Anyone wishing to take advantage of this will please communicate with me.

Elmer Walker, South Poland was recommended for plumbing inspector for the town and was so appointed by the State Department.

I notice some people still insist in depositing their rubbish within the limit of the highway. We should have more pride in our town than to let anyone do this, so please discontinue this practice.

Our schools are better in materials and methods than they were.

A system is efficient only as it presents equal and universal opportunities; prepares the youth to do better the desirable things of life which he must inevitably do; prepares him physically for the tasks of life; inspires him with a desire for worthy home membership and for voca-

tional and professional efficiency; gives him a sense of civic responsibility; builds in him an ethical character.

The following essentials mark an efficient school system:

- 1. An intelligent and sympathetic public.
- 2. Adequate support.
- 3. A school plant adequate to the needs of the community, which safeguards the health and morals of the children and has the equipment for efficient instruction.
- 4. A school year of sufficient length to assure the continual growth of the child.
- 5. A program of studies which is connected with life lessons and problems.
- 6. Capable and conscientious teachers of sound judgment and character.

There is a fine spirit on the part of the people which is exceedingly gratifying.

There are many difficult problems yet to be solved, among them the question of transportation of school children who live in sparsely settled sections and who are handicapped in their endeavor to secure an education.

Each day that a pupil is in school is worth to the town about \$.02½ per day. The town draws from the State this amount for aggregate attendance.

It is very plain to see that the pupils should be in school every day that school is in session. During the winter term the attendance has been unavoidably low. There has been a loss to both the pupils and town.

A few recommendations follow:

- 1. Qualified teachers.
- 2. A longer school year.
- 3. More reading material to be placed at the disposal of the pupils.

HEALTH WORK

All teachers are required to give instruction in health principles, in health projects.

During the past year the support of the Superintending School Committee was obtained and the services of a Red Cross Nurse was secured. The nurse examined 332. The following points were observed; eyes, teeth, ears, skin, weight and height. These reports were sent home. The nurse also visited some 30 homes giving advice and instructions to mothers. If this can be followed up, in a few years most of the worst defects can be corrected, and the habits of health and cleanliness of the children greatly improved.

READING

A very decided improvement in the ability of pupils to read has been gained. Teachers were encouraged to study the subject and to teach from every conceivable angle, posting themselves on the several methods that are advanced so that they might select the one which gave the best results. They are still studying. It is believed that by improving the quality of reading in our schools, we shall materially enhance results in every other study.

TEACHERS' MEETING

The Poland Teachers' Association has become a very important factor for good to our teachers.

Six very helpful and interesting meetings have been held during the year. Programs have been so planned that several professional speakers have been enjoyed.

It is our belief that the meetings of the teachers' association are of increasing benefit and constitute a valuable factor in our educational program.

CONCLUSION

The year has been filled with unavoidable breaks, with much sickness and hardships which we have tried to overcome with courage.

Our teachers are a splendid group. I wish to thank them for the fine spirit and kindness which they have shown in all the hardships which they have met. Their kindness to me is sincerely appreciated. They are a painstaking and faithful group. It is a pleasure to work with them.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

To Arthur B. Grant, Constable of the Town of Poland in the County of Androscoggin and State of Maine.

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Poland qualified by law to vote in town affairs to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Monday the tenth day of March, A.D., 1930 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To hear and act upon reports of Town officers and committee on accounts.
- Art. 3. To choose all necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to elect one or more road commissioners and fix their compensation.
- Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to elect an advisory committee to work in conjunction with the Selectmen and School Committee to investigate the entire business of the town and make recommendations for the consideration of the 1931 Town meeting, and to designate the number of citizens on this committee.
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay tuition of scholars attending High Schools of other towns, support of common schools, and for textbooks and supplies.

- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of school property.
- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of graduation exercises of Poland schools, under the direction of the Superintending School Committee.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of school flags and for maintenance of flag poles.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of Superintendent of Schools and other town officers.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to reopen the Hard Scrabble school at the beginning of the school year, Sept., 1930.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to continue the Johnson Hill School.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of roads and bridges.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for common road patrol.
- Art. 15. To see whether the town will vote "Yes" or "No" in regard to snow removal on the roads in town for winter of 1930 and 1931.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen and Road Commissioner authority to close to winter travel such roads as they deem advisable.
- Art. 17. To see what action the town will take in regard to buying or hiring a truck or tractor or any other road machinery for road work and snow removal or act

in any other manner relating thereto and raising and appropriating money to purchase the same.

- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase snow fence for the winter of 1930-1931.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay snow bills.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of raising and appropriating necessary money to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Public Laws of 1916.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$732.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for care of ways, highways and bridges.

The above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of State Highways during the ensuing year under provisions of Section 9 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913 and Chapter 272 of the Public Laws of 1915.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$726.00 for the maintenance of Third Class roads, such sum being necessary to prevent a forfeiture of apportionment from the State, under provisions of Section 4, Chapter 260 of the Public Laws of 1929.
- Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to continue the building of the road from the G. T. R. R. siding to the Rogers Fibre Company mill.

Rogers Fibre Company agreeing to pay \$250.00 additional for the same purpose.

- Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$400.00 to improve that section of the Hardscrabble road beginning at the small bridge near the farm buildings of Tony L. Heureux and extending toward the Auburn line.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to finish graveling the road running from State Highway at Shaker Village to New Gloucester town line on North Raymond road.
- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to improve the road from Harris Hill School house to the Mechanic Falls line.
- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to finish the Swamp Hill, so-called on the Black Cat road.
- Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to continue the road already started from the Jackson road to the Hayes Hill.
- Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to improve the road near John Schellingers, continuing the work done in 1929.
- Art. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for graveling the road between the "square-house", so-called and Geo. Chipmans.
- Art. 32. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to widen the turn from Black Cat road toward White Oak Hill.
- Art. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of poor.
 - Art. 34. To see what sum of money the town will

vote to raise and appropriate to pay collector's commission and abatements.

- Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and donate to A. A. Dwinal Post, G. A. R. to help defray the expenses of Memorial Day.
- Art. 36. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Contingent Fund.
- Art. 37. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.
- Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 to pay the Town Bond due September 1, 1930 and \$765.00 to pay interest on Town Bonds, due in 1930.
- Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to sell one or both of its town farms including buildings, stock and equipment. Also to see if the town will vote to use all funds received from sale of such property in making payment on town indebtedness.
- Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$75.00 to pay the school board.
- Art. 41. To see what date the town will fix for payment of taxes.
- Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to make poll taxes payable on presentation of bill.
- Art. 43. To see if the town will vote to allow the Town Treasurer and Selectmen to hire necessary money to pay bills until taxes are collected.
- Art. 44. To see if the town will vote to have the town books audited for the ensuing year.

- Art. 45. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300.00 for the repair of town buildings.
- Art. 46. To see if the town will vote to raise and expend the sum of \$200.00 to continue work of White Pine Blister Rust control.
- Art. 47. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the services of a County public health nurse working under the supervision of the American Red Cross.
- Art. 48. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Superintending School Committee to procure liability insurance covering accidents on transportation vehicles.
