well as the Sub-Primary Grade, now using

the Banquet Room of the Town Hall; provide more suitable heating apparatus; construct a proper sewerage for water closets and properly build said closets and connect the same with the water system of said Village.

The selectmen will be in session at said Town Hall for the purpose of revising the list of voters, at nine o'clock in the forenoon of the day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not to make due return with this warrant with your doings thereon, on or before the day of said meeting.



## LIBRARY REPORT.

The work of the Public Library has increased through this its second year as it did through the first. The average number of books let out each week has increased from 75 to 125. There have been 140 books purchased and some given by Mrs. Oliver Rowe, J. M. Sanborn, Esq., and Mr. Wm. Town. The whole number now reaches 862. The traveling libraries have been sent to East and North Newport as much of the time as anyone could be found to care for them. Reference books have been placed in two school districts and it is hoped this work may be extended as the number of our books increase.

The library is open every Wednesday from 2.30 to 5 and Saturday evening from 6 to 9. The books are loaned under the following rules:

#### Rules.

- 1. Any person of good character, over fourteen years of age, who has been a resident of Newport for three months, is entitled to a card. Each card shall entitle the holder to the home use of one volume at a time under the Library rules.
- 2. Residents of neighboring towns or visitors in Newport may be allowed home use of books by the purchase of a temporary card or the payment of one cent per day. The librarian shall have authority to require of any applicant for a temporary card, a satisfactory reference or a deposit of money, when necessary, for the protection of the library.
- 3. When a card is lost it may be replaced by the payment of two cents.
  - 4. All subscribers are responsible for damage or loss of books.
- 5. Books are not to be loaned out of the family on penalty of one dollar.
- 6. A book may be kept out two weeks. Any person who detains a volume longer than the regulations permit shall pay a fine of two cents for each day of detention.
- 7. All teachers and students in Newport shall be considered residents of the town during term time.
- 8. Books will not be issued to members of households in which a contagious disease is known to exist.

9. No person will be allowed to take a book from the library who appears by the records accountable for a book taken or for a fine imposed.

# School Committee's Report.

## Free High School.

Prof. E. P. Dyer has completed his third year as principal of the high school. Through his efforts several pupils have come in from other towns, and are well satisfied with the amount and quality of the work accomplished. Owing to sickness Prof. Dyer was unable to keep but eleven weeks of the winter term. It is expected, however, that the full amount of work will be made up in the spring by a little extra hard study.

Length of terms, 12 weeks. Spring term—whole number pupils, 24; average, 22; visitors, 15. Fall term—whole number pupils, 24; average, 22; visitors, 48. Winter term—whole number pupils, 24; average, 22; visitors, 8. Wages of principal, \$70.61 per month.

### Common Schools.

Village Schools.

#### GRAMMAR GRADE.

The Grammar School has been under the instruction of Miss Eva M. Hilton, who is a teacher of wide experience, having taught many terms in this and adjoining towns. This school is progressing finely, and is setting a good standard for the rural districts. Those who were present on the parents' days can judge for themselves as to the quality of the work.

Length of terms—12 weeks. Spring term—number of pupils, 31; average, 23; visitors, 1. Fall term—number of pupils, 33; average, 31; visitors, 25. Winter term—number of pupils, 34; average, 30; visitors, 4. Wages of teacher, \$7.50 per week.

#### INTERMEDIATE GRADE.

This grade has been taught throughout the year by Miss Flora A. Boyd. Little need be said about this school, as all are acquainted with Miss Boyd's success as a teacher. The required amount of work has been accomplished and most of the scholars will be able to go on with their classes.

Length of terms—12 weeks. Spring term—whole number of scholars, 32; average, 29; visitors, 17. Fall term—whole number of scholars, 40; average, 36; visitors, 16. Winter term—whole number of scholars, 38; average, 34; visitors, 4. Wages of teacher, per week, \$7.50.

### PRIMARY GRADE.

This is one of the hardest grades of our schools, but has been handled very successfully by Mrs. Merrill. The school has been better supplied this year with charts and apparatus, making the work much easier and more profitable. We would have been glad to have seen more of the parents visit the school, as it has been somewhat neglected in this line.

Length of terms—12 weeks. Spring term—whole number of scholars, 43; average, 37; visitors, 1. Fall term—number of scholars, 41; average, 37; visitors, 12. Winter term—number of scholars, 41; average, 34; visitors, 10. Wages of teacher per week, \$7.50.

#### SUB. PRIMARY.

The first four weeks of the spring term was taught by Mrs. L. M. P. Dickey. The term was finished by Mrs. P. S. Littlefield. The fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Addie Miles. It is to be regretted that Miss Miles could not have had the school throughout the year (but owing to sickness it was impossible) as she is especially adapted and trained for this grade of work. Considering the place in which Miss Miles has to work, and what she has to do with, the school has accomplished a great amount of work.

Length of terms, 10 weeks. Spring term—whole number of pupils, 32; average, 28; visitors, 15. Fall term—whole number of scholars, 28; average, 20; visitors, 12. Winter term—whole number of scholars, 31; average, 25; visitors, 15. Wages of teacher, \$6.50 per week.

#### Rural Schools.

#### BILLINGS HILL.

Miss Mary Eldena Pratt of North Newport has had charge of this school for the past year. Miss Pratt is a teacher of several years' experience and possesses a great amount of tact and ability. She has



never taught in town before but has certainly done credit to herself and the school. She has conformed to the course of study as far as possible with marked results. Good will has been maintained on the part of the pupils and parents throughout the year. This is one of the surest proofs of a successful school.

Length of term, 12 weeks. Spring term,—whole number of pupils, 23; average, 17; visitors, 3. Fall term,—whole number pupils, 24; average, 19; visitors, 5. Winter term,—whole number pupils, 25; average, 20; visitors, 15. Wages of teacher, per week, \$7.50.

### NORTH NEWPORT.

This school has been taught by Miss Arrie L. Pratt, a well-known teacher, and one who has always met with the best of success. This year's work has been an exceptionally good one, from the fact that there has been little sickness and good attendance. The school is making rapid progress and is well graded.

Length of terms, 12 weeks. Spring term,—whole number of pupils, 22; average, 19; visitors, 6. Fall term,—whole number of pupils, 21; average, 17; visitors, 10. Winter term,—whole number of pupils, 20; average, 16; visitors, 8.

#### GILMAN DISTRICT.

This school was taught the entire year by Mrs. L. B. Foley of Palmyra. Mrs. Foley has had a wide experience and is a hard-working and painstaking teacher. Although this school is small, it has done a good amount of work and is well graded.

Length of terms, 12 weeks. Spring term,—whole number of pupils, 13; average, 11; visitors, 15. Fall term,—whole number of pupils, 12; average, 10; visitors, 9. Winter term,—whole number of pupils, 8; average, 7; visitors, 5. Wages of teacher, per week, \$6.50.


With the exception of the Sub Primary school there have been no changes in the teachers for the past year. I think this is the quickest and surest way of raising the standard of the schools to its proper level.

The thirty-six week school year, although criticised by some, has proven a great success, and I trust the custom will be followed. The cost of running the schools for the past year is somewhat larger than

the year previous, owing to the fact that the North Newport school was not closed up at the time of our last report, and no orders were paid in that part of the town for the winter term. A greater interest has been shown in the schools during the past year, as may be seen by the number of visitors. This is highly gratifying to the teachers as well as to myself.
