

Miss Dunbar is well known in this community, having taught the Grammar school for a number of years and having given excellent satisfaction in her work. The School Board and all interested in the school were very sorry when she resigned her place as teacher in this school.

The fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Beulah Holden. Miss Holden has done admirable work in the school. She has been active, earnest and faithful, with the result of a constant and increasing interest on the part of scholars and a rapid advancement in study.

It is very desiable that Miss Holden should be continued in this school.

DISTRICT NO. 3, THE MILLS SCHOOL.

The spring and fall terms of this school were under the instruction of Mrs. Jeanette M. Dodge, an experienced and successful teacher. Under her judicious management and instruction, the scholars generally made very good advancement in study and were orderly in conduct.

The winter term of this school has been in the care of Mr. Alton R. Hodgkins, a member of Bates College. This was Mr. Hodgkins' first attempt at teaching, and he exhibited some fine traits as a teacher. After the first few days, during which I am sorry to say, some of t'e scholars were a little disorderly, especially at recess time, both in the schoolhouse and out doors, everything moved on pleasantly and properly and the term was a profitable one. Mr. Hodgkins has reason to feel encouraged in the work of teaching.

District No. 4. called the Pond Road school, has been under the care and instruction of Miss Ella Hodgkins, a graduate of Augusta High school, during the whole year. Miss Hodgkins has done good and faithful work in this school, the scholars have been punctual, studious and orderly and have made good progress in their studies. Whenever I have visited this school during the five years that I have held the office of Superintendent, I have found good order, and studiousness on the part of the children, and generally good recitations.

DISTRICT OR SCHOOL NO. 5, THE PRIMARY DEPARTMENT
OF THE VILLAGE SCHOOL.

This school has been during the year under the faithful care and instruction of Miss Elizabeth Michell. For five years or more Miss Michell has taught this school, and it has been pleasing to notice that never since the commencement of her course has the teacher been more thorough and careful in her work, nor the children more interested in the school. Those who have taught much know very well that it is difficult to sustain term after term and year after year an unflagging interest in their work: but this seems to have been done by this teacher with good results.

DISTRICT NO. 6, FORMERLY CALLED THE WRIGHT SCHOOL.

The spring term of this school was under the care and instruction of Miss Mabel Jewett, who fully sustained the good reputation as a teacher that she had previously gained in No. 8. We would gladly have continued her in the entire year, but for some reason she preferred not to remain.

The fall and winter terms have been under the faithful care and instruction of Miss Doris Carney, a graduate of Maine Wesleyan Seminary. The two terms have been successful and profitable, and the teacher has done excellen twork.

DISTRICT NO. 7, SOMETIMES CALLED BEACH HILL SCHOOL.

Miss Ella Sherman was the faithful and successful teacher of the spring and fall terms of this school. During one of these terms a very nice entertainment was held by the teacher and scholars, and money enough raised to procure and raise a very nice flag, and now on pleasant days when school is in session, the Stars and Stripes floating over the schoolhouse proclaim the ardent patriotism of the youthful hearts within.

The winter term has been under the instruction of Miss Ruth W. Clifford, a graduate of Lincoln Academy. Miss Clifford has shown herself very active and efficient in the school room and has given excellent satisfaction.

This school is very small, the average attendance being but six the last term. There are children enough in the district to give an average of eight, but for some reason the parents of two of the children have seen fit to send them into another district out of town. This seems a pity as it injures our own school, and may render it necessary to discontinue the school and convey the children to another district.

DISTRICT NO. 8, COMMONLY CALLED THE KENNEDY SCHOOL.

Miss Winnifred Erskine of Alna, commenced the spring term of this school, but made some mistakes on account of youth and inexperience, and left at the end of two weeks.

Miss Florence Tomlinson, a graduate of Lincoln Academy, finished out the spring term, and taught the fall and winter terms. Miss Tomlinson accomplished good work in the school, the scholars were punctual and studious, and made rapid advancement.

This school has averaged only seven in attendance, caused by parents sending children away to school, or keeping them at home to work. But it is the opinion of the Superintendent that this school had better be continued at least another year with the small number of scholars rather than convey them to some other school.

DISTRICT NO. 9, KNOWN AS THE SHELLSCOT SCHOOL.

The fall term of this school was taught by Miss Ruth Bartlett of the Mills. Miss Bartlett is a wide awake and faithful instructor and did good work in this respect. There was some disorderly conduct on the part of a few of the boys toward the close of the term. In such cases the teacher should at once send the offenders home, inform their parents and the Superintendent of their offense and await their action.

The winter term of this school went to Alna, where also the spring term had been. Miss Mayers has just commenced a short term of this school in this town.

DISTRICT NO. 10, NORTH NEWCASTLE SCHOOL.

This school has been under the care an linstruction of Miss Mamie Mayers of Dresden Mills. Miss Mayers is one of the best of our teachers. Her school was orderly, the scholars studious and interested and everything moved on very pleasantly and to the entire satisfaction of all. We are glad to know that there is a prospect of securing the services of Miss Mayers for another year. This school held an entertainment at the close of the fall term, which was very satisfactory, and netted quite a little sum, which was expended in some useful articles for the school room.

Thus it will be seen that we have had nine schools in town with 225 weeks of schooling, seven of these schools having had 30 weeks each; one having had 29 weeks, losing one week by the sickness of the teacher; and the Sheepscot school having already had 10 weeks in this town and now having a term of 6 weeks, which will give that school 16 weeks in this town and about the same in Alna.

In closing it gives me great pleasure to say that during the five years of my service as Superintendent our schools have never been in so good condition, nor have they ever accomplished any better work than during the past year. Our teachers have been active and efficient, the children have generally been studious and obedient, and the parents have seemed to cooperate to secure the constant and punctual attendance of their children at school. There have doubtless been a few exceptions, but not many. This is as it always should be.

And now in retiring from office I would express my thanks to the School Committee for their assistance, the parents for their cooperation, the teachers for their faithful work, and would assure the children, the most of whom I know by name, that I shall always remember them and pray for them with interest and affection, hoping they may all become noble men and women and accomplish much good in the world.

To JONATHAN DODGE, Esq., a constable in the Town of Newcastle. County of Lincoln and State of Maine.

GREEIING: - In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Newcastle, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on the 16th day of March, A. D., 1908, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- ART. 3. To choose Selectmen for the ensuing year.
- ART. 4. To choose Assessors for the ensuing year.
- ART. 5. To choose Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.
- ART. 6. To choose Fish Committee to act with Nobleboro Fish Committee for the ensuing year.
- ART. 7. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- ART. 8. To choose three Road Commissioners for the ensuing year.
- ART. 9. To choose one member of the Superintending School Committee to act for three years.
- ART. 10. To see what method the town will adopt for collecting taxes and fix the compensation for same.
- ART. 11. To choose a Collector for the ensuing year.
- ART. 12. To choose an Auditor of accounts for the en suing year.
- ART. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for schools for the ensuing year.
- ART. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.
- ART. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Free High Schools for the ensuing year.

- ART. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for school text books for the ensuing year.
- ART. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of poor for the ensuing year.
- ART. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for highways for the ensuing year.
- ART. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of bridges, amount to include the expense of putting draw in Sheepscot bridge as required by the U. S. War Department, draw to be completed on or before June 1st, 1908.
- ART. 20. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, relating to the appropriating of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1908.
- ART. 21. To see if the town will raise, appropriate and set apart, for the permanent improvement of the main highways within the town, such sum of money as is contemplated and directed by Section 5 of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, being the sum of \$113.50.
- ART. 22. To see what sum the town will vote to raise for sidewalks for the ensuing year.
- ART 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for payment of town officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to alse for incidental expenses for the ensuing year.

- ART. 25. To see if the town will vote to raise two hundred dollars for Taniscot Engine Company for the ensuing year.
- ART. 26. To see if the town will vote the sum of one hundred dollars for support of Free Library for the ensuing year.
- ART. 27. To see if the town will vote to pay the Twin Village Water Company the sum of one hundred dollars for electric lights in the village for the term of one year from Nov. 1st, 1908, the same as are in use at present.
- ART. 28. To see what action the town will take for new valuation of taxable property in town and to see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the expense of taking such new valuation and the manner in which such valuation shall be taken.
- ART. 29. To see what action, if any, the town will vote to take toward abating the whole, or any part, of the taxes of the Centrifugal Leather Company, for the year 1907, the same remaining unpaid.
- ART. 30. To see if the town will vote to pay R. H. Hanly a sum of money for the loss of his horse, he claiming loss through defect in highway.
- ART. 31. To see what action the town will take in regard to schools in Districts Nos. 7 and 8, whether the schools be kept as they are, or will have the schools conveyed to some other school.
- ART. 32. To see if the town will vote to maintain a school in what was formerly known as District No. 1 on River road, as petitioned by A. H. Lailer and others.

ART. 33. To see how much the town will vote for paying bridge notes and interest for year 1908.

ART. 34. To see if the town will vote to instruct the fish committee not to sell fish to out of town speculators until all town's people have been supplied.

ART. 35. To see if the town will vote to fence its burying grounds to comply with law of 1905, ammending Section 3 of Chapter 20 of the Revised Statutes, and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

ART. 36. To see if the town will vote to take a part of appropriation for permanent improvements to repair or improve Wright's Hill.

ART. 37. To see if the town will vote to accept list of Jurors as made up by Selectmen.

ART. 38. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen in order to meet and pay bills against the town promptly to borrow money from bank on town notes, such sums and at such times as may be necessary, not to exceed fifteen hundred dollars.

ART. 39. To choose all other necessary town officers.

ART. 40. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
