
With the completion of this year's work the initial Blister Rust program in Poland has been completed. The work this year was conducted under the direct supervision of Willis Kimball, and a foreman and the

AUDITOR'S REPORT

February 26, 1931

To the Chairman and Board of Selectmen, Town of Poland, Maine. Gentlemen:

We have completed our examination of the accounts of the Town of Poland for the year ending February 15, 1931.

The Treasurer's records have been examined and are hereby certified correct. We have determined, from all sources available, that income due the town has been properly accounted for and that all disbursements made by the Treasurer were supported by orders drawn by the Selectmen and signed by two or more members of the board. Other town funds in the custody of the Treasurer were properly accounted for.

The Tax Collector's records have been examined and satisfactorily account for the entire commitment plus the supplementary list of taxes due.

Payrolls submitted by the Superintendent of Schools and by the Road Commissioner were examined and found properly signed and authorized by the School Committee and the Selectmen.

We have found numerous clerical errors in the annual reports rendered by the Superintendent of Schools, both for the current year and prior years which are errors in summarizing and copying. We have recommended to your Selectmen a new combined voucher and report in triplicate form for the Superintendent of Schools which in our opinion will aid in eliminating many of the above mentioned inaccuracies. A similar form of voucher and report is also recommended for the Road Commissioner, which if adopted will save much labor in copying.

Town orders drawn by the Board of Selectmen were supported by invoices made out to the Town of Poland and approved by two or more members of the Board. The record of town orders and the filing of invoices are kept in good order for ready reference.

The Treasurer of the Poland Ministerial Fund accounted for the funds in his possession and properly recorded the income and expenditures. Interest on the following named bonds held in this fund was defaulted April 15, 1930:

I respectfully submit herewith the annual report of the Superintendent of Schools:

The past year has been very satisfactory from an educational view point.

It is the first time in years that the schools have not been broken up more or less by contagious diseases. Regular attendance by pupils is an important factor in maintaining a strong educational program. Pupil progress has been excellent and much credit is due to the faithful efforts of the teachers.

The good roads have added greatly to our attendance problem.

Our schools are better in materials and methods than they were.

A system is efficient only as it presents equal and universal opportunities; prepares the youth to do better the desirable things of life which he must inevitably do; prepares him physically for the tasks of life; inspires him with a desire for worthy home membership and for vocational and professional efficiency; gives him a sense of civic responsibility; builds in him an ethical character.

The following essentials mark an efficient school system:

1. An intelligent and sympathetic public.

2. Adequate support.

3. A school plant adequate to the needs of the community, which safeguards the health and morals of the children and has the equipment for efficient instruction.

4. A school year of sufficient length to assure the continual growth of the child.

5. A program of studies which is connected with life lessons and problems.

6. Capable and conscientious teachers of sound judgment and character.

There is a fine spirit on the part of the people which is exceedingly gratifying.

There are many difficult problems yet to be solved, among them the question of transportation of school children who live in sparsely settled sections and who are handicapped in their endeavor to secure an education.

Each day that a pupil is in school is worth to the town about $02\frac{1}{2}$ per day. The town draws from the State this amount for aggregate attendance.

A few recommendations follow:

1. Qualified teachers.

2. More reading material to be placed at the disposal of the pupils.

REPORT OF COUNTY SCHOOL NURSING IN POLAND FOR 1930

The fifteen schools of Poland were visited during September. Two hundred eighty-eight (288) pupils were inspected and of this number one hundred fortytwo (142) were free from obvious defects. Twelve (12) had defective vision; four (4) defective hearing and twenty (20) had enlarged tonsils.

All children were weighed and measured and eighteen (18) of this number were underweight. One hundred two (102) notices were sent to parents and thirtytwo (32) home calls were made to advise and help parents care for the defects. One (1) child was accompanied to a throat specialist for examination. Since similar work was done last fall, fifty seven (57) children had teeth defects corrected; ten (10) had enlarged tonsils cared for and five (5) had glasses fitted. One (1) child who had a bad throat and ear condition for two years was given hospital treatment and for the children in another family, denta¹ treatment was arranged without cost. Clothing was furnished a needy family and a layette was also given.

Arrangements are being made for three (3) other children to have hospital treatment for enlarged tonsils and for one (1) child to have examination for defective vision.

Miss Helen Fifield, Dental Hygienist spent two days on prophylactic work and examinations in preparation of awarding dental certificates for mouth hygiene. Eighty (80) children had their teeth cleaned.

Dr. Mitchell, State Health Officer, examined eighty

(80) children for throats and awarded sixty (60) certificates. Many children now will be ready to qualify as six point children.

The audiometer, a machine for testing the hearing was used. Two hundred fifty (250) children were examined and four (4) found to have defective hearing. Parents were notified and teachers were instructed to arrange seats to make it easy for them.

Health talks were given in each school. The drinking water and toilets were inspected and found satisfactory.

Teachers were encouraged to study the subject and to teach from every conceivable angle, posting themselves on the several methods that are advanced so that they might select the one which gave the best results. They are still studying. It is believed that by improving the quality of reading in our schools, we shall materially enhance results in every other study.

TEACHERS' MEETING

The Poland Teachers' Association has become a very important factor for good to our teachers.

Five very helpful and interesting meetings have been held during the year. Programs have been so planned that several professional speakers have been enjoyed.

It is our belief that the meetings of the teachers'

association are of increasing benefit and constitute a valuable factor in our educational program.

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CONCLUSION

Our teachers are a splendid group. I wish to thank them for the fine spirit and kindness which they have shown in all the hardships which they have met. Their kindness to me is sincerely appreciated. They are a painstaking and faithful group. It is a pleasure to work with them.

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WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

67

To Arthur B. Grant, Constable of the Town of Poland in the County of Androscoggin and State of Maine. Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Poland qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Monday, ninth day of March, A.D., 1931 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To hear and act upon reports of Town

Officers and Committee on Accounts.

Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to elect three Selectmen, one to hold office for one year, one for two years and one for three years. One member of the Board of Selectmen to be elected at each annual meeting of the town thereafter for a term of three years.

Art. 4. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To see if the Town, instead of electing a Road Commissioner, will vote to instruct all Selectmen when elected, to appoint a Road Commissioner.

Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to elect one or more road commissioners and to fix their compensation.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will

vote to raise and appropriate to pay tuition of scholars attending High School of other towns, support of common schools and for text books and supplies.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of school property.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of graduation exercises of Poland schools, under the direction of Superintending School Committee.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of school flags and for maintenance of flag poles.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the salary of the Superintendent of Schools and other town officers.

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Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to allow A. B. Ricker to remodel the Ricker Hill Schoolhouse into a two room building according to plans as approved by State Superintendent of Schools.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$750 for their part in remodeling the Ricker Hill Schoolhouse.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to continue the Johnson Hill School.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of roads and bridges.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for common road patrol.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote "Yes" or "No" in regard to snow removal on the roads in Town for winter of 1931-1932. Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase snow fence for the winter of 1931-1932.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$4,410.00 to purchase the truck and snow plow we now have on lease.

Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay snow bills.

Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of raising and appropriating necessary money to entitle the Town to State Aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Public Laws of 1916.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$732.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for care of ways, highways and bridges.

The above amount being the maximum which the Town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18 Chapter 25 of the revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,010.00 for the maintenance of Third Class roads, such sum being necessary to prevent a forfeiture of apportionment from the State under provisions of Section 4, Chapter 260 of the Public Laws of 1929.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the road leading from the Five Corners to the West Poland road.

Art. 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$400.00 to improve the Hardscrabble road at East Poland.

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Art. 26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate on the road from Harris Hill Schoolhouse and Mechanic Falls line.

Art. 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and expend on the Jackson road, continuing the work of 1930.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to improve the road near John Schellinger's continuing towards Summit Spring Hotel, continuing work done in 1930.

Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Rangeway leading from Jackson Road to the White Oak Hill Road.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate on the Rangeway road leading from the Jackson Road to the White Oak Hill

Road.

Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$500.00 to complete work started on the Mannis Hill Road.

Art. 32. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor.

Art. 33. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to pay Collector's commission and abatements.

Art. 34. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and donate to A. A. Dwinal Post G. A. R. to help defray expenses of Memorial Day.

Art. 35. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Contingent Fund.

Art. 36. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.

Art. 37. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$75.00 to pay the School Board.

Art. 38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 to pay the Town Bond due September 1, 1931 and \$720.00 to pay interest on town bonds due in 1931.

Art. 39. To see what date the Town will fix for payment of taxes.

Art. 40. To see if the Town will vote to make poll taxes payable on presentation of bill.

Art. 41. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Town Treasurer and Selectmen to hire necessary money to pay bills until taxes are collected.

Art. 42. To see if the Town will vote to have the uniform system of accounting as recommended by the State Auditors' department installed. Also to have the town books audited for the year 1931.

Art. 43. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$400.00 for the repair of town buildings.

Art. 44. To see if the Town of Poland will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 to be used for nursing work under the supervision of the Androscoggin County Red Cross.

Art. 45. To see if the Town will vote to close the road known as the City Road, leading from the old John Murray residence, running north by the Barberick place, and intersecting the road leading from Rickers' Gate to Bailey Hill and to put up signs to warn travelers who use the road that they do so at their own risk.

Art. 46. To see if the Town will vote to close the short piece of road at the top of Cobble Hill to Rickers' gate.

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Art. 47. To see if the Town will vote to hire the money anticipated from the State in 1932 on construction of Third Class road to allow the Town to build two years road in 1931, the interest on this loan to be paid at no expense to the Town.

Art. 48. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the School Committee to purchase land adjoining the West Poland School property for the purpose of enlarging the woodshed so that the toilets may be rebuilt to meet State requirements and to furnish suitable school grounds.

Art. 49. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the School Committee to rebuild the woodshed at West Poland.

Art. 50. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of improving the West Poland school property according to the two preceding articles.

Art. 51. To see if the Town will vote to accept a list of jurors as compiled by the Selectmen.

Art. 52. To see what action the Town will vote to take on closing or selling the Town Farm for the ensuing year.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall on the day of the meeting at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
