

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS-

The length of the school year has been thirty-four weeks, a gain of one week over former years. The town has been unusually fortunate in retaining its teachers, nearly all having taught for several terms in the same school and except in District No. 8 where there has been but one term, all have taught the entire year.

Two meetings attended by the teachers of this town and Damariscotta have been held each term during the year. The teachers have shown much interest in these meetings in which the course of study for common schools furnished by the State has been carefully discussed with a view to adapt-

ing it to our schools and securing a uniformity of studies in all the schools of the two towns. Since all have the same length of school year, uniformity would seem to be reasonable.

Last year's report contained an allusion to a change in the method of admission to Lincoln Academy. scholars were admitted on their school record. This means that they had completed satisfactorily the course of study required in the common schools. Those who have been admitted in this way have made a good record at the Acad-Those who for any reason have not taken a full course in the common schools, or who have failed to pass from term to term, have a chance to take the examination prescribed by the State. It should be clearly understood that the town and the state pay tuition at the Academy only when scholars have either completed the common school course of study, or have passed an examination for which questions are furnished by the State. The larger part of those admitted last year took examinations. Twelve in all entered. The attendance from Newcastle at the Academy will be found at the end of this report. I estimate thirtyfive tuitions for our scholars. This would mean \$350 for the town to raise for the purpose. This is not a matter which is in the hands of the town but is a State requirement. It would seem wise to raise an amount sufficient to cover the expense, as a small-r amount will only result in a deficit. Quite a large number of scholars have moved into town during the year for whom books had to be furnished. remarks made above in regard to tuition apply to this The superintendent is obliged to furnish necessary books.

Mention was made in last year's report of the need of better janitor service. There has been some improvement

in this respect much to the benefit of all concerned. A poorly kept room goes a long way towards making a poor school. It would be better to shorten the school year, if necessary, in order to have the schoolhouses well taken care of.

It does not seem just to have such a marked difference between the furniture of the various schools. The buildings are now in so good repair that a small appropriation would give all the schools comfortable seats and heating appliances. Certainly the residents of districts in which the furniture is poor and uncomfortable have a right to complain and to insist that they shall be treated like the rest of the town. New seats are needed at Damariscotta Mills, North Newcastle and Sheepscot.

Thirty or forty years ago it was usual to find attending the winter term of common school boys and girls seventeen, eighteen or even twenty years of age. This class has entirely disappeared, nor are they all by any means to be found in the Academy. Many of these used to work during the rest of the year and attend school in the winter only. The Academy is not open to them as they have not passed the required examination and no provision is made for them in the common schools. Very few are found in the district schools after fifteen years of age.

Irregularity of attendance is an injury to many scholars. Chapter 15, Section 49, of the Laws of Maine, reads "Every child between the seventh and fifteenth anniversaries of his birth, shall attend some public day school during the time such school is in session, and an absence of one-half day shall be deemed a violation of this requirement."

In spite of this children are kept out of school on the most trivial excuses or none at all.

Not to speak of loss of school work, disregard of law is

poor training for children. It will be easier for them to break any law if they are brought up to break this one.

The attendance in the Primary School is largest of any school in town. The young women from the Teacher's Training Course at the Academy have given efficient assistance bere during the year, and the helpful superintendence of their work by Miss Carlisle from the Academy deserves especial mention. The work done in the Primary School is a marked example of the wisdom of keeping the same teacher from year to year. Miss Louise Robbins, teacher. Total attendance 49, average 36.

The attendance at the Grammar School has been smaller than usual but a class of seventeen from the Primary department will enter in the fall and this will make the members normal. Eight from this school entered the Academy last fall. Miss Holden's work has been up to her usual high standard. Total attendance 28, average 20.

The school at Damariscotta Mills has had a prosperous year under Miss Christine Smithwick. The quiet attention to work is very noticeable here. Because of frequent changes of residence the scholars in this school change in an unusual degree from term to term. Total attendance 22, average 18.

In district No 6 Miss Ethel Linscott is teaching her second year. This school is remarkable in that the same scholars have attended practically without change for the two years. This fact, together with good teaching, makes the work done very gratifying. Total attendance 25. Average 22.

Miss Annie E. McCobb has taugh the terms in district No. 7, and has done excellent work. While the total attendance has been 9 some of the scholars are small and not able to attend in the winter. It will be necessary for the

town to take some action in regard to this school and No 8, as neither has the average attendance required by law.

In district No. 8 no school has been in operation since the spring of 1912 until this winter. As there were seven scholars to attend and the problem of carrying them to Sheepscot was difficult and expensive, the committee opened the school in Janury. It has been in session nine weeks with Miss Sunie E. Potter as teacher. Her work has been well done. It should be left with the school committee to continue this school if they think best.

District No. 9 has had the great advantage of retaining the same efficient teacher many terms in succession. Two from this school entered the Academy last fall. The total attendance 17. Average 13.

The improved conditions in the schoolhouse at North Newcastle have been appreciated by all. This is Mr. Leighton's third year in this school, which is sufficient proof of the estimation in which his work is held. Total attendance 34. Average 25. Eleven not absent one-half day of the last term.

On the whole the schools of Newcastle—teachers, scholars and school buildings, are ā credit to the town. With the Academy for a high school, few towns in the State offer children better advantages.

# TUITION AT LINCOLN ACADEMY FOR THE YEAR ENDING DEC. 1914.

# Town Warrant

TO A. B. GILPATRICK, ESQ, a Constable of the Town of Newcastle, County of Lincoln and State of Maine:

GREETING: In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Newcastle, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on the 15th day of March, A. D. 1915 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting
- Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see what action the town will take on report of the Auditor.
  - Art. 4. To choose Selectmen for the ensuing year
  - Art. 5. To choose Assessors for the ensuing year
  - Art. 6. To choose Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year
- Art. 7. To choose a Fish Committee to act with the Nobleboro Fish Committee for the ensuing year.
  - Art. 8. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To choose one member of the Superintending School Committee to act for three years.
- Art. 10 To see what method the town will adopt for the collecting of taxes and fix the compensation for the same.
  - Art. 11. To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To choose an Auditor of the accounts for the ensuing year.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for schools for the ensuing year.

- Art 14 To see if the town will authorize the school committee to continue schools in district No. 8 if they think best to do so.
- Art 15. To see is the town will authorize the School Committee to continue the union with Damariscotta for school superintendence.
- Art 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.
- Art 17 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Free High Schools for the ensuing year.

- Art 26. To see if the town will vote to install one electric light on lower end of land in front of Jesse Hall place
- Art 27 To see if the town will vote to authorize the school committee to provide for instruction in music in the common schools and what sum of money the town will vote for that purpose
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to authorize its selectmen to contract during the year 1915, jointly with the selectmen of Nobleboro, for sale of the surplus alewives to be taken out of the fish stream in the village of Damariscotta Mills for a term of years not exceeding five, beginning with the year 1916

- Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs of sidewalks for the year.
- Art. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the payment of Town Officers for the ensuing year
- Art 34 To see if the town will vote to raise \$150 for the Taniscot Engine Co. for the ensuing year.
- Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to raise \$100 for support of free library for the ensuing year.
- Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of twenty-five dollars for Harlow Dunbar Post for Memorial purposes.
- Art. 37. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay outstanding notes and interest.
- Art. 38. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purpose of lighting streets for the ensuing year
- Art 39 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for gathering Brown Tail Moth nests for the ensuing year
- Art. 40 To see if the town will vote to raise \$200.00 for painting and repairs for school-house in districts 3 and 5, the village district.
- Art 41 To see if the town will vote to pass the following by-law regulating the use of bicycles on the sidewalks in the town: all persons are prohibited from riding bicycles, upon any of the sidewalks within the limits of the town; and whoever shall violate the provisions hereof, shall be fined not less than one nor more than three dollars, to be recovered by complainant, for the use of the town of Newcastle

- Art 42 To see whether the town will vote to raise money, and what sum, for the maintenance of State highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town under provisions of Sections 9 of chapter 130 of Public Laws of 1913
- Art 43 To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow such sum of money as is needed to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes.
  - Art. 44 To choose all other necessary town officers
- Art 45. Transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.
