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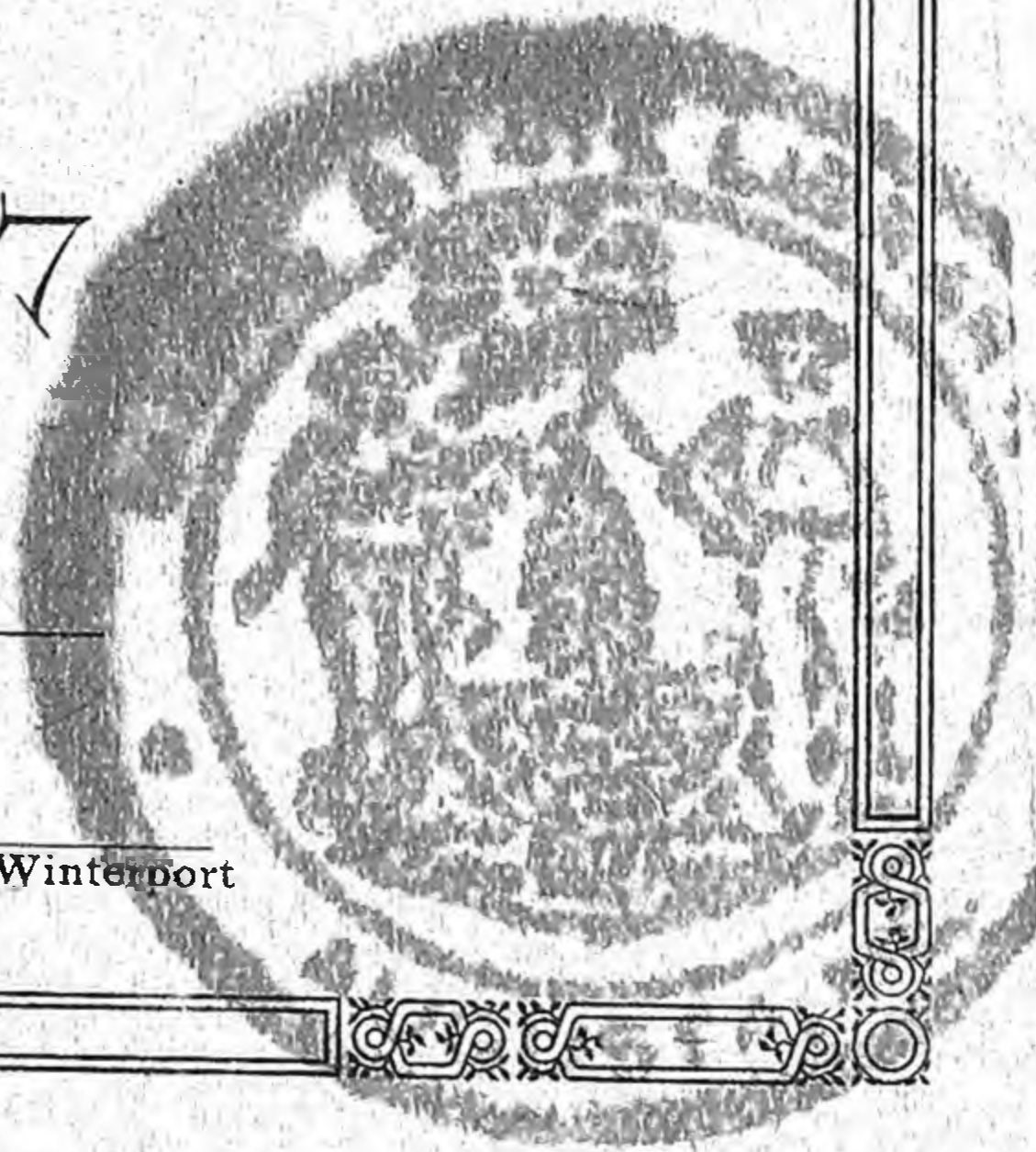

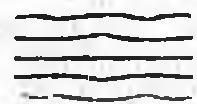

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.



To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the town of Winterport.

I hereby submit to you my second report as superintendent of your schools. The work has on the whole been satisfactory and I believe the schools to be at a higher standard than a year ago. One reason for this is that they are more closely graded. During the summer vacation an outline was made which designates what text books are to be used in the different grades. Some changes have been made when careful experiments proved them to be for the better, until now it seems to be very near correct. It also enables the superintendent to get a better idea of what is being done in the schools and to note the progress made.

The teaching force is equal if not the superior to last years. While we have been unfortunate enough to lose some efficient teachers the new ones who were secured have done excellent work. Six of the teachers have had normal training and three are normal graduates. The others had quite a wide range of experience in teaching.

Copies of Lincoln's Everyday Pedagogy has been placed in the schools. This book is a valuable aid to the teacher if studied carefully, as it is very practical. Every teacher has been furnished with a plan book and in the Village schools a daily plan has been kept. This is not practical in the rural schools and it is used to keep a record of the terms work. It is especially helpful to a new teacher.

At the beginnig of the fall term all teachers were required to take the course in penmanship given by the A. N. Palmer Co. On account of the high cost of paper it had to be discontinued, All writing lessons in the grades below the eighth are given with the pupils using pencils and the rough paper. Examinations are given orally instead of written. While the efficiency of the school is

interfered with in many ways, it is necessary on account of the high cost of material. To further reduce the expenses book slates have been purchased and will be used whenever practical.

All teachers who have the ability have been encouraged to teach a little music and drawing this year. In some of the schools very good work has been done. I hope that in time they may be taught in all the schools as a part of the required course.

The Snellen Ear and Eye Test is given in every school at some time during the year and the parents notified if the child's sight or hearing is found to be defective. I think we ought to go a step farther and have medical inspection in the schools.

CONVEYANCE.

Six conveyance teams have been maintained since the beginning of the school year, which is one more than last year, the Conant school having been closed and the pupils transported to West Winterport.

REPAIRS.

The lower part of the Upper Primary building has been made into two rooms and with the exception of the floors these rooms are very attractive and comfortable. Quite a saving is made in the cost of fuel and janitor's service.

A new floor has been laid in the Grammar School room. The walls were painted and the ceiling whitened.

The chimney at the High School has been fixed so that there is very little annoyance from smoke in the assistant's room. These repairs were badly needed.

NEEDED REPAIRS.

The walls of the High School room should be fixed and painted and the stove jacketed.

The wood work in the Lower Primary room needs painting and the walls should be fixed in places.

The Lowell school building should be remodeled. A new floor should be laid and modern desks installed. The toilets should be moved and connected with the building.

At the Whittier School a new floor should be laid and the ceiling fixed. The committee recommend that banking boards be made for all the rural buildings which in

the end will be far more economical and satisfactory than the use of brush each year.

TEXT BOOK.

The schools are well supplied with text books. A few reference books should be purchased for the High School and next year readers for the seventh and eighth grades should be purchased.

Among the new books purchased this year were readers for the ninth grade, new arithmetics for the four upper grades and some music books. On account of the large entering class at the High School a number of books had to be purchased.

HIGH SCHOOL.

Excellent work is being done at the High School due to the efficient work of the teachers. Mr. Pope has had three years of college training and has worked hard for the best interests of the school and a high standard of scholarship is maintained.

Miss Jordan is so well known that it is needless for me to comment upon her work. We were very fortunate to secure her services for another year.

A course in typewriting is a part of the curriculum this year. Several of the pupils are taking it. An article will appear in the warrant asking the town to decide upon the purchase of a typewriter for the school.

In closing I wish to thank, all who have worked to make the schools a success for the past year.

REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL.

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the town of Winterport:—

I hereby submit to you my first report as principal of the Winterport High School.

In the work at the High School this year two ideas have been kept in mind. The first was to give to the pupil a training and general education which should benefit him in a practical way in after years. As is the case of all high schools, the majority of the pupils attending will never reach college, and for this reason more stress should

be laid on the practical side of education. The other was to set forth a course of study which should prepare for college, those who desire to go farther than the high school. A college education is becoming more and more a necessity. This is an age of progress. The young man who graduates from college to-day is no better fitted for life than his father was with only a high school training.

The excellent work of Miss Jordan is worthy of your praise. Faithful to every duty and personally interested in each and every pupil, make her the efficient teacher that she is.

In the fall term there were forty-three pupils registered at the High School. Due to sickness one was obliged to drop out, and another was lost through a change of residence. At the present time there are forty-one. The average attendance has been fair.

Two plays have been presented with reasonable success for the financial benefit of the two upper classes. In behalf of these two classes, I wish to take the opportunity to thank the public for their generous patronage.

The Atheletic Association made it possible to have a basket ball team, by raising money to give the boys a start. Although the success of the team was not great, yet the boys received some benefit and pleasure from the games.

A typewriter was hired the first part of the winter term, and there are nine pupils using it now, paying for the use of the machine themselves. This shows the need of the town owning one or more machines, which can be purchased at half the retail price by schools. Another urgent need is a supply of water and a sink in the laboratory to do satisfactory work in that line.

What we have wanted to do is far more than what we have actually accomplished, yet only with the hearty co-operation of parents and citizens has it been possible to do what we have, and for this we sincerely thank you.

TOWN WARRANT

State of Maine,

Waldo S. S.

To Thomas Caraw, a Constable in the town of Winterport in said county, Greeting:—

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Winterport qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble in Union Hall, in said town on Monday, March 12, 1917 at 9 o'clock, A. M., to act on the following articles, to wit:—

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To Choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To choose three or more Selectmen.

Art. 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Common Schools, for Free High School, for the repair of School houses, for School Supplies and for Free Text Books and Salary of Superintendant of Schools.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 6. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the state highway commissioner in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 7. To see whether the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of State and State aid highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town under the provisions of Section 9 and 18 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 8. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of Highways and Bridges and for Clearing Snow from roads during the coming winter.

Art. 9. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the Support of Poor, Salaries of Officers, for Abate-ments and for Hydrant Rental and other Miscellaneous Town Charges,

Art. 10. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Purposes and Free Library.

Art. 11. To see how many Road Commissioners the town will vote to have.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to place its roads in the care of the Selectmen and instruct the Selectmen to appoint six deputies to have the care of the roads provided they will render such service and perform such duties without pay or take any action to carry out the intention and purposes of this article.

To see if the town will vote to purchase five small road machines or road graders and determine what sum shall be raised to pay for the same or act anything thereon.

Art. 13. To fix the rate of discount, if any, for the prompt payment of taxes and the time when said discount shall cease.

To fix the time when the taxes due the town, for the year 1917 shall become payable and collectable. To determine whether interest shall be charged on taxes remaining unpaid after that date and the rate of such interest.

To see if the town will vote to instruct its Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year to collect all such taxes within one year from the date of their commitment, and instruct its Municipal Officers to require the Collector to give a bond for his faithful compliance with the vote under this article.

Art. 14. To fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 15. To choose a Collector of Taxes.

Art. 16. To choose three or more Assessors of Taxes.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to elect its Overseers of the Poor for three year terms as authorized by Section 13, Chapter 4, Revised Statutes, 1916 formerly Chapter 170 Public Laws, 1905, and to take such further action in relation thereto as may be necessary.

Art. 18. To choose a Town Treasurer.

Art. 19. To choose a Town Agent.

Art. 20. To choose one or more members of the Superintending School Committee.

Art. 21. To see how much money the town will raise for Common Schools, the Free High School, Repairs, Text Books, Supplies and apparatus.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to continue the school at Boyd Corner as recommended by the School Committee or take action relating thereto.

Art. 23. To see how much money the town will raise to equip the school buildings with flags as required by law.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise twenty-five dollars for the rent of Mr. Dunton's building on Commercial Street, that being the sum already paid Mr. Dunton by agreement or take action relating thereto.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to pay the school committee twelve dollars per year, per member for services rendered or take action relating thereto.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of fifty dollars for a typewriter for the High School, provided the school will raise the remaining amount necessary.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to pay Mr. L. D. Hill anything for a horse that he lost while working on the road the past winter.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to ask the University of Maine to place the next County Demonstrator in Waldo County.

Art. 29. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the purpose of lighting the streets.

Art. 30. To choose an Auditor of Accounts.

Art. 31. To choose one or more Constables.

Art. 32. To choose one or more Fire Wardens.

Art. 33. To choose a Fire Inspector.

Art. 34. To choose one or more Fence Viewers.

Art. 35. To choose one or more Measurers of Wood and Bark.

Art. 36. To choose one or more Surveyers of Lumber.

Art. 37. To choose one or more Surveyers of Shingles, Clapboards, Hoops and Staves.

Art. 38. To choose one or more Sealers of Leather.

39. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared by the Selectmen.

The Selectmen will be in session at their office on Saturday, March 10th at two o'clock p. m., for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
