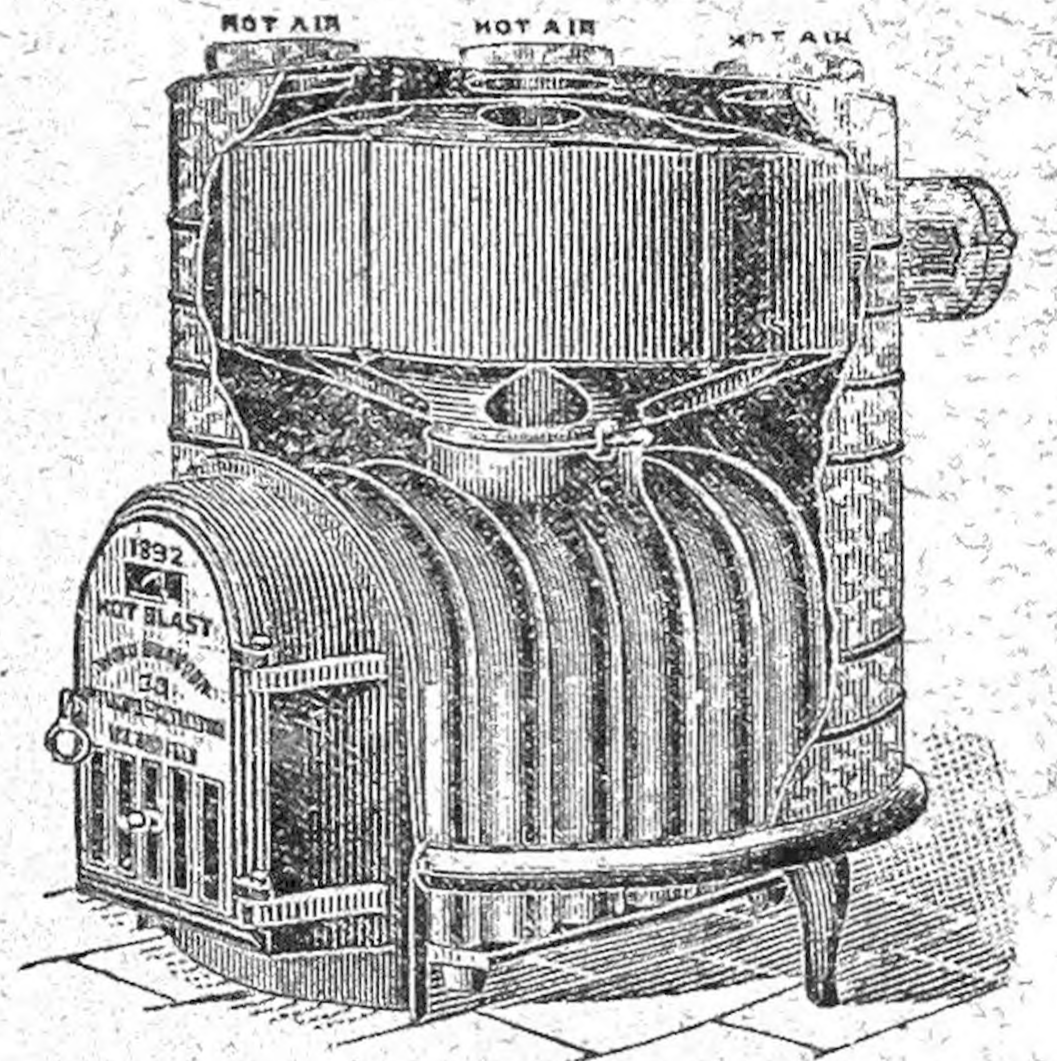

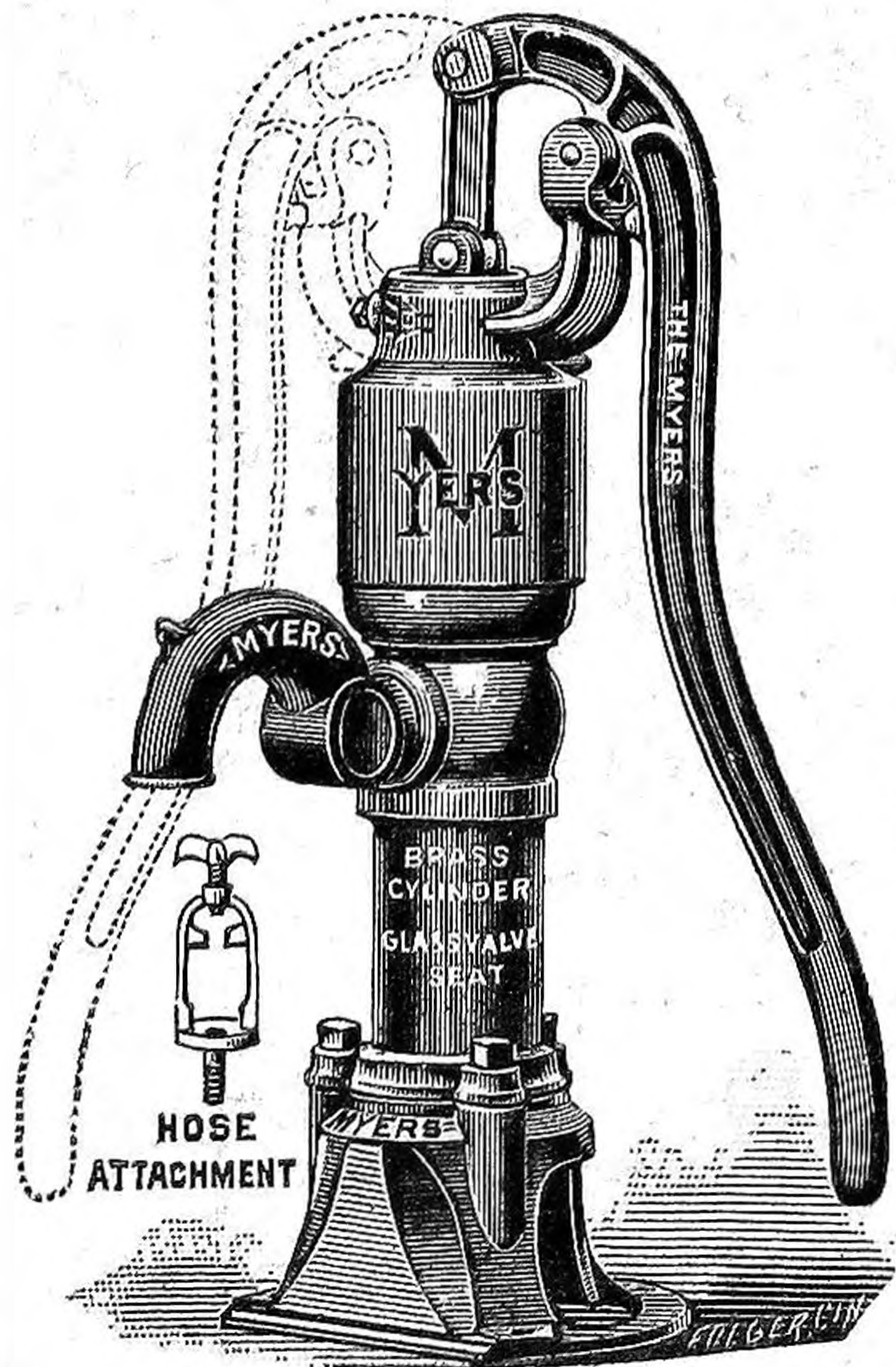

FOR THE YEARS 1905-6.

At our last annual meeting, there were three schools not closed.

### VICKERY SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Karlie M. Cushman. Whole number registered, 9; average attendance, 8; number not absent one-half day, 2; length of term, 12 weeks; wages per week, including board, \$6.50.

Miss Cushman gave good satisfaction in her work.

### CANTY SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Ruby M. Gould. Whole number registered, 13; average attendance, 10.4; number not absent one-half day, 3; length of term, 12 weeks. Wages per week, including board, \$7.00.

Miss Gould I consider a fine teacher.

### WEST SCHOOL.

This school was taught by Pearle K. Wilson. Whole number registered, 16; average attendance, 15; number not absent one-half day, 8; length of term, 12 weeks. Wages paid per week, including board, \$7.00.

Miss Wilson did good work in her school.

### SPRING TERMS.

#### VICKERY SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Miss Marcia Parker. Whole number registered, 12; average attendance, 9; number not absent one-half day, 1; length of term, 9 weeks. Wages paid per week, including board, \$5.00.

This was Miss Parker's first school and gave good satisfaction, considering so small a school.

#### CENTER SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Miss Elsie M. Tufts. Whole number registered, 23; average attendance, 21; number not absent one-half day, 3; length of term, 9 weeks. Wages paid, including board, \$7.00.

Miss Tufts cannot be too highly praised in her work.

#### CANTY SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Miss Ruby M. Gould. Whole number registered, 13; average number, 11; number not absent one-half day, 1; length of term, 9 weeks. Wages paid, including board, \$7.00.

Miss Gould continued with good results.

## WEST SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Miss Pearle K. Wilson. Whole number registered, 18; average attendance, 14; number not absent one-half day, 1; length of term, 9 weeks. Wages paid per week, including board, \$7.00.

## FALL TERMS.

## VICKERY SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Miss Minnie E. Nayson. Whole number registered, 8; average attendance, 7; number not absent one-half day, 1; length of term, 9. Wages paid, including board, \$6.00.

This was Miss Nayson's first term and closed with good success.

## CENTER SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Miss Villa Flemming. Whole number registered, 36; average attendance, 29; number not absent one-half day, 1; length of term, 9 weeks. Wages paid per week, including board, \$10.00.

This was Miss Flemming's first term in town and her teaching was liked very much.

## WEST SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Miss Pearle Wilson. Whole number attending school, 19; average number, 17; number not absent one-half day, 0; length of term, 9 weeks. Wages paid, including board, \$7.00.

Miss Wilson I consider a very fine teacher.

## WINTER TERMS.

## CENTER SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Lillian Trott. Whole number registered, 20; average number, 16; number not absent one-half day, 0; length of term, 8. Wages paid, including board, \$7.00.

Miss Trott is an experienced teacher.

## CANTY SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Miss Villa Flemming. Whole number registered, 17; average attendance, 13; number not absent one-half day, 2; length of term, 8 weeks. Wages paid per week, including board, \$7.00.

## WEST SCHOOL.

This term was taught by Pearle Wilson. Whole number registered, 19; average attendance, 16; number not absent one-half day, 1; length of term, 8 weeks. Wages paid per week, including board, \$7.00.
