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

We think that Mr. Needham and his wife have done very well for the town considering that live stock, farming tools, and house furnishings all had to be bought new. Mr. Needham has painted and papered the house inside and had a new chimney built in place of one which was defective. The house has also been shingled, putting the buildings in a very good state of repair.

We have hired Mr. Needham and his wife to take charge of the farm for the coming year at a salary of \$450.00.

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



To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Poland:

I have the pleasure of submitting my second annual report of your schools.

TEACHERS

While we lost some good teachers from our last year's force, we have in every instance, I believe, been able to scure a teacher equal to or better than the one last year. This has been made possible through being able to pay a better wage. The average salary in your schools is now eleven dollars per week. This is about the average for the elementary school teachers for the state and should be incrased that we may keep up with the demand for larger

salaries. Cost of living, clothing and in fact nearly everything has advanced and it is but fair that salaries should increase accordingly. Elsewhere in this report you will find a schedule showing training and experience of all your teachers.

ATTENDANCE AND PUNCTUALITY

While there has been a slight increase in the per cent of attendance over that of last year, there is still much to be desired. Parents are urged to co-operate with us in making the pupils realize the value of regular and punctual attendance. A few parents allow their children to stay out on the slightest pretext. Since schools open so late and close so early, a child should not take any of this time to visit relatives or friends.

BOOKS AND SUPPLIES

A child loses his interest if obliged to read the same book many times and if put into the next higher reader he finds it too difficult, so we have purchased some supplementary readers.

We have purchased language books for the third and fourth grades in which the pupils take a great deal of pride and are doing good work.

The Palmer Method of Business Writing is beginning to show good results and some of the pupils should get Palmer buttons for improvement in writing before the end of the spring term.

Books have advanced slightly since January and paper has advanced nearly 300% during the last two years, we are therefore asking for a little more money.

HAND WORK

Pupils have displayed much interest in the hand work which some of the teachers have taken up. At Poland Corner an inexpensive bench has been installed and the boys of the upper grades have done some very good work.

Hand work is valuable not alone for its own sake but also for the added interest it gives to the other studies A pupil learns the value of fractions when he actually uses them in his work. Moreover he learns to receive and follow either oral or written instructions exactly as given.

REPAIRS

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The lower room of the Minot Corner schoolhouse has been put in good condition. The Committee engaged a local carpenter to do the work but late in July he found that he could not undertake it. It was, therefore, necessary to hire a contractor from Lewiston which made the cost a little more than it otherwise would have been. We now have a school room of which the people may well be proud. The light is arranged to come from the left; there are, however, three windows on the right in order to get the morning sun. The curtains on these windows may be drawn when the pupils are in their seats. The Smith Heating and Ventilation System is a great improvement over the two old stoves which were formerly used. The temperature in different parts of the room seldom varies more than one degree, while by the old method some suffered with the heat and others with the cold. The new desks which were installed may be adjusted to fit the various pupils, thereby allowing the children to sit in healthful positions.

Much needed repairs were made on the Bailey Hill schoolhouse. The repairs started on the Herrick Valley schoolhouse will be completed in the spring.

I hope that all the schoolhouses may soon be equipped either with the Smith Heating and Ventilating System or with jacketed stoves, the latter have been found to very satisfactory in the town of Harrison.

The sheds and toilets at Poland Corner need repairing and should be made to open from the school room.

CONCLUSION

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Let us all strive to make the schools of Poland as good as those of any similar town and, if possible, better.

I wish to thank the Superintending School Committee, the teachers and the citizens who have aided me in my work.

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WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

To George W. Blair, Constable of the Town of Poland in the County of Androscoggin and State of Maine.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Poland, qualified by law to vote in town affairs. to meet at the town hall in said town on Monday, the twelfth day of March, A.D. 1917, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To hear and act on reports of town officers and committee on accounts.

Art. 3. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to elect a road commissioner and fix his compensation.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for school text books.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs on school property.

Art 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay the tuition of scholars attending high school in other towns.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray the expenses of graduation exercises at the Poland schools under the direction of the superintending school committee. Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for salary of Superintendent of Schools and other town officers.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs of roads and bridges.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay snow bills.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commission and abatements.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to donate to A. A. Dwinal Post, G. A. R., to help defray the expense of Memorial Day.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to pay each member of the superintending school committee ten dollars.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for contingent expenses.

Art. 18. To see what date the town will vote to fix for

the payment of taxes.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote yes or no on the question of appropriating and raising necessary money to entitle the town to State aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 20. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$666.00 for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the destruction of brown tail moth nests.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of State high-

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ways during the ensuing year under the provisions of Section 9 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913 and Chapter 272 of the Public Laws of 1915.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to re-establish the school on Johnson Hill.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise \$150.00 to cut sand hill on road leading from Morrell's Four Corners to Danville Road.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money to pay bills until taxes can be collected.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise money to pay Hiram Ricker & Sons for two Moore wagons.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to discontinue each of the following roads which have not been kept in repair for a number of years:—1st, the road from the town stable through the woods to the state road at the foot of the sand hill at Poland. 2nd, Abram Edwards' Lane on Johnson Hill. 3rd, the road from the State aid road near the Knights place to the Garland Meadow road near the shore of Tripp Pond. 4th, the road from the top of hill above Poland Depot across the pasture to Bailey Hill. 5th, the Clark Hill road from Minot Corner Schoolhouse to the Lane road. 6th, the road from the Jackson Road to the Summit Spring road near M. L. Mills.

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The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall on the day of the meeting at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
