

To FRANK W. CARLETON, a Constable of the Town of Winterport in said County.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Winterport, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble in Union Hall in said town on the eighth day of March next, at ten o'clock A. M. to act on the following articles to wit:—

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To choose three or more Selectmen.
- Art. 4. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the Free High School, for the support of Common Schools, for the Repairs of Schoolhouses and for Free Text Books.
- Art. 5. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs of Highways and Bridges.
- Art. 6. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Poor, for salaries of Officers, for Abatements, for Hydrant Rental, and for other Miscellaneous town charges.
- Art. 7. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial purposes, for Winding Town Clock and for Free Library.
- Art. 8. To fix the time when taxes due the town for the year 1909 shall become payable and collectable; to determine whether interest shall be charged on taxes remaining unpaid after that date, and the rate of such interest; to see if the town will vote to instruct its Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year to collect all such taxes within one year from date of their commitment; and to instruct its Municipal Officers to require the Collector to give a bond for his faithful conpliance with the vote under this article.
- Art. 9. To fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 10. To choose a Collector of Taxes.

- Art. 11. To choose a Road Commissioner.
- Art. 12. To choose three or more Assessors of Taxes.
- Art. 13. To choose three or more Overseers of the Poor.
- Art. 14. To choose a Treasurer.
- Art. 15. To choose a Town Agent.
- Art 16 To choose one or more members of the Superintending School Committee.
 - Art. 17. To choose an Auditor of Accounts.
 - Art. 18. To choose one or more Constables.
 - Art. 19. To choose one or more Fire Wardens.
 - Art. 20. To choose one or more Truant Officers.
 - Art. 21. To choose two or more Fence Viewers.
 - Art. 22. To choose one or more Surveyors of Lumber.
- Art. 23 To choose one or more Surveyors of Shingles, Clapboards, Hoops and Staves.
 - Art. 24. To choose one or more Measurers of Wood and Bark..
 - Art. 25. To choose one or more Tithing-men.
 - Art. 26. To choose one or more Sealers of Leather.
 - Art. 27. To choose a Sealer of Weights and Measures.
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112, of the Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1909.
- Art. 29. To see if the town will raise, appropriate and set apart for the permanent improvement of the State road within the town, such sum of money as is contemplated and directed by section 5, of Chapter 112, of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, being the sum of \$94.50.
- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of Two hundred Dollars to make necessary repairs on Town Farm buildings.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to authorize its superintending school committee to join with either or any of the following towns, to wit. Frankfort and Prospect, for the purpose of employing a Superintendent of schools in accordance with the provisions of Section 40 to 45, inclusive, of Chapter 15 of the Revised Statutes, and to see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of Superintend of schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 32 To see if the town will vote to raise One Hundred dollars (\$100) for the purchase of a lot for Hose No. 1.

# Report of the Superintendent of Schools 1908-9.

Fellow Townsmen:-

The cause of education must always be regarded as of the very first importance by those who desire the perpetuation by our free republican form of government. The right of the people to govern themselves is of no value unless coupled with the capacity to govern themselves well. It is essential, then, that all classes of the community should enjoy the benefit of a liberal and enlightened educational system. This has been as well cared for in this town as our resources would warrant. I am glad to say I sincerely believe that during my term of office such progress has been made as was required, so far as our means justified. No request made of the voters was ever refused. Every effort has been made to receive full value for all money expended and I believe such has been attained.

My efforts have been directed to have the teachers cause the pupils to do for themselves their own work, and thus by exercise of the organ of thought—the brain—grow in mental power. The logical result of such method of teaching is to make the pupils self reliant, and thus be prepared for the duties of life.

There are many theories advanced about school management which must be tried by others and its value determined, before it is advisable to change well known. Safe methods, for new theories, but when it has become a demonstrated fact that any system or method is an improvement over the one in use, I have never hesitated to advise its adoption. The teachers have endeavored to give to the pupils under their charge the instruction most needed for their proper advancement and true success.

The parents have continued to manifest a deep interest in the success of our schools. This is one of the most encouraging factors, that indicates progress will be demanded and our school privileges as adequate, as advancing enlightenment demands they should be.

The schoolhouse at West Winterport was thoroughly repaired and is now in good condition. This completes repairs on rural schoolhouses where the outlay will call for any considerable amount, for some years to come. This has been to me one of the very pleasant features of my term of office to see these schoolhouses all put in good condition.

The schoolhouses at Districts No. 1 and No. 4, should be provided with modern seats. When this is done each rural schoolhouse will be furnished in fair condition. The school rooms at District No. 2 were sheathed in part during the year. This was a necessity and could not well be delayed.

It would be very gratifying if some citizen would present to the town, a lot near the centre of the village of adequate size for school grounds so at some future time, when the town thought advisable, a new central school building could be constructed that would be sufficient for all the village schools. The lot required for this purpose should be of sufficient acreage to have grounds, adequate to the needs of such a building. I have, during the past few years, called the matter to the attention of some of our well to do citizens, with the suggestion that they furnish such a lot for that purpose, but as yet they have not seen it to be a duty or a privilege so to do. I shall not enter upon extended comments as to the desirability or final economy, of such a course being taken by the town, but consider it sufficient at present to express my firm conviction of the desirability of such results, and an abiding hope some citizen may yet see it is a privilege, and that they will exercise it to secure such a lot for the town, for the purpose herein named.

Other towns have had citizens as public spirited, so why may we not hope for as good fortune at some future time? I think it proper to give this matter attention in this report. It may convey the knowledge to some one who may desire, at some future time to make provisions to supply a very desirable lot and building as herein suggested.

The appropriation for the High School made it possible to have an assistant teacher, and thus maintain the school as an approved secondary school of standard grade. employment of an assistant made it necessary to have a recitation room, which was arranged in the school building where the High School is located. The expense of making such changes as were required will be provided for in part by proceeds from entertainments given by the students of that school. It should be gratifying to all to know of the willingness and desire of the students to help defray the expenses of providing a recitation room. school board was fortunate in the selection of an assistant teacher as well as in the selection of teachers for each of the schools in town. The school year has shown they exercised rarely good judgement in placing teachers in each school, whose work has been successful and therefore very satisfactory.

I thank all the people and especially those who have served as members of the school board during my term of office for their deep interest in the success of the schools for their devotion to duty, their loyal and hearty cooperation for better conditions and to attain the best results possible. In the future, as always in the past, may we realize that our duties as citizens cannot be fully discharged in a commendable, creditable or honorable way, unless we look well to the education of all those who are soon to become citizens, and provide the necessary surroundings, conditions and instructions, so it may be well and thoroughly done.
