REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH AND HEALTH OFFICER

February 18, 1932

To the Citizens of Poland:

In the past year the following cases have been reported to me and likewise I have reported to the State Department of Health at Augusta.

Fifteen persons have been cultured for diphtheria and found negative. Four families have been under partial quarantine and I have guaranteed the cost of anti-toxin in two cases of diphtheria. The following homes have been disinfected, one for diphtheria, one for infantile paralysis, three for scarlet fever, two for tuberculosis and two school houses.

There is at present one family under quarantine for scarlet fever and two for measles. Eight hundred and two health certificates have been issued to food handlers and the law now requires that applicants must sign their certificates in the presence of the health officer. I have attended four board of health meetings and recommended the reappointment of Elmer F. Walker as plumbing inspector and A. F. Waterhouse as deputy plumbing inspector for 1932 and these two names were confirmed by the State Department. All nuisance cases reported have been investigated.

I note that some still persist in dumping rubbish within the limits of the highway. This practice must be stopped. Free vaccination for small pox will be given in the month of March and those wishing to take advantage of this will please notify the health officer.

REPORT OF AUDITOR

Board of Selectmen, Town of Poland, Maine. Gentlemen:

We have completed our examination of the accounts of the Town of Poland for the year ending February 15, 1932.

Town orders drawn by the Selectmen were properly supported by invoices and approved by two or more members of the Board. The orders were correctly distributed to the various accounts for which money was raised by the Town.

The Treasurer accounted for the money due the Town from all sources determinable by us and made payments only on orders drawn by the Selectmen, excepting those payments made to the County and State Treasurers.

The Tax Collector accounted for the taxes committed for collection and held receipts for cash paid the Treasurer. Uncollected taxes were listed and abatements supported by Selectmen's signatures.

The Road Commissioner's payrolls were supported by invoices and time records, tests of which were made in verification. Payrolls and invoices were approved by the Selectmen.

We recommend the adoption of a new form of report by the School Superintendent and School Board similar to that suggested last year. We also recommend that the head of each department of the Town present a completed annual report to the Board of Selectmen before the arrangements are made for the final auditing of the Town's accounts and reports.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

I respectfully submit the annual report of the Superintendent of Schools:

There is much talk and discussion at the present time relative to reduction in taxes. While we are in general sympathy with such a movement, we feel it our duty to voice our protest against any wide-spread reduction in the salaries of teachers.

The average salary of teachers in Maine is already very low, Maine standing thirty-six of the forty-eight states in reference to average salary of teachers. Maine on the average, is over two hundred dollars lower than the neighboring state of New Hampshire, lower than Vermont and, of course much lower than the other New England states.

It would appear that any marked reduction in teachers' salaries could result only in a decreased efficiency in our public schools.

Because of nation and world-wide financial difficulties, we cannot afford to penalize the present generation in school and deprive them of their fair share of educational opportunities. In periods of financial stress, education should be the last item in which curtailment should be made.

When we analyze any reduction in tax rates which may be effected through a reduction in teachers' salaries we will find that such a reduction alone will oftentimes be too insignificant to afford any real relief. Two or three dollars per week may mean the difference between a poor school, which is largely a waste of money, and a good school, which must be considered a good investment. The practical value of even a week's study does not lie in the amount of knowledge gained in that time but in that direction and guidance which enables us to grapple with the problem of ourselves.

Much of the work we have been attempting to accomplish does not lend itself particularly to publicity and yet, we feel that we are steadily making progress and that from year to year we can see evidences of steady improvement in the public school system of our town.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

To Arthur B. Grant, Constable of the Town of Poland in the County of Androscoggin and State of Maine.

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Poland qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Monday the fourteenth day of March, A.D., 1932 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To hear and act upon reports of Town Officers and Committee on Accounts.
- Art. 3. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to elect one or more Road Commissioners and to fix their compensation.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay tuition of scholars attending High School of other towns, Support of Common Schools and for textbooks and supplies.
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of school property.
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of gradua-

tion exercises of Poland Schools under the direction of Superintending School Committee.

- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of school flags and for maintenance of flag poles.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of the Superintendent of Schools and other Town Officers.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of roads and bridges.
- Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for Common Road Patrol.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote "Yes" or "No" in regard to snow removal in Town for winter of 1932-1933.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase snow fence for the winter of 1932-1933.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay snow bills.
- Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of raising and appropriating necessary money to entitle the Town to State Aid as provided in Section 19, Chapter 25, of the Public Laws of 1916.
- Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$666.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for care of ways, highways and bridges. The above amount being the maximum which the Town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

- Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$800.00 for the maintenance of Third Class Roads, such sum being necessary to prevent a forfeiture of apportionment from the State under provisions of Section 4, Chapter 260, of the Public Laws of 1929.
- Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300.00 to gravel the Hardscrabble Road near the Auburn line.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate on the road from Harris Hill Schoolhouse to Mechanic Falls line.
- Art. 20. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$300.00 and expend on the Jackson road near Harry Johnston's place.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to expend on Hayes Hill.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to improve the road near Abram's Place continuing towards Summit Spring Hotel, continuing work done in 1931.
- Art. 23. To see what sum, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid Roads built within the past five years in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 271, Public Laws of 1931.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay Collector's commission and abatements.
- Art. 26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and donate to A. A. Dwinal Post, G. A. R. to help defray expenses of Memorial Day.

- Art. 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Contingent Fund.
- Art. 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.
- Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$75.00 to pay the School Board.
- Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 to pay the Town Bond due September 1, 1931 and \$675.00 to pay interest on Town Bonds due in 1932.
- Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to cut all Town Official's pay and all School Teachers 10% or more.
- Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to give the Tax Collector permission and authority to collect delinquent taxes both real and personal by the State Law.
- Art. 33. To see what date the Town will fix for payment of taxes.
- Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to make poll taxes payable on presentation of bill.
- Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Town Treasurer and Selectmen to hire necessary money to pay bills until taxes are collected.
- Art. 36. To see if the Town will vote "Yes" or "No" to have the Tax Collector bring suit immediately before April 1st, to recover the taxes assessed in 1931 against Camp Marqua, Young Woman's Christian Association.
- Art. 37. To see if the Town will vote "Yes" or "No" to appoint Cook, Hutchinson, Pierce & Cannell the Town's Attorneys for the suit against Camp Marqua.

- Art. 38. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee of not less than five or more than ten citizens of Poland to work during the ensuing year in conjunction with representatives of other Maine towns to get through the Maine State Legislature a clear definition of the right of tax exemption of so-called charitable, religious and research Camps and organizations and to choose the members of said committee, if so voted.
- Art. 39. To see if the Town will vote not to hire any help out of town.
- Art. 40. To see what action the Town will vote to take on closing or selling the Town Farm for the ensuing year.
- Art. 41. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for repairs of Town buildings.
- Art. 42. To see what action the Town will take in regard to calling the Mechanic Falls fire department for fighting fire in the Town of Poland.
- Art. 43. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the road leading from Mechanic Falls line at Cousins Brook to Poland Corner.
- Art. 44. To see if the Town of Poland will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 to be used for nursing work under the supervision of the Androscoggin County Red Cross.
- Art. 45. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote taken in 1926 to dispose of such vacant School property as the School Board deems advisable.
- Art. 46. To see if the Town will vote to turn the vacant school property over to the Selectmen.
- Art. 47. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 to eradicate brown tail moths.
- Art. 48. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,300.00 for maintenance of State Highways

during the ensuing year under provisions of Section 9 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913 and Chapter 272 of the Public Laws of 1915.

- Art. 49. To see if the Town will vote to continue the Johnson Hill school.
- Art. 50. To see what action the town will take, if any, with regard to maintaining electric lights in school buildings.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall on the day of meeting at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
