In order for the farm to continue to produce milk and house able bodied inmates, it will be necessary either to install a flush closet or build a milk room, as present conditions are not in accordance with the Milk Regulations.

The barn needs to be resilled and shingled on the back side.

The present Board of Selectmen recommend Mr. and Mrs. Tripp to run the farm for the ensuing year.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH AND HEALTH OFFICER

February 15, 1934

To the Citizens of Poland:

We have been very fortunate the past year in having so few cases of contagious and infectious diseases reported, in fact much less than for a number of years. The following have been reported to me and I have reported the same to the State Department of Health at Augusta.

I have had three families under quarantine for scarlet fever and two under a partial quarantine for the same. One dog was under quarantine for two weeks for fear of rabies. Two homes have been disinfected and at present we have but one family under quarantine for scarlet fever. A number of nuisance cases have been investigated. Between six and seven hundred health certificates have been issued to food handlers.

Elmer Walker and A. F. Waterhouse were appointed as plumbing inspector and deputy and were confirmed by the State Department for 1934.

During March free vaccination will be given to all who apply as a precaution against small pox.

We appreciate the cooperation of all and ask for your continued support.

REPORT OF AUDITOR

February 27, 1934.

To the Board of Selectmen,
of the Town of Poland, Maine.

Gentlemen:

We respectfully report that we have examined the accounting records of the Town of Poland for the year ended February 15, 1934.

The Treasurer's records have been examined and are hereby certified correct. We have determined, from all sources available, that income due the Town has been properly accounted for, and all disbursements made by the Treasurer were supported by orders from the Selectmen or other proper authority. Other Town funds in the custody of the Treasurer were found to be in proper order. Your Treasurer has been requested to designate in his reports the balances of cash impounded in closed banks so that it may be clearly shown that these balances are not available for current expenses of the Town.

All orders drawn by the Selectmen were signed by at least two members of the board and are supported by invoices or other vouchers in proper form.

The Tax Collector's records have been examined and the entire commitment plus the supplementary list of taxes due and automobile excise taxes collected, has been satisfactorily accounted for.

The records of the Superintendent of Schools, Road Commissioner and Treasurer of the Ministerial Fund have been examined and were in proper order.

Due to the general business depression and the banking holidays, a large amount of extra time has been required of the Selectmen and Treasurer during the past year, and the time necessary to complete our audit is more than in prior years. Such adjustments as have been necessary were referred to the proper officials as noted and, in our opinion, are properly reflected in the various final reports as submitted to us.

Believing that the children of the Town of Poland are entitled to at least thirty-four weeks of school; believing that the teachers of Poland's children are deserving a living wage for their services, and believing that the Town of Poland, with its low tax rate, is well able to meet these necessary expenses, the following recommendations for amounts to be raised and appropriated at the Annual Meeting are respectfully submitted.

We also recommend that the Town, at its next Annual Meeting vote to continue the Johnson Hill School for the school year, beginning in September, 1934.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens
of the Town of Poland:

It is my pleasure to present the following brief school report for the year closing February 16, 1934.

The annual school census, taken last April, gave a total of 445 persons between the ages of five and twenty-one, 226 boys and 219 girls. This is a gain of 41 over the number reported to the State a year ago.

Out of this number 399 were attending school last fall, 326 in the local schools and 73 in various High Schools (see tabular statements).

Students were registered in High Schools as follows: Mechanic Falls, 51; Edward Little, 15; Fryeburg Academy, 2; Scarborough, 1; Gorham, 1. Two of these have left school, while 13 are to be graduated next spring. This will leave 58 enrolled next fall, which, added to the present number in the eighth grade will make a registration of over ninety, provided none decide to leave school.

The financial statement shows expenditures of \$14,809.03, more than \$2,600 less than was expended last year and almost \$5,000 less than two years ago. This reduction in expenses was the result of three factors; a 20% cut in teachers' weekly salaries; closing schools two weeks earlier last spring, so the State school year was only 32 weeks, and paying for only thirty-one weeks of school for the present fiscal year.

It is to be hoped that a sufficient amount will be raised at the annual meeting so that the children may have the advantage of thirty-six weeks of school. An elementary school year of only thirty-two weeks means a big handicap to those children who go to High School and compete with others who have had the advantage of a thirty-six week school year.

A determined effort is being made by the teachers to keep the children up to grade in their work. All that is needed to be sure that this is accomplished is a few more weeks of school this spring.

Notwithstanding their large cut in salaries I feel that the teachers are doing their work with just as much interest, enthusiasm and professional spirit as ever, and they surely are deserving of commendation for this attitude.

Only the routine necessary repair work has been done this year except at Minot Corner. At this school a special appropriation made possible a very much needed change in the toilet conditions, and some new seats and a new floor up stairs. In the Primary room the plaster was patched and walls and ceiling were refinished. The outside steps were also put in shape and some grading done. Next year it will be necessary to erect a suitable fence on the upper side of the school lot and more grading should be done.

Considerable repairs are needed at the other buildings, particularly at West Poland, South Poland, and Empire. It is time now also to start on the painting program again. Two or three buildings each year is the economical way to keep them in good condition. With these things in mind a much larger appropriation is needed at the annual meeting.

In closing I would ask the people of Poland to take serious thought of the school situation, with particular reference to the length of the school year, and to decide whether or not the children in the grades are having as

good educational opportunities as rightfully belong to them.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

To Raymond A. Waterhouse, Constable of Poland in the
County of Androscoggin and State of Maine:

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Poland qualified by law to vote in Town affairs to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Monday the twelfth day of March A.D., 1934 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To hear and act upon reports of Town Officers and Committee on Accounts.

Art. 3. To elect all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to elect one or more road commissioners and fix their compensation.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay tuition of scholars attending High School of other Towns and for the Support of Common Schools and for textbooks and supplies.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs of school property.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Salary of the Superintendent of Schools and other Town Officers.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the health work in the schools. The rest of the Bills to be paid by the Poland Red Cross.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of roads and bridges.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Common Road Patrol.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote "Yes" or "No" in regard to Snow removal in Town for winter of 1934-1935.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay snow bills.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase snow fence for the winter of 1934-1935.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of raising and appropriating necessary money to entitle the Town to State Aid as provided in Section 20, Chapter 28 of the Public Laws of 1930.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$666.00 for the improvement of the Section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for care of Ways, Highways, and Bridges. The above amount being the maximum which is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930 or under the provisions of Section 22, Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,300.00 for maintenance of State

Highways and Special Resolve Highways during the ensuing year under provisions of Sections 9-18-36-37 and 38, Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$869.00 for maintenance of Third Class Road, such sums being necessary to prevent a forfeiture of apportionment from the State under provisions of Section 4, Chapter 260 of Public Laws of 1929.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and expend on the road from Harris Hill Schoolhouse to the Mechanic Falls line.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to fix the compensation for trucks \$1.00 per hour for 1½ Ton Truck and driver.

Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to fix the compensation of the road crew, compensation for teams, and for Town Officials.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay Collector's Commission and abatements.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Contingent Fund.

Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$75.00 to pay School Board.

Art. 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to pay Town Bond due Sept. 1, 1934 and \$840.00 to pay interest on Town Bond and Town Notes due in 1934.

Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to give the Tax Collector permission and authority to collect delinquent taxes, both real and personal, by the State Law.

Art. 27. To see what date the Town will fix for payment of Taxes.

Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to make poll taxes payable August 1, 1934.

Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Town Treasurer and Selectmen to hire necessary money to pay bills until taxes are collected.

Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for Repairs of Town Buildings.

Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the tax payers to call the nearest fire department in case of fire, without permission from the selectmen, and have the selectmen instruct the fire department to this effect.

Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 to eradicate brown tail moths.

Art. 33. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to expend on a Milk Room or Flush Closet at Town Farm.

Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to continue the Johnson Hill School for the School Year beginning September, 1934.

Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 in trust of which the income each year shall be used for the care and upkeep of the burial lot of Lemuel C. Keene, buried at Megquire Hill Cemetery.

Art. 36. To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen revalue the Town's real estate property.

Art. 37. To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen revise and bring up to date the boundary book before they assess the 1934 tax.

Art. 38. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,000.00 to pay C. L. Keene for note due Feb. 14, 1935.

Art. 39. To see if the Town will vote to have the Town Books audited for the ensuing year.

Art. 40. To see if the Town will vote to sell the Town Farm.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall on the day of the meeting at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
