Taught by Miss Mabelle Clewly. This is my only school, during the year, that I could not recommend as being fully successful. Miss Clewly had some good methods in teaching, but failed to get the pupils interested. However, by careful study she may become a successful teacher.

Besides submitting the above report of schools, I wish to call your attention to the condition of the text books and also of the school houses.

During my year's service I have found it necessary to invest in a few new books, not as many, however, as ought to have been supplied, on account of the deficiency of funds and the economy I have been obliged to practice. I would take this opportunity to remark that a great many of the text books used in this town are unfit for service, being nearly worn out, and I would strongly recommend an appropriation to be made this year for the purchase of new books.

The repairs made on the school buildings were absolutely necessary, and they are in fairly good condition, with the exception of the one in Canty district, which is almost uninhabitable. In regard to this building, I would advise that it be abandoned and the children be trans-

ported to Pushaw school.

As you all know the condition of these two houses, it is needless for me to explain the advantage of the Pushaw building over the other. Both schools are so small that the two combined would only make a fair-sized school. Hoping that all present will consider what an important part an education plays in a person's life, and think of these ideas I have laid before you. Hoping the citizens of this town may think favorably of this. I have given this a careful consideration, and I think the children would be much more comfortable and derive a great benefit out of the money appropriated for the education and welfare of the scholars.
