

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Committee and Citizens of Newcastle:

I herewith submit my annual report of your schools. Considering the change of teachers a reasonable amount of go od work has been done, but, as I reported last year, these frequent changes have been and are now doing much to hinder the progress of our schools.

The only schools that have retained teachers for the year are North Newcastle, South Newcastle and the village grammar school.

The maximum salary paid to teachers is \$18, the minimum \$12. We cannot expect an experienced teacher who receives \$15 per week, pays from that amount her board and other living expenses, to remain on our teaching f orce for any length of time, and certainly we cannot think of securing an expert teacher for any one of our schools who pays her board from a weekly stipend of \$12. The only way to relieve the situation is by paying our teachers a living salary and retaining them.

Mrs. Emily Chandler is teaching her second year in the grammar school. Mrs. Chandler has worked hard for the interest of her school and has met with a good degree of success. Three from this school entered Lincoln Academy last fall. Total attendance, 28. Average, 25.

In the primary room Miss Keyes taught the first term of the year, Mrs. Elsie Reed the second and Miss Hilda Morrison the third. These teachers are well qualified and have done good work, but the changes have meant a loss somewhere. Total attendance, 30. Average, 20.

At Damariscotta Mills, Nettie Clark taught the first term, Miss Winnifred Wood the second and Mrs. Elmira Hale the third. The program left by one teacher has been so successfully taken up by the others that there has been no noticeable break in the advancement of the pupils. Total attendance,13. Average, 12.

District No. 4 has also been unfortunate in its changing teachers, Mrs. Mary Sherman teaching the first term, Mrs. Bellamay Bosworth the second and Mrs. Sanford Bartlett the third. One from this school entered Lincoln Academy last fall, and if we are able to retain our present very efficient teacher two will enter the Academy next fall. Whole attendance, 11. Average, 9.

Charles Sherman is teaching his second year at North Newcastle. This is a real rural school; the attendance large and the classes many. Mr. Sherman, in spite of difficulties, has kept up the interest and done good work. Whole number registered, 22. Average, 19.

In Sheepscot Mrs. Alice Dodge taught the spring term, Miss Isabel Lewis the fall, and Rev. John A. Stevens the winter. This is also a real rural school, but of small attendance and few classes. Let teachers try as they will in schools of this kind, the interest will flag. The attendance, seven, is so small that the school can only be continued by vote of the town.

This is Elsie Sherman's sixth year at South Newcastle. Miss Sherman lives a long distance from her school but she is on duty when the roads are almost impassable. One scholar from this school entered Lincoln Academy last fall.

The school has not the average attendance, eight, required by law and can be continued only by vote of the town.

Miss Lurie Glidden taught the first term of the year at District No. 6, Mrs. Alice Dodge the second, and Miss Winnifred Wood the third. With the present interest and efforts of the scholars four should enter Lincoln Academy next fall. Total attendance, 22. Average, 18.

All teachers noted above have been faithful to their duties and painstaking in their efforts.

In the report of last year was inserted a notice from the State Laws of Maine relative to the fact that on and after the first day of Setpember, 1924, all school buildings shall be provided with toilet facilities which will meet the requirements of the State.

No appropriation was made and nothing has been done concerning this law.

I would advise that a special appropriation be made for a beginning of this work and that the school board attend to the work as soon as possible, otherwise the expense will be crowded into one year.

Other needed repairs should be made this year, real repairs that will be lasting for a year or two at least. Too much patching has been done; the method of repairs means a greater expense to the town later.

The building at South Newcastle needs a new floor as soon as possible. The little shabby uncomfortable desks in this room have become unsanitary through age.

I repeat that the building at Damariscotta Mills needs a new platform, doors repaired, and furnished with proper locks and bolts.

There are many minor repairs to be made at North Newcastle and Sheepscot. North Newcastle should receive first attention to its toilets. If these two buildings could receive the repairs they need during the summer vacation, a greater interest would be shown in regard to the schools than heretofore.

The outside platform and steps of the village school must be put in better shape.

Tuitions of Newcastle scholars at Lincoln Academy: Winter, 41 scholars; spring, 39; fall, 37.

TOWN WARRANT

To A. B. Gilpatrick, a Constable of the Town of Newcastle, County of Lincoln, State of Maine,

GREETINGS

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of said town of Newcastle qualified to vote in town affairs to assemble at "Oliver's Hall" in said town on the 19th day of March, A. D. 1923, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:—

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To see what action the town will take on report of the Auditor.

Art. 4. To choose Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of Poor, and Fish Committee and fix their compensation.

Art. 5. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To choose three members of the superintending school committee; one for one year, one for two years, and one for three years.

Art. 7. To see what method the town will adopt for the collection of taxes and for compensation for same.

Art. 8. To choose a collector of taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To choose an auditor for the ensuing year. Art. 10. To choose one member for the Board of Trustees, Cemetery Association, for three years. Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to elect one or three road commissioners, or leave to Selectmen to appoint.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars for a Sinking Fund for ensuing year.

Art. 13. To see what sum the town will vote for discount of taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will for repair of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for support of common schools.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay tuition of secondary schools.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of text books and supplies.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will' vote to raise for the support of poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for highways for ensuing year.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of bridges for the ensuing year.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for payment of snow bills for ensuing year.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on question of raising and appropriating money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Sec. 30 of Public Laws of 1913. Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$533.00 for State Aid road under provision of Section 19, Chapter 130 of Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote for the repair of sidewalks for ensuing year.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote the sum of \$500.00 to build permanent sidewalks on Main street in the village by contract or otherwise.

Art. 26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the payment of town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote for incidentals for the ensuing year.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$650.00 for the surfacing, putting in catch basins and extending work on Main Street to R. R. crossing.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote for putting in Sanitary Closets at school houses under provisions of State Law.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the town will vote for support of Free Library for ensuing year.

To see if the town will instruct Selectmen to sell the old Town House, road machine house at the village and South Newcastle; also in connection with Jefferson the fish house at North Newcastle to the best advantage of the town. Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will raise for patrol service for the ensuing year.

Giles' residence in town of Boothbay, to Alna line following the highway as laid out and used in the town of Boothbay, Edgecomb and Newcastle as follows: River road from said Willow Tree to Edgecomb town line, thence over same highway through the towns of Edgecomb and Newcastle to the Congregational Church in Newcastle; thence to Damariscotta Mills thence to Alna line.
