To HERBERT I. COLE, a constable in the Town of Winterport in said County

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Winterport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in Union Hall in said town on the eleventh day of March next, at half past nine o'clock A. M. to act on the following articles to wit:—

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To choose three or more Selectmen.
- Art. 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Free High School, for the support of Common Schools, for the Repairs of Schoolhouses and for Free Text Books.
- Art 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs of Highways and Bridges.
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Support of Poor, for Salaries of Officers, for Abatements, for Hydrant rental, and for other Miscellaneous Town Charges.
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial purposes, for Winding Town Clock and for Free Library.
- Art. 8. To fix the rate of discount for the prompt payment of taxes and the time when such discount shall cease, and to see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the same.
- Art. 9. To fix the time when taxes due the town for the year 1907 shall become payable and collectable; to determine whether interest shall be charged on taxes remaining unpaid after that date, and the rate of such interest; to see if the town will vote to instruct its Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year to collect all such taxes within one year from date of their commitment; and to instruct its Municipal Officers to require the collector to give a bond for his faithful compliance with the votes under this article.
- Art. 10. To fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 11. To choose a collector of Taxes.
 - Art. 12. To choose a Road Commissioner.
 - Art. 13. To choose three or more Assessors of Taxes.
 - Art. 14. To choose three or more Overseers of the Poor.
 - Art. 15. To choose a Treasurer.

Art. 16. To choose a Town Agent.

Art. 17. To choose one or more members of the Superintending School Committee.

- Art. 18. To choose an Auditor of Accounts.
- Art. 19. To choose one or more Constables.
- Art. 20. To choose one or more Fire Wardens.
- Art. 21. To choose one or more Truant Officers.
- Art. 22. To choose two or more Fence Viewers.
- Art. 23. To choose one or more Surveyors of Lumber.
- Art. 24. To choose one or more Surveyors of Shingles, Clapboards, Hoops and Staves.
 - Art. 25. To choose one or more Measurers of Wood and Bark.
 - Art. 26. To choose one or more Tithing-men.
 - Art. 27. To choose one or more Sealers of Leather.
 - Art. 28. To choose a Sealer of Weights and Measures.
- Art. 29. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the permanent improvement of a State Road.
- Art. 30. To see if the town will determine the number and location of the schools in the village, in what were formerly districts Nos. 2 and 16, or act thereon.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to buy five hundred feet of fire hose to be used by the Winterport Fire Department.
- Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to discontinue its portion of the road between Winterport and Hampden leading from Monroe road to the old Pomeroy place.
- Art. 33. To see what action the town will take, if any, to prevent snow from drifting into roads in certain places where it has always been known to drift.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as revised.

The selectmen will be in session at their office Saturday, March 9,'07 at 9 c'clock, for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters. Given under our hands at Winterport, this 1st day of March, A.D. 1907.

In accordance with my duty, I have examined the accounts of the selectmen, treasurer and overseers of the poor of our town for the year 1906-7. I find them correctly kept, a proper voucher is on file for each order drawn; and all moneys paid to the treasurer have been properly accounted for.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools 1906-7.

The success and welfare of the schools in town during the past year has been materially aided and advanced by the renewed and continued interest on the part of parents and citizens. It is encouraging to notice in some localities the large increase in the number of visits by citizens to the schools. I am firm in the belief, which I think is founded on common sense, that it is an imperative duty citizens owe the public, to visit the schools. They can in this way be of great benefit in aiding a cause worthy of the best efforts of every person. In some localities there is an indifference on the part of parents which should not exist. All should have a live continuing interest in this important branch of government. The interest is increasing but should continue to grow and should be manifest by practical work. The first step is to become familiar with the work done in your school. In no way can this be done as well as by visits to the schools.

No practical person would employ laborers and send them to work, even if they employed what they considered a competent foreman or superintendent, without occasionally making observations of the way work was progressing This should be made a practical illustration about visits to those institutions where the mental development of the children is being conducted Of vastly more importance is the welfare of those who are to become citizens; Therefore with emphasis I say, look well to the conditions; and aid in the success of our schools.

Don't be a chronic kicker and growler, but be always ready to convey to those in authority your honest ideas about conditions and with all fairness offer to the school officials such practical suggestions as occur to you, so that remedies may be adopted to improve existing conditions.

This plan prevails now more than formerly, but should become the custom and invariable rule of all and thus will better practical results be obtained.

Repairs which could not be deferred were made on the school house at Boyd's Cor., (Dist. No. 14) and new seats were placed in the schoolroom.

The most urgent needs at present are—new seats for White's Cor. schoolhouse; repairing belfry to prevent rapid decay of roof of school building at Upper Village, also repairs on school rooms of this building. The school building at West Winterport is in need of extensive repairs,

The High School has been well attended. The class graduated in June 1906, numbered ten. The class to graduate this year will be made up of thirteen members. There will be at least eighteen scholars who will enter that school at the fall term. They will come from different parts of the town, The school should be continued and liberal provisions made for its support so its present high standard may be maintained. To check or dwarf its usefulness by an insufficient appropriation, would be poor business policy and false economy, similar to the philosophy of some who think "A penny wise and a pound foolish" system is economical.

Be comprehensive and business-like in your treatment of this school which is a valuable aid to the young people of this town, and thus show by your acts that you believe in permanent progress and prosperity for those who work so diligently and faithfully to acquire that valuable attainment, an education.

The one important thing a town can do for the future citizens, is to give them an opportunity to acquire a liberal education; therefore deem it a privilage as well as a sacred duty to "Act well your part for therein all the honor lies."
