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To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Poland:

I have the pleasure of submitting my third annual report of your schools.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

I wish to call your attention to the above figures submitted by your committee. After careful consideration of the needs of your schools, these sums are found to be the least possible amounts with which we can hope to make our schools efficient.

#### TEACHERS

Our teachers have worked faithfully to make our schools successful. We have been fortunate in having

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but one change in our force since September and expect all teachers to continue in their positions through the spring term. A teacher can do much better work after she has become acquainted with the pupils and the conditions with which she has to deal.

I recommend that, as far as possible, our present teaching force be retained for another year. Wherever it is necessary to make a change, we should strive to secure a teacher as good and if possible better than the one now in that position. This can be done only by paying much higher wages. All lines of work are paying much more than they did last year and if teachers cannot get a living wage they will go into other positions. Our present average weekly wage is \$11.54 for a thirty-three week year. Compare this with the wages which women are now receiving in other occupations.

## COURSE OF STUDY

We have arranged a new course of study which has been approved by our State Superintendent, Dr. Thomas.

This course of study will be ready for use at the opening of the spring term. The eighth grade in the new course corresponds with our present ninth grade and so on down through the grades, the sub-primary corresponding with the present first grade. This change is made because most of the text books now published are based on an eight grade plan. We have added the sub-primary because it is not possible for the average child to cover all the necessary work of the elementary schools in eight years of only thirty-three weeks each. The children in the larger places are having thirty-six or more weeks per year.

#### STANDARD TESTS

The pupils in grades 4 to 9 have taken the Courtis Standard Tests to measure their speed and accuracy in handling the four fundamentals—Addition, Subtraction,

Mutliplication and Division. These tests showed a general weakness in both speed and accuracy. All the teachers have been asked to give more attention to rapid drills. One teacher has used the Courtis Drill Cards for a few minutes each day, and a second test in her school has shown a decided gain in both speed and accuracy. The teacher also reports that her pupils are doing better work in all their regular arithmetic lessons.

# ATTENDANCE AND PUNCTUALITY

Parents, will you kindly give the teachers your hearty co-operation in securing better and more punctual attendance?

#### WRITING

Several of the pupils now have the Palmer buttons for improvement in writing, and one girl has the pin for passing the first one hundred drills in the Palmer Method of Business Writing.

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#### THRIFT STAMPS

The Thrift Stamps offer an excellent opportunity to invest small as well as large savings at a good rate of interest. They are well named, for they are not only a good investment but also teach our boys and girls to save money. This habit, when well established, will be of great value to them. I feel sure that parents will grasp this opportunity to teach both patriotism and thrift, and that our schools will do their part in this great work.

Every pupil in the Quaker Ridge school in Casco has purchased one or more Thrift Stamps. This entitles the school to a certificate from the government which will be framed and hung in the school room. I hope that every school in the Casco, Otisfield, and Poland District will secure such a certificate before the close of the spring term.

#### JUNIOR RED CROSS

Another grand opportunity for the children to aid Our Country is through the Junior Red Cross. Every school in the land is cordially invited to help in this great work. Even the little ones may help by cutting cloth for comfort pillows. Of course the lessons must be learned first, so this is an incentive to the children to improve their time. Two of our Poland schools have already signified their intentions to organize Junior Auxiliaries.

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#### REPAIRS

A new Smith Heater has been installed at West Poland. It was found that the old chimney was not safe, and so a new one was built. The Smith System always works well if properly installed and therefore needs no comment.

At White Oak Hill, we have installed a jacketed stove and a ventilating system. This works as well as a heater for the smaller school rooms, and the expense is very much less. The seats in this school house were poor, so those from Black Cap school house were taken up and used to replace the old double desks. The toilets' here have had much needed repairs.

#### 35

The toilets at Poland Corner have also been repaired.

The South Poland school house needs a Smith Heater. At present, it is heated by two stoves, which is both expensive and unsatisfactory.

The stoves in at least two of the smaller school houses should be jacketed this next summer.

The Herrick Valley and the White Oak Hill school houses both need new ceilings.

There are other smaller repairs which must be done in order to make the buildings comfortable and sanitary The Comittee does not contemplate any extensive repairs but has asked for just enough to do the really necessary work.

# CONCLUSION

I wish to thank the committee, the citizens, and the teachers for their aid in making our schools a success.

#### GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Poland, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall in said Town, on Monday, the eleventh day of March, A. D. 1918, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit :--

"Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

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Art. 2. To hear and act on report of town officers and committees on accounts.

Art. 3. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to elect a road commissioner and fix his compensation.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for school text books.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs on school property.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay the tuition of scholars attending high school in other towns. Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray the expenses of graduation exercises at the Poland schools under the direction of the Superintending School Committee.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for salary of Superintendent of Schools and other town officers.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs of roads and bridges.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay snow bills.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay collectors' commission and abatements.

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Art. 15. To see if the town will vote a certain amount for the services of the West Poland Brass Band, Decoration Day.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to donate to A. A. Dwinal Post, G. A. R., to help defray the expense of Memorial Day.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to pay each member of the Superintending School Committee Ten Dollars.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for contingent expenses.

Art. 19. To see what date the town will vote to fix for payment of taxes.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote yes or no on the, question of appropriating and raising necessary money to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913. Art. 21. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$666.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of State Highways during the ensuing year under the provisions of Section 9 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913 and Chapter 272 of the Public Laws of 1915.

Art. 23. To see if the town will raise an amount sufficient to pay outstanding bills and money hired in 1917.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer or Selectmen to hire money to pay bills until taxes can be collected, not to exceed \$4.000.00.

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Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to build an ell on Howe house and how much money for same.

Art. 26. To see what the town will vote to raise to build the bridge over Worthley Brook between Frank Stone's and John Stone's.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to raise \$500.00 for a permanent road from C. C. Gidding's to the Minot Corner Bridge.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to gravel the strip of swamp road between Leander Edwards' and the Promised Land, so called.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to raise \$500.00 to improve that portion of the road leading from Empire Station road towards Excelsior Grange Hall, beginning at said Empire Road and extending a distance not exceeding one-half mile. Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise \$500.00 to remove the knoll at Death Trap Curve, on Harris Hill or make other provisions therefor.

Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for a permanent road from Charles Rowe's Store to Poland Station.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to raise \$50.00 to build a culvert and raise the road at the head of Shaker Bog on road leading from Harry Thurlow's to New Gloucester line.

Art. 33. To see what action the town will take to re-open the Range Way, so called, between the White Oak Hill road and Jackson road.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to buy lot of land for \$75, adjoining town house of Ada Colbath.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall on the day of the meeting at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
