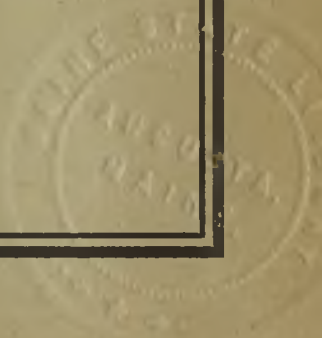

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the Superintending SchoolMHF -Y
TO THE MEMBERS OF THE SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL
COMMITTEE AND PEOPLE OF NEWCASTLE:

I hereby submit my annual report of schools.

The total enrollment of the common schools is 149.

The total census of scholars taken in April 1920 was 305.

There have been more changes in our teaching force this year than at any time during my service as superintendent in your town. This is partly due to teachers leaving the teaching profession for more lucrative positions. In nearly all cases the inexperienced teachers who have filled the vacancies made by the retiring teachers, have been faithful, sparing no pains to adapt themselves to the needs of the schools; these teachers need the help and co-operation of parents and scholars. There never was a teacher who did not teach her first term, nor who did not gain her experience by teaching. I have faith in these climbers on the lower round and ask you to have the same.

Both Miss Chandler and Mrs. Reed of the village schools resigned and their places were aptly filled by Miss Jacobs and Miss Keyes, who were able to carry on the work without a break in routine.

Miss Effie Perkins taught the short winter term at Damariscotta Mills. I consider that for a teacher with no experience Miss Perkins has done well. I take this space to thank the older boys for their loyalty to a new teacher.

At Dist. No. 4 Miss Bellamay MacAllister, a graduate of Bristol high school, taught her first term in the fall; she also was without experience and has done her best.

At No. 6, Miss Ruby Hodgkins, who promises to be one of our best teachers taught the spring term, but, owing to ill health was obliged to get excused from teaching the fall term and Miss Josephine Lailer, another inexperienced teacher, did the work in a creditable manner. Miss Hodgkins returned for the winter term. This school has only eleven scholars who are in many different classes of one or two pupils each, making the work less interesting to teacher and pupils than if there were enough students to make a competition.

These small schools scattered about our town would make a fairly good sized school where splendid results might be obtained were they united. This union of schools should be made.

At Sheepscot Miss Ruth Carney taught until the fall term opened. The English taught by Miss Carney was exceptionally good and deserves mention. Miss Helen Stewart taught the winter term with good results.

The school at South Newcastle, having a sufficient number of scholars unexpectedly move into that district, was opened later than the others; this school has been efficiently taught by Miss Ella Sherman.

The most difficult school of our town is at North Newcastle, a school registering through the year thirty-five scholars with many grades and classes; on this account no teacher however expert could do justice to such a situation. Miss Smithwick has been painstaking and conscientious; parents must realize this. The only way to relieve this tension and give scholars and teacher justice is to separate the grammar from the primary grades and hire two teachers; this should not be a consideration of dollars and cents, but one of the welfare of the school.

Repairs have been made on some school build-

ings and others, owing to lack of labor are still needing them.

At Damariscotta Mills the school room was painted at the expense of the town and papered by the School League. Repairs have also been made in the basement, but new shores are still needed; better toilets should be built there.

Shingles were bought for No. 4 in the spring, but owing to lack of labor they have not yet been used. North Newcastle building must be shingled; that of Sheepscot was shingled this fall and is in good repair.

The usual report is to be made of No. 6. At a superintendents' conference at Augusta last year pictures showing some of the model school building of the State were put on the screen and much to my delight that of No. 6 was shown, but I fear if the inside of the building had been pictured the enthusiasm that this neat little house met would have been less. The drainage is still a menace; it is unsanitary. New blackboards are needed, portions of the walls should be plastered and walls and ceiling whitened. The village building is in good condition, new curtains are needed there as well as at North Newcastle.

Any bills contracted for the necessary repairs made at South Newcastle are due to me, and I willingly assume all responsibility and blame for them in having that building made fit for occupancy.

From my point of view it would be a matter of economy if sufficient money to put all school buildings in equally *good* repair was appropriated one year, and a lesser sum raised each year after to keep them so. It is impossible to make really needed repairs to the amount of \$500 with an appropriation of \$250.

This is the second year of our State Course of Study. Scholars are being graduated from the common schools on the completion of this course, but,

owing to the short school year and shortage of experienced teachers results were not satisfactory last year.

Better work has been done in lower grade reading than in any previous year. The supervision of primary work of Portland gave us a part of a day at the grammar room during the spring term. This was expert work and I am glad to note the results in some of our schools.

The New Starkey History of Maine is in our seventh and eighth grades. This book fills a long felt need of the history and civics of our State.

I wish to suggest that long fall and spring terms with a recess of one week in each and a vacation of the two long cold months of winter constitute the school year.

I take this space to declare that the common school money appropriated each year includes the sums of teachers' wages, fuel, conveyance and board of scholars, and janitor service.

TOWN WARRANT

To A. B. Gilpatrick Esq., a constable of the town of Newcastle, County of Lincoln and State of Maine,

GREETING :

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Newcastle, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Oliver's Hall in said town on the 21st day of March, A. D. 1921, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To see what action the town will take on the report of the auditor.

Art. 4. To choose selectmen, assessors, overseers of the poor, and a fish committee for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To choose two members of the superintending school committee, one to act for two years, one to act for three years.

Art. 7. To see what method the town will adopt for the collecting of taxes, and fix the compensation for the same.

Art. 8. To choose a collector of taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To choose an auditor of accounts for the ensuing year.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to elect one or three road commissioners or leave with the selectmen to appoint.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise One Thousand Dollars for a sinking fund for the ensuing year.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for discount on taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of common schools for the ensuing year.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs of school houses for the ensuing year.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for payment of tuition in secondary schools.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for school text books and supplies.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for highways for the ensuing year.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs of bridges for the ensuing year.

Art. 22. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of Five Hundred Thirty-three Dollars (\$533.) for State Aid road under the provision of Sec. 19 of Chap. 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs of sidewalks.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 25. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for incidental expenses.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise One Hundred Dollars for support of free library for the ensuing year.

Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to raise One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$150.) for support of Taniscot Engine Co. for the ensuing year.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of Twenty-five Dollars for Harlow Dunbar Post, G. A. R.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for patrol service for the ensuing year.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on town notes.

Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for street lighting for the ensuing year.

Art. 32. To see whether the town will vote to raise, and what sum, for the maintenance of State highways within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Sec. 9 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
