

School Report

To The Citizens of Islesboro:

We take pleasure in reporting a profitable school year. We have been able to continue the grade schools for thirty-six weeks this fiscal year. This is a great improvement over conditions as they existed years ago when we had less than thirty weeks in these same schools.

Eleven pupils from the Dark Harbor school entered the High School this last fall thus materially affecting the size of the grammar school, so much so that it seemed wise to unite the Grammar and Primary schools. All of the grade schools in town are small and much better work could be done at less expense if more of them could be consolidated.

Many permanent repairs have been made this year but other things remain to be done outside of the usual wear and tear of buildings, inside and outside.

The expense of heating and caring for school rooms has greatly increased and these with the other ordinary school expenses will fully require all the appropriations asked for by your committee who unite in recommending the following sums for the ensuing year.

School Committee.

Superintendent's Report

To The School Committee of Islesboro:

I herewith submit my annual report for the schools of Islesboro.

Our teaching force has been of excellent quality and practically all of the teachers have remained in the schools for the entire year, that is, from September to June—the school year. In their reports to me they all state that the pupils, with a few exceptions, have shown interest in their work and have accomplished the required limits. They also report certain needs in their respective school rooms; these will be referred to the superintending school committee. The report of the Creek School is given in full as certain conditions therein described are typical of other schools. In this school there are four grades and a primer class—twenty pupils in all.

REPAIRS.

All the school houses are in good condition, generally speaking. A great improvement has been made in the Creek schoolhouse. A new underpinning, a toilet opening from the school room and other minor repairs. To the Dark Harbor school room has been added a toilet and new hooks in the en-

try. The Ryder school with its two new windows in the back of the room, new paint and paper and new toilets, is much improved. A new doorstep is much needed here also at the Parker school house. The Pendleton Grammar school has had a much needed book closet built and the Primary room needs one too, for during the vacation there is no place to store the books. The High School needs a new system of heating and new toilet rooms.

Nearly all the blackboards in town need paint—some rooms need paper and paint. Glass needs to be set in windows—dampers in stove pipes—fasteners on doors inside and outside. These things are perhaps little in themselves but they mean much to the comfort of teacher and pupil. Repairs of this kind cannot be made once, to last through the year; they are constantly coming up as many a member of the school committee can testify as he realizes that his position means the giving of much of his time while possibly receiving scanty appreciation from the town in general.

The Dark Harbor school gave an entertainment in December thus earning money to buy a covered water tank with faucet thus improving sanitary conditions. This is a good example for other schools to follow.

MANUAL TRAINING.

Manual training has been discontinued during the past year and the benches, tools and sewing machines have been stored in the High School building. I wish the parents would consider a plan of having this work again introduced into the schools at some future time. In order to save the pupils coming the long distance to a central place the work could be carried on in each school by having one or two benches put in each room. A local carpenter could instruct the boys and a local dressmaker could visit each school once a week to instruct the girls in sewing. This would save much time on the part of the pupils. The school board feel that this move must come from the parents if it is to be a success.

Books.

The appropriation for books has been over run this year but it is not surprising for in the first place the entering class in the High School for two years has been much larger than usual and more books were required. This fact taken in consideration with the general wearing out of books and necessary replacement means that some money must be spent, more money than usual; but instead of having more, the appropriation was cut down one hundred dollars from the previous year. No doubt pupils are careless with their books but the parents have a duty in that respect, as well as the teacher, and before criticizing others should look carefully to their own household.

HIGH SCHOOL.

TO MRS. INEZ M. PENDLETON, Superintendent of Schools:-

More than the usual number of problems have confronted your teachers this year. These have been met with the determination to maintain the honor of the school and to establish the right.

At the beginning of the fall term, seventeen pupils entered making an enrollment of thirty-nine, thirty-six regular and three special students.

The initiation of the freshmen into the Sigma Iota Sigma was conducted with the usual amount of fun. The meetings have been well attended but for several reasons they have been postponed for a while.

In the early fall our school was visited by the State Inspector, Mr. Taylor. In considering the general equipment, few things were found to be criticized. He did, however, refer to the condition of the toilets. He spoke particularly of the lack of proper privacy and we hope that these conditions may be improved in the near future. Owing to the mild winter it has been fairly comfortable but in a severe winter the heating apparatus is not adequate for the size of the room. The modern heating arrangement where the stove is inclosed in a sheet iron jacket would be most desirable for the school.

At the end of the seventh week of school, Miss Tuttle was released to accept a higher position in Willimantic, Connecticut. We were extremely fortunate in obtaining a man of Mr. Rodick's education and ability to take her place.

After much experience, the educators of the state have formed a code of laws by which the athletics of the leading preparatory schools are governed. In organizing our Athletic Association, we thought we could do no better than to adopt these state rules. As these rules caused dissatisfaction among the students, the faculty thought best to discontinue all athletics connected with the school.

Music is forming a very enjoyable part of our school work. Students and teachers alike wish that it might be continued next year.

An important branch of our work is the school paper, "The Islesboro Argonaut." The paper cost a large amount of time, labor and money. Without the support of the towns people it cannot be maintained. Let me urge everyone to buy this paper.

CREEK SCHOOL.

To Mrs. Inez M. Pendleton, Superintendent of Schools:-

The progress of the pupils of the Creek school has, on the whole, been a little slow. However, good interest has been shown in History and Geography, and the pupils have made

good progress in those studies. Of Arithmetic and Grammar not so much can be said. The first half year has been spent mostly in reviewing and drilling on fundamentals, with only an occasional step in advance.

A radical change was made in the program, giving more time to the two upper grades. This was naturally at the expense of the lower grades, whose classes are now held all in the morning session, but it must be borne in mind that in two years the lower grades will have the school all to themselves. The improved work of the upper grades has justified the change.

I would like to urge upon the parents the necessity of co-operation with the teacher in encouraging home study. (I would pause here to say that encouragement is far better in most cases than compulsion.) The pupils who study at home can not be kept back with the less industrious ones.

Once in a while the leaders, in singing in certain schools seem to all go out at the same time, which has been the case at Dark Harbor this year and only having **one** lesson where they absolutely needed **two** naturally they have not progressed as much as we would have liked.

The Pendleton Grammar school is doing good work, and is very much interested. The Primary School is nearly all boys, and it would be worth one's time to come in and hear them sing. A year ago they could hardly read in the Key of C., while now they read in nearly all the keys, and do it well.

The High School is doing fairly well, and if the pupils tried a little more, we could have a fine chorus.

Miss Draper is expecting that the Town will help along this line the coming year, and who of us can say that it is not necessary that our children have a little music in their daily lives.

Library Report

To THE LIBRARY COMMITTEE:-

The Library has now 2990 books accessioned and there are many State Reports which we do not put on the accession book, making a total of about 3150 volumes.

We have just purchased several very interesting books, including a 1914 War Manual, books on Belgium, Turkey, Arabia, and several other histories besides a number of pleasing novels. With our new set of books on South America we feel ready to furnish material for anyone on any subject.

What we now lack is room and room we must have if we are to continue our work in the coming years. We have absolutely no place for more books. If the two Branch Libraries were to return their books without taking others to replace them we should have to pile them on the floor for every available space has been utilized. In the juvenile room and also in the main room we have used Library tables on which are put the latest and most popular books. We have even used the wood room and had shelves put there and have filled those. There is no room for more.

It seems if our leading men of the Town would call on us some afternoon when the Library is open and see the different ones who are using books and look at our shelves filled, that they would do more to enthuse the men to vote for a Library building. We trust in the coming election they may do something for us along that line.

Those who have seen the High School students call when they come from school each after a certain book—not the latest novels as you may suppose—but some of Dickens, Thackeray, Scott, Cooper, Irving and have waited to find after they have gone, all of Cooper's and the greater part of Dickens' works have been taken as they were one afternoon recently, must realize that our Library is a great success.

Several books have been presented this year by Mr. F. S. Jones, Miss Johnson, Miss Forbes, Dorothy Creamer, Mr. Walter Fuller and Mrs. M. P. Pendleton.

In our September inventory we found every book that was listed on our accession book with the exception of three.

The circulation this year has been greater than in any previous year.

Even if you do not wish to read a book we have magazines to interest everyone from a child to an adult.

We invite everyone to call.

REPORT OF LIBRARY COMMITTEE.

TO THE SELECTMEN OF ISLESBORO:-

The Maine State Legislature in 1915 passed a law which we read of in the "Revised Statutes of Maine 1915," whereby any town, may appropriate any sum of money, for a library building. The Library Committee has been waiting for some time for this law, and is glad to see it at last. We therefore in the spirit of necessity, for it is what the town needs, and in the spirit of appreciation, for we know you are going to give us that which we ask, approach the subject of a building.

First of all, we ask for an appropriation of not less than \$1,000.00 to go toward a library building.

Second, we ask for a Building Committee to be appointed; such Com. might find the Selectmen, the Library Com. and the Supt. of Schools a helpful advisory Com.

Concerning the first request the Building! some money in the treasury for this purpose, a matter of two or three hundred dollars, and we would not expect on an appropriation of \$1,000 to complete the building. furnishings could wait while we used the old. We advise building the main wing, say 26x36 ft. in one large room. Such a building put up in the old style lines, similar to the renovated golf-link house, better known as the old Ames' homestead, would represent to our younger folks of today and of tomorrow the best style in their grandfather's homes, and would be in keeping with the town of today, and the town of tomorrow. With walls, wood-work, furnishings, and all, one color, preferably light, a restful effect is obtained. with the long low windows of small panes and an old fashioned fire-place in one corner, an attractive room is gained. one central door with side lights and the light green fan surmounting it, is also in keeping with this style. The building should of course be painted white with light green shutters. Then another year or perhaps after we have a permanent "Branch Home" up the Island, we shall ask for a second appropriation to put on a wing for the children's room or for Just now small libraries do not divide the reference room. the room except by railings.

Concerning our second request—the appointment of a Building Committee. We might suggest the names of Messrs. E. M. Tehan, D. M. Pendleton, Arthur Hatch, Alpheus Pendleton, and L. N. Gilkey.

These men know this style of building to perfection and I believe can make \$1,000 look like \$2,000, or \$1,500 nearer \$2,500. We might suggest also Mrs. Isaac Burgess as treasurer of this Building Fund, as she has been of the Voluntary Fund, or if not she, then Mr. Harold Pendleton. You see we want everyone to do something for the cause.

Educationally we have wonderful opportunities.

Some one has said it is an education to be able to classify books.

But taking the place of the lecture, the concert, the theatre, the "movies," and the various other forms of entertainment and instruction found in town life, we look to the library to fill these wants. Not long ago, one of the leading citizens of our town, was asked to make out a list of books, showing what he thought the library lacked. He sent in the list, but without looking over what we already had—for in the 50 vols. listed, the library had them all but two volumes. "Acres of Diamonds" one vol. on the list, had been recently purchased. And now please don't say you wish such and such a book was in the library. If you want it and say so, and it's any good, you may have it. Naturally we do not have a large amount to spend on new fiction. We have but one thing to say to our readers; do not keep out a new book several weeks when you know a half dozen people are waiting for it.
