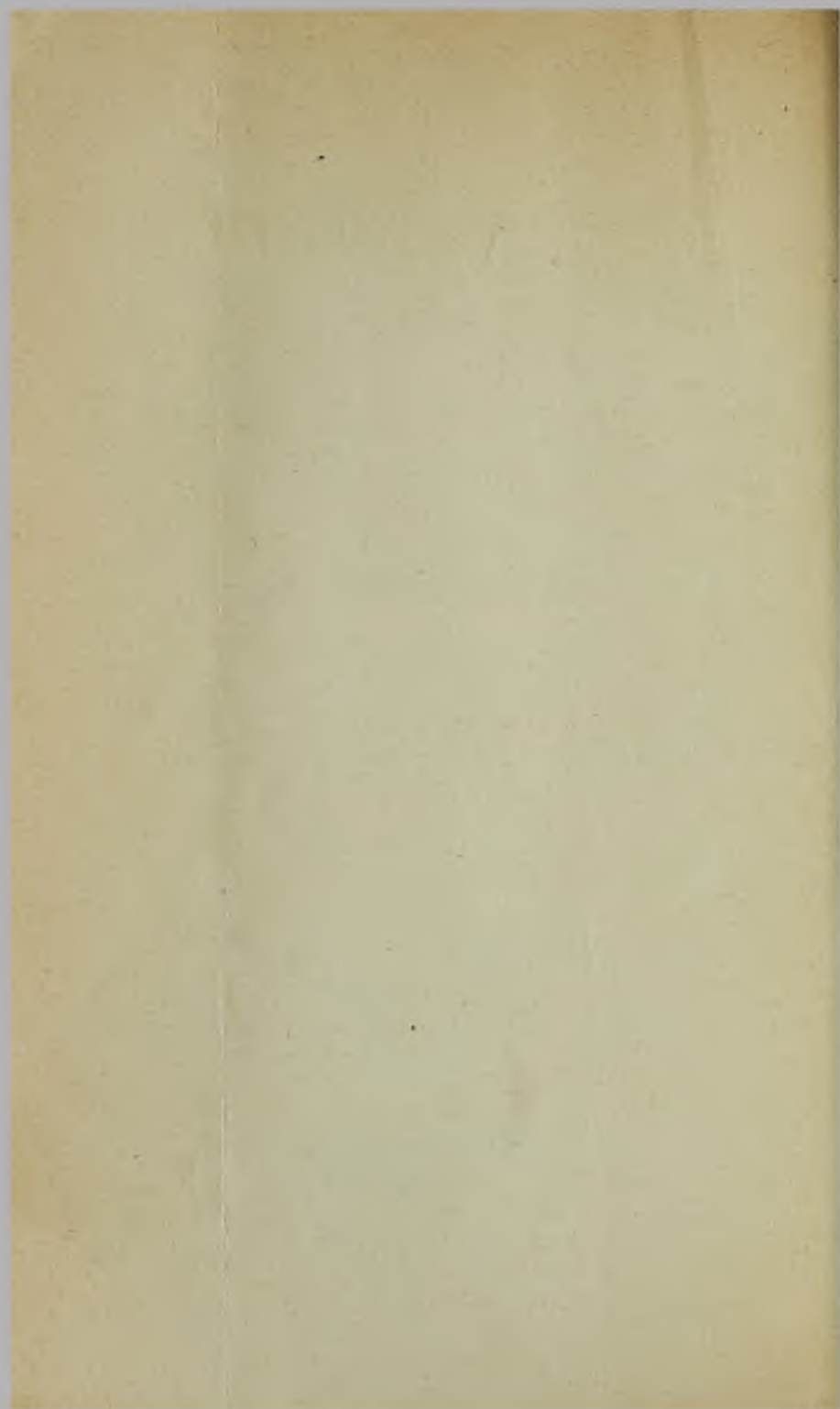

# Report of the Superintendent of Schools.

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The school year just brought to a close has been, on the whole, profitable and successful. The same number of schools have been maintained as a year ago, with an added week on the winter term, making thirty-two weeks for the year.

Four of our teachers have been new to the work, being recent graduates, three of them from the Academy and one from the Wiscasset High School. Only two of our teachers have been in the same school for the entire year, and these have been the village teachers. I have only words of commendation for these earnest young women who have done their best for their scholars. A large class passed from the village school to the Academy in the fall, and four scholars from the other districts.

Few changes have been made in the school books. New grammars have been put into the village schools which have proved to be a decided improvement over those that have been used. I would suggest that in the coming year the change be made throughout the entire town. A cabinet of wall maps has been put into the school at North Newcastle, and one is very much needed in the primary school at Newcastle. Nineteen different teachers have been employed during the year, at an average wage of \$7.62 per week. There have been thirty-two weeks of school in all but two districts. In several of the schools an attempt has

been made to teach the rudiments of music. Taking the schools in the order of their number I wish to submit the following report:

#### NO. 1, RIVER ROAD.

This little school which did such good work last year has fully maintained its high standard for this year. Miss Henrietta Palmer who conducted the work so successfully last year was in charge of the spring term and did most creditable service to the school. The attendance was good and the scholars were interested. The fall and winter term were in charge of Miss Lillian Nash. This was Miss Nash's first experience. She has however, shown the qualities of a thorough teacher. The interest has been sustained and the instruction has been thorough.

One scholar from this school entered the Academy in the fall. The removal of one of the largest families from the district makes it advisable to close the school again and transport the few scholars to the village school.

#### NO. 2, GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

Miss Beulah Holden who was in charge all of last year has been at her post for the whole of this year, and the school and teacher have shown progress. Miss Holden is a growing teacher and her work in the schoolroom shows it. A successful effort has been made this year to secure some needed reference books for the use of the school to which town money appropriated for school books could not be applied. Thirty-six dollars was earned and expended in this way which adds much to the equipment of the school. The teacher and scholars have also raised money for an oak bookcase with glass doors. It is sincerely to be hoped that the same teacher will be continued for the coming year.

### NO. 3, THE MILLS SCHOOL.

The spring term was taught by Miss Margaret Sawyer, a young woman of training and experience; and a successful term was conducted. There was much sickness and the attendance for a part of the time was small.

The fall and winter terms were in charge of Miss Olive Blagdon, a recent graduate of the Wiscasset High School. Miss Blagdon won the confidence and esteem of scholars and parents, and the work in the schoolroom has been highly satisfactory.

### NO. 4, THE POND ROAD SCHOOL.

Miss Florence Tomlinson was in charge of the spring term. Miss Jeanette Hysom, a recent graduate of the Academy, taught the fall term and Miss Cora McLain the winter term. As a year ago we have had a new teacher for each term which has been unfortunate. Miss Tomlinson brought to her work several years of experience and made a fairly good showing for the time and effort spent. Miss McLain had only seven scholars enrolled, all boys but one. I have only the highest words of commendation for her as a teacher, and excellent work was done. The removal of one of the families, taking away four of the scholars and one of the older boys leaving school, reduces the attendance below the number required for a legal school. It is for the town to decide whether or not the school shall be continued.

### NO. 5, THE VILLAGE PRIMARY SCHOOL.

Miss Elizabeth Mitchell who has been teacher of this school for several years has done good work as usual. The attendance has been less this year than in the past year as a number have been transferred to the grammar school and there have been few to take their places. The instruction



has been systematic and pains-taking, and whenever the superintendent has visited the school he has found it and the children busy at their tasks. The children's commendable and successful effort in the spring to raise money to secure an oak bookcase for their library

#### NO. 6, THE WRIGHT SCHOOL.

This is now the third largest school in town, having an enrollment of twenty-two. The spring and fall terms were under the instruction of Miss Pearl Hutchins. Hutchins is one of our best teachers, possessing tact and having the power of sustaining the interest of her scholars.

The winter term was taught by Miss Zoë Clark, a teacher of good training and some experience. The term was a good deal broken up by sickness among the scholars and on account of the enforced absence of so many teachers the school closed in the middle of the tenth week. The superintendent did not therefore make his last visit.

#### NO. 7, SOUTH NEWCASTLE.

The spring term was taught by Miss Ella Sherman, who has been teacher of this school for several terms. During this term the schoolroom was papered and other improvements made, and Miss Sherman is entitled to much credit for putting the room in so attractive a condition. The fall and winter terms have been in charge of Miss Edith McCurda. Miss McCurda has been very successful, especially with the very small scholars. This school is very small, only five scholars much of the time, and yet, in view of the difficulty of getting them accommodated in any other school, and as there is a fair prospect of two more little children for the next year it is my judgment that perhaps the school better be continued.

### NO. 8, THE KENNEDY SCHOOL.

The spring term was taught by Miss Elsie Dodge who taught there the fall before. The term was very satisfactory to me. Teacher and scholars worked together and the last visit of the term showed good progress and systematic work.

The fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Catherine Clark, a recent graduate from the Academy. Miss Clark has shown herself resourceful and tactful in managing her school and has done good work in the way of instruction. This school is very small, and it will be for the town to determine whether or not it shall be continued.

### NO. 9, THE SHEEPSCOT SCHOOL.

This is the union school and I report only the terms held on this side of the river. The short term, as it is called was conducted by Miss Doris Carney with her usual success. A winter term of twelve weeks has just closed taught by Miss Jessie Kelly, a teacher of experience. Her work was of a high order, and I am glad to report that she is to continue as teacher of the union school.

### NO. 10, NO. NEWCASTLE.

This, our largest school has enjoyed a year of prosperity. The spring term was in charge of Miss Mamie Mayers who has been so successful in former terms.

The death of her father and home duties prevented her from taking the fall term, and Miss Nellie Reed, a teacher of experience was secured. Her work was highly satisfactory, but she did not care to continue longer in the position of teacher. We were fortunate in being able to persuade Miss Mayers to return for the winter term.
