Report of the Superintendent of Schools 1907-8

It is a pleasure to report a continuance of the interest of parents and citizens in the daily session of our schools.

This is a healthy and fortunate state of the public mind. It indicates that the people are alive to the great blessings and benefits they should bestow upon those who are soon to become our citizens, assume the cares incident to life and be fitted to discharge the manifold duties devolving upon them, in a way that means there shall be prosperity and progress.

There is a willingness to work for and with the schools. There is much less carping because of the enjoyment the faultfinder derives from criticising and nagging. That was misdirected energy. It is now working to advance the best interests of the many instead of riding the hobby horse of the imaginary abused individual. This spells advancement and means progress along the right road which will ultimately lead to the ideal.

Many of our teachers are putting more emphasis on principles, requiring greater proficiency in process, omitting not a few of the less important topics and giving but limited time to minor details. They are insisting that pupils do their own work and master the studies pursued.

They quite generally realize that there are better results attained when they have sympathy for the plodder, the

wayward, the unbalanced, the genius, as well as with the brilliant. That they must be filled with that enthusiasm which makes difficult duties easy, and enthuse their pupils with a desire to accomplish desirable results. In this way all do their work more intelligently and hence more effectively.

The foundation to the school building at District No. 16 has been thoroughly repaired.

The schoolhouse at White's Cor. has been supplied with new seats and is now a comfortable and neat building within and without.

The next urgent need which should be supplied at once, is repairs on the schoolhouse at West Winterport. There is an article in the warrant for this purpose and I hope and believe it will receive favorable consideration at the coming annual town meeting.

The fact that extensive repairs are much needed is apparent to all who are familiar with the condition of the school buildings. That fact when known to the public will no doubt insure a sufficient sum of money to make the required repairs.

The High School has been well attended by pupils from the rural schools as well as those living in the village. It is doing excellent work. It has been listed by State Superintendent of Public Schools as an approved Secondary School. No lack of interest on the part of those who are indifferent to the needs of the town, nor any misguided individual, or misdirected idea of reducing the appropriation, and thus fail to provide the necessary sum of money required to maintain this as an approved Secondary School, should prevail.

There are pupils in almost every school in town who are working hard for the purpose of, and looking forward in happy anticipation to the time of entering this school.

Here they can receive an education which will enable them to enter life's complicated duties on an equal plane with others who are thus trained, and they will be well fitted to take up and carry successfully forward the duties resting on each citizen in our form of government.

It is no argument to point to men who have been eminently successful in life and say they had no such opportunities, for it is a fair inference that had they been better prepared, their achievements and their successes would have been more than they have now attained.

Our school system as a whole, the primary schools, the grammar school, the rural schools, the high school are all in splendid condition and should be so kept and so supported and so maintained. Any change made should be an advance, and not a backward step should be thought of seriously.

The goal in the onward march of progress should be to supply all needs as fast as our resources will allow the demands to be met.

If I understand correctly the desires of the noble, unselfish, selfsacrificing people of this town as maninifested in their actions in school matters, all needs will be supplied, and all demands cheerfully and cordially approved and met.

WARRANT.

STATE OF MAINE.

WALDO SS.

To HERBERT I. COLE, a constable in the Town of Winterport in said County.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Winterport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in Union Hall in said town on the ninth day of March next, at ten o'clock A. M. to act on the following articles to wit:—

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To choose three or more Selectmen.
- Art. 4. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the Free High School, for the support of Common Schools, for the Repairs of Schoolhouses and for Free Text Books.
- Art. 5. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs of Highways and Bridges.
- Art. 6. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the Support of Poor, for Salaries of Officers, for Abatements, for Hydrant Rental, and for other Miscellaneous Town Charges.
- Art. 7. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial purposes, for Winding Town Clock and for Free Library.
- Art. 8. To fix the time when taxes due the town for the year 1908 shall become payable and collectable; to determine whether interest shall be charged on taxes remaining unpaid after that date and the rate of such interest; to see if the town will vote to instruct its Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year to collect all such taxes within one year from date of their commitment; and to instruct its Municipal Officers to require the collector to give a bond for his faithful compliance with the vote under this article.
- Art. 9. To fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 10. To choose a Collector of Taxes.
 - Art. 11. To choose a Road Commissioner.
 - Art. 12. To choose three or more Assessors of Taxes.
 - Art. 13. To choose three or more Overseers of the Poor.
 - Art. 14. To choose a Treasurer.
 - Art. 15. To choose a Town Agent.
- Art. 16. To choose one or more members of the Superintending School Committee.

- Art. 17. To choose an Auditor of Accounts.
- Art. 18. To choose one or more Constables.
- Art. 19. To choose one or more Fire Wardens.
- Art. 20. To choose one or more Truant Officers.
- Art. 21. To choose two or more Fence Viewers.
- Art. 22. To choose one or more Surveyors of Lumber.
- Art. 23. To choose one or more Surveyors of Shingles, Clapboard, Hoops and Staves.
 - Art. 24. To choose one or more Measurers of Wood and Bark.
 - Art. 25. To choose one or more Tithing-men.
 - Art. 26. To choose one or more Sealers of Leather.
 - Art. 27. To choose a Sealer of Weights and Measurers.
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112, of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State amount for highways for the year 1908.
- Art. 29. To see if the town will raise, appropriate and set apart for the permanent improvement of the main highways within the town, such sum of money as is contemplated and directed by Section 5, of Chapter 112, of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, being the sum of \$94.
- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to sell the schoolhouse at Moody's Mill.
- Art. 31. To see what money the town will vote to raise to repair the schoolhouse at Marden's Mill, known as No. 9.
- Art. 32. To see what action the town will take in regard to paying Surford Baker for a horse, that broke his leg by a defect in highway
- Art. 33 .To see what action the town will take towards suppressing the destroying of property, taking up of sidewalks, crossing and steps and building of bon-fires in the Public streets and other depredations on the night of the third and morning of the fourth of July, that the selectmen shall have power to enforce such fines as the town shall deem necessary and appoint Police to execute the same.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to issue and post notices prohibiting the knocking of base balls in the public streets.
