Report OF THE Superintendent of Schools.

To the Citizens of the Town of Glenburn:—

Whole number of scholars April 1st, 1905, 102.

SPRING TERMS

VICKERY SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Miss Martha Braley. Whole number registered, 15; average attendance, 10; number not absent one-half day, 1; length of term, 8 weeks. Wages paid per week including board, \$5.25. This was Miss Braley's first term and she failed to give general satisfaction.

CENTER SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Miss Stella Preble. Whole number registered, 22; average attendance, 18; number not absent one-half day, 1; length of term, 10 weeks. Wages paid per week including board, \$6.75. Miss Preble has many good qualifications in teaching but failed to give satisfaction.

CANTY SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Miss Agnes E. Bean. Whole number registered, 13; average attendance, 10; number not absent one half day, 1; length of term eight weeks. Wages paid per week, including board, \$6.75. Miss Bean performed the tasks she undertook with good results.

WEST SCHOOL OR NO. 6.

This term was taught by Miss Pearle Wilson; whole number registered, 14; average attendance, 13.3; number not absent one-half day, 1; length of term, ten weeks. Wages paid, including board, \$7.00. This was Miss Wilson's sixth term in town and she did good work.

SCHOOL No. 7.

This school was taught by Karlie M. Cushman. Whole number registered, 10; average attendance, 7; number not absent one-half day, 2; length of term, 10 weeks. Wages paid per week, including board, \$6.75. Miss Cushman gave good results from her work.

FALL TERMS.

VICKERY SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Miss Karlie M. Cushman. Whole number registered, 14; average attendance, 8; number not absent one-half day, 4; length of term, 12 weeks. Wages paid per week, including board, \$6.50.

CENTER SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Miss Elsie M. Tufts. Whole number registered, 18; average attendance, 18; number not absent one-half day, none; length of term, 10 weeks. Wages paid per week, including board, \$9.75. Miss Tufts gave good satisfaction and deserves much credit in her work.

CANTY SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Miss Ruby M. Gould. Whole number registered, 17; average attendance, 14; number not absent one-half day, two; length of term, 12 weeks. Wages paid per week, including board, \$7.00. Miss Gould commands her school in a very fine manner.

WEST SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Miss Pearle Wilson. Whole number registered, 15; average attendance, 13.4; number not absent one-half day, 0; length of term 10 weeks. Wages paid per week, including board, \$7.00. Miss Wilson was continued in her work in the same school with good results.

WINTER TERMS.

CENTER SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Miss Elsie M. Tufts. Whole number registered, 23; average attendance, 18; number not absent one-half day, 7; length of term, 12 weeks. Wages paid per week including board, \$10.00. Miss Tufts did good work and met with good success.

There are three schools not closed, the scholars have made rapid advancement in all the schools in town. We have a good corps of teachers and I should recommend their services the following year.

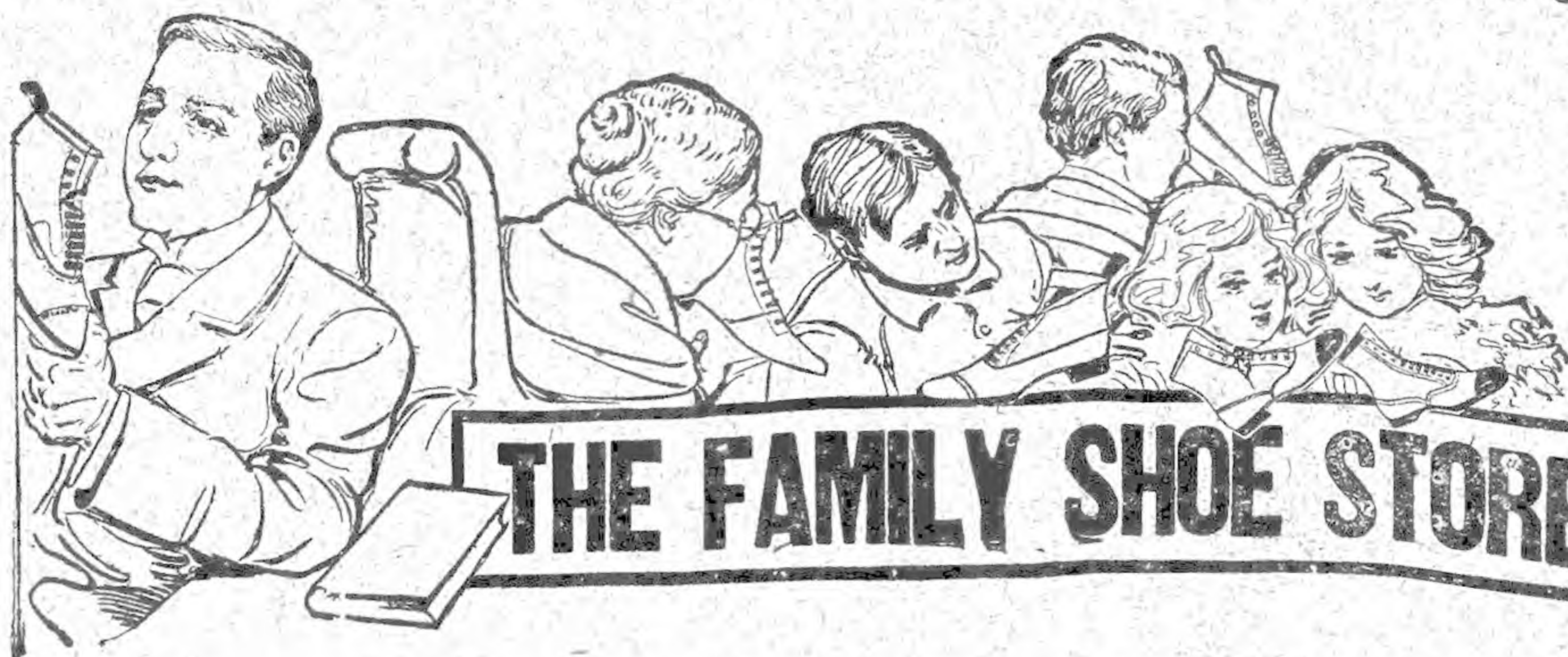

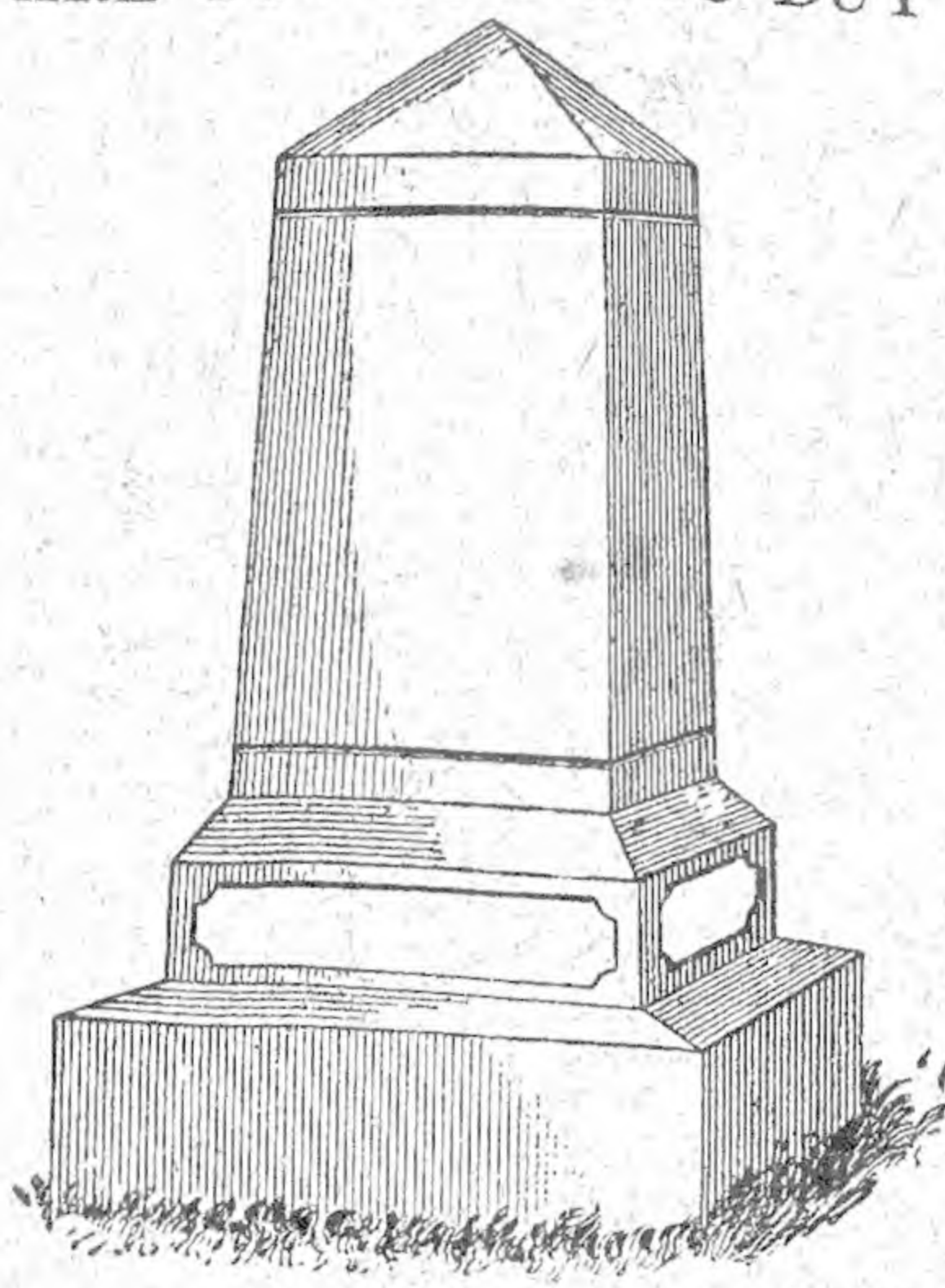

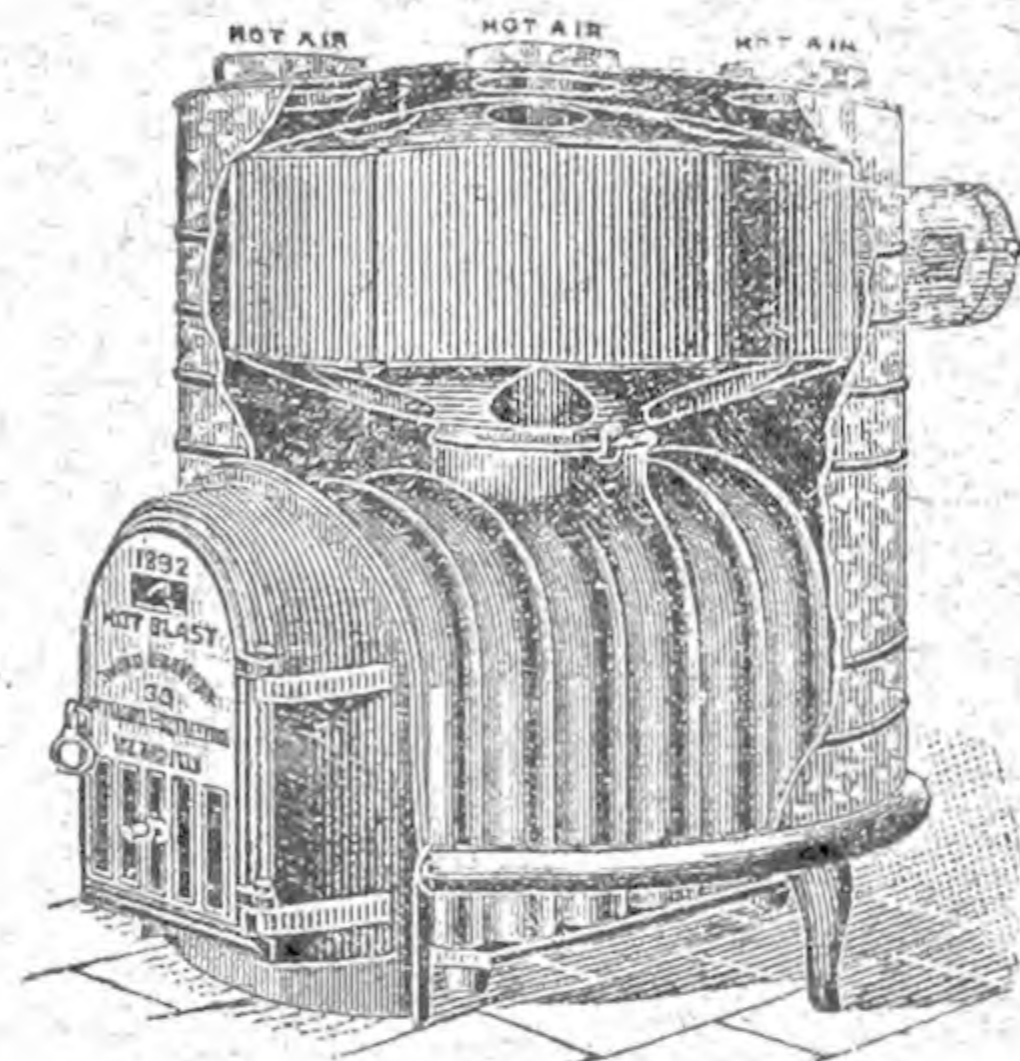
