

# Town Warrant

#### State of Maine

#### PENOBSCOT, SS.

#### To D. E. Larrabee, Constable of the town of Newport, in the County of Penobscot. GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Newport aforesaid, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town hall, so called, in said town, on Monday the fourth day of March, A. D. 1912, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1 To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2 To choose a Town Clerk for the year ensuing.
- Art. 3 To hear all reports made at said meeting and act upon the same.
- Art. 4 To choose three or more Selectmen.
- Art. 5 To choose three or more Overseers of the Poor.
- Art. 6 To choose three or more Assessors.
- Art. 7 To choose a Town Agent.
- Art. 8 To choose a Town Treasurer.
- Art. 9 To choose a member, or members, of the Superintending School Committee.
- Art. 10 To choose three or more persons to enforce town ordinances.
- Art. 11 To choose a Chief Engineer, and Assistants, of the Fire Department.
- Art. 12 To choose Sextons for the various cemeteries in town.
- Art. 13 To choose one or more Road Commissioners, not exceeding three, and to determine their per diem compensation, as well as laborers and horses on the highway.
- Art. 14 To choose all remaining town officers required or permitted to be chosen at the Annual Town

Meeting, excepting a Collector of taxes, and to determine how many, if any, of the said town officers shall be appointed by the Selectmen.

To see if the town will determine when its tax list Art. 15 for 1912 shall be committed for collection; also, when taxes thus committed must be paid, and what instructions, if any, it will give relative to Also to see what conditions it will the same. impose upon the Collector relative to settlement with the town and to receive bids and proposals for the collecting of the taxes for the ensuing year on such terms and conditions as may thus be determined.

- To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year. Art. 16
- Art. 17 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, to pay town charges and contract obligations.
- Art. 18 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, to apply on debt and interest account.
- To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, Art. 19 how much, for the support of poor outside of the town farm.
- Art. 20 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, to make, construct and repair highways, bridges, ways, crosswalks and sidewalks in said town, and determine how and by whom the same shall be expended, and what shall be the per diem compensation of laborers and horses thus employed.
- To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon Art. 21 the adoption of the provisions of chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907, as amended by chapter 69, Pulbic Laws of 1909, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to state aid for highways for the year 1912.
- To see if the town will raise and appropriate, in Art. 22 addition to the amounts regularly raised and

appropriated for the care of ways, highways and bridges, such sum, not exceeding \$450.00, as is contemplated and directed by law for the building of State Roads, so called, agreeably to the provisions of chapter 112 of Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by chapter 69 Public Laws of 1909; or what action it will take relative to the same.

- Art. 23 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for the use and maintenance of Newport Fire Department for the ensuing year, and whom it will authorize to expend the same.
- Art. 24 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the support of common schools.
- Art. 25 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so how much, for the maintenance of a Free High School.
- Art. 26 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the purchase of school text books.
- Art. 27 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the purchase of school supplies and apparatus.
- Art. 23 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for school house repairs.
- Art. 29 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for the purchase of books and to pay the running expenses of the Free Public Library.
- Art. 30 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for aid to the G. A. R. Post in Memorial Day observance.
- Art. 31 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, to hire a night watchman for Newport Village for the year commencing April 1st, 1912; said watchman to perform the duties as heretofore required, or such as may be prescribed and required.
- Art. 32 To see if the town will vote a sum of money, if so, how much as a salary for Supt. of Schools.

- Art. 33 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, to finish the fill at the foot of Jenkins' hill.
- Art. 34 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, to repair or make permanent road on the North County road so called. The same to be located and built under the direction of Road Commissioner.
- Art. 35 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to purchase a sidewalk snow plough.
- Art. 36 To see if the town will vote to build a sidewalk on Water street from the Croxford block to the Town Hall building.
- Art. 37 To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer or public drain beginning at a point on High street opposite the Sargent property, running Southerly to Middle street thence down Middle Street to Shaw Street to connect with the sewer at that point, if so, what sum of money it will raise for the same.
- To see if the town will vote to construct a sewer Art. 38 or public drain, beginning at the sewer on Elm street, thence running easterly on land of M. C. R. R. Co., to land of F. E. Adams, thence north easterly crossing land of said Adams and Robert Palmer to Adams street so called, thence northly on Adams street and across Park Ave. to Rowe street so called, thence northerly along Rowe St. to a point near the residence of Thomas Barnes, and beginning at a point near the residence of Miles B. White on Park Ave. running easterly connecting with the above mentioned sewer, and beginning at a point near residence of C. I. Libby on Park Ave. running westerly along said Ave. connecting with the above mentioned sewer.
- Art. 39 To see if the town will vote to enter into a contract with the Newport Light and Power Co. for a term of years for street lights, and appropriate and

raise sums of money in payment therefor during said term, and whom it will authorize to execute such contract on the behalf of the town, or what action it will take in relation to the subject matter of this article.

- Art. 40 To see if the town will vote to locate and pay for 3 street lights on Grove St. one near the Cemetery, one near the residence of Mrs. Lura Corey, one near residence of Chas. D. Katen
- Art. 41 To see if the town will vote to locate and pay for a St. light near the east end of the upper bridge
- Art. 42 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, for repairs and furnishings to the town farm buildings, and whom it will authorize to expend the money thus raised.
- Art. 43 To see if the town will vote to contract with the Newport Water Co. for an additional hydrant for fire purposes, same to be located on Park Avenue near the east line of land of Frank Hoyt.
- Art. 44 To see if the town will vote to contract with the Newport Water Co. for an additional hydrant for fire purposes to be located on the St. leading from Spring St. to the Corn Factory.
- Art. 45 To see if the town will vote to abate the tax assessed against the property of Mrs. Rose Marsh for the year 1911.
- Art. 46 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much to paint the lower bridge in Newport village and all other bridges that need painting.
- Art. 47 To see if the town will vote to accept the street in Lakeview Park known as Bangor Ave.
- Art. 48 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of three hundred dollars to make a fill at the foot of Seavey and Caverly hill so known in North Newport. The same to be expended under the direction of the Road Commissioner.
- Art. 49 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for the purchase of wire fencing to be

substituted for existing fences along the town highways at such points as may be deemed by the selectmen to be of advantage to the town.

- Art. 50 To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money if so, how much, to purchase some suitable and appropriate metal markers for the graves of each and every soldier, sailor and marine who served with honor in the forces of the U. S., buried within the limits of township, to be placed on the graves of such soldiers for the purpose of permanently marking and distinguishing said graves for Memorial purposes.
- Art. 51 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money if so, how much, to build concrete or other sidewalks, and whom it will authorize to expend the same.

The selectmen will be in session at said town hall for the purpose of revising the list of voters in said town at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not to make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon, on or before the day and hour of said meeting.

# Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the citizens of Newport:

I hereby present my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools of the town of Newport for the fiscal year ending February 1, 1912.

#### High School

The High school was under the instruction of Mr.JohnT. Wadsworth of Gardiner, as Principal, and Miss Emily I. Mitchell of Newport as Assistant, during the spring term. At the opening of the fall term Mr. Leroy W. Ames of Bangor was elected Principal, and Miss Katherine M. Parsons of Auburn Assistant. Miss Parsons tendered her resignation at the close of the fall term and Miss Annie M. Fillmore of Charleston was elected to fill the vacancy.

The registration of the year was twenty-four (24). This is two less than the average for the preceding year. At the opening of the fall term a few of the students left the school to enter other institutions. A few others have dropped out of school work entirely.

At the opening of the fall term a new course of study was adopted which has received the approval of the State Superintendent of Public Schools, and which seems to meet the needs of the school at the present time so far as possible with the limited teaching force. This course of study carries two branches of work: The College Preparatory and the English Scientific. Each of these courses requires diligent work on the part of the students. The College Preparatory fitting the student to enter colleges accepting students from Standard High schools on the approved list for New England, and the English Scientific course fitting students with a general knowledge of the English branches, particularly those who do not intend to enter college.

During the year the laboratory has been placed in order, a

table having been constructed which provides ample room for individual work on the part of the students in experimental work, and the room has been supplied with water and wired for electricity. New apparatus has been purchased for the chemical department and the students are now required to do individual work. Some physical apparatus will have to be purchased during the coming year for individual work.

Attention is again called to the fact that the school is greatly in need of reference works for use in the school room. The school is already supplied with an encyclopedia, but works in history, literature, etc., are greatly needed. It has been impossible to supply them from the appropriation for text books owing to the fact that this appropriation has been used to supply the general texts. It is hoped that the same arrangement can be made this year as was made last year and the books supplied through the Public Library.

The students have done good work throughout the school year and the general standard of the school has been materially improved for which our thanks are due the instructors who have labored diligently to make their work successful.

To make this school the success that it should be requires a united cooperative spirit on the part of all the parents who have students in the institution as well as the parents of those children in the grades who later will become students in the school.

• The school has been continued on the approved list of Standard High Schools for Maine and also on the list of the College Entrance Examining Board for New England.

## Village Schools

These schools have been under the instruction of the same teachers as last year. Miss Mina S. Soper in the eighth and ninth grades, Mrs. Aroline L. Greenway in the sixth and seventh grades, Miss Clara E. Redman in the fourth and fifth grades, Mrs. Bessie R. Weymouth in the second and third grades and Miss Harriette Fenderson in the Sub-primary and first grades.

## **Rural Schools**

The school in the Hubbard district was under the instruction of Miss Lou M. Knowlton during the spring term.

The fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Myrtie S. Goss. In the Coburn district Miss Edith R. Wingate had charge of the school throughout the year. The school in the Gilman district was taught during the spring term by Miss Geneva Richmond, the fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Mary L. Tardy. In the East Newport district the spring term was taught by Miss Ullie Eggleston, the fall term by Miss Bernice Babcock and the winter term by Miss Bessie A. D. Morrison.

#### Teachers

The teachers of the village schools have carried on the work in a very satisfactory manner during the past year. They have been conscientious in their efforts and have striven hard to make their work successful. There is no question in the fact that more and better work can be done by teachers who are retained in our schools from year to year. Their influence is broader over the pupils who come under their instruction, and the schools run much smoother than where there is a constant change of instructors.

In most cases the work of the rural teachers has been satisfactory. There have been a few instances of criticism by the parents of the work in the school room of some of our rural teachers. When these teachers were engaged for the schools we had every reason to believe their work would be successful. In the instances where this has happened the teachers have had special training before entering our schools. This leads us to believe, to some extent at least, that the more modern methods of instruction have not met with the approval of some of the parents. Some criticism may have been justified, but much is not, and if the parents would visit the schools while they are in session and observe the children in their work a much more cordial spirit would be built up between the parents and teachers. This would obivate many misunderstandings that are bound to arise when the schools are observed from the point of view that has nothing to do with their inside workings.

Another matter that we wish to call to the attention of many parents is the indifference many manifest toward punctual attendance of their children in the school room. The most of the tardiness and absence of pupils during the past year has been due to the parents. Many children have been kept out of school without good reason and consequently have fallen behind those pupils whose parents have been more careful about the attendance of their children. The teachers have been blamed to a certain extent for this retardation of the pupil when in fact no blame whatever can be attached to There have been one or two cases where parents them. have sustained their children in objecting to do the required This method if persisted in will only tend toward a work. harmful injury of the child in his future life. If parents would realize that these things may mean the difference between the success or failure of the child in the future I think they would be more careful.

## CONVEYANCE

The same teams for the conveyance of pupils has been maintained as formerly, a team from the Rutland district, to the Coburn Corner district, one in the Gilman district, one in East Newport and one in the village.

## COURSE OF STUDY

The same course of study has been maintained during the past year that was established one year ago. A few additions have been made to the work and it seems as if this course is meeting our expections in having a basal system upon which to carry on the work. The better understanding of the work was clearly manifest in the better standing of the pupils in the examinations at the close of the spring term and particularly in the work of "the class entering the Highschool. This course is maintained in all our schools through out the town.

Attention is again called to the fact that we should have

instruction in music and drawing in our schools. It is useless to attempt to carry on this work in a systematic manner without the services of a special instructor. Many of the pupils have talent in these subjects which should receive development while interest on the part of many others could be aroused to develope the accuracy of the ear and hand. Now that we have a good working course of study we could add these courses without material conflict and to the parents we must look for the support to maintain this work.

## BOOKS

No changes have been made in the books during the past year. It has been necessary to purchase quite a large number of books to supply the schools and some supplementary work has been put in the schools. The Ward System of Phonetic Reading has been introduced into the Sub-primary school and Frye's Home Geography has been introduced into the fourth grade. It is believed these subjects will strengthen the work of the younger pupils. A large number of books have been purchased for the High school particularly in the required work in English.

#### SUPPLIES

The same general supplies have been purchased as formerly. Globes, maps and charts are still needed in some of our schools and should be provided during the coming year We have not felt justified in making the expenditure during the past year owing to the amount of expenditures required for the general supplies.

## **BUILDINGS**

During the year 1910 the present High school building was thoroughly reconstructed. The High school occupies the second floor, with a main study room, two commodious recitation rooms and a well equipped physical and chemical laboratory. The first floor is occupied by the sixth, seventh eight and ninth grades, and also has a room for the use of the teachers. The new building which was under construction at the same time was not occupied for school purposes until the spring term 1911. This building is occupied by the Sub-primary, first, second, third, fourth and fifth grades. There is also one unoccupied room on the second floor which can be utilized should any of the other rooms become overcrowded. On this floor is a teachers room and a stock room. On each floor are toilet rooms and the basements are

crowded. On this floor is a teachers room and a stock room. On each floor are toilet rooms and the basements are equipped with modern, sanitary toilet equipment. The building is heated with a modern equipment of steam and hot air furnaces that insures good ventilation in the several rooms at all times. These buildings have both been fitted to meet the needs of the pupils for years to come and have been constructed with that purpose in view. The grounds about the buildings have been graded during the past year and it will be but a short time before Newport will have its school buildings occupying as beautiful grounds as any municipality in the State. Extensive repairs have been made on the building at East Newport by raising the building and constructing a stone and concrete foundation beneath. New windows and new doors have been placed in the building and also new blackboards. This building needs to be painted and new seats are needed. The building at Coburn's Corner needs to be shingled and new seats should be provid-The shed in this district needs extensive repairs. ed.

## CONCLUSION

The schools have been in session the same number of weeks as during the previous year. Thirty-three weeks in the rural schools and in grades, four, five, six and seven; thirty weeks in the Sub-primary, first, second and third grades and thirty-six weeks in the eighth and ninth grades, and the High School.

For the financial report of the School Department reference is made to the report of the Selectmen.

They have each sought to make the best of their opportunities and I feel that our schools have profited generally by their efforts for the improvement of conditions.

My thanks are due the citizens for their kind cooperation in carrying on the work, and I am also grateful to the Superintending School Committee for assistance and counsel rendered by them.
