For these reasons we feel that the entire sum as shown by this report is not fairly chargeable to the poor account of this year, but we include it all in the sum total of pauper expenses.

# Report of the Board of Health.

The report of the Board of Health for the year 1905 must necessarily consist largely of "Congratulations" and "Recommendations."

The town has been comparatively free from contagious diseases with the exception of Measles, with a few scattering cases of Chicken Pox. No Typhoid fever cases were reported to the Board of Health and only a few cases of Tuberculosis.

No Small Pox has appeared this year and no Diphtheria. Few cases of nuisance were reported and those which were called to the attention of the Board were attended to in so far as our powers lay.

The commencement of the sewer system marked the entrance of a period of unusual good health in the village. Before that time Typhoid Fever and the germentative bowel complaints were of common occurrence, while for almost three years we have been practically free from those diseases. This is an absolute demonstration of the facts to which we have so frequently referred in our reports of previous years and should be a source of encouragement to the friends of "sewerage" and should convert its opponents if there are any.

Nature has done so much for the town of Bethel in providing good water and natural drainage with unusually clean light soil that it leaves but little to be done by the inhabitants in order to be almost free from all diseases caused by

stagnation and filth and if the people allow their cupidity and negligence to result in the occurrence of these diseases they have only themselves to blame for it.

A few more of the shorter side streets remain which should receive the benefit—so much enjoyed by that part of the village already covered—and we trust that the needed appropriations will be forthcoming at the regular town meeting.

We urge again, as in former years, special attention to drainage of cellars, cess pools and farm-yards. See that all surface waters are led off by proper ditches and not allowed to enter wells and springs. Enough may be saved in "doctor's bills" to pay the "tax collector."

We recommended special care to parents in cases of illness of an uncertain nature at the outset but which may later prove to be one of the contagious diseases. Avoid exposing other children and spreading an epidemic which almost stops a school in the middle of the term. "Your room is more to be desired than your company."

The presence of this kind of disease at the beginning of a school year costs the town a good deal in money unwisely expended in as much as the school still continues at the usual rate of expenditure while those who should be receiving the benefit are detained at home with an illness which could have been avoided.

- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for the support of the poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for town officers.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for miscellaneous expenses.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to pay on the town debt and interest.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to extend the sewer system.
- Art. 26. To see how much money the town will appropriate for the permanent improvement of the State road.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to accept the deed of land given by E. S. Kilborn and A. F. Copeland for a street leading from Chapman street to Vernon street in Bethel village subject to the conditions named within.
- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to extend and repair sidewalks at Bethel and West Bethel.
- Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to maintain for the ensuing year schools at Bird Hill, Swan's Hill and Middle Intervale.
- Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to Brown Post No. 84, G. A. R., for the proper observance of Memorial Day.

- Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise to grade Capen Hill and cover sand on Middle Intervale road.
- Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the selectmen, clerk and treasurer.
